Lynn County Will Receive \$24,162 From Gas Tax

Lynn County will receive approximately \$24,162.00 as its share of the surplus in the County and Road District Highway Fund this year, according to a letter received this week from Joe Nelson, chief accountant of the State Board of County and District Indebtedness, Austin, by County Judge Tom Garrard.

This is Lynn county's portion of the gasoline tax funds made available for building and maintaining lateral roads.

Judge Garrard states that the returns to the county from this source have increased tremendously in recent years.

He says the county received only \$1,525.76 from this fund in 1945, \$6,896.11 in 1946, and \$14,995.58 last year.

Fire Damages Lynn Theatre

Recent installation of new fire-proof projection room walls in both the Lynn and Wallace Theatres prevented a serious fire at the Lynn Wednesday afternoon, according to Lester Flood, local manager.

At about 4 o'clock, film in the Lynn projection booth caught fire. The theatre was quickly cleared of patrons, but the fire never got out of the booth. About 2,000 feet of highly inflammable film was burned in a flash, and about \$1,000 in damage done to equipment had the fire occurred a few weeks earlier, Mr. Flood says he shudders at the thought of what the damages might have been.

All three Tahoka theatres now have virtually fire-proof projection rooms, he says.

Saturday is Democratic primary election day throughout Texas. The Democratic party is the only one in this state that nominates its candidates by the election method. The Republicans and other minor parties nominate their candidates in conventions. They are usually hand picked.

As a result of these facts, most qualified voters in this state go into the Democratic primaries regardless of their party affiliation nationally. On the ballot is a pledge to support the nominees of this primary, but that pledge does not bind any voter to support the Democratic nominees for President and Vice-President, for the candidates for these offices are nominated in conventions. Neither are Presidential electors selected in primary elections.

Our primary election laws therefore let down the bars for everybody regardless of how they intend to vote in the Presidential election next fall, provided they agree to vote for the nominees of the primary election, which includes only state, county, and precinct candidates, and candidates for the United States Senate and the House of Representatives (Congressmen).

Many people are predicting that there will be an unusually large vote polled in Texas Saturday. In the first place there are more persons in Texas who are qualified to vote than ever before. In the second place, there will probably be more Negro voters than there have been since they were barred from the Democratic primaries many years ago. The supreme court has declared these laws and regulations as unconstitutional and has emphasized the fact that the Negro must be protected in his right to vote in the Democratic primaries if otherwise qualified.

In the third place, recent events have stimulated interest in the elections, and in the fourth place there is a multiplicity of candidates for the United States Senate and for the Governorship as well as for district and county offices in many counties of the state. This tends to interest more people.

In Lynn county, there are between 3,600 and 3,800 potential voters. Poll tax receipts and certificates.

HUGE SIGN BOARDS WILL BE ERECTED NEAR HERE

Tuesday the Directors of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce approved the erection of four huge billboards at the north, south, east, and west approaches to the city welcoming the visitors and tradesmen to Tahoka. These boards will be fifty-four foot by thirteen foot overall in size giving one third to the City of Tahoka and to the Chamber of Commerce. This will be the center section size, sixteen and a half foot by ten foot with all of the lettering advertising the city to be in brilliant scotchlight which illuminates by car lights at night.

A colorful picture illustrating the natural resources of Tahoka and Lynn county showing a scene of harvesting grain, cotton, cattle, irrigation, etc. will be painted in the foreground. The two and a half foot by fifty-four foot skirt will carry the city's slogan in scotchlight.

The sponsorship of the board will be sold to the merchants in the form of individual panels size three and one third feet by five and one half foot on a four year contract with an option for a two year renewal. These panels will appear on both sides of the boards giving the merchants an opportunity to have some roadside advertising.

The Western Sign Company, who is temporarily operating at Brownfield, Texas until they get a building suitable for a bulletin plant in Lubbock, is handling the details of selling the spaces, building, erecting, painting, and maintaining the boards. Miss Dorothy Pragle representing that company will make the contacts.

These boards will be substantially built with heavy durable material, anchored in concrete, braced and cabled to withstand the windy seasons. The face of the boards will be all metal.

Doctors Report Radioactive Arsenic Used for Cancer

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.—The first use of radioactive arsenic for cancer was reported to the American Association for Cancer Research.

This arsenic is made in an atomic energy furnace at the Argonne laboratory near Chicago. It is used on human leukemia and Hodgkins disease, both incurable forms of cancer.

The report was made by Drs. William Neal, Leon O. Jacobson, Austin M. Brues, Howard Ducoff, Robert Straube and Thomas Kelley of the Argonne and the University of Chicago department of medicine.

Arsenic is one of the old remedies for both diseases. It never cured. Nor was it known why the arsenic was beneficial.

The new form, known as Arsenic 78, emitting strong radioactive rays, is used for two purposes. One is to try to learn why arsenic is beneficial. The other is to find out whether this new form may be more useful for people with the diseases.

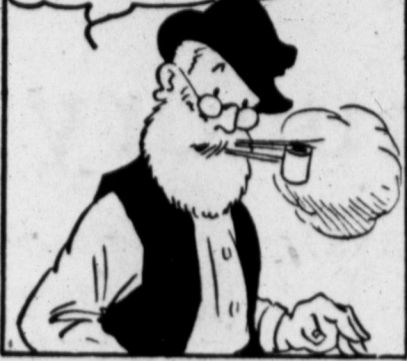

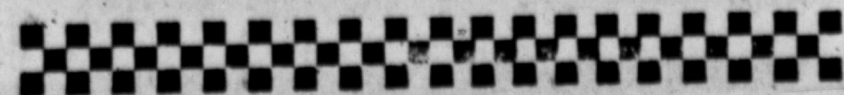

Maine Farmer and Wife
Refuse to Accept Charity

BOSTON.—A Maine farmer and his wife, trying to live on \$15 until their very ill son recovers at a hospital, refused to accept help. Residents of Boston deluged them with offers of food, clothing, money and transportation. But Lawrence Leeman, 31, and his 30-year-old wife, Marilyn, of Dover-Foxcroft, Me., responded with a firm "no thanks."

"Didn't know city people could be so nice and neighborly," said Leeman, whose year-old son Victor, is being operated on for malignant tumor at Children's hospital.

"Guess these people heard about us spending our money to bring the boy here for treatment. Mighty nice of them, but we still have \$15 left and all we want is for the boy to get well. Guess we can hitch-hike home well enough."

"Our switchboard has been tied up all day," a hospital official said. "Rich people, poor people and just every-day-people have been calling up offering help. Two families who were dispossessed from their homes in Dorchester called to say they'd like to help."

But Leeman, a slow-talking Yankee, insisted he wanted no help. "Not to us," he said. "We're hard-working people. We handle our farming by ourselves and we don't believe in asking other folks to share our burdens."

Mrs. Leeman nodded agreement. "Thank you kindly," she told the hospital officials, "but we don't believe in being beholden to folks. It's just our way of doing things up in Maine. No offense meant."

Mice Perish in 25 Minutes
At 35 Degrees Below Zero

WASHINGTON.—Survival time of various warm-blooded animals kept in cages at a temperature of 35 degrees below zero has been determined by the Army Quartermaster corps. The series of tests were conducted in the cold room of Harvard's fatigue laboratory.

Mice succumbed quickest under such an exposure, dying in less than 25 minutes. Canaries were next, surviving for only 36 minutes. White rats lasted between 45 minutes and 2 hours. Some rabbits died in three and a half hours while others not for six and a half hours.

Some white leghorn chickens perished in less than three and a half hours while others managed to stay alive for twenty-nine and a half hours.

Army carrier pigeons put up the greatest resistance to the frigid temperatures. None died in less than 22 hours, and one lived for 78 hours. This hardness may provide clues to the high survival of half-wild park pigeons under tough city conditions.

None of the animals hopped or fluttered about in an effort to keep warm. Instead, they hunched themselves up as compactly as possible presenting a minimum body surface to the cold.

Attic Relics Often Offer
Attractive Possibilities

Attics can be wonderful places, especially when they belong to the family or friends of young couples just starting to furnish a new home. Many once discarded pieces of furniture can take up a useful life again in new guises.

An old-fashioned dresser can be made into a smart, modern piece of living room or dining room furniture if the mirror is removed, the sides squared and the legs cut off. Given several coats of lacquer, it becomes a striking buffet or storage piece.

Old tables are real treasures, for they offer many remodeling possibilities as well as being so useful and doing much to give a room a "lived in" look. Sometimes it is only necessary to refinish the surface of an otherwise satisfactory table. If the proportions are right, legs can be cut to the right height for end tables or coffee tables. The table itself, if too large, can even be cut in half and placed against the wall in foyer or living room.

Smart home furnishers never discard any object after just a casual glance. A second look often suggests a possible use, and the ugly duckling may become the prize possession of the new home.

Ornoids, Laymen's Fossils

Of the many visitors who bring fossils to the Chicago Natural History museum for identification, most bring pieces of crinoids that have been found, says Eugene Richardson, Jr., curator of invertebrate fossils. Attractive in themselves, looking like anything but a part of a drifting animal of the ocean currents, these pieces naturally compel one to wonder, on finding one in a beach pebble or a quarried rock, what they may be. Because the commonest crinoid fossils are the pieces of the broken and scattered skeleton, many of whose pieces are star-shaped, people have often taken them for "irradiations" of heavenly bodies. In reality the crinoid is a spiny-skinned animal. The entire animal is encased in a heavy armor of crystalline calcite, several hundred times as heavy as the animal inside. The star-fish is an excellent example of the crinoid.

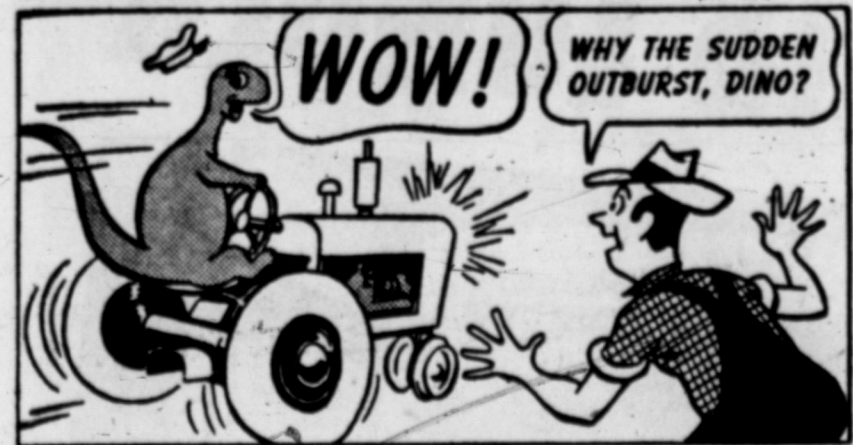

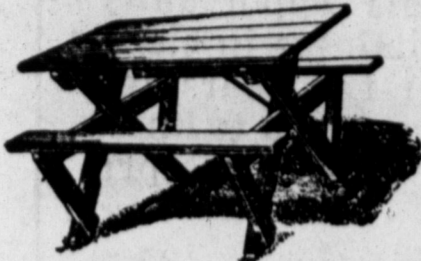

Canning Tactics

ISN'T IT CONVENIENT to have home-canned foods in good supply before the garden runs out? Yes, you may have been putting up fruits and vegetables as well as some of the early jams, jellies and preserves, but how about some of those extras that help tide you through the winter?

There are a variety of home-canned soups which are simply grand when lunch time rolls around on a snowy day. And, of course, there are pickles and relishes that are always handy for adding zest to sandwich suppers or for rounding out the meat course.

IF YOU LIKE a good, well-seasoned tomato soup, here is an easy way to put up one. This is a small-sized recipe, but it is concentrated so it will go a long way after you heat it and add milk or water. Of course, the recipe can be multiplied.

Concentrated Tomato Soup (Makes 2 quarts)
12 pounds tomatoes
3 small bay leaves
12 whole cloves
2 teaspoons salt
2 teaspoons sugar

Choose firm, red ripe tomatoes. Wash and remove cores; then place in a large preserving kettle. Add bay leaves and heat to boiling. Reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Put through sieve or food mill, return to kettle and simmer until of the consistency of gravy. Tie cloves in a cheesecloth bag, and add during the last five minutes of cooking time. Remove cloves and add salt. Pour into hot sterile jars, place on lids and simmer for five minutes in a boiling water bath.

IF YOU LIKE to can meats, here are some ways which are delicious for preparing them:

Veal in Tomato Sauce (Makes 4 quarts)
2 1/4 quarts tomatoes
2 cups sliced celery
2 tablespoons salt
1 teaspoon sugar
1/8 teaspoon black pepper
6 pounds boneless veal, cut for stew

Peel tomatoes, remove cores and slice thin before measuring. Or use one and one-half quarts cooked or canned tomatoes. Mix tomatoes with celery, salt, sugar and pepper; heat to boiling and cook rapidly for five minutes. Add veal, cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Pack into clean hot jars and fill to within one-half inch of top. Adjust lids according to manufacturers' directions. Process 75 minutes for pints, 90 minutes for quarts at 10 pounds pressure.

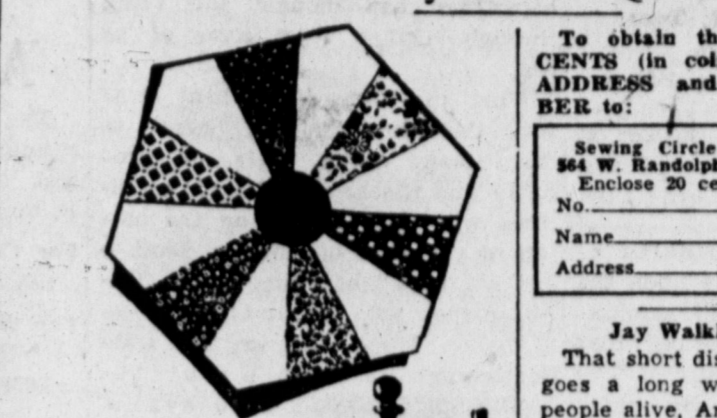
Beef for Stew (Makes 4 quarts)
10 pounds of beef
3 tablespoons shortening
2 tablespoons salt

Use either chuck or rump of beef. Trim off excess fat and weigh meat after trimming. Wipe with damp cloth and cut into pieces to fit jars. Melt shortening and brown meat in skillet. When well browned add just enough water to cover, heating until all browned residue from skillet is dissolved to make a rich gravy. Pack meat into clean hot jars to within one inch of the top. Add one and one-half teaspoons salt to each quart. Adjust lids. Process 75 minutes for pints, 90 minutes for quarts at 10 pounds pressure.

LYNN SAYS: Housekeeping Is Easy With These Hints

Nail holes on walls where pictures have hung can be filled with a mixture of melted glue and extra fine sawdust. Pack this into the hole tightly before you paint your walls. Keep waxed paper or towels handy in your kitchen for those times when you do peeling and measuring jobs. These can be folded up after use and you will have a clean table surface.

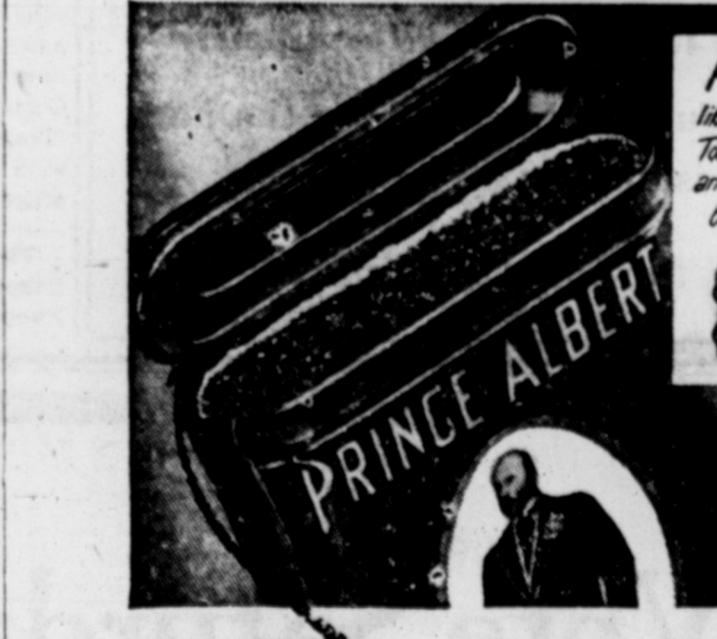

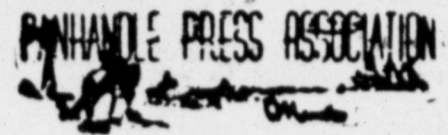

THE POLITICAL POT IS SEETHING HOT
Old-time "states rights" Southern Democrats, stung by the lack of consideration shown them, and even the ridicule and contempt heaped upon them by Northern and Eastern Democrats at the Democratic National Convention in Philadelphia last week, went home and hastily called a convention of their followers and sympathizers for last Saturday. According to press reports, it was attended by several thousand Southerners, who organized, adopted a platform, and nominated candidates for the Presidency, Governor J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina for President and Governor Fielding Wright of Mississippi for Vice-President.
The ordinary Texas Democrat considers this a fool-hardy move. "What do they expect to accomplish?" "What can they accomplish?" are questions that may be heard on every hand. "They certainly can not hope to elect their nominees. They can not possibly do more than to assure the election of the Republican candidates, and what is to be gained by that?" This is about the only kind of comment we hear.
But these Southerners have a deeper purpose than that. Apparently they were fool-hardy, radical, mad with anger,—but perhaps there

was method in their madness. Perhaps they had thought this thing through further than some of us had.
What can they accomplish? It is true that they can not hope to carry many states. It is not probable that the names of their candidates will even appear on the ballots of any state outside the South—and not on all of them. In all likelihood they will not be on the Texas ballot. What then are the irate Southerners of South Carolina, Mississippi, Alabama, Louisiana, Arkansas, Georgia, or Florida to gain by breaking loose from the regular Democratic organization and assisting in the election of the Republican candidates? Do they suppose or even hope that the Republicans will assist them in any degree in their old-time states-rights program? Not at all, but—
They may be able to give Truman and the leaders of the national Democratic organization a terrible drubbing. The electoral votes of South Carolina and Mississippi alone, in a close election, taken away from Truman and throw away on Thurmond and Wright, might swing the election—yes, and swing Truman out of the White House.
What good would that do? The old-time Southerners figure that it would prove to Truman and the Democratic leaders of the North and East that they need the South to help them win an election—that they can not afford to insult, berate, or ignore the South either in the White House, the Halls of Congress, or a Democratic national convention—that they must consult the South, as well as the Lewises, the Greens, the Murphys, the Pendergasts, the Hagues, and other labor bosses and ward heelders of the North in shaping legislation designed to punish or insult the South.
They figure that if they can thus escort Truman out of the White House in spite of the aid and comfort given him by pressure groups of the North and East, these gentlemen will listen to the protests and the counsel of the South four years hence.
So those so-called radicals of the Old South may be wiser than we vest-pocket Democrats think. We shall wait and see.
To most of us our memory is the thing we forget with.

Kinn: "I know two words—'da' (Yes) and 'nyet' (no)."

Malik: "Yes, but all the newspapers here say we only say 'nyet'."

Kinn: "Well, in the United States the first word we teach our babies is 'da'. Maybe there's a difference between your country and mine."

Malik (grinning): "The first word we teach them is 'nyet'."

Cattlemen Trap Buzzards That Eat Live Calves

LAKE CHARLES, LA.—Cattlemen in southwest Louisiana are warring on a ravenous flock of buzzards which has been passing up carcasses for living animals.

The buzzards have been attacking and killing all kinds of livestock, but mostly newly born calves.

W. L. Calwell, who lives near Lake Charles, reported the flying scavengers had killed 20 of his calves in a year and seven in one week.

John E. Jackson, Calcasieu Parish agent, has told farmers to set up poultry wire traps in their large pastures, using a carcass and dead buzzard as a decoy.

He said one farmer near Baton Rouge, La., had trapped and killed 3,500 buzzards in one season by using this method.

In most cases, the cattlemen reported, a flock of about 300 buzzards would swoop down and attack a helpless newly born calf.

Arabs and Jews Go Back to War As U.N. Truce Fails in Palestine; Truman OKs Farm Price Support

FAILURE: U.N. Truce

There was not peace, but once more a sword in Palestine. The United Nations truce had failed.

As the four-week interruption of hostilities between Arabs and Jews dragged somberly through its final hours, combatants on both sides were making preparations to resume warfare.

They had failed to come to terms, and that failure arose out of the fact that there had existed no political or social basis upon which a peace agreement could be rested, nor were either the Jews or Arabs particularly eager to create one.

Their attitude throughout the truce negotiations had been that the contest over whether the state of Israel should be allowed to exist must necessarily be a flat, win-or-lose battle with no middle ground solution possible.

Count Folke Bernadotte, U.N. mediator in Palestine, had tried hard, but he had had to carry out his negotiations in what might be termed a spiritual vacuum between the Jews and Arabs. There simply was no meeting of minds upon which he might have capitalized.

Before the truce expired Bernadotte had endeavored to get it extended and continue the negotiations. Israel had agreed to such an extension but the Arab league opposed it.

Previously, during the last days of the truce, the Arabs had rejected a plan submitted by Bernadotte which included an extensive revision of the now defunct U.N. partition scheme.

Bernadotte's proposal would have restored the area of Palestine to what it was before Trans-Jordan was separated from it, and that total area then would have been partitioned into independent Arab and Jewish states.

The plan, as presented, had a ring of desperation in it. It must have been obvious, even to Bernadotte, that the Arabs would not accept such a scheme, particularly since they had violently opposed the original U.N. partition idea.

Trans-Jordan was especially antagonistic to the plan, insisting that it would put the nation under at least partial jurisdiction of the United Nations, thus making it no better than a dependent state.

As Bernadotte and his staff left Palestine guns already were firing and the Holy Land had relapsed into a condition of war.

FARM BILL: Price Support

To the accompaniment of his now customary blast at the 80th congress President Truman signed into law a farm bill that extends present price support policies for 15 months and establishes a long-range, flexible support program to begin January 1, 1950.

Signing the bill, the President said: "I wish to make it plain once again that legislation for price supports is only part of the action this congress should have taken to meet the problems of American agriculture."

Thus, he was not criticizing the farm price support bill in itself but rather giving another re-run to the familiar theme whereby he has been castigating congress for doing a little when a lot more was needed.

Congress, he said, failed to enact legislation to strengthen the soil conservation program; it did not provide the necessary funds for marketing research; it did not act on the international wheat agreement. It failed, he specified, to meet "the serious problems of rural housing, health and education."

"In the field of agriculture, as in so many others, most of the business of the 80th congress was left unfinished," Mr. Truman observed.

Under the extension bill farm prices generally will be supported at their present levels. However, the support price for cotton will drop from 92½ to 90 per cent of parity.

The idea behind parity farm prices is to insure the farmer the same buying power, compared with the rest of the community, that he had during a favorable crop period. Usually the standard interval upon which parity prices are based are the five years from 1909 to 1914.

Five other basic crops will continue to be supported at 90 per cent of parity. They are wheat, corn, rice, peanuts and tobacco.

Spending Money

As the economic cooperation administration closed its Marshall plan books on the first three months of its operation it reported that recovery shipments worth \$762,747,140 were approved for Europe and China during that period.

That total is about 58 per cent of the goal originally set for the quarter, but ECA Administrator Paul Hoffman said the unspent balance would be used eventually.

Stage Manager

Rep. Hugh D. Scott Jr. of Pennsylvania has been chosen by Republican leaders as the national chairman to lead the party in the forthcoming presidential campaign. Scott is 47, a World War II veteran and represents the Germantown-Chestnut Hill district of Philadelphia in the house of representatives.

BERLIN: Trouble

As U. S. planes continued to fly tons of food into beleaguered Berlin the East-West stalemate over Germany was solidifying in a stubborn mold.

The Russian blockade of Berlin had brought the painful German issue to a head, and both the Soviets and the western powers were anticipating that events might begin to move very rapidly soon.

There were these developments: The Communists announced that they were drawing up a constitution for a German republic and also a two-year plan to link Berlin economically with the Soviet zone.

At the same time, on the free side of the iron curtain, German political leaders were expressing their opposition to the western powers' plans for a West German federal government.

In Berlin, power cuts were ordered in the three western sectors of the city to save the dwindling coal stocks. The action was taken despite the fact that coal shipments had begun to arrive by air.

Key to the situation, perhaps, was the Communist proposal for a new constitution. The Soviet-sponsored German People's Congress of eastern Germany announced that the document would be official. In a statement the group said that "Germany is an indivisible republic made up of states and that executive power stems from the people."

That appeared to bring Soviet intentions more or less out in the open. It means that Russia apparently is determined either to force the western democracies out of Berlin or bludgeon them into an agreement whereby the Soviets would be in virtual control of the city.

REPUBLICAN: Changes, If

Although the presidency of the United States still is far from a reality for Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, the Republican nominee nevertheless is giving considerable thought to some of the problems that will face him if he does get elected to the office.

If, for instance, he is to make good his promise to sweep out "16 years of Democratic cobwebs" from the federal government, there are some of the tasks he will be expected to perform:

Replace hundreds of officials in Washington and all over the nation with men of his choice who will put his policies into effect.

Establish with congress a coordinated program of policies for all federal departments, both foreign and domestic.

Streamline government functions and eliminate duplications in the present structure of alphabetical agencies and bureaus.

It will be a gigantic task. Policies that a Republican president would have to establish would range through the current conduct of foreign affairs; domestic spending of taxpayers' money; federal relations with private business, labor and industry; housing, veterans, agriculture and social improvements.

Then there will be the matter of choosing a cabinet that will be geographically representative of the entire nation.

PRICES: Up Again

Consumer's price index, formerly called the cost of living index, for mid-May this year rose .6 per cent above that for mid-April to reach a new all-time high, according to figures released by National Industrial Conference board.

Expressed in 1923 dollars, the purchasing power of the dollar stood at 61.3 cents in May. That represents a drop of .6 per cent from April and 7.4 per cent from June, 1947.

RAILROADS: No Strike

Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough was not a man to stand idly by and watch society disintegrate, as he termed it, so he issued an injunction forbidding a national rail strike.

The injunction was a permanent one replacing the temporary "no strike" order he issued last May after the government had seized the railroads in the face of an impending strike by the three operating brotherhoods.

Justifying his action, Goldsborough said that if he had not issued the order "the whole economic and political system of the nation would be upset."

Although rail unions had protested that a permanent injunction was unnecessary, Goldsborough said they could not be permitted "to adopt a process which will disintegrate society itself." That held true, he pointed out, regardless of whatever merits the union's case might hold.

"Our political influence throughout the world would be done away with, we'd become a laughing stock. To permit a strike of this kind is something society should not be forced to tolerate."

But as the stalemate dragged on the disputants apparently lost some of their zest for the contest.

Finally a series of conferences, arranged by John R. Steelman, presidential assistant, resulted in a more or less amicable settlement: The unions agreed to accept a wage increase of 15½ cents an hour, plus some changes in operating rules.

Chortled President Truman as he called the labor and management representatives into his office: "You did this on your own hook and I feel very good about it. I congratulate all of you on it."

CYCLES: Freezing

People who are addicted to the theory that human existence is defined by cycles have made a horrendous prediction: This will be a world of dictators for the next 250 years.

That prognostication was made in a "law of growth of nations," published by the Foundation for the Study of Cycles. This law indicates further that after the period of dictators will come a static or "frozen" civilization.

This "frozen" civilization probably will be a happy one, but it is, nevertheless, doomed to deteriorate. The end is foreseen when younger peoples, eager for the loot of the world, rise to give the coup de grace to the emasculated western powers.

Who these younger peoples are is not revealed. They may be a fresh group of barbarians or near-barbarians who will come sweeping down from the north or up from the south.

Low Finance



In addition to giving Russia a false incentive toward becoming particularly nasty in Berlin, the recent currency revaluation in Germany's western zones caused a certain amount of personal financial confusion also.

This German hausfrau turned in her old currency for the new money sponsored by the western powers, receiving 40 new marks for 60 of the old. But the new money will buy as much as the old—she hopes.

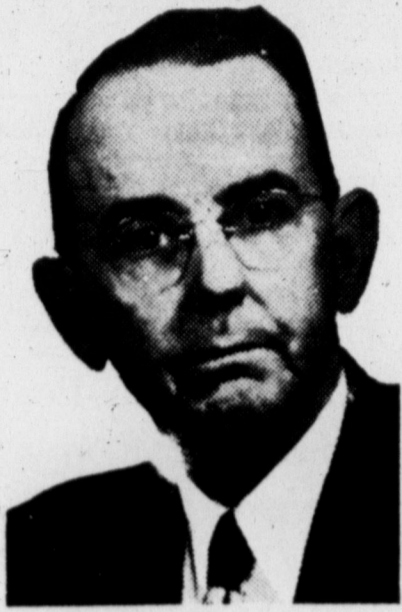

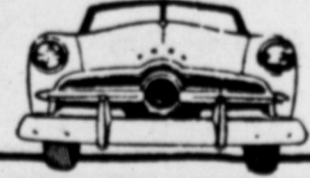
