## Farm Implements, Mechanics School Here Wednesday

A farm implement show and service school will be held in Tahoka at the Fair grounds next Wednesday, April 28, according to County Agent Bill Griffin, who is making arrangements for the meeting.

All farmers, farm hands, 4-H and FFA boys, mechanics, and other people interested are invited to attend. The school will be similar to one held in Lubbock recently.

Local implement dealers and the farm machinery manufacturers are co-operating in staging the school. Latest farm machinery and some of the latest methods of farming will be demonstrated. Talks and films will be presented by factory representatives, farm experts, and local service men.

The meeting will be an all-day affair beginning at 9:30 in the morning and continuing until 3:30 in the afternoon. Talks and picture shows will be held in the livestock exhibit barn.

This comedy presents a fond and adoring mother, who exaggerates everything pertaining to her son.

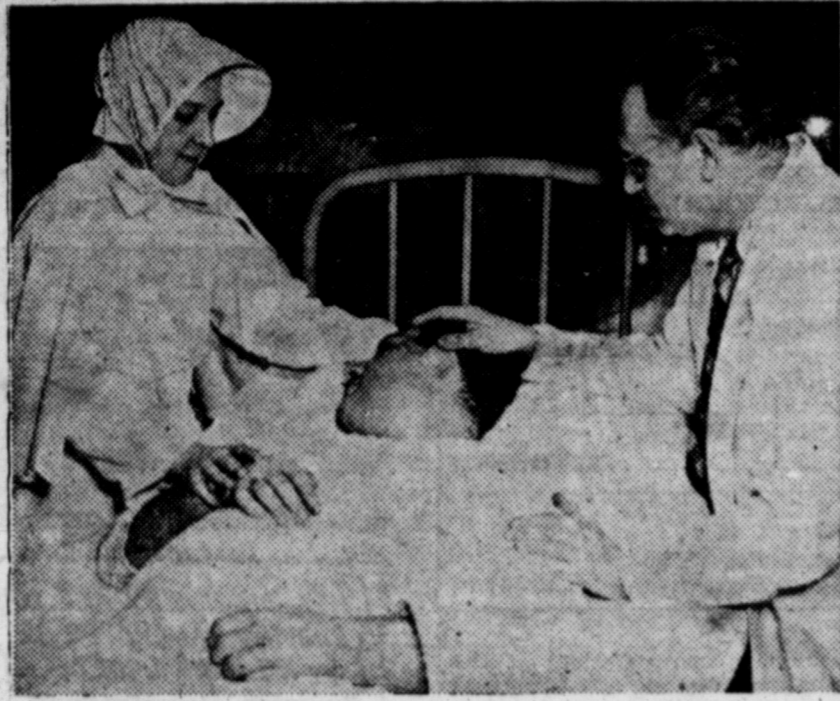

## Local Showes Aid Some Sections of The South Plains

Local rains have fallen this week in many localities in Lynn County, making the planting of crops possible in the favored places.

The series of showers began Monday afternoon when the first thunder clouds of the season gathered and hung over this entire area. Just a very light shower fell in Tahoka but it grew heavier east of town and a rain that filled the furrows in the fields with water covered a considerable area from the first lake east of Tahoka on to the six-mile service station and even to Central Church. Showers, light in some places and heavy in others, covered most of the south-east quarter of the county. A rather severe hail storm swept a considerable area in the Midway community but little damage was done. Much lightning and thunder accompanied these showers even where the rainfall was practically nil.

On Tuesday night another rain-cloud approached from the south and deposited its moisture over portions of Dawson county and a narrow strip extending east and west over the south side of Lynn county. O'Donnell reported the rainfall there at 1.75 inches. A good rain was also reported in Wells and other communities west and northwest of O'Donnell.

Showers also fell in some localities on Wednesday afternoon, and the skies remain overcast and threatening — or promising — as this report is being written Thursday.

Farmers and business men generally pleased with the start that has been made.

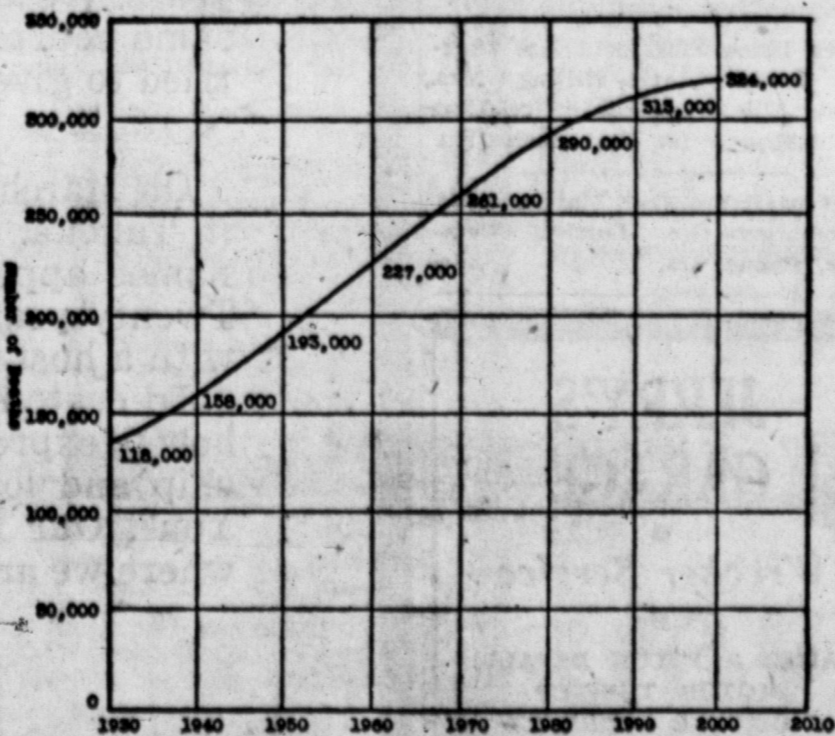

**Sidelights From Washington**

Most West Texans will approve the action of the House of Representatives last week with respect to two important subjects, public roads and the U. S. Air Force.

The House approved a new three year public roads program to succeed the program which is now being completed. Under the new law a total of \$1 1/2 billion dollars will be expended by the Federal government over a three year period. The money will be spent in cooperation with the states for various phases of public road construction, including farm-to-market roads.

The bill approved by the House for the Air Force provides funds for a total of 2900 modern military aircraft. An additional 1500 planes are provided for the Navy. The number of additional planes for the Air Force is far in excess of the number originally requested by the President. This increase was provided in view of the unsettled world conditions and refusal of Russia to cooperate in our efforts to promote peace. I spoke in favor of the program for the expansion and modernization of the Air Force and served as a Member of the committee which wrote the legislation and presented it to the House for action.

The passage of this legislation for an expanded and improved Air Force is one of the most significant and important steps taken by Congress since V-J Day. Undoubtedly the American people favor such a program. We had some difficulty in the House in securing passage of an important amendment but on final passage of the bill, the House was almost unanimous, passing the measure with only three dissenting votes.

**COTTON MECHANIZATION MEETING TO BE HELD IN LUBBOCK IN OCTOBER**

COLLEGE STATION—The second annual nationwide cotton merchandization conference will be held October 14-15-16 at Lubbock Director R. D. Lewis of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, announced Tuesday.

Decision to hold the conference at Lubbock was reached at the meeting of the 18-member mechanization steering committee of the National Cotton Council held in Memphis, Tenn. An invitation to meet in Texas was extended by the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Extension Service of the Texas A. & M. College and by the Texas State-wide Cotton Committee.

Director Lewis said the mechanization group adopted as a theme for the 1948 meeting, "the challenges of the mechanization of cotton and related farm crops." He added that initial plans for the three-day program call for a demonstration of the various phases of mechanized cotton production, and mechanization authorities.

Holding the conference at Lubbock will give the highly mechanized operation on the High Plains of Texas, Lewis said. Already, he pointed out, some High Plains farmers have reduced the man-

hour requirements for cotton production to 6.9 per acre.

Ransom E. Aldrich, Michigan City, Miss., chairman of the permanent mechanization steering committee, advised Director Lewis that attendance at the 1948 conference is expected to exceed that of the first conference held last year at Stonesville, Miss. Nearly 1,000 representatives of agriculture, farm implement companies and governmental agencies attended the Stonesville meeting, Lewis said.

Mechanization demonstrations at Lubbock will be under the supervision of D. L. Jones, superintendent of the Lubbock sub-station. They will emphasize High Plains mechanization practices including harvesting the crop with strippers, Lewis said.

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An American General at Frankfurt, Germany, underwent the humiliating experience of apologizing to the Russian Government for alleged insulting and violent conduct directed by two American soldiers toward officers of the Russian Restitution Mission in Frankfurt. One of the soldiers is alleged to have cursed the officers and "tried to pick a fight, followed them home and threw a rock through their window; then both the men entered the officer's billets and used profane and abusive language. The News story didn't say so but this sounded to us like the conduct of two drunk men. Whether they were drunk or sober, such conduct is not calculated to help the influence or the popularity of the United States with the people of other nations and does not help the cause of peace. It may tend to fan the flames of hatred that might cause a third World War. Most American soldiers are gentlemen: all of them should be—and to that end they should remain sober.

The folks who get out a newspaper, even a weekly, usually work

like fighting fire, and hence many errors appearing in newspaper columns are excusable. For instance there is a slight error in the foregoing sentence, made for the sake of brevity, but there is little excuse for the frequent and glaring errors contained in stories, or propaganda, sent to the newspapers by representatives of the colleges seeking publicity. Just this week we noted two or three glaring errors in the first two lines of copy sent by one college to this newspaper. Such errors are not very good advertising for the colleges making them. College students sending out such material do not know how to write correct English, it might help if they would submit their contributions to their English teachers for correction before sending them out. Turning out graduates who write slovenly, punctuate carelessly, and mis-spell simple words, seems to be one of the weaknesses of the modern college.

Among the teachers in Tahoka public schools who were re-elected recently was Para Lee Sayles, teacher of the colored children. We don't know how many terms Para Lee has taught but she has been a teacher here possibly longer than any other member of the faculty. We are sure that she has done a good job and deserves the commendation of the board of trustees as well as the patrons of her school and of the white people of Tahoka also. She has labored under great difficulties in that it has been her task to teach at least seven grades. It is to be hoped that the school board will soon find it practical and wise to employ an additional teacher for the colored school. The fewness of colored children who choose to attend school or whose parents choose to send them accounts for the fact that the school board has found it possible thus far to "get by" with one teacher. But we are sure that two teachers teaching three or four grades each could do much more efficient work than can one teacher teaching seven grades. Furthermore, when a second colored teacher is added, we believe that the compulsory attendance law should be more rigidly enforced than it has been heretofore. Let's give the colored children every educational opportunity to which they are entitled and enforce better attendance upon the school provided for them. The colored people of Tahoka do not desire that their children shall attend school for the Whites, but they have a right to expect that the Whites will provide them with the very best educational opportunities that may be practicable. This newspaper is not undertaking to run the schools of Tahoka nor to control the actions of the board of trustees; we merely want to give the colored children a square deal, and we believe the board of trustees wants to do the same thing. Our treatment of them should be entirely above criticism.

Harold Stassen took a decided swing upward following the Nebraska election last week. Governor Dewey of New York was a poor second and Senator Taft of Ohio was a poorer third. Coming from Minnesota, Stassen may be expected to sweep most of the republican states of the Middle West. Dewey and Taft will probably split wide open the votes of the Northeastern states from Ohio to Maine. There is so much politics involved in the Republican votes of the South that it is difficult to forecast with any degree of accuracy as to how the delegates to the Republican convention from the Southern states will stand. California and possibly some of the Rocky Mountain states will favor Governor Warren of California. Just who will be the Republican nominee for the Presidency is anybody's guess. It is altogether probable that President Truman will be the Democratic nominee but he will go into the fight for re-election with a broken wing. Harold Stassen could be the next President of the United States.

**BROTHERHOOD HAS ROUNDTABLE DISCUSSION**  
With a comparatively few men present and no prepared program for the occasion, the Baptist Brotherhood engaged in a roundtable discussion of its plans for the future at its regular meeting Monday night. The discussion, it is believed, will result in a greater program of activities hereafter. One of the matters which was given attention was the quarterly meeting of the Associational Brotherhood to be held in the church here soon. While there will be an inspirational address by one of the pastors of the association, it was decided to stress the musical part of the program at this meeting. It is hoped that there will be a large attendance from over the two counties included in this association, Lynn and Terry.

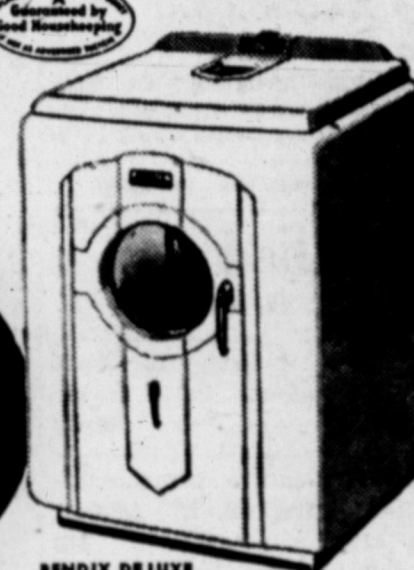

**ASSOCIATIONAL BROTHERHOOD MEETS HERE SOON**

**HEALTH NOTES**

Austin, Texas, April 20. The ordinary housefly is an enemy to health, and is one of the agents most commonly responsible for the spread of disease throughout the nation, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Typhoid fever, dysentery, and many other intestinal diseases can often be traced to the common housefly as the carrier of infection.

Speaking in this connection, Dr. Cox advised: "Be sure that your windows and doors are tightly screened so that stray flies will not endanger the health of your family. Keep flies away from food, drink, and utensils used in the preparation of food. Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that outside privy vaults are tightly covered so as not to permit the entrance of flies. Infections from this source can be picked up by flies and spread to human beings through contact with food, drink, and utensils. Keep all garbage covered until collected or buried. Eliminate all breeding places for flies and you will be helping your community in its work of controlling communicable diseases and preventing unnecessary illness."

Dr. Cox said that the State Health Department would furnish upon request a pamphlet outlining safe and practical methods recommended for use in fly control.

**STARTER SOLUTIONS**

College Station, April 22. To get an early start in growth with tomatoes, peppers, and eggplants, J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A & M College. These vegetables are having to be set out a little late this year due to the late freeze.

When setting out the plants in the garden, pour a teacupful of the solution around each one. And here are directions for making the solution: add one pound of 5-10-5 fertilizer to five gallons of water—that's the same as 10 pounds of 5-10-5 to a barrel of water—mix well and let the solution stand for a while so it will completely dissolve. Repeat in seven to ten days to give the plants a good "send-off".

There will not be many early tomatoes, peppers nor eggplants this year because of heavy kills of plants in the cold frames. Plants should go to the field in early April during an average year, but the late freeze will put this off for another two or three weeks.

The Rio Grande Valley plant dealers will be taxed to supply demands, so don't look for heavy yields in late tomatoes. Because the early variety tomatoes got off to a late start, the growing season for the later varieties, so the crowded, says Rosborough, so the late-tomato yield will not be as large as usual this year.

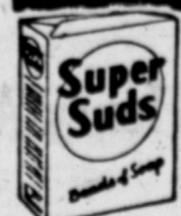

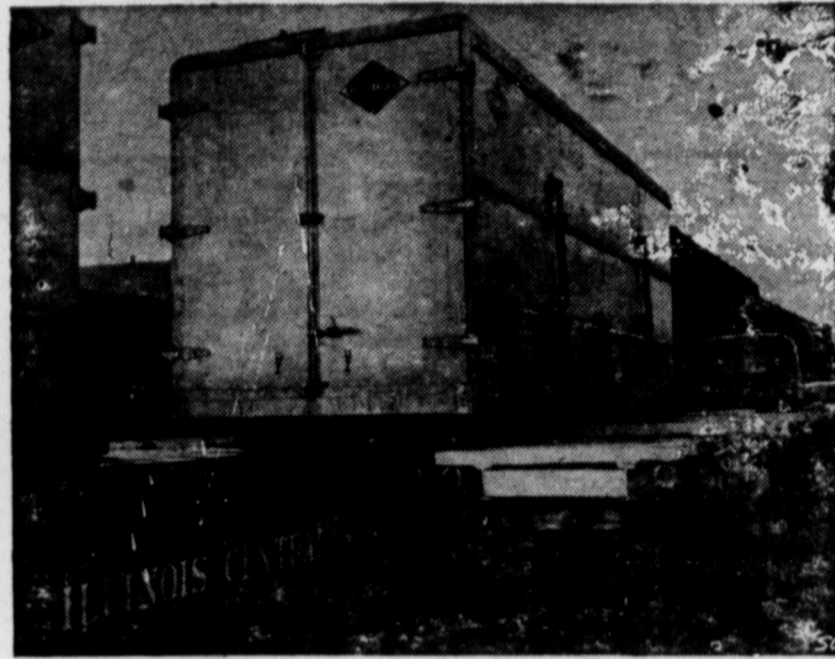

Pictured here is a revolutionary method of shifting 10 tons of merchandise from a flat car to a motor-truck trailer in a transportation experiment now being conducted by the Illinois Central Railroad between Chicago and Memphis. The service coordinates rail and highway transport on a door-to-door basis through the use of an aluminum container and equipment developed by the Reynolds Metals Company. 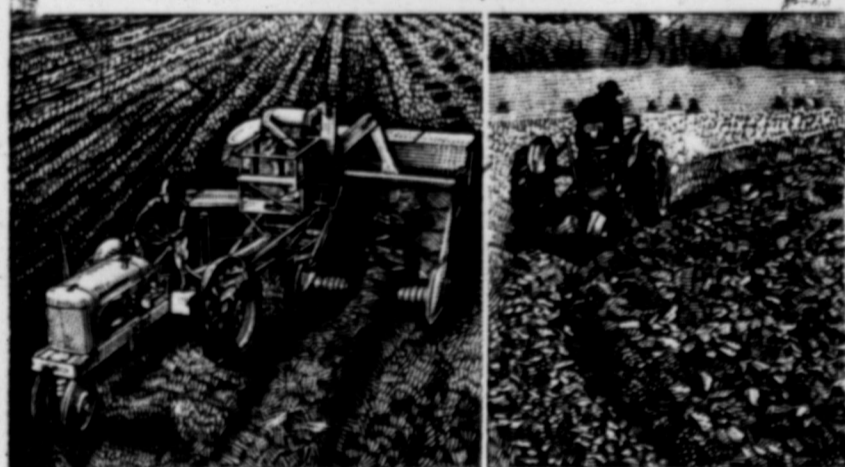

of the home demonstration agent.  
The tenant purchase plan was instituted here by the Government in 1939 through the Farm Security Administration, predecessor to the Farmers Home Administration, for the purpose of selecting outstanding tenants through a process of careful elimination and setting them up with a farm of their own. Up to 100 percent loans are made for a term of 40 years at 3 percent interest.  
Through the local office 52 farms have been bought, averaging about 175 acres each, and since 1940 23 have been paid for entirely. In this year a total of approximately \$455,000 has been loaned these 52 farmers to buy farms.  
Mr. Walker's annual report has some interesting figures which re-

fect the success of the program as handled by the Lynn-Garza unit with headquarters here.  
Since 12 farmers had already paid off all notes on their farms, this year's report is on 40 farmers, who had an average of 4.6 people to the family. The average loan is for \$9,400.00, and the average annual payment is \$458.00. These borrowers have had five annual payments come due, but the average farmer in the program has paid eight years in advance which is not yet due.  
This year's report shows that the borrower has had an average total income of \$10,211 from his farm, and has shown a net gain in his farm assets of \$3,464.00. His average living expense was only \$1,448, much of his living having been raised at home. His farm operating expense was \$4,312, and his net cash income was \$4,292.

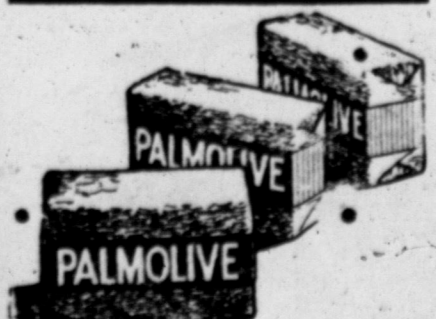
