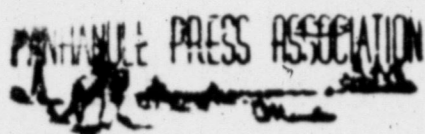

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WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH TEXAS U.:

A certain great magazine with nation-wide circulation sends out publicity matter respecting its May issue, which contains an article about the University of Texas.

In this publicity matter it is stated that the article contends that the University of Texas is losing its opportunity of becoming a great institution of learning because of political interference.

"Potentially the wealthiest University in the world because of the discovery of oil on part of its two million acres," the publicity item states, "the University can not attract top flight educators because of what critics call the reactionary attitude of the Texas Board of Regents." One professor in the University is quoted as saying:

"New teachers like myself are honestly afraid. We've got a feeling we're being watched all the time."

We believe that we could tell the gentlemen what is the matter with the University of Texas. There are a few professors and quite a sprinkling of students in the University who are tainted with Communist ideas, and they insist on the right of such professors to proclaim, untrammelled, their peculiar and un-American theories and speculations to the students in their classes, and the students—a few of them—proceed boldly to proclaim their ideas through the columns of the student publications and otherwise, so as to leave the impression that the University is a hub of Communism. In fact it is not, and in spite of this taint of communism in its faculty and its student body, it is not merely "becoming" but is already in fact "a great institution of learning." Our opinion is that it would speedily become greater and more useful if Northern Educators and Northern magazines would quit meddling where they have no business and would let Texas run it.

Statesmen in this country should be able to work out some plan not violative of either the letter or the spirit of our Constitution whereby strikes in the major industries affecting the welfare of our people generally can be effectively forestalled or rendered harmless. Something a kin to compulsory arbitration of differences between employees and management should be provided by law. Perhaps an arbitration commission created for the purpose of settling all such matters and clothed with judicial powers should be established. Possibly the Interstate Commerce Commission should be clothed with

such powers. Whatever body might be created to settle such disputes, its decisions, subject to appeal to the Supreme Court, should be enforced by the executive branch of the Government with all the d.s. patch and effectiveness with which any other court decision or decree is enforced, even to the use of the military power of this Government whenever necessary. Surely this great Government has the power to enforce, even to the use of the convenience and suffering which frequently follow a stalemate or a failure of efforts by management and labor to settle their disputes. This body should be a permanent body free from political influences from any source. Surely the people should have their inning in these matters that so vitally affect them.

Had you ever noticed how swimmingly our two Old Parties get along together until election year rolls around. Of course there are a few outbursts now and then but as a rule the Old Elephant and the Little Old Donkey are as affectionate as two playful kittens until election year dawns. The first thing you notice after that is that the one on the outside of the pen gives the one on the inside a cold stare, which is returned. Then the stares become colder and more frequent, until hot words begin to pass. In a few weeks criticisms are flying like beer bottles at an Irish wake. The battle rages hotter and hotter until November. By that time, the two combatants have called each other so many names that the public has just about decided that both of them are crooks. As soon as the votes are counted, however, the friends of the two old brutes begin to rub salt on their wounds, and by Christmas the two animals are caressing each other over the back fence. It's a great country we have here in America—lots of kicking and rampaging and growling and braying, but no revolutions, no broken skulls, no dead on the battlefields, except a few fellows who have been killed politically. We like America.

Why do these "civil rights" advocates object to "Jim Crow" laws that allow Negroes to ride on the same trains and buses as the Whites, at the same prices and with the same conveniences, though in separate compartments? Where do they find any discrimination there? Why do they object to the poll tax when Whites must pay it the same as Negroes, in order to vote? Where do they find any discrimination there? If and when Negroes are afforded educational opportunities which are adequate for their abilities and requirements, why object to mere separation of the Whites and Negroes in the public schools and colleges? All this hue and cry about "civil rights" is sheer politics and nothing more.

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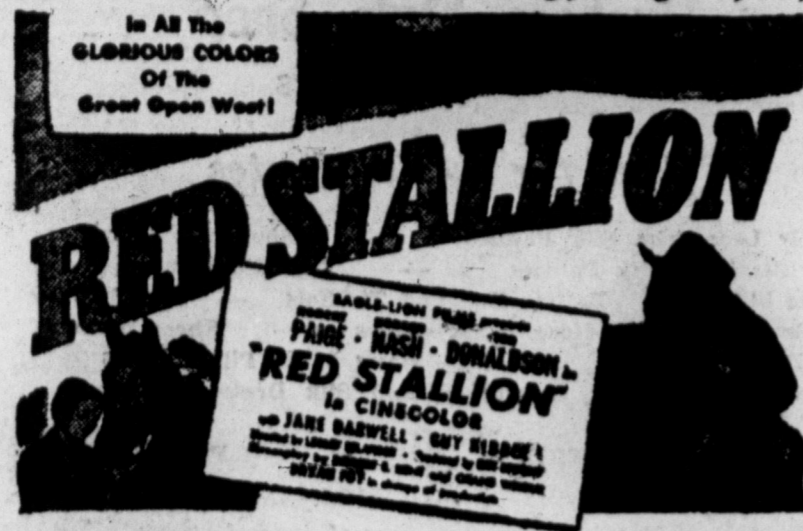
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HEARTWARMING STORY MAKES 'RED STALLION' FINE ENTERTAINMENT

Texas City Stages "Comeback"

Devastated by the explosions of two freighters loading ammonium nitrate fertilizer in its harbor, Texas City, Tex., suffered one of America's worst peacetime catastrophes on April 16-17, 1947. The explosions were perhaps the most destructive ever known on the North American continent, apart from the atom bomb test. Only the Black Tom and Halifax explosions of World War I are comparable. But Texas City has already "come back." Except for the dock area, hardly a scar of the terrific explosion remains. The business district gleams with shiny new store fronts and plate glass. The stricken residential districts are freshly painted, neater and tidier looking than ever before. Fire insurance and the undaunted will of the people have been behind this amazing reconstruction.

Precaution for Housewives

After lighting but before leaving a burner, the flame should be observed to make sure that perfect ignition has occurred. This applies to burners under the solid or partly enclosed cooking top of a range and to a radiant space heater as much as to an oven, water heater or furnace. It sometimes happens that gas does not light at every port of a burner, and unburned gas escapes from those at which there is no flame. Oven burners are especially subject to this trouble. When the gas is lighted it is well to make sure that there is a flame at every port. If there is not, something may be wrong. Usually the burner needs cleaning, but if cleaning does not remedy the trouble the burner should be repaired or replaced by an experienced appliance adjuster.

Kiskatchie National Forest

In central Louisiana lies the beautiful, rugged Kiskatchie country. This has always been game country, and of late years it has been taken over by the government. Many square miles of it now constitute the Kiskatchie national forest. This area has a wealth of upland game, including deer, turkeys, wildcats and other species. There are some wild turkeys ranging the wilds within 20 or 25 miles of New Orleans. The wild turkey is a wary bird, and hunting for him calls for more patience, knowledge and skill than any other game bird.

Forgotten Inventor

Tom Davenport, a blacksmith, traded his brother's horse for some cash to buy an electromagnet. He invented the first battery-operated electric motor. A fire in the U. S. patent office, in December, 1836, destroyed the model. Unbeaten by disaster, Davenport built a second model and was awarded a patent in 1837. His invention inspired world-wide efforts along these lines. Today electric motion help power the world.

In this addition are also eight Sunday School class rooms, a kitchen, two rest rooms, and a baptistry so situated as to be in full view of the congregation in the main auditorium.

The entire building is of frame construction with a stucco finish outside and a beautiful finish inside. It is a structure of which the entire membership and the people of the community generally are justly proud.

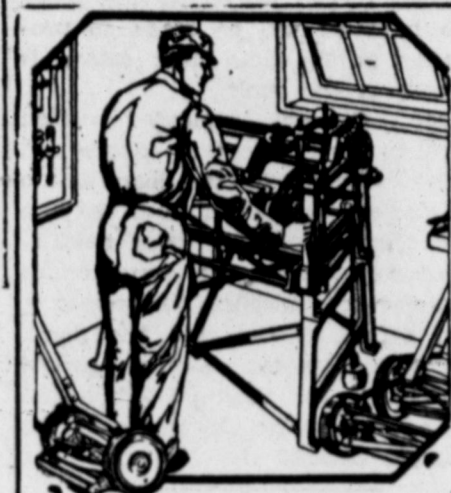

CCC Cotton Loan Pool Explained

Cotton farmers of Lynn county who have government loans on their 1947 crop cotton are reminded that all 1947 crop cotton still under loan on August 1, 1948, will be pooled by the Commodity Credit Corporation for the producers' accounts. Clarence Church, chairman of the Lynn County Agricultural Conservation Committee, said that 1947 crop cotton under CCC loan that is not redeemed by August 1, 1948, will be placed in pools and sold in an orderly manner by CCC. After July 31, 1948, producers will not be entitled to order the sale of the cotton. The loans mature on that date.

He explained that when all the cotton in the pools has been sold the net proceeds, of any, after deduction of all advances, interest and accrued costs, will be distributed among the producers whose cotton was placed in the pools. Distribution will be made on the basis of the amount of the loans on the cotton placed in the pools. No payment will be made to producers at the time their cotton is placed in the pools.

Mr. Church reminded cotton farmers that they may either sell their "equity" in the loan cotton or redeem the cotton from the loan and then sell on the open market. Producers should give some serious thought to marketing the loan cotton before it goes into the pools. At present prices, farmers should be able to sell most of this cotton at a profit over the loan and the charges against the cotton.

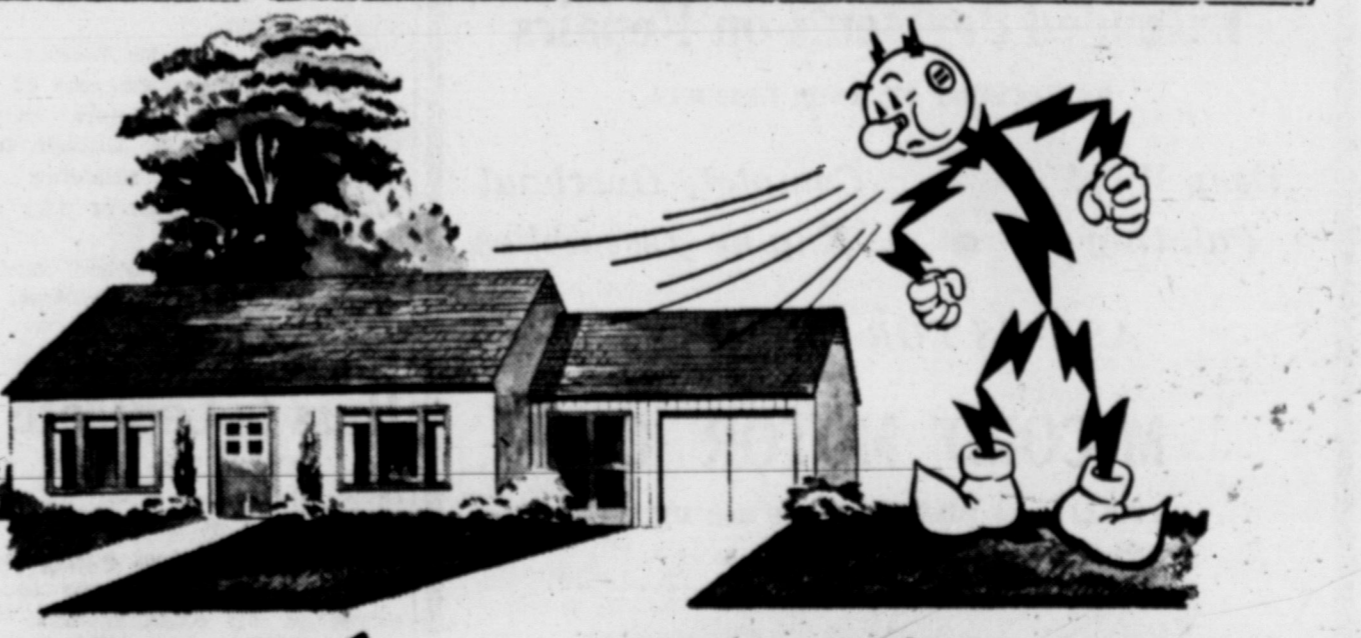

side North Second street. The grocery compartment will consist of the sales room, which will be 41 by 17 feet in size, lying alongside and facing Main Street, which is Highway No. 84. The remaining space, 41 by 8 feet, along the east side of the building, will be used as a storage room. Drive-in spaces will be provided along the west side and the south end of the structure.

The building will have a partly stucco and partly asbestos shingle finish, chrome-trimmed and streamlined, and will be as neat as the proverbial pin.

Next winter an ice factory will be constructed on the east of this building, 40 by 60 feet in size, where the old G. R. Milliken home still stands. This residence will either be torn down or sick and moved away.

This is just another business enterprise that helps to keep Tahoka thoroughly modern.
