REPORT ON CIVIL RIGHTS LEGISLATION

The first test vote of the Session on the so-called civil rights question came in the House of Representatives last week. This question has provoked more hot words than any recent political issue.

Congressman Kee'e of Wisconsin had succeeded in placing a rider on an appropriation bill at a subcommittee meeting which would prevent the segregation of whites and colored in certain vocational schools and hospitals. When the full committee on appropriations met to give final approval to the measure, I joined with other Democrats on the committee in an effort to strike the obnoxious language from the bill. We were able to get enough Republican votes to win the motion and amend the bill.

The next contest came on the floor of the House. Congressman Marcantonio of New York offered a motion to restore the language which we had been successful in striking from the bill in Committee. Democrats voted against the motion almost solidly and we were able to win sufficient Republican

support to defeat the Marcantonio amendment.

The so-called civil rights program includes proposals for the passage of Federal antipoll tax and antilynching legislation, plus a so-called FEPC law and legislation which would prohibit the segregation of whites and colored in interstate travel, and eventually in the schools. In previous years we have been confronted with parts of this program and by voice and vote I have always opposed it and I am continuing my active opposition.

I maintain that a federal antipoll tax law would be unconstitutional because Art. 1, of the U. S. Constitution, provides that the States, not the federal government, shall fix the qualification of voters. The people of Texas, if they desire, can amend the Texas constitution which provides for the poll tax and substitute a system of registration, but the U. S. Congress has no authority to indirectly amend the Texas constitution.

Lynching is a crime which is local in character and should not be handled by Washington authorities but by local and state officials. As to the FEPC and the proposals to prevent the segregation of the whites and colored on railroad trains and in schools, I take the position of those who say that the federal government has no right to interfere with local laws and customs in this regard, and that our system for segregation of the races is necessary and in the best interest of both races.

But many of the northern Democrats and many Republicans are loudly advocating the so-called civil rights program in an effort to get the negro and minority votes in the doubtful states of the North and East.

The Republicans have a majority in both the House and Senate. Therefore, the only chance to stop this program is through a non-partisan fight against it by both Democrats and Republicans such as proved successful in our effort to eliminate the so-called civil rights rider from the appropriation bill.

Miss Doris Jane Roberts, who is a student in Mary Hardin-Baylor College, Belton, has been here since last Friday visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Roberts, while the heating plant at Baylor is being rebuilt. It was destroyed by fire last week. Miss Doris Jane is a 1947 graduate of the Tahoka high school.

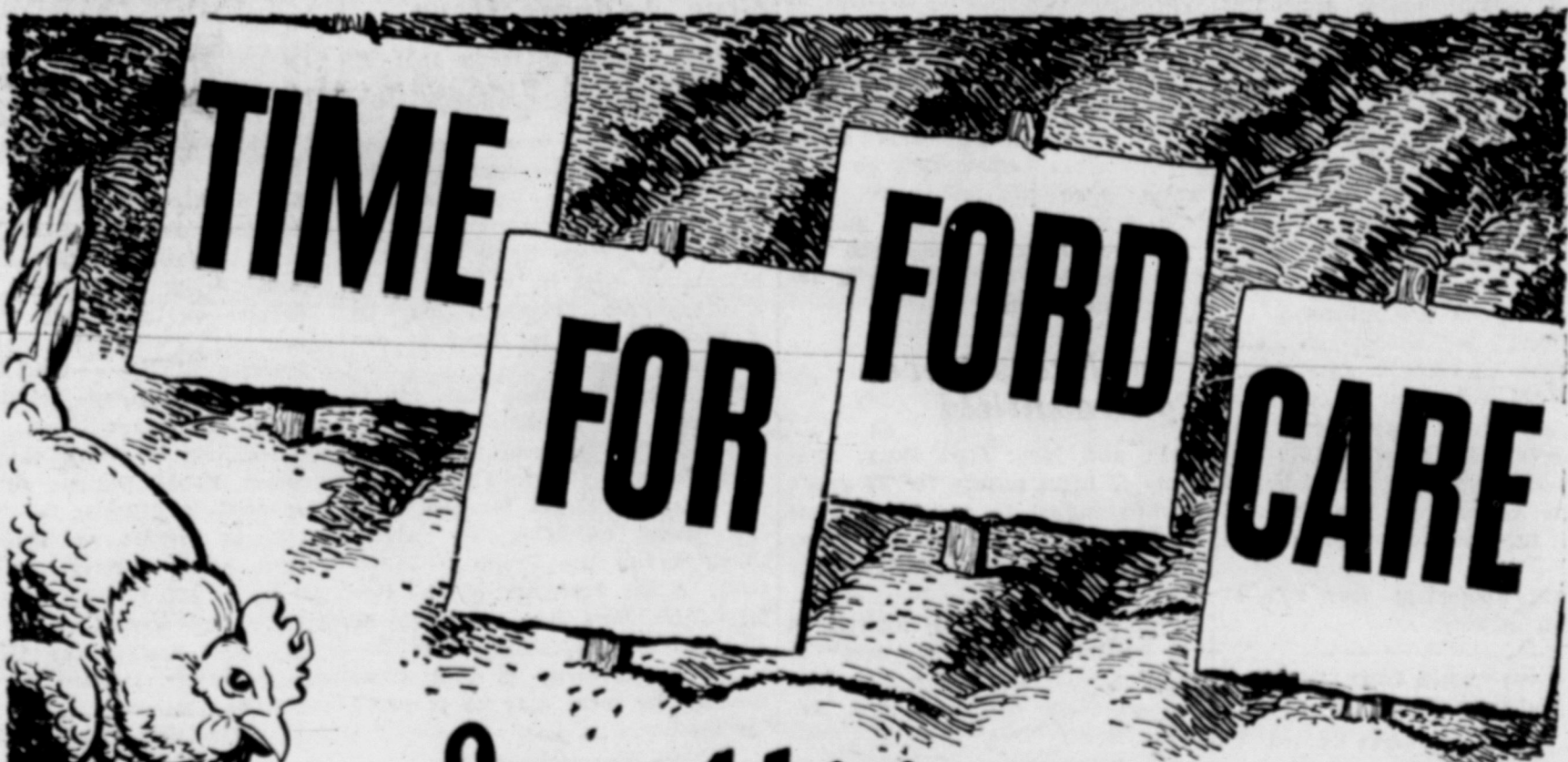

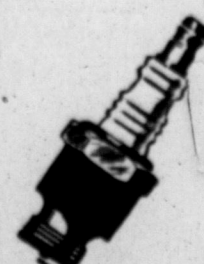

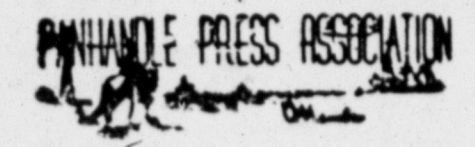

Committeemen of the Texas Democrats in session in Tyler Saturday lined up with the regular Texas Democratic organization in opposition to President Truman's so-called Civil Rights program. In opposition to the Federal Government's attempt to establish its claims to the oil under the tide-lands of Texas, asked that the two-thirds rule in national Democratic conventions be restored, so as to give the South at least the veto power in the nomination of candidates for the Presidency, favored an uninstructed delegation to the national convention, took a slap at National Chairman Mc-

Grath, endorsed universal military training, endorsed the Gossett plan for electing the President and vice-president of the United States, and resolved to support the regular Democratic nominees for this year or the offices. A proposal was made to start a movement to draft Eisenhower as the party's candidate for the Presidency, but strong opposition developed and the proposal was withdrawn. The Young Democrats, we believe, expressed the majority sentiment of the Democrats of Texas on all these points. It is the proposal for universal military training; and unless Russia abandons her aggressiveness and menacing attitude, the majority of our people will doubtless come around to the position of favoring universal military training.

At a dramatic session of the U. S. Senate Saturday night and following a spirited debate that consumed more than eleven hours, the Marshall plan of aid to Europe was approved by the overwhelming vote of 69 to 17. The opposition was led by Republican Senator Taft, Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, Republican, and Senator Connolly of Texas. Democrat introduced, and sponsored the bill in the Senate. The passage of the measure by so strong a vote is hailed as a blow to Communism and to the apparent purpose of Russia to rule the entire continent of Europe and eventually the world. The bill appropriates the sum of \$5,300,000,000 for the rehabilitation of sixteen western European countries in order to restore them to a fair degree of prosperity and to save them from the virus of com-

munist. It is a vast sum of money but it is vastly cheaper than a third world war would be, and is constructive while a war would be terribly destructive.

Another war now would be too horrible to contemplate. But we believe that this country is pursuing the only possible course that, without divine intervention, can avert war. It is evident to us that unless Russia is stopped in her aggressions now, she will keep right on grabbing up nation after nation until she will have all Europe in her grasp. Then she will proceed to strike further in whatever direction may seem to her to be the most practicable. The more nations she subdues and assimilates, the stronger she will feel and the more defiant of the United States will she become. She seems bent on spreading her communism throughout the world, and she would regard the United States as the greatest prize of them all. Paraphrasing what Abraham Lincoln said, she realizes that the world can not long continue to be half slave and half free—half communistic and half democratic. Therefore she has decided to wipe out the democracies one by one. And the more of them she wipes out the harder will it be for us to stop her. She knows no law but the law of might, and the time has come when we must speak sternly and carry a big stick. Congress is doing the right thing in adopting the Marshall plan and in encouraging western Europe to organize for defense against the Muscovite Monster.

Two recent political announcements in New Mexico and one in Oklahoma are of much interest to the people of Texas. In New Mexico it was announced a couple of weeks ago that Senator Carl Hatch would not run for re-election. Then on Saturday came the definite announcement from Secretary of Agriculture, Anderson, that he would be a candidate for Hatch's seat. In Oklahoma, Governor Robert Kerr announced that he would be a candidate for the Senate from that state.

PEPSI-COLA AWARDS THREE TEXANS SCHOLARSHIPS

Three Texas high school students were awarded a scholarship by the Pepsi-Cola company in their nation-wide competition of 121 four-year scholars' lips.

The three Texans winning the top honors in the nationwide \$130,000 scholarship competition were Carl Davis, Fort Worth; Richard Vann, Belton; and George Donaldson, Houston.

The Pepsi-Cola Company financed this nation-wide program as a service to American youth.

There were 1,606 candidates from Texas competing and 46,112 students from 10,629 high schools in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico.

According to an announcement made public this week a total of 722 awards were granted to boys and girls throughout the country this year. 121 were Four-Year College scholarships, at least two of which were awarded in each of the 48 states, District of Columbia, and one each in Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico.

URGES CITIZEN FORCE

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Sp.)—Creation of a citizen's unified military force of 16,000,000 men was recommended to the Gray Beard by Col. William H. Neblett, president of the Reserve Officers Association. He would begin by organizing veterans of World War II who are not yet 45 years old.

GEORGE PEDDY TO BE STRONG CONTENDER FOR U. S. SENATE

The News has received the information published below about George E. B. Peddy, a prominent lawyer of Houston who, in January announced his candidacy for the United States Senate to succeed Senator W. Lee O'Daniel. Since the News recently published a story respecting the only other candidate, Coke Stevenson, we feel that common fairness requires that we publish this information furnished by Mr. Peddy's supporters. So, a few words about his life.

He was born August 22, 1892, on a farm in Shelby county, the youngest of seven sons. His father died two months before he was born.

At the age of ten, he joined the Methodist Church, and throughout his career, it is stated, he has led a Christian life.

After graduating in high school in 1913, he entered the University and paid his way for two years by washing dishes. He then accepted a position as teacher in a rural school in Shelby county and while teaching was elected to the legislature without opposition. That was in 1916 and he was then 24 years of age.

While serving as legislator, he continued his law studies in the University. He acquired the reputation as a formidable debater and an eloquent speaker while in school, and when the amendment proposing woman suffrage was submitted he became one of its most effective advocates.

When the United States was drawn into World War I, he withdrew from school and entered the army. He served with distinction through that contest.

After the war ended, he re-entered the University and received his law degree in 1920. After graduating, he located in Houston

for the practice of the law. In 1921, he married a University girl, Miss Gertrude Erwin, and they have reared two nephews as their own children, both of whom served in World War II.

From 1920 to 1922, Peddy served as assistant criminal district attorney in Harris county. In 1922, when E. B. Mayfield was nominated for the United States Senate, a group of Anti-Ku Klux Democrats nominated Mayfield as their choice for the place, but failing to get his name on the official ballot, more than 140,000 of them wrote in his name on their ballots.

During the next eighteen years he practiced law most successfully in Houston, and in 1942 he volunteered for service in the U. S. Army. He served through the war, mostly in France and Germany, with distinction. While in Europe, he learned much about economic conditions there and is doubtless well equipped to serve in the United States Senate.

He has the reputation of being a brilliant orator, and the prospects are that he will be a strong contender for the Senate.

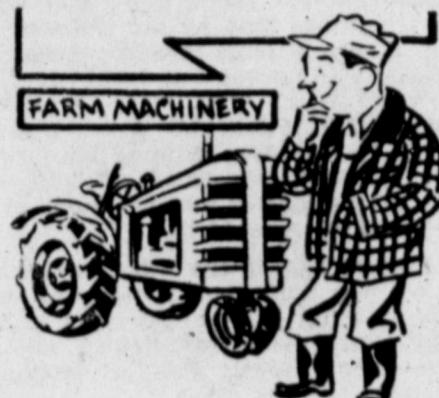

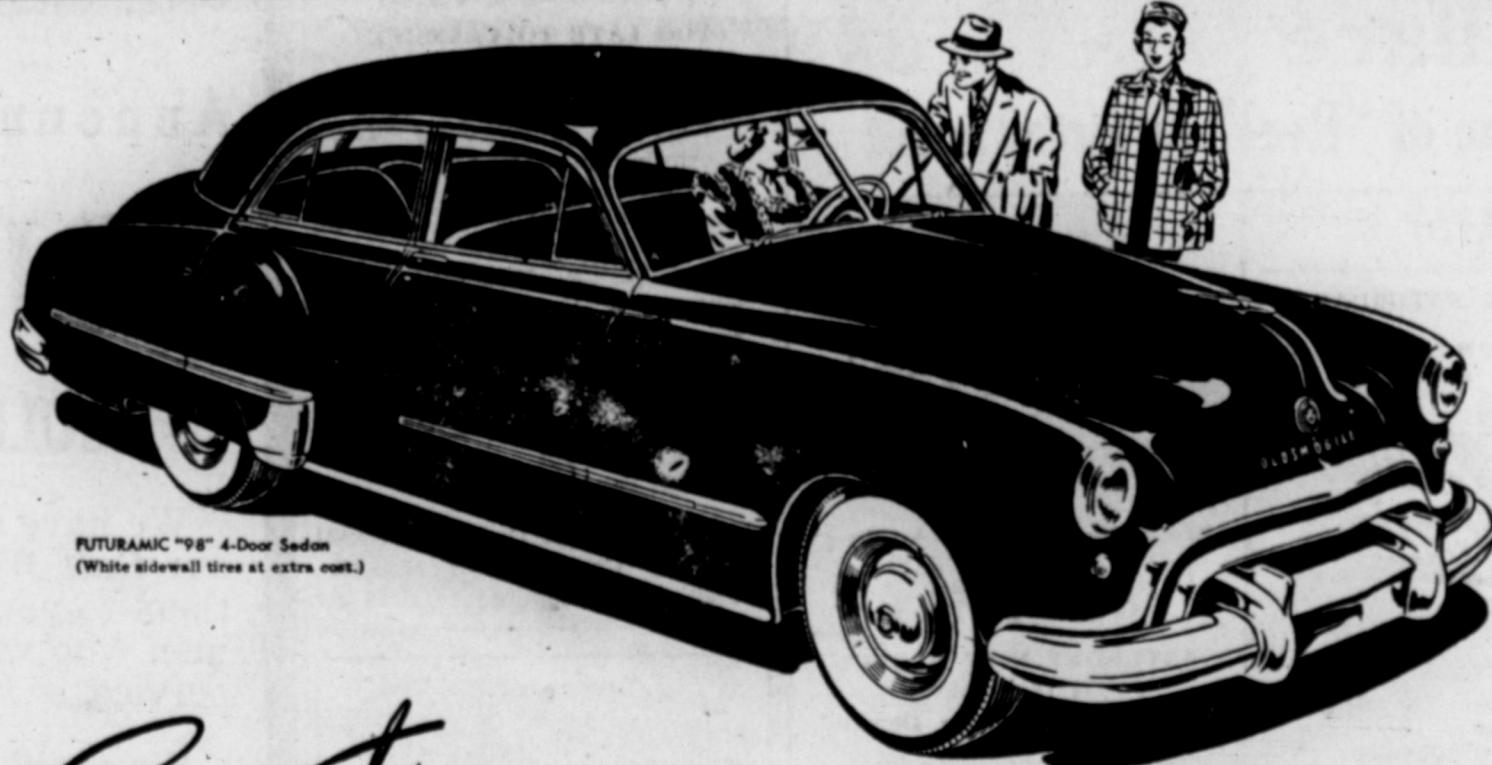
