Ex-Convict Faces Burglary Charge In Lynn County

W. W. Hoffman, 32, ex-convict, is in jail here charged with the burglary of the Keltner Hotel shortly before four o'clock last Sunday morning. He is also charged with the theft of some clothing and a \$75.00 suit case in Lubbock on the preceding Wednesday night from H. H. Sampson of Bridgeport, a member of the graduating class of the Texas Technological College.

About 4 o'clock Sunday morning, Tom Reid, the night watchman here, saw a man come out of the Keltner hotel, slam the door behind him, and start hurriedly away. Mr. Reid stopped the culprit and began to ask questions. The fellow said that he was going to Big Spring with another man in a car and thought he was late, hence the hurry. He was carrying a radio in his arms. Reid accepted his explanation and permitted him to go.

Of course Mr. Keltner missed the radio. He complained to officers and on Monday morning Sheriff Sam Floyd telephoned officers in Big Spring to be on the look-out for the man. They found him and placed him in jail. Sam went down to Big Spring that afternoon. He failed to find the missing radio but did find a suit-case with H. H. Sampson's name thereon and also the clothing with Sampson's name in it. So he brought the gent back to Tahoka and placed him in jail.

City Detective Pat Davidson of Lubbock came down Tuesday and took a confession from the thief. Investigation also revealed that Hoffman had been released from the penitentiary on May 28. He was sent up, it is stated, from El Paso for theft of a truckload of whiskey.

Property Stolen Here Recovered

A number of major thefts committed in this area recently have been solved, police officers say, and one Orville Glenn has been charged with the crimes.

Two or three weeks ago some one stole from the new house being constructed for Vernon Wilhoit three miles north of Tahoka just west of the Lubbock highway a quantity of building material including a big 12-glass window 43 by 62 inches in size, together with the screen and the window frame, galv sheet rock and other material.

Also a lot of wrenches and other tools were stolen from the tractor and breaking plow being used by one Mr. Mallouf in doing some deep breaking in the sand beds on and near the Wilhoit place.

About \$500.00 worth of building material and tools was stolen about the same time from L. E. Evans living near Lynn-Lubbock line, who was building a house in Lubbock county.

A bedroom suite and mattress were stolen from a Hockley county man, and other thefts were also reported to officers.

Last week Orville Glenn was arrested and charged with one or more of these thefts. On Wednesday or Thursday Sheriff Sam Floyd of Lynn county went to Plains, Yoakum county, investigating, and found the above articles of property which had been stolen from Wilhoit and Mallouf.

Only misdemeanor complaints were filed here, however, for Glenn had not taken from either of these men at any time as much as \$50 worth of property. He had already been arrested on a charge of stealing the Evans material and tools. He is out on bond, it is said.

BLACK CATS LOSE TO LEVELLAND OILERS

Johnny Martin, colored, announced that the Tahoka Black Cats lost the game played here with the Levelland Oilers last Sunday afternoon, the score being 8 to 9 in favor of the visitors. It was a good game nevertheless, he declares.

The Tahoka Black Cats will play the Oilers next Sunday afternoon at Levelland.

Lyntegar Plans Line Extensions

The News received the following message from Congressman George Mahon Wednesday morning. It had been filed for transmission at 5:20 Tuesday evening. The text of the message follows.

"Rural electrification administration officials advised me today of final approval of a \$510,000 loan to Lyntegar for improvements and extension including a total of 210 miles of new lines in the Lyntegar system. Manager Garland Pennington and Judge Tom Garrard are in Washington and are responsible for the prompt action taken today. Regards, George Mahon."

Two hundred and ten miles of extensions will put electricity in many additional homes in Lynn and other counties served by Lyntegar Cooperative. The work of building these extensions will doubtless begin soon. Messrs. Pennington and Garrard will be able to give the details upon their return to Tahoka. Judge Garrard is attorney for Lyntegar.

Hard Rain Fell Here Wednesday

A hard dashing rain fell in Tahoka and over much of the surrounding country between 4:00 and 5:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Three quarters of an inch fell in Tahoka in little more than half an hour, according to the rain gauge kept by the News.

The rainfall was lighter, however at the edge of town in almost every direction, but there were a few other localities in the county where it was heavy.

Cotton planted last week was just beginning to peep up out of the ground but the News heard no reports of any substantial damage. The rain was really helpful to some of the fields that had crusted over and made it difficult for the sprouting plants to push their way through.

There were prospects Thursday morning for more rain.

West Texas Gas Plan Improvements

A program of improvements to the natural gas distribution system in the Plains, including enlargement of the Tahoka booster station, has been announced by the West Texas Gas Company, which serves 44 West Texas towns.

Announcement of the expansion program was made by R. F. Hinchey, president of the company. Contract has been made by the company for more gas.

Also, lines will be extended and expanded, booster stations enlarged, and other improvements made that will insure every town a sufficient supply of gas next winter.

Among the many improvements will be installation of a 300 horsepower compressor unit at the Tahoka Compressor Station, located two miles west of here. All materials are on order, compressor unit is promised for July delivery, and it is hoped to complete the station by September.

Also, 10 miles of 4 1/2 inch pipe on the line between Tahoka and Plainfield will be replaced with 3-5/8 inch line. Pipe is on order now and construction will begin as soon as it is received.

GRASSHOPPER POISON IS NOW AVAILABLE

Grasshopper poison is now available to the farmers of Lynn county at the Id. Red Cross building east of the Tahoka court house, according to County Agent Bill Griffin. Mr. Griffin states that prospects are that the hopper infestation will be bad this year.

DR. RONEY GRADUATES

Dr. Robert C. Roney, formerly associated with Dr. K. R. Durham in the practice of dentistry here, received the Master of Science in Dentistry degree at Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois. Since leaving Tahoka, Dr. Roney has been doing post-graduate work in the University.

Youth Revival Starts Sunday

In College he won many medals and other honors as a student and public speaker, and at 26 he has served ably as pastor of the Church at Harco in Collin County.

Robert Mitchell, 21, is also a graduate of Baylor University and of the Southwestern Baptist Seminary, and is a most promising young preacher.

The song services will be led by Stanley P. Howard Jr., 26, who is likewise a graduate of the two above named institutions.

The purpose of this meeting and many others like it is to enlist and to train the young people of the church in religious work as well as to call others to repentance.

Older people, however, may be benefited and inspired by attending these meetings just the same as the younger people, and so the invitation is for everybody to attend.

Of course, Mr. and Mrs. Sheldon Russell, leaders of the young people in the local church, will assist in every way possible. In fact, it is due to the efforts of Mr. Russell that this meeting has been made possible.

Make Improvement On School Campus

A number of improvements are being made on the Tahoka school campus this summer, according to Supt. Vernon Brewer.

The area of the grade school campus lying between the classrooms building on the east and the main building has been plowed up and planted to grass.

The football field has been plowed and will be leveled in an effort to get a better turf.

Early this week, the fencing for the football stadium arrived, and this will be installed before the opening of the fall term.

The fencing is said to be the strongest and best made and may be expected to last many, many years. It is storm-proof chain-link, 9-gauge, 6-foot high, with a one foot angle bracket extension on the top on which will be three strands of barbed wire. Sixteen hundred feet of the fencing is required to enclose the stadium. There will be two 8-foot double gates and two 5-foot single gates.

AT SWIMMING SCHOOL

The News is informed that about 12 Tahoka children are attending the free swimming school which is being conducted each week day morning at the Lubbock Municipal pool. Local ladies are furnishing the children transportation to and from the school.

City Water Rates Going Up With Rising Prices

At its regular meeting Monday night, the city council decided that the time had come when the city water rates must be raised a bit, in view of the greatly increased prices of all supplies that the City has to buy.

The raise as shown below, however is nothing like as great as the raise in the cost of piping and other water equipment which the City is compelled to buy.

The minimum rate for the first 3,000 gallons of water, which has been \$1.50 heretofore, was raised to \$2.00. For the next 10,000 gallons of water the rate was raised from 20 cents to 25 cents per 1,000 gallons. All water used above 13,000 will be charged for as heretofore at the rate of 15 cents per 1,000 gallons.

For many years heretofore there has been a summer irrigation rate, for the months of May, June, July, August, and September, of \$2.50 per 10,000 gallons of water. The Council Monday night raised this to \$3.25 per 10,000 gallons. For all water used above the 10,000 gallons, the irrigation rate will be 15 cents per 1,000 gallons, as heretofore.

Last Sunday afternoon, the Tahoka team played Loop at Seagraves and won by a score of 10 to 3. G. W. White was the winning pitcher.

Two War Fatalities Home For Burial

Services Today For Lt. King's Body Interred Thursday

The body of Private Robert Lee Potts, son of Vin and Mary E. Potts of Tahoka, who was killed in Australia on September 9, 1943, while serving in the U. S. armed forces, was expected to arrive in Tahoka early this (Friday) morning, and funeral services are to be conducted by Rev. C. A. Holcomb Jr. in the Methodist Church here this afternoon at 2:00 o'clock.

He will be buried with military honors with rites conducted by the Veteran of Foreign Wars. The Stanley Funeral Chapel has charge of funeral arrangements.

Private Potts did not meet death at the hands of the enemy but was accidentally killed while handling some Army mules. But he was just as much a casualty of the war as if he had been killed in battle.

Private Robert Lee Potts was born on March 26, 1919. He enlisted for service in the Army on July 9, 1941, almost five months before the attack on Pearl Harbor, but he was still in this country when the attack came. He was then sent to the Pacific area and was killed in Australia just two years and two months after he enlisted, his age being 24 years, 5 months, and 13 days.

Survivors include the parents, Vin Potts and Mary E. Potts; four brothers, James, Charles, Thurman, and Otis Potts; and three sisters, Mrs. Helen (Homer) Cash, Winnie Potts and Joyce Potts, together with other relatives.

All honor to him and other young men who gave their lives for their country.

DUNAGAN'S NEPHEW KILLED IN AIRPLANE ACCIDENT

A. L. Dunagan received a message Wednesday stating that the body of his grand-nephew, Harold Dunagan, Jr., who was in the Air service at Spokane, Washington, would arrive in Corsicana on that day for funeral services and burial. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Dunagan live in Corsicana. His mother was reared in Post, her maiden name being Ellis.

The message which Mr. Dunagan received told nothing of the young man's death except that he died of a fractured skull.

The original meaning of the word "epitaph" was "work."

Funeral services were conducted at 2:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon in the First Methodist Church here for Lt. Lee King, who gave his life for his country in far-away India on March 29, 1944, while serving in the Air Force.

Services were conducted by the youthful young Minister George M. Small, a native of Tahoka, assisted by Rev. C. A. Holcomb Jr., the new pastor of the Methodist Church here. Following the services at the Church, the Veterans of Foreign Wars took charge and honored the deceased soldier with a military burial.

All of the services were most impressive.

Chief assistant of D. B. English in the operation of his two picture shows here for several years, Mr. King was known and loved by nearly everybody here.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. King, he was born at Sanger in Denton county on December 5, 1906. He was brought to Tahoka as a small child by his parents, both of whom preceded him in death. When he became old enough, he entered school here and came up through all the grades. From his youth he was interested in aviation and long before the war he learned to fly a plane, and along with two or three companions he had many a thrilling experience here in the air.

Following his school days and while making his way in business life, Lee King, at the age of 25, was married to Miss Odelle J. Kaughan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. McCaughan of this city. One son, Jerry, was born of this marriage; he is now eleven years of age. Lee was happy with his little family, but two days after he had observed his 35th birthday, the Japs struck at Pearl Harbor. Like every other red-blooded American, Lee's patriotism was fired to white heat by this sudden and treacherous act. In the following March, he volunteered for service in the Air Forces of the Army. He received training first at Randolph and Kelley Fields; he was then sent to Harington for a time and was thereafter stationed successively at La-

Clinic Additions Are Underway

Construction on the large additions to Tahoka Clinic are well under way and completion of the project is expected before the summer is over.

The new part will add 2,500 feet of floor space to the building. When completed, the building will be 155 feet deep and 86 feet wide across the front, including Dr. K. R. Durham's Dental Clinic, which adjoins Tahoka Clinic and is a part of the same building.

The additions will bring the Clinic to 15-bed capacity, complete in every respect for almost any operation or illness.

In the addition at the rear, there will be six more bedrooms, a supply room, nursery, ambulance entrance, and two operation rooms. The operating rooms will be the very latest work in hospital facility, and will be completely out away from the rest of the hospital, with an independent heating system, so that there will be none of the usual operating room odors transmitted to the rest of the building.

On the west front end, another addition is being built, which will add four treatment rooms to the plant.

Also, a larger and more modern kitchen will be installed, the x-ray room and laboratory enlarged and improved, and many other minor improvements made.

Dr. Emil Froh and his associate, Dr. Skiles Thomas, expect to spare nothing to make this one of the most efficient small hospitals in this whole area.

Millions Hear Broadcasts From Sunday School Classroom



ATLANTA, GA.—The Sunday morning broadcasts of four denominations originating in the Sunday school classroom here are heard by millions over a network of 66 stations. The room has been converted into a well-equipped broadcasting studio. Fifteen minutes after the broadcast, members of the Four Square class of Druid Hills Baptist church begin to arrive.

SOIL CONSERVATION WORK UNIT NEWS

Plans were made last Friday morning by the board of supervisors, Lynn County Soil Conservation District, for a night meeting on Friday, July 2, at 8 o'clock. Special Soil Conservation films will be shown and a short talk on Soil Conservation District will be made by Louis Dawkins of Plainview, field representative of the State Soil Conservation Board. These films and discussion will be of interest to all citizens in the district, the supervisors announced. The public is cordially invited.

Marshall W. Howard of Lubbock, District Conservationist, and Louis Dawkins attended the Friday sessions of the district supervisors held in the local Soil Conservation Service Work Unit Office.

Supervisors present were: R. L. Littlepage, Chairman, who presided; F. O. Cabiness of O'Donnell and Arthur Hagens of Wilson. Discussion of the Texas Soil Conservation Law, farmer-district agreements and soil conservation plans, and applications for assistance consumed the remainder of the supervisor's regular June meeting.

Approval was made on the following applications: Claude Harper—242 acres and Mrs. E. E. Callaway—400 acres.

Farmer-district cooperative agreements and soil conservation plans were approved by the supervisors on the following Lynn county district farms: W. P. Freeman (W. A. Tadlock-operator); C. H. Haire, C. A. Haire, J. H. Haire, Paul W. Haire, M. C. Stratzman (R. L. Tay-

lor-operator); Dr. A. C. Surman (P. E. Ehridge-operator); C. C. Haire (Lois Smelser-operator); E. J. Jones, Arthur Patterson, Jerry Houston, and Forest Jones (Sam Cox-operator, this makes a total of 388 district cooperators.

Some of the soil conservation practices planned and established on the dryland farms are as follows:

1. Terracing for water erosion and moisture conservation.
2. Farm with the terraces (contour farming).
3. Rotate cotton at least every two years with combine sorghums for erosion control.
4. Plow the land in such manner as to have the sorghum crop residue on or near the surface for wind erosion control and moisture conservation.
5. The use of such grass and small grain for supplemental pasture. Some of these farms consist of small areas of shallow land and this practice is desirable for the control of erosion on such lands.
6. Some of the farmers are planning to rotate cotton with combine sorghums each year on the sloping lands since these lands are more subject to erosion than the nearly level lands.

In addition to these practices Boyd Barnes plans to grub the brush plant on his 23 acre pasture and overseed it with adapted grasses.

Dr. A. C. Surman of Post (Pete Ehridge-operator) plans to terrace his farm, which is located approximately 7 miles east of Tahoka, with the Calloway and Blair farms, adjoining farms as one unit. This illustrates how farm-

ers are working together to control erosion.

Several farmers in the district who have sandy lands and shallow lands which are highly susceptible to wind erosion are planting these lands to sorghums to establish a protective cover for erosion control. In addition to this practice some of these farmers are deep plowing the sandy land prior to planting of the sorghums.

R. F. Stegemoller irrigates a large portion of his farm which is located in the Northeast corner of the district. The major portion of

the farm consist of nearly level light land which is well suited for irrigation. Stegemoller plans to rotate cotton at least every two years with sorghums or other erosion resisting crops. He plans to establish during the year 1 acre of Alfalfa, 2 acres of irrigated pasture and 6 acres of weeping lovegrass.

Grassroots . . .

LYNN COUNTY 4-H CLUB SWINE PROGRAM

Each year in Lynn County 4-H Club boys write essays on "Hog Production On the Farm" to try to win a Registered Duroc Gilt or Registered Duroc Boar.

This program is sponsored by Sears Roebuck Foundation with the Texas Extension Service cooperating. Eight registered gilts and one registered boar are given to the 4-H boys who are selected as winners. This year the winners are: Kenneth Huffaker, Route 1, Tahoka; Benny Brockshire, Route 1, Tahoka; Leroy Edwards, Route 1, Tahoka; Carl Gene Spears, Route 4, Tahoka; Jimmy Bragg, Route 5, Tahoka; Charles Mission, Route 1, Tahoka; Alton Billings, Route 3, O'Donnell; and Walter Billings, Route 3, O'Donnell each winning a registered gilt and Melvin Edwards, Route 1, Tahoka who won the registered boar.

The boys receive the gilts and boar, and feed and develop these animals in preparation for the County Show to be held some time in September. The boy who has the County Winner receives \$8.00 in prize money and an opportunity to exhibit his gilt in the Store Area Show held in Lubbock the last Saturday in September. The prizes in the Store Area Show are as follows: 1st prize \$45.00; 2nd \$40.00, 3rd \$35.00, 4th \$30.00, 5th \$25.00, 6th, 7th, 8th, and 9th \$20.00 each, 10th \$15.00 and 11th, \$15.00 each. This money is to be spent to buy hog lot equipment or to improve the equipment that the boy already has on the farm. After the Store Area Show the gilts are brought home and placed on special rations to prepare them for breeding in November.

The gilts are bred some time between the 1st and the 10th of November to the boar in the program. The boys then care for their

gilts until farrowing which should occur some time between the last week in February and the first week in March. When the gilts farrow their pigs, the boys automatically enter a litter contest in which they strive to produce the heaviest litter in 56 days. Prizes for the heaviest litter in the Store Area are: 1st, \$30, 2nd \$25, 3rd \$20, 4th \$15, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th \$10, each, 11th through 17th, 9 each, 18th \$8, and 19th through 38th \$7 each. When the pigs reach 56 days of age, they are weighed and entered into the heavy litter contest, and the boys each return the best sow pig in his litter which goes to make up the following years program. Then the boy picks three other pigs from his litter and feeds them for market pigs. The market pigs to be shown in September at the same time as the Sears Gilts.

The winning gilt and the winning pen of three barrows will be carried to the Store Area Show and compete with similar gilts and barrows from other counties. The prizes for the best pen of three are as follows: 1st, \$40.00, 2nd, \$30.00, 3rd, \$20.00, 4th, \$15.00, 5th, \$10.00, and 6th, \$5.00. This program carries the boys through a complete cycle of hog production that begins with

an eight weeks old pigs and ends the program by feeding three market hogs.

The boy who wins the boar has a somewhat different program to try to complete. His record is based on amount for service fees, the equipment, pasture, breeding pens, management and practices he uses in caring for his boar in his breeding program. The boar is also exhibited on the last Saturday in September in the Store Area Show and he is competing for the following prizes: 1st, \$45.00, 2nd, \$40.00, 3rd, \$35.00, 4th, \$30.00, 5th, \$25.00, 6th, \$20.00, 7th, \$20.00, 8th, \$20.00, 9th, \$20.00, 10th, \$15.00, 11th, \$15, and 12th, \$15.00.

Tri-County Hospital Plans Explained By O'Donnell Man

(By S. F. Johnson)

The Tri-County Hospital Association of O'Donnell is calling a meeting for Thursday night, June 17, at the high school auditorium at 8:30. Everybody is urged to be at the meeting. Several important business matters are to be discussed and voted on. The permanent directors for the first year are to be elected, and various other problems must be decided at this meeting.

The chapter has been secured, and a site for the hospital bought. The site chosen is the entire block immediately West of the John Andy Edwards's residence. It is one of the most favorable spots in town, and seems to meet with approval from most everyone. The City Council offered to give a complete block in the Northeast section of the town, but it was decided that the site on the South side would be more appropriate.

Surplus buildings at Amarillo Army Air Field have been inspected with a view to purchasing; and various hospitals similar to the one proposed for O'Donnell, have been visited. Much of the preliminary work has already been done, and plans for other work are progressing very much.

Membership in the Association has been set at \$100.00, and it is from this source that money must be secured to erect and equip the hospital. The membership drive will start immediately after the coming meeting and if and when enough members are secured, then the building will be started. Estimates call for between \$75,000 and \$95,000 to build and equip the hospital.

Everyone interested in seeing the hospital be made a success is cordially invited to attend the meeting on June 17 at the high school. Mr. Parr Merriman, who helped organize the Lubbock hospital, and Mr. James Monroe, business manager of the Hale Center hospital, will be on hand for the meeting. Both men have had wide experiences in this type of work and can answer most of the questions that we will want to ask.

Efforts are being made to secure Federal Aid to the extent of one third of the cost of construction. A representative from the State Health Department was by recently, and pledged their support whether we participated in the Federal Aid or not. She also informed us that it wasn't necessary to abide by strict regulations in order to secure the aid—only that the building be made fire-proof. This is being investigated more, and it is hoped that this aid can be secured.

NAVY NEWS

Lieutenant Commander Lee J. Delworth, Recruiting Commander of the Albuquerque Recruiting District announced today that effective 15 June 1948, enlistments or reenlistments of otherwise qualified broken service personnel enlisting in the navy in the engine room rating may not be enlisted above the fifth pay grade. This announcement applies to broken service personnel who were discharged in the ratings of motor machinist's mate or engineman.

At present personnel discharged as chief and first class in the mentioned ratings may be enlisted as second class; men discharged as second or third class may be enlisted as third class.

Commander Delworth urged that those men in the foregoing rating groups who have plans of reenlisting in the Navy, do so prior to the deadline of 15 June, 1948 in order to take advantage of open ratings.

NANCY WYATT MAKES REPORT ON AQUATIC SCHOOL

Marshall, Texas, June 3, 1948. — (Special)— Working on a dawn-to-dark schedule at the Red Cross National Aquatic School at Camp Fern, students are cramming into the 10-day school period subject matter that would require a whole summer to complete under ordinary teaching schedules, according to Nancy Wyatt of Tahoka, now in her fifth day of training in First Aid and Accident Prevention.

Nancy declared that the Aquatic School is ideally fitted to give maximum instruction and training in a maximum of time due to its location, equipped, and its battery of national instructors. Nancy added that through the school's beautiful outdoor location has the appearance of a vacation spot, there is little of the vacation atmosphere. "This place is a school in the strict sense of the word," Nancy said. "Each day is filled with lectures, demonstrations, and participation by the students in the various techniques involved. This is called 'learning by doing'."

The American Red Cross National Aquatic School, one of 34 similar schools in this country and Hawaii sponsored by the Red Cross, offers 10 days of concentrated training to new volunteer instructors in First Aid, Water Safety, and Accident Prevention. Students are subject to an intensive period of instruction in such required subjects as swimming, diving, canoeing, boating, and life saving. Others specialize in first aid and accident prevention. Upon successful completion of their studies they will be issued Red Cross certificates qualifying them to teach the same subjects.

Nancy stated that if the people of Lynn County will urge their children to take the courses to be offered this summer, accidents will be reduced and people will know what to do in case of accidents.

Universal Postal Station Just Keeps Rolling Along

The Universal Postal station, composed of virtually all the countries and colonial areas of the world, was established in Paris about 70 years ago.

The United States took the first step toward world postal simplification in 1862 when President Lincoln's postmaster general, Montgomery Blair, proposed a convention which was held in Paris in 1863. Although the convention adopted a useful code, further action was delayed by the American Civil war, and the Franco-Prussian war, notes the National Geographic society.

In 1874 the United States, Egypt, and 20 countries of Europe met in what stands as the first postal congress at Bern, Switzerland. From the second postal congress in Paris in mid-1878, however, the Universal Postal union took its name and its global range. Sixty postal administrations then or promptly afterward adhered to the Paris postal treaty.

The union's purpose is clearly stated in that treaty. It is to "alleviate the uncertainty, confusion, and excessive cost of international postal communications by uniting countries in a single postal territory for the reciprocal exchange of mail."

Now included as one of 11 specialized agencies of the United Nations, the union carries on its work through its international bureau at Bern, opened in 1874.

Attic Relics Often Offer Attractive Possibilities

Attics can be wonderful places, especially when they belong to the family or friends of young couples just starting to furnish a new home. Many once discarded pieces of furniture can take up a useful life again in new guise.

An old-fashioned dresser can be made into a smart, modern piece of living room or dining room furniture, if the mirror is removed, the sides squared and the legs cut off. Given several coats of lacquer, it becomes a striking buffet or storage piece.

Old tables are real treasures, for they offer many remodeling possibilities as well as being so useful and doing much to give a room a "lived in" look. Sometimes it is only necessary to refinish the surface of an otherwise satisfactory table. If the proportions are right, legs can be cut to the right height for end tables or coffee tables. The table itself, if too large, can even be cut in half and placed against the wall in foyer or living room.

Smart home furnishers never discard any object after just a casual glance. A second look often suggests a possible use, and the ugly duckling may become the prize possession of the new home.

Crinoids, Laymen's Fossils

Of the many visitors who bring fossils to the Chicago Natural History museum for identification, most bring pieces of crinoids that have been found, says Eugene Richardson, Jr., curator of invertebrate fossils. Attractive in themselves, looking like anything but a part of a drifting animal of the ocean currents, these pieces naturally compel one to wonder, on finding one in a beach pebble or a quarried rock, what they may be. Because the commonest crinoid fossils are the pieces of the broken and scattered skeleton, many of whose pieces are star-shaped, people have often taken them for "irradiations" of heavenly bodies. In reality the crinoid is a spiny-skinned animal. The entire animal is encased in a heavy armor of crystalline calcite, several hundred times as heavy as the animal inside. The star-fish is an excellent example of the crinoid.

Copper GI

In the peak of Mount Washington, N. H., 6,288 feet above sea level, stands the grotesque figure of a man. This pedestal-mounted, rope-braced figure is a copper soldier. He is clad in the latest scientifically designed Arctic clothing and is filled with an intricate system of electric wiring and electronically-controlled heating elements. The copper GI is answering questions that no human being has been able to answer with any degree of accuracy, namely, "How cold does it feel up there?" The copper soldier will be able to tell quartermaster corps research technicians for example, which is the more chilling—zero weather with a 20-mile-an-hour wind, or 30 degrees below zero without any wind. And he will indicate with exact precision how fast a body loses heat at different temperatures and under varying conditions of humidity and wind with each type of clothing assembly under test.

Progressive Changes in Oranges

When oranges and grapefruit are still immature, the rind and flesh have a greenish color; the juice vesicles appear like grains of rice and are not distended with juice as in the mature fruit. The walls of these juice cells are thick and conspicuous, the juice itself is greenish-yellow to yellow, lacks aroma, is acid to very tart, and has a raw, immature taste. As development progresses and the fruit matures, the greenish color in the rind disappears and, in oranges, the fruit takes on its characteristic aroma and orange color, or, in the case of grapefruit, a tannish-yellow color. Progressive changes also occur within the fruit, the vesicle cell walls becoming thinner and the vesicles distended with juice.

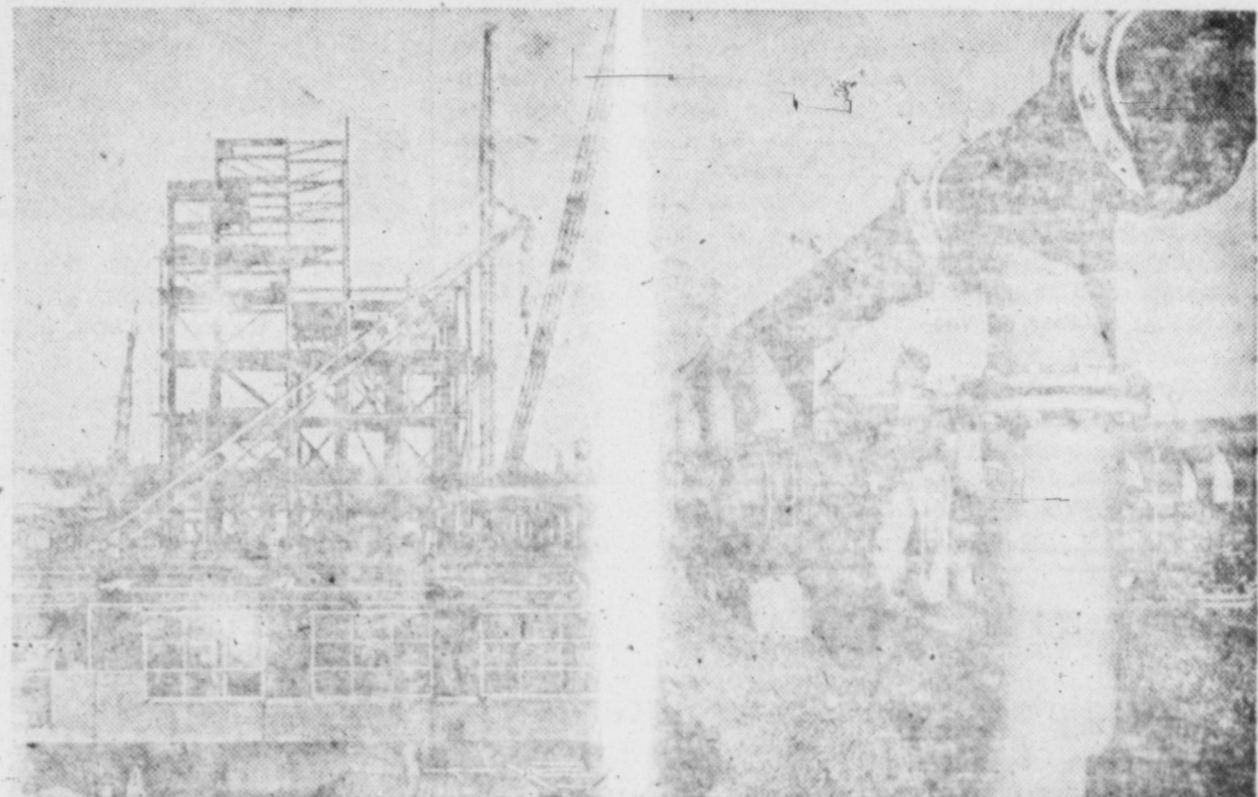
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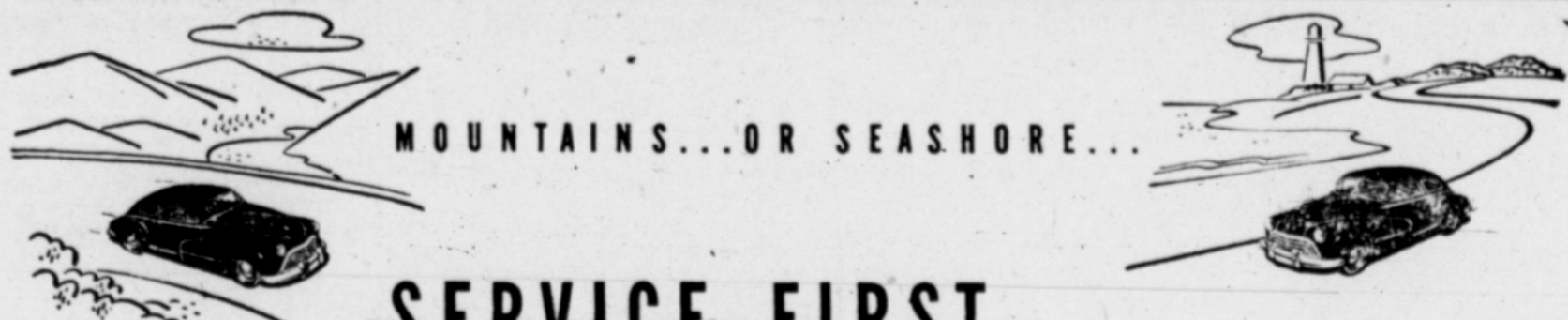
