REPORT ON CIVIL RIGHTS LEGISLATION

By George Mahon

The first test vote of the Session on the so-called civil rights question came in the House of Representatives last week. This question has provoked more hot words than any recent political issue.

Congressman Kee'e of Wisconsin had succeeded in placing a rider on an appropriation bill at a subcommittee meeting which would prevent the segregation of whi'es and colored in certain vocational schools and hospitals. When the full committee on appropriations met to give final approval to the measure, I joined with other Democrats on the committee in an effort to strike the obnoxious language from the bill. We were able to get enough Republican votes to win the motion and amend the bill.

The next contest came on the floor of the House. Congressman Marcantonio of New York offered a motion to restore the language which we had been successful in striking from the bill in Committee. Democrats voted against the motion almost solidly and we were able to win sufficient Republican







