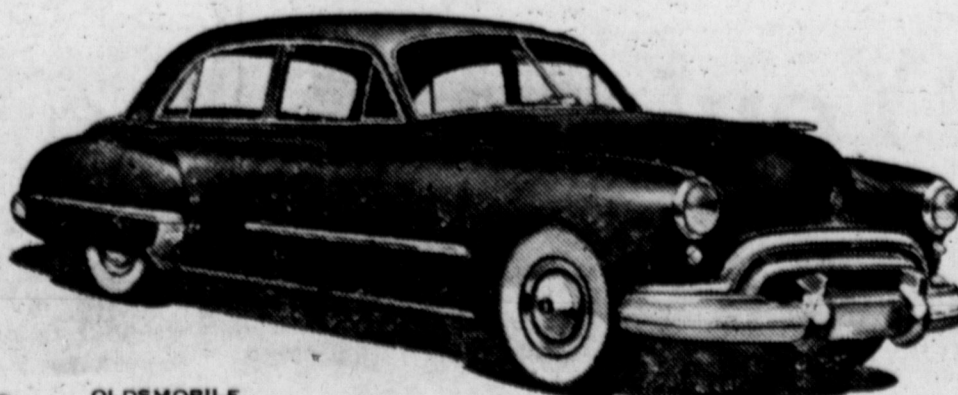

Doctors Discover Method To Keep Flowers Forever

PATERSON N. J.—Two brothers Drs. Phillip and Sidney Joffe, announced the discovery of a solution that will preserve freshly cut flowers forever.

Their secret process fixes the cell structure of the flower and preserves its color, form and texture. The flower loses its fragrance, however.

The brothers had worked on the solution in collaboration with an uncle, Philip Joffe, for the last eight years.

The preparation will go on sale in a department store in New York at "a reasonable price," they announced.

There are three steps in the preservation process, Joffe said, and they will be simple enough for any housewife to perform.

First, the flower is dipped into a solution that dehydrates it, fixing its form and stopping bacterial decay. It is then dipped into another solution and dried.

A third solution establishes a permanent, acid-alkaline balance in the flower.

When finished, the flower is in a fixed state of preservation that is impervious to heat, cold or time.

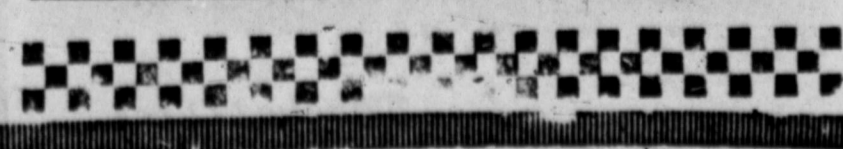

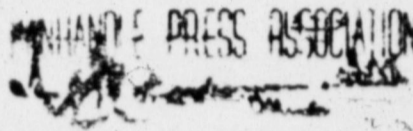

UNSIGNED COMMUNICATIONS NOT PRINTED

The News does not print unsigned communications, unless in rare instances where the author's identity is otherwise made known to us. In fact, as a rule, we pay little attention to them.

But upon receiving a second one last week from the same person criticizing something that had been published in The News, we looked over recent issues of the paper to find out what could have provoked the writer's wrath. Upon doing so, we discovered a typographical error which made the editor seemingly

save just the opposite of what he had in fact written. Even then, we did not consider the matter of sufficient importance as to kindle anybody's wrath, but it seems to have had that effect upon one person at least.

We were quoting a little news story which had appeared in the public press and made this comment: "It is gratifying to know that whether Stevenson or Johnson is sent to the United States Senate, the new Texas Senator will vote against the repeal of the Taft-Hartley law."

But when the statement appeared in print it was found that the word "against" had been left out and our statement was made to read as follows: "It is gratifying to know that whether Stevenson or Johnson is sent to the United States Senate, the new Texas Senator will vote the repeal of the Taft-Hartley law." It didn't state "for" or "against," but in its fact the sentence seemed to indicate that we meant to say "for." Our critic jumped to that conclusion and seemed to think that we were defending and supporting Coke Stevenson. And she, or he, thereupon unleashed her wrath and gave Coke and the editor a terrible tongue-lashing—or rather a pen-and-ink-lashing.

The opposite, however, was true. In an editorial in the same paper we clearly expressed our preference for Lyndon Johnson.

We hope the lady's wrath has subsided, or the gentleman's wrath, if our critic was a man.

If you think you're an optimist, just read what the boys have to say in the seed catalogs.

Any one who will make even a cursory examination of the votes cast at the various elections held in Texas during the past ten or twelve years will readily see that the political power of the cities has been increasing out of all proportion to the rural vote. This means that the labor-union vote in Texas is increasing out of all proportion to the increase, if any, of the farmer vote. In fact, the farmer vote has increased practically none at all during that time. On the other hand, has been some increase in the vote it has apparently decreased. There of the small business man, but nothing to compare with the increase of the vote controlled by the big business interests or by the labor unions. The state is rapidly becoming industrialized, and it will probably be as much so as most of the states of the North and East within another decade or two. So, one may look for the political complexion of Texas to change greatly during the next few years.

It is regrettable that those North Carolina people peppered Henry Wallace with eggs and tomatoes and broke up a couple of meetings at which he attempted to speak in that state, even if he is a near-munimist. We have little sympathy for him personally and none at all for his attempts to besmirch this country in its dealings with the dictators of Russia, but we boast of the fact this is a country of free speech and it is unfortunate that in the Democratic South this fundamental right should be so flagrantly violated. Those two North Carolina audiences have done the South and the Nation at large a district disservice.

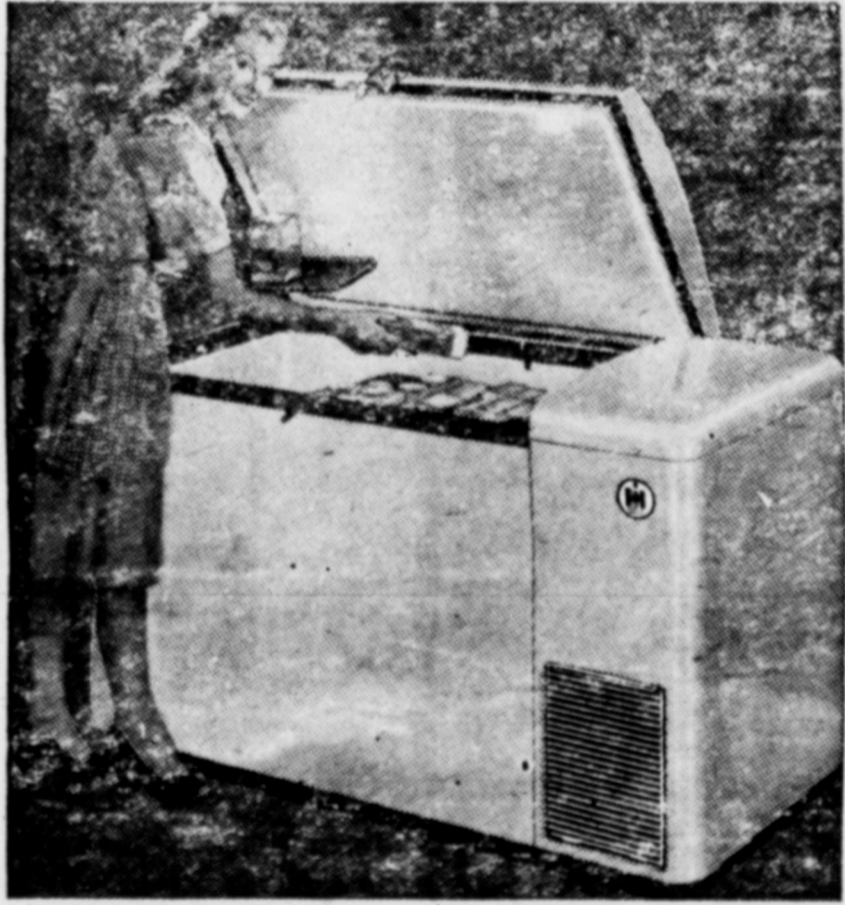

Lamesa Reporter Is New Daily

The Lamesa Daily Reporter began its existence as a daily paper Sunday in a big-way. Its first publication was a 72-page special edition.

Ross A. Woodson is publisher of the new daily, with Edwin Englewood as editor. Its No. 1 issue bears Volume No. 41. Lamesa Newspapers, Inc., owner, purchased the Lamesa Courier in September, 1945, and since has published it as a weekly.

The "progress edition" in nine sections tells the story of Lamesa's growth during the forty-four years since it was organized in Dawson county. Incorporated in 1917, it now has an estimated population of 11,500. The Lamesa Chamber of Commerce estimates the county's population at 22,000.

Lamesa's rapid growth in post-war years is attributed to development of its resources in agriculture, oil, livestock, industry and as a merchandising center of the South Plains area.

Woodson dedicated the special edition to the pioneer citizens of Dawson county, who guided growth of the town and county from a sparsely settled ranch country to one of intensified agriculture.

Noting that the area is still a young and growing one, Woodson wrote:

"Our pioneer citizens, many of whom are still among us, are responsible to a great extent for our prosperity today."

The new daily will be published each afternoon, Monday through Friday, and on Sunday morning.

(Continued from page 1) registered in any state of the Union, considering the large number of votes polled, almost a million.

Lynn county failed by far to cast its full vote in this contest. Many other Plains counties likewise failed to vote anywhere near their full strength. In Lynn county, there was not a single county contest to draw out the full vote. In this county, only 1,692, votes were cast in the Stevenson-Johnson contest. Johnson carried the county by 240 votes, the returns showing that he received 966 votes against 726 for Stevenson.

In the contest for the state senate, waged by Sterling J. Parrish of Lubbock, the present incumbent, and Judge Kilmer B. Corbin of Lamesa, his opponent, Corbin lead by 256 votes. He received a total of 970 votes against 714 for Parrish.

Corbin also received a substantial majority in the entire 30th senatorial district, but the figures are not available to the News at this time.

In the run-off primary for county commissioner of precinct No. 4, the New Home precinct, G. W. (Dick) Turner received 189 votes against 168 for Donald C. Caudle. Turner will therefore succeed Thad Smith on January 1, 1949, as commissioner from New Home.

FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

by Roger C. Whitman

QUESTION: How should plaster walls that show dampness through the wallpaper be treated? Some say that using black asphaltum on the wall would waterproof it. But how will wallpaper be over this material? Aluminum paint is said to be good for sealing the wall. But will wallpaper hold over this?

ANSWER: I would not advise using black asphaltum for this purpose. Your wallpaper may be pulpy and absorbent, and probably the plaster also absorbs and holds much of the dampness from the air. Before repapering, and after removing the present paper, try the effect of painting the walls with good aluminum paint. Let this dry, apply a glue size, and then hang a washable type of wallpaper or an oilcloth type of wall covering. If there is excessive moisture in the air of your house, try to locate the cause.

QUESTION: There is a "ring" in the ceiling where some patching had been done. Will this correct itself if the ceiling is repapered after a lapse of several months?

ANSWER: It is possible that the plaster may have disintegrated from excessive dampness or leakage, and the discoloration should be examined by a plasterer and taken care of before paper is hung. When the patching was done, it may be that not enough plaster was cut out, and a damaged area still remains.

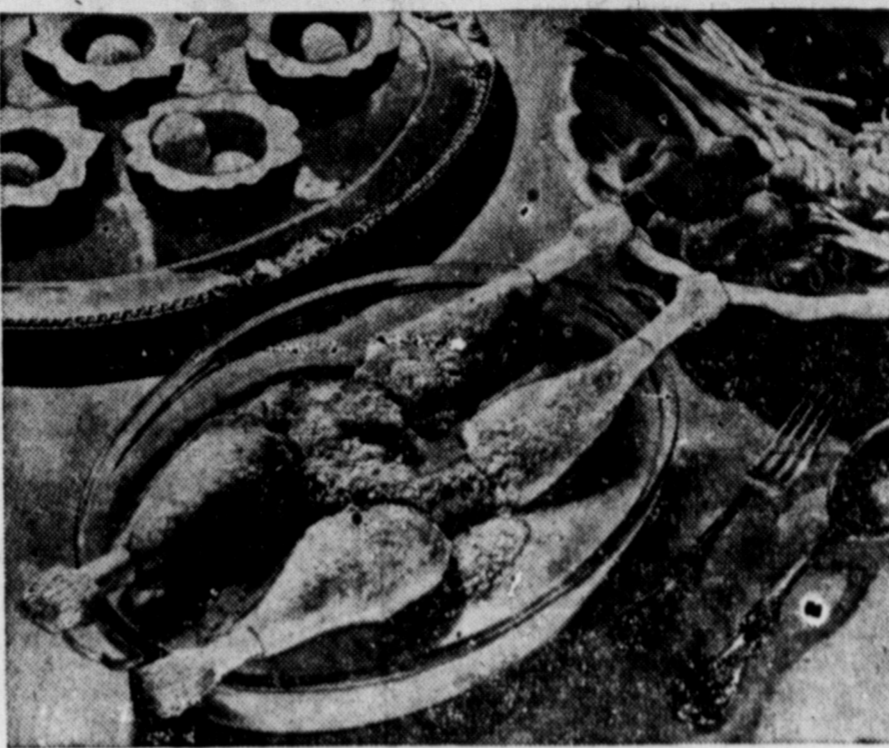

Relishes Will Add Zestful Touch to Meals (See recipes below)

Canning Relishes
BY THIS TIME you undoubtedly have finished your fruit and vegetable canning, but there still remain those late-in-the-season relishes. Those spicy, zesty accompaniments to meat and other entrees are almost as essential as the fruits and vegetables, and many women do not consider their canning complete without them.

Most relishes are easy to put up and there is little opportunity for spoilage if directions are followed. Enlist some help from the family for cutting up some of the vegetables and fruits and work will go forward rapidly.

SPICED GRAPES are delightful with mild-flavored meats such as lamb, veal and chicken.

Spiced Grapes
5 quarts stemmed grapes
8 cups sugar
2 cups vinegar
1 teaspoon grated nutmeg
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon ground cloves
1 teaspoon ground ginger
Pry seeds from grapes. Drain. Boil sugar, vinegar and spices for five minutes. Add grapes and cook until thick. Pour into hot sterile jars and seal at once.

If you aren't certain you have enough spreads for bread already canned, make some spicy, delicious apple butter. It may be used in sandwiches, cookies or as spread for biscuits and muffins.

Apple Butter
1 peck apples
1 gallon sweet cider
6 cups sugar
1 tablespoon cinnamon
½ teaspoon cloves
Wash and slice apples. Add cider and cook until soft. Press through sieve. Boil the strained pulp until thick enough to heap on a spoon, then add sugar mixed with spices and continue boiling until so thick that no liquids run from the apples. Pour into hot jars and process for 10 minutes in a boiling water bath. Complete sealing if necessary.

RELISHES SHOULD be moist but not juicy. Chief ingredients in them should have a firm rather than mushy consistency. Vegetables in both of these relishes should be finely chopped.

Chow-Chow
1 gallon chopped cabbage
12 onions
12 green peppers
12 red peppers
2 quarts tomatoes, chopped
5 cups sugar
4 tablespoons ground mustard
1 tablespoon turmeric
1 tablespoon ground ginger
4 tablespoons mustard seed
3 tablespoons celery seed
2 tablespoons mixed pickling spice
1 gallon vinegar
Mix all vegetables, which have first been chopped, with one-half cup salt. Let stand overnight, then drain. Tie spices in a bag. Add sugar and spices to vinegar. Simmer 20 minutes. Add all ingredients and simmer until hot and well seasoned. Remove spice bag and pack hot chow-chow into sterile jars; seal at once.

LYNN SAYS:
Following Rules for Pickling Fruits and Vegetables
Pickles should be crisp and firm, solid and evenly colored. The correct color for the green pickle is olive rather than bright green.

Pack sufficient liquid in the jars in which you can pickles so that those on top will not shrivel.

Fresh spices are your best guarantee of flavor when making pickles. Spices lose flavor as they stand so only freshly opened packages should be used.

Tomato Chutney
12 ripe tomatoes
3 onions
3 sweet peppers
6 tart apples
1 pod hot pepper
1 clove garlic
1 cup seeded raisins
3 cups brown sugar
1 tablespoon ginger
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon salt
3 cups vinegar

Skin tomatoes and onions, seed peppers, pare and core apples, wash raisins and then run all ingredients through the food chopper. Combine all ingredients and cook until thick.

Corn Relish
2 quarts corn
1 quart cabbage
1 cup chopped green pepper
1 cup chopped red pepper
2 large onions
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons ground mustard
1 tablespoon mustard seed
1 tablespoon salt
1 tablespoon celery seed
1 quart vinegar
1 cup water

Boil corn for five minutes. Cold dip. Cut from cob and measure. Chop and measure cabbage and peppers. Chop onions. Combine ingredients and simmer 20 minutes.

CLOVE APPLES are very popular with roast pork dinners. If you add a few drops of red food coloring, the apples will be pretty and eye-catching.

Clove Apples
2 pounds prepared apples
4 cups sugar
2½ cups water
1 tablespoon crushed ginger root or mixed whole spices
12 whole cloves
Food coloring
Use apples that hold shape after cooking. Pare, core and cut large apples in halves or quarters. Pare and core small apples, but leave whole. Boil sugar, water and cloves with food color with the peelings

of two or three red apples until the jelling point is reached (220 degrees). Remove cloves and peelings, pour syrup over apples.

Crab Apple Pickles
1 gallon crab apples
6-8 cups sugar
3 cups water
1 cup vinegar
1 stick cinnamon
1 tablespoon ginger
1 tablespoon whole cloves
½ tablespoon whole allspice
Wash and pierce each apple with a needle. Heat sugar, liquids and spices, tied in a bag, until sugar dissolves. Cool. Add apples and simmer until tender. Let stand several hours or overnight. Pack cold into sterile jars.

Fruits and vegetables used for pickling should not be overripe. The same rules for selecting pickling material as for general canning holds true.

When making fruit pickles, cut the fruit in uniform sizes and shapes so the pickles look attractive when served. The syrup for fruit pickles is as thick as that for preserves.

Vegetables which are brined should be kept thoroughly covered with the brine, otherwise those standing uncovered by brine will spoil.
