## Truman Wins Election By Tremendous Majority; Biggest Upset In History

Lynn county went Democratic again last Tuesday.

Neither Tom Dewey, Republican, nor J. Strom Thurmond, States Rights Democrat, was able to make scarcely a dent on the normal Democratic vote in this county. Henry Wallace didn't get a vote. Neither did Norman Thomas, the Socialist. Claude Waston, Prohibition Party candidate, got six votes.

In the race for the United States Senate, Jack Porter, Republican, fared a little better, but Lyndon Johnson, the Democratic candidate, defeated him by a vote of five to one. Sam Morris, Prohibition candidate ran far ahead of his ticket. He received 43 votes.

Quite a few votes cast in many of the voting precincts could not be counted or the reason that the voters left the names of more than one candidate for the same office unscratched.

In the Presidential race, 2530 were counted; for the United States Senate, there were only 2452 legal votes; for Governor, 2492; for Congress, 2529. In the North Tahoka box, for example, 519 ballots were handed in, but only 495 could be counted for President; and only 490 for the United States Senate. In the county, probably as many as 2600 ballots were turned in, but not more than 2530 were counted in any one race.

### Wenzels Win Awards At State Fair

The winning of the banner for the fat barrow grand championship with his Berkshire entry in competition with all other breeds at the State Fair, including entries from the A. & M. College, brought a glow of pride to the hearts of A. D. Wenzel and son Leo, former Lynn county farmers and stockmen of the Wilson community, now residing in Terry county.

Wenzels, who still read The News told a representative of the paper that he and his son exhibited 19 hogs in the State Fair and that in addition to the grand champion banner just noted, they had three other entries winning grand champion and two winning reserve champion places in their respective classes, besides 12 first place ribbons, four second place ribbon, and six third place, and other places, totaling 37 in all.

The Wenzel started raising hogs about 12 years ago while living near Wilson. They now live between Meadow and Brownfield.

### Texas Voting Shown Light

Although the Texas vote in the general election Tuesday was not as large as might have been desired, incomplete returns Thursday morning indicated that around 900,000 votes had been polled. Republicans had polled a much larger vote than usual, and States Rights Democrats had cast somewhere between 75,000 and 90,000 votes but the Democratic majorities were overwhelming, just the same.

So much confusion existed in the minds of so many people who therefore did not take the trouble to vote at all, and so many who did cast a ballot made errors in marking the same that invalidated it, that the total vote was cut down considerably. Many split tickets had to be thrown out all over Texas because the voters were not careful enough in marking them.

The News hopes to be able to give the total vote of Texas in all the state and national races next week.

The son of the late Ed Cook and wife Mrs. Ida Cook of Wells, deceased was born on December 5, 1906, and at the time of his death he was 38 years, six months and eleven days old. He came with his parents from Taylor county to Lynn county in 1924. He was married in 1927 and lived in Big Spring at the time he was called into service in the United States armed forces, being a truck driver for the H. O. Wooten Wholesale Grocery Company.

Surviving are his wife, his mother, two sisters, five brothers and other relatives. The sisters are Mrs. Lena Dial of Meadow and Mrs. May Ellis of Baldwin Park, California. The brothers are R. F. Cook of Lorezno, V. E. Cook of Meadow, E. A. Cook of Tahoka, H. L. and W. H. Cook of O'Donnell, Rt. 3.

As The News went to press Thursday night, the Bulldogs were entertaining the Seagraves Eagles on the local field. Though Seagraves is considered weaker than usual, it has an alert young team that was able to defeat the Slaton Tigers. This had been designated the annual Home-Coming game, and a crowd of Exes was expected to be present.

O'Donnell, however, has the best team it has had in many years. Sparked by Quarterback Joe Palmer, a former Tahoka student the Eagles have won over Slaton, Seagraves, and gave Post a close tussle until late in the game.

Both Tahoka and O'Donnell business houses will be closed Armistice, and a large holiday crowd is expected for the game.

Last Friday night, the Bulldogs looked good in taking an easy 27 to 6 victory over the Morton Indians there.

Morton scored its only touchdown in the first quarter when Halfback Yarey broke through the line and raced 60 yards for the double stripe.

Other than that however, the Bulldogs were in charge of the game all of the way. End Duane Carter scored in the second quarter. In the third, Fullback Tommy Chandler crossed the goal, and in the final period End Douglas McNeely caught a pass for a tally, and Halfback Jimmie Small ran 30 yards for another score. Carter kicked the three extra points.

Tahoka's touchdown was made by Wayne Tekell. The tackling and blocking was excellent most of the way, and fans left the game enthusiastic about the future of Tahoka football team because of the excellent play of the "B" string. No doubt, their play was an inspiration to the "A" string, which went out the next night and ran over Morton. Though the Bulldogs have won no championship this year, they have learned to play the game hard and fair, and the training will doubtless be of value to the boys in future life.

The Crumes were residents of Tahoka for a few years some twelve or fifteen years ago.

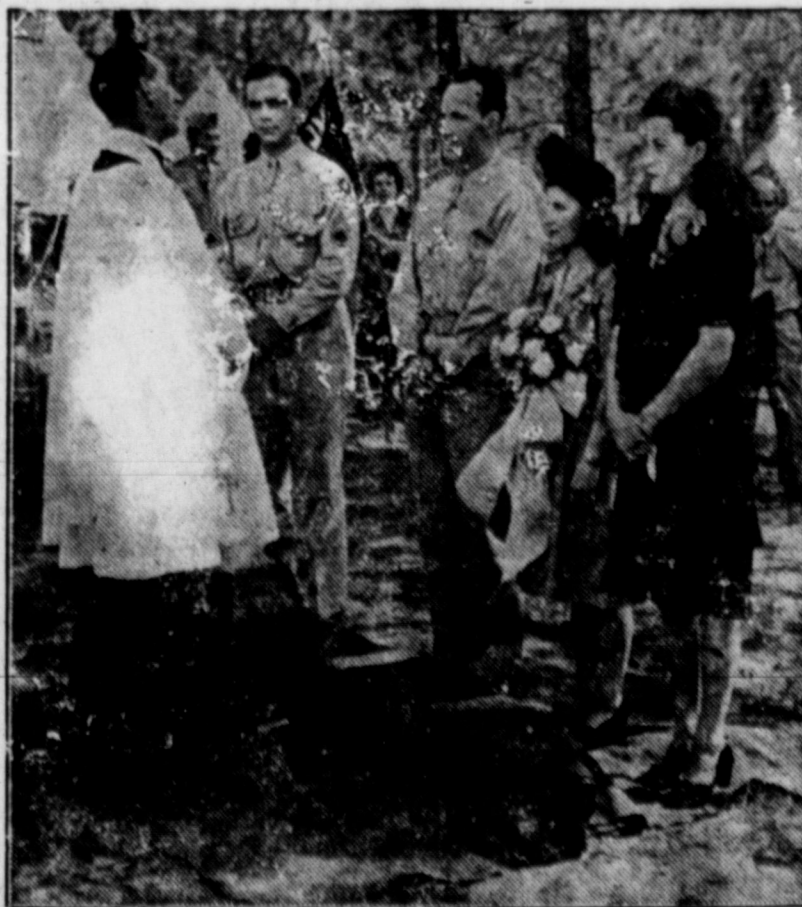

**Texas City Stages "Comeback"**

Devastated by the explosions of two freighters loading ammonium nitrate fertilizer in its harbor, Texas City, Tex., suffered one of America's worst peacetime catastrophes on April 16-17, 1947. The explosions were perhaps the most destructive ever known on the North American continent, apart from the atom bomb test. Only the Black Tom and Halifax explosions of World War I are comparable. But Texas City has already "come back" Except for the dock area, hardly a scar of the terrific explosion remains. The business district gleams with shiny new store fronts and plate glass. The stricken residential districts are freshly painted, neater and tidier looking than ever before. Fire insurance and the undaunted will of the people have been behind this amazing reconstruction.

**Precaution for Housewives**

After lighting but before leaving a burner, the flame should be observed to make sure that perfect ignition has occurred. This applies to burners under the solid or partly enclosed cooking top of a range and to a radiant space heater as much as to an oven, water heater or furnace. It sometimes happens that gas does not light at every part of a burner, and unburned gas escapes from those at which there is no flame. Oven burners are especially subject to this trouble. When the gas is lighted it is well to make sure that there is a flame at every part. If there is not, something may be wrong. Usually the burner needs cleaning, but if cleaning does not remedy the trouble the burner should be repaired or replaced by an experienced appliance adjuster.

**Aviation's Forgotten Man Attends to His Trapping**

Forgotten man of aviation is Johnny Moore, of Colington, N. C. He is the lone surviving witness of the first powered airplane flight, the last living man who actually lent a hand to the Wright brothers on December 17, 1903, when they put their flimsy craft into the wind and flew the astonishing space of 120 feet.

Johnny Moore is 62 years old now, weathered and carefree. He was 17 years old when he chanced by Kill Devil hill on that memorable date and helped put the Wright plane in position for its run down the wooden rails upon which it was launched and so became truly airborne.

Having thus lent a couple of brawny arms to this historic event, watching the three other flights made the same day, and then seeing the plane crash ignobly among the hummocks, Johnny casually went back to his eel pots and muskrat traps and to oblivion.

For many years on Kill Devil there have assembled both visiting dignitaries and local citizens, with commemorative wreaths and often as not a squadron of modern military planes to fly over. Johnny Moore, who lives within a stone's throw of the great monument to the first flight, never attended these events. He doesn't like crowds.

**Puerto Rico Home-Building Speeded Up in Big Project**

A 50-million-dollar postwar housing boom is helping to ease the extreme housing shortage that has plagued Puerto Rico in recent years.

First of the immediate projects is the huge Puerto Nuevo development in the suburbs of San Juan, where some 5,000 homes are being rushed to completion. Built by private construction interests through the personal stimulation of Gov. Jesus T. Pinero, it is the largest such development ever inspired and insured by the FHA.

Eventually a second 5,000 homes will be built in the San Juan area, while the ultimate goal of the insular government is to see an additional 10,000 low cost homes built throughout Puerto Rico. Each community will have its own schools, shops, churches and theaters, while local bus systems will provide direct transportation services to minimize travel problems.

Priced around \$4,000, these new mass-produced homes can be bought by ex-service men on monthly installments. Most are two-bedroom homes, with bath, kitchen and living room.

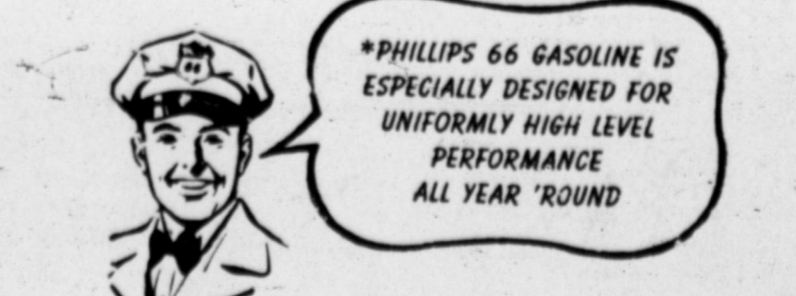

### Citizens Asked To Contribute

Terry Thompson, Lynn county director for the March of Dimes, calls attention to the following information recently furnished him respecting the spread of polio.

This disease, it is declared, has become epidemic in Texas. A recent survey showed that there were then 1600 cases in Texas as against 189 during the entire year of 1947. As one evidence of the prevalence of the disease, 47 patients are now being treated in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

The need for a successful campaign for the eradication of the disease is greater now than has ever been, Thompson declares, and the big part of the money collected must be used to pay for continued treatment of patients now suffering from the disease. He is suggesting that several thousand dollars be raised in Lynn county during the coming campaign, which will end in January.

He says that this money must be raised principally through the churches and schools and possibly some of the service organizations. 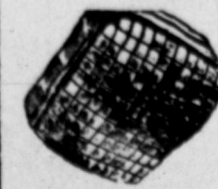

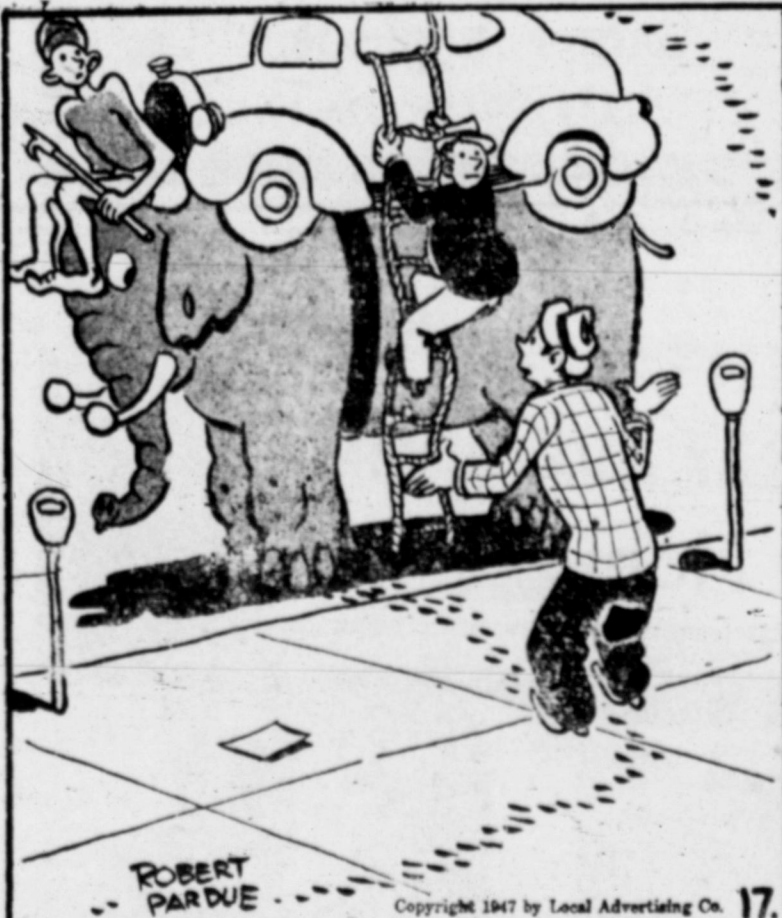

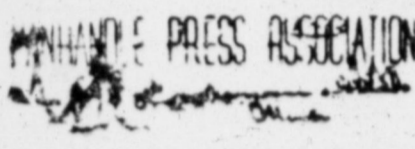

**A WORLD CONFLICT RAGES**

All close observers of world affairs must see clearly that a fight to the death is being waged in the world today between the forces of Democracy and the forces of Totalitarianism.

The forces of Democracy are most powerfully represented by the United States and Great Britain; the forces of Totalitarianism by Russia and by Communists everywhere. There is a third mighty force that is seeking mastery in the affairs of the world, the Roman Church. It is no less political than religious in its aspirations and activities.

Democracy, which is most powerfully represented by our nation, is based upon and has its roots firmly imbedded in the doctrines held generally by the evangelical churches. In fact, it is the outgrowth of the teaching of the Bible and particularly of the New Testament of Christ, himself.

It is the adherents of the evangelical churches that have chiefly peopled America. The first white settlers in what is now the United States were Puritans, Baptists, Quakers, members of the Dutch Reformed Church, French Huguenots, a few Presbyterians, a few Lutherans, and other Protestants. The Methodists came and flourished a little later. Among the first settlers also were members of the Church of England (Episcopalians) who settled in Virginia, and who can not be classified strictly as Evangelicals; and the Catholics who settled Maryland, who belong strictly to the ritualistic, liturgical group.

Now the forces of Totalitarianism are undertaking to destroy this great Democratic Ideology, this philosophy of government and of life that exalts the individual and proclaims the rights of man as opposed to the self-asserted right of dictators, potentates, and other arrogant pretenders to lord it over their fellowmen.

It looks as if Totalitarianism as formerly represented by Hitler and Mussolini and as now represented by Stalin, Molotov, and their powerful co-conspirators, who dominate Russia and seek through the spread of Communism to dominate the world, is constantly gathering strength, constantly intimidating other nations, constantly extending the iron curtain, with a view to striking hard and fast at the opportune time.

The Roman Catholic Church, however, which has never been democratic in its doctrines nor in its practices, is bitterly contesting the aggressions of Russia, for the reason that Communism magnifies the State and asserts that the State must be all-powerful, while the Pope and the Catholic Church contend that the Church and not the State must dominate in the affairs of men. Communism would mean the death of Roman Catholicism, a fact which the Pope and his religionists fully understand. Hence the bitter opposition to Stalin and his group.

If Russia is eventually crushed and Communism eradicated, then Roman Catholicism, as a matter of self preservation as well as from a desire to rule and to make the world Christian according to its own ideas, will become the great aggressive force that will seek to overcome all opposition, including all

**Aztecs Paid Off Soldiers In Succulent Cocoa Beans**

Long before Columbus discovered the new world, cocoa was of prime importance in the economy of Middle America. Cocoa beans were the standard medium of exchange among the Aztecs, and the Aztec emperor who preferred chocolate to all other beverages levied taxes for the imperial treasury in the succulent beans, thus insuring himself an adequate supply of his favorite drink. Up to 1880, cocoa beans were still common currency in isolated hamlets of Middle America.

Aztec treasures were crammed with outside chocolate bars. Slaves in those times went for a hundred cocoa beans the head, and soldiers were paid off in the same "coin." At once it became obvious that the American slang word, "bean," meaning dollar, is of very ancient origin indeed. Cocoa bean money had a profound ethical difference from other moneys: it could not be hoarded, for it spoiled after a few months. It could only be spent or eaten or guzzled in the form of chocolate.

## New Grass Strain Spreads Through Northern States

Men who work for the improvement of grass have reason for satisfaction in the record of alta fescue, a new strain now well proved. It is especially useful as pasture. Alta fescue was picked out from a field of tall fescue 25 years ago. Selected by H. A. Scoth of the U. S. department of agriculture, working at the Oregon agricultural experimental station, and developed by him and the station agronomists into a popular forage in the northwest, it is working its way into favor in many parts of the northern states and may go farther. Last year the production of seed, practically all of it grown in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho, totaled close to 2,500,000 pounds, enough for seeding about 160,000 acres. Of this, Oregon produced about 1,750,000 pounds. In addition to 10,000 acres devoted to alta fescue seed production, 49,000 acres was grown for forage in the three states last year.

Stands of this new fescue have surprising persistence. The first seed-increase planting was in 1936 and that plot of one-tenth of an acre is still thriving. The plant sends its roots down 5 feet or more where conditions are most favorable, a characteristic that enables it to keep green in dry weather and to keep growing continuously over a long season. It is adapted to heavy soils and does well even where drainage is poor. Preliminary tests in Missouri indicate it may prove a good forage for growing on overflow land and on gray silt loam with tight hardpan layers.

## London Bridge Makes Trip To Serve Central Africa

When enemy bombs and rockets rained havoc on Britain during the blitz, Londoners watched squads of workmen hastily erect two large temporary bridges over the Thames. Had any of the main bridges been blown to bits, London's heavy traffic was to be diverted across these stop-gap roadways. At war's end, no traffic had ever crossed them.

These bridges are to be re-erected as a link on the main highway running between Salisbury and Lusaka, the capitals of Southern and Northern Rhodesia, two land-locked territories in the heart of Africa. This vital route is now broken at the Kafue, some 35 miles south of Lusaka, where the river has to be crossed by ferry.

This bridge will be of importance in plans now being considered to industrialize the Rhodesias and to develop the world's largest known deposits of coal and one of the biggest sources of chrome in existence.

Northern and Southern Rhodesia together are larger than the combined areas of Texas and Colorado. Their combined population of nearly 3,500,000 is, however, less than half that of the two U. S. states.

## Short History of Statehood

Hawaii has been a territory of the United States for almost half a century. Annexed in 1898, Hawaii has persistently petitioned for statehood and has waited longer for the honor than any other state, except New Mexico. Thirteen states founded the nation. Five were carved from existing states—Vermont, Kentucky, Maine, West Virginia and Tennessee. The first four were admitted to statehood directly. Tennessee was a territory for a brief period before being made a state. Two were foreign areas when acquired and were made states without being territories first—Texas and California. Twenty-eight others were first territories, then states. Two of the 28 comprised one territory before admission—the two Dakotas.

## Shoe Industry Started in 1846

Most people have worn shoes of one kind or another for centuries. The oldest type of footwear known is the sandal, created some 4,000 years ago, by the Egyptians. The shoe-making industry in the United States started in 1829 when the Mayflower, on its third voyage to America, dropped anchor in the harbor of Salem, Mass. Thomas Beard and Isaac Richman, shoemakers, landed with bundles of hides and the rough implements used in the making of early footwear. Shoemaker's tools in those days consisted of an awl, hammer, needles, thread, pegs, beeswax, knives and a variety of rubbing sticks. In 1846 Elias Howe Jr., revolutionized the shoe making industry by putting the eye of the needle in the point and gave the world a machine which was to do away with hours of home drudgery.

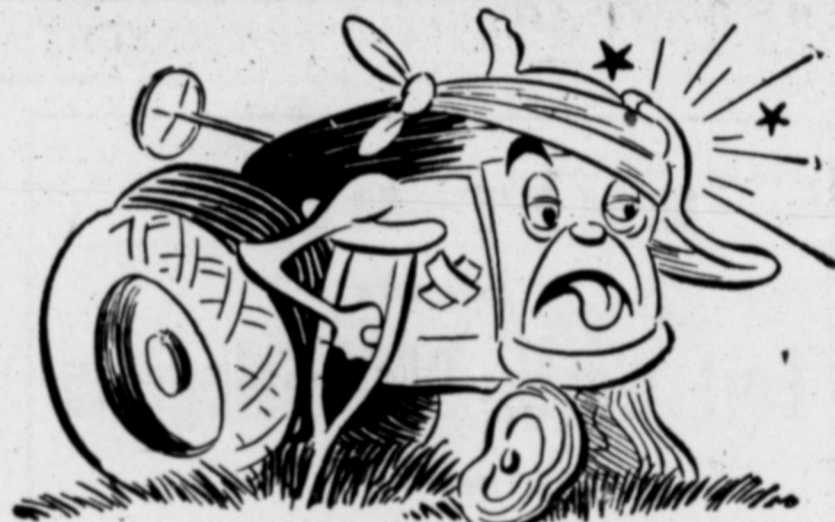

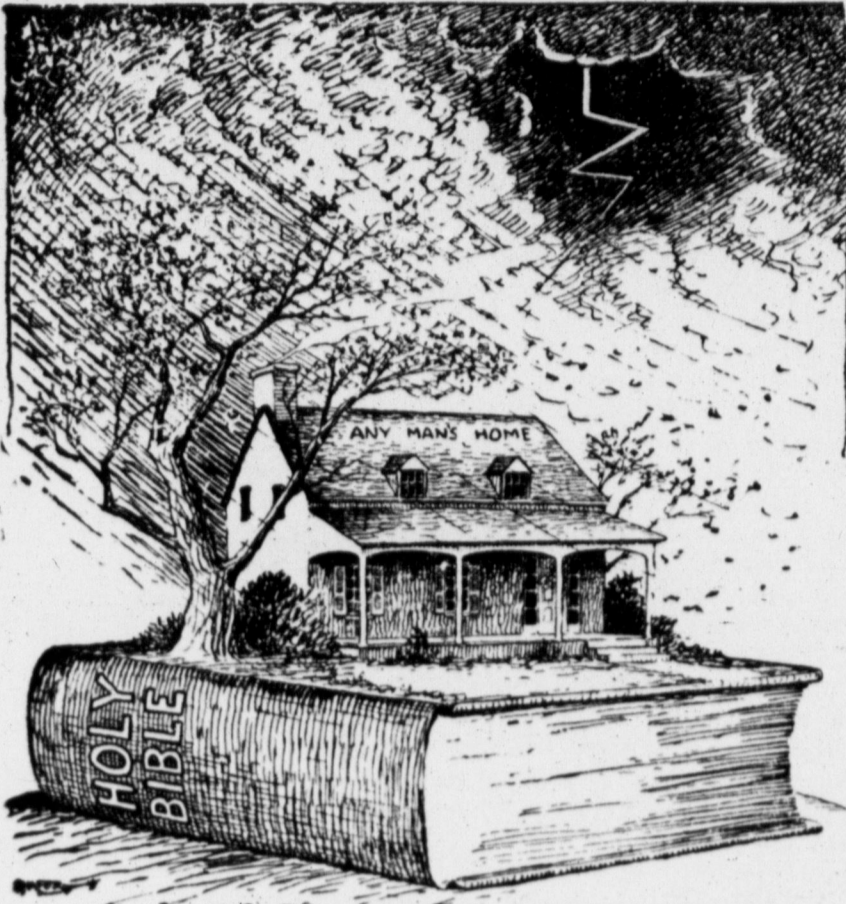

Pilot Error Causes Most Air Crashes

WASHINGTON.—While pilot error is blamed for most air crashes, new systems of perfecting pilot technique are being developed constantly.

During the war the air force lost more than half as many pilots in training accidents as it lost in combat. An air force study of the experiences of 460 flyers since the war disclosed one important fact:

All pilots make mistakes sometimes.

Some pilots make more errors than others, and some errors are more common than others.

Half of all the errors reported were "substitutions"—that is, operating the wrong control, such as lowering the wing flap instead of the landing gear.

Nearly one-fifth were "adjustment"—moving a control too much or too little or not moving it fast enough.

Nearly one-fifth of the mistakes were simply forgetting to do something.

Move Controls Wrong

The rest of the errors were caused by moving a control the wrong way, moving it unintentionally or by not being able to reach it.

Robert V. Garrett, chief pilot and a senior accident investigator for the civil aeronautics board, says two things need to be done:

1. Cockpits should be standardized.

2. Pilots should be trained more.

The air force and the navy have taken one important step toward standardization by grouping the six basic instruments used in "blind flying." These are the air speed indicator, directional gyro-compass, artificial horizon, altimeter, turn and bank indicator.

Most errors, in fact about one-fifth of all pilot mistakes, occur in the "power group"—the four handles which control fuel mixture, propeller pitch, fuel and supercharger. They must be operated in that order when increasing power, and in the reverse order to decrease it.

Need Natural Arrangement

The natural arrangement would appear to be to place the controls in the order of use, but few planes have it that way.

The second most common failing—confusing flap and wheels—accounts for one error in eight. In most airplanes those controls are in the same area and sometimes have the same shape. Both are used in landings and takeoffs.

Garrett proposes that all cockpits be standardized, whether for military, commercial or private planes.

A further step might be changing the movement of some controls, such as from horizontal to vertical or rotary. Still another step might be to place the light used to show whether a control is on or off right in the handle instead of above, below or beside it.

The next big move for safety is to increase training. Flight training is expensive. It costs as much as \$1,500 an hour in a large 4-engine plane. When a mistake occurs it can be very expensive, but not as expensive as it would be at a later date.

Youthful Iowa Pranksters Enact "Ganglike Killing"

MANNING, IOWA.—Townpeople here who stumbled over each other in their attempts to get out of the way of a murderous gangster car now are attempting to convince themselves that they knew it was a fake all the time.

Five high school youths from Audubon admitted that they staged the "killing" complete with blank shotgun shells and bloodlike catsup, to relieve the monotony of a dull Sunday afternoon.

They said that after they drove to Manning, James McLeran, one of the youths, began running down Main street. Two others, chased him and fired three shotgun blasts. McLeran fell, spilling catsup as he did so. The other "roared up in McLeran's car, tossed the "body" into the back seat, and sped out of town.

Frightened witnesses called Sheriff Tom Finegan, who thought he had a crime on his hands until several youths told him they had seen the "death car" earlier in the afternoon and that some Audubon boys were in it.

Finegan traced the youths to the Audubon high school, where he found that everyone knew about the "killing." He arrested the youths and took them to the county jail at Carroll. The boys promised "We won't do it again."

Late for Work, Woman Calls Police for Transportation

EVANSVILLE, IND.—When Katharine Hoskinson, deputy city clerk couldn't get a taxicab to take her to work, she called police. Two breathless patrolmen arrived. But Mrs. Hoskinson was late, anyway. It took her quite a while to explain to the police that nothing was wrong and all she wanted was a free ride to city hall.

Twenty-one million Republicans were astounded and dejected Wednesday morning as unfavorable election reports continued to pour in until at ten o'clock it became clear that Dewey had been defeated. On the contrary about twenty-three million Democrats were delightfully surprised and elated that President Truman had been overwhelmingly re-elected.

The landslide for Truman was generally pronounced the most amazing upset in the history of our country. All the poll-takers had consistently predicted an easy Dewey victory, and these predictions were so general and persistent that most Democrats had lost all hope.

Returns published Thursday morning showed that Truman had majorities in 29 states and was assured of 304 electoral votes, and Dewey had majorities in only fifteen states with 189 electoral votes. Thurmond was credited with having carried four states, South Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana, with 38 electoral votes, with prospect of getting two electoral votes from Tennessee. Wallace never carried a single state and will get no electoral votes.

With the count still unfinished a total of 44,491,891 votes had been reported. Truman had received 22,229,400 votes, Dewey 20,371,674, Thurmond 862,429, and Henry Wallace, 1,028,391. This result is all

When the poisonous snake strikes, his mouth opens wide, so the upper and lower fangs are in a vertical line. The fangs point outward like two slightly curved lances. Several drops of venom are forced into the wound. All this is accomplished within a fraction of a second. Two or three drops of poison at one time will be released by a large snake. The size of the injection varies with the object struck and the state of the reptile's excitement. More poison is used in biting a man than a rabbit. When the poison enters the body, part of it is rapidly absorbed into the blood stream by capillary blood-vessels. The balance of the venom remains at the puncture until absorbed. Great swelling and discoloration quickly appear in the region of the bite. If the snake's fangs puncture a vein or an artery the victim is almost certain to die, because the poison quickly reaches the brain, heart and other vital organs.

#### Whirling Dervishes Still Whirl

The whirling dervishes of Turkey were a hardy lot. They banged their heads against oak trees, thrived on a diet of broken glass, walked through beds of hot coals and came up smiling—and spinning like a top. It was the Turkish rejuvenator, Mustafa Kemal Pasha, who drove the dervishes into their final tailspin. Sometime around 1920 he abolished the crumbling caliphate, ordered women to drop their veils, and decreed the use of the Roman alphabet and western dress. The dervishes were ordered to go, but were determined to hang on, and many of them lost their necks in the process. But the dervish has not been entirely eradicated. Their habitat is the entire Moslem world, from North Africa through Asia Minor and Asia as far as India and China. Turkey and Persia have been their principal bailiwicks.

### Famous Musical Autographs Added to Congress Library

A remarkable collection of musical manuscripts has been acquired by the library of congress through the generosity of Mrs. Gertrude Clarke Whitell, whose previous gifts to the library include a quartet of Stradivarius instruments and an endowment for concerts of chamber music.

The new gift consists of original manuscripts of the following composers: Johann Sebastian Bach, Joseph Haydn, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Ludwig von Beethoven, Johannes Brahms and Max Reger.

Every manuscript represents a work of major importance, and the group greatly enriches the autograph holdings of the library's music division.

Unexcelled among these new additions is the autograph of Beethoven's piano sonata in E major, Op. 109, one of this composer's famous "last five" in which he attained his greatest maturity in writing for this instrument. Finished about 1820, it is also the first complete Beethoven sonata in original manuscript form to come to the library.

There are two Mozart autographs, one a violin concerto and the other a piano concerto. Both are full orchestra scores.

#### Forgotten Inventor

Tom Davenport, a blacksmith, traded his brother's horse for some cash to buy an electromagnet. He invented the first battery-operated electric motor. A fire in the U. S. patent office, in December, 1836, destroyed the model. Unbeaten by disaster, Davenport built a second model and was awarded a patent in 1837. His invention inspired world-wide efforts along these lines. Today electric motor help power the world.

#### Cattle Loss from Heel Flies

Damage done to cattle by heel flies and grubs is more extensive than many people realize, researchers say. Annoyed by the flies, cattle run off much flesh in fly season. Later, when the grubs are burrowing inside the animals, the resulting irritation, soreness and general run down condition is the cause of unthriftiness of cattle. Punctured by the grubs when they move to the backs of the animals, hides are often reduced in value by 50 per cent. Because of the damage grubs cause, much emphasis has been placed on their control in recent years.

#### Facts for Oyster Lovers

Oysters are canned commercially in the United States on the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific coasts. Pacific oysters are much larger, are somewhat more tender, and easier to break or tear than Eastern oysters. The methods used for canning Eastern oysters and Pacific oysters are essentially the same. Oysters in the shell are steamed until the shell opens. The partially-cooked oysters are removed from the shells, washed to remove extraneous matter, such as sand, pieces of shell, and packed into containers. Water is added to fill the container, leaving only a small head space. Such water is known as "packing medium." Salt may be added for seasoning. The containers are sealed and processed by heat to prevent spoiling.

## Former Teacher Visits Here

Joseph R. Griggs, now superintendent of the Huntsville public school system and also Director of Teacher Training in Sam Houston State College there, who did his first teaching in the South Ward school situated about seven miles southeast of the city of Tahoka, was a visitor here last Saturday. He was accompanied by his son, J. Wright Griggs, who is now a sophomore student in the Sam Houston College.

The youthful Joseph R. Griggs made application for a position in the school here just as he was about to graduate from the John Tarleton College at Stephenville. He got a great kick Saturday in recalling with the editor, who was then a member of the school board, some of the circumstances of his employment.

The board had been having much trouble with the South Ward School and they were in search of a man who could satisfactorily handle the situation. Griggs was not married but hoped to be soon and so he put in his application for both himself and his fiancée. They got the job and did a fine piece of work there, so fine that at the close of that school term the Draw district offered him the job as principal of that school and his wife as a teacher. They taught there successfully one year, and were then called to Woodrow. He remained there two years. His wife died in the meantime and later he married her sister. Then he joined the Lubbock school system and at the end of four years he was elected county school superintendent, serving from 1934 to 1938.

During his incumbency he led in a campaign which resulted in the consolidation of all public schools in Lubbock county outside the city into six school systems: Idalou, Shallowater, Cooper (Woodrow), Frenship, New Deal, and Roosevelt. New school buildings were constructed at a cost of approximately

## JOHN JACKSON IS OUT OF HOSPITAL; MUCH IMPROVED

After a siege of eight weeks of serious illness in the West Texas Hospital, Lubbock, during which time he underwent major surgery three times, John Jackson was released and brought back home Monday.

Nearly half the scholastics in the district are colored.

Since leaving Tahoka, Mr. Griggs has acquired an M. A. degree from the Texas Tech and a Ph. D. degree from the University of Texas.

To his mere acquaintances he is now Dr. Griggs. To his old-time friends he is just plain Joe Griggs. The rustic young pedagogue of 1926 from the sticks of Stephens county came to a good town to get his start and he has been climbing ever since. We may see him some day as State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

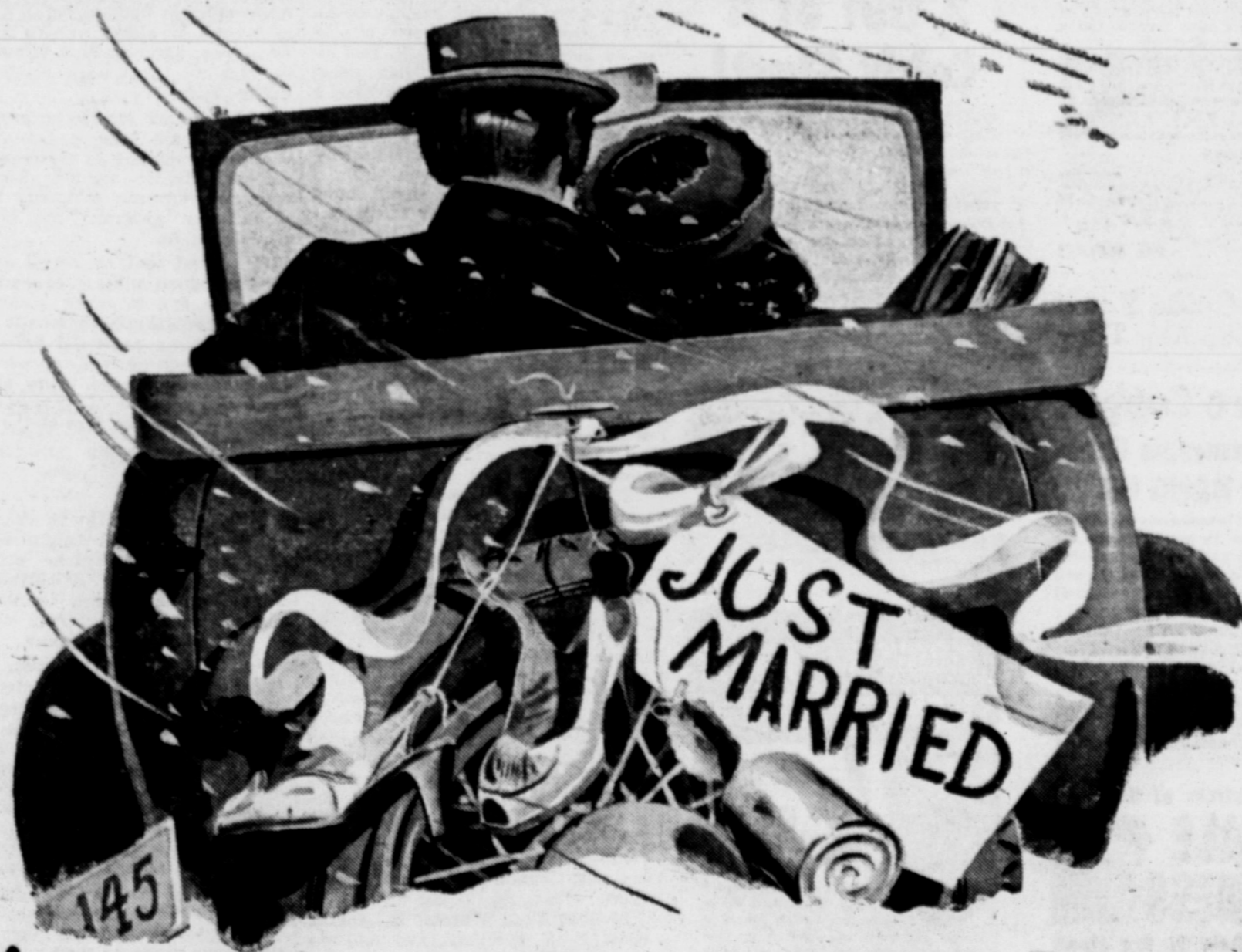

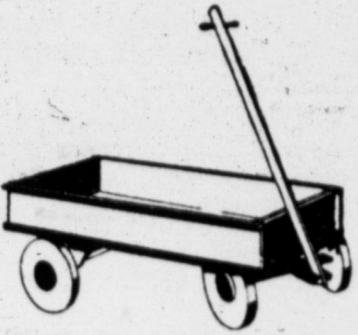

**U. N. Says Cease Fire in Palestine;  
Truman Asks More Defense Funds;  
U. S. Atom Control Plan Approved**

**CEASE FIRE:  
Holy Land**

Almost before anyone knew what was happening fierce fighting between Israeli and Egyptian forces had flared into bloom in the Negev, southern Palestine desert area.

ISRAELI government spokesmen said the purpose of the Israeli attack was to smash open the road to Jewish settlements in the Negev. Blocked transportation lines had prevented the Jews from running supply convoys to isolated settlements in the district.

But Dr. Ralph Bunche, acting Palestine mediator for the U. N., in his report to the security council, told a different story. Blame for the eruption of fighting in the Negev, he said, was not a "question of black and white."

"EACH side has soiled its hands in the grim business of trying to win a war through the instrumentality of a forced truce," was his version of the conflict.

By the time the battle had proceeded savagely for six days the harassed U. N. security council had had enough. It commanded both Arabs and Jews to issue immediate cease-fire orders.

Earlier, Bunche had attempted to promote a three-day truce in the fighting, with each side holding the positions it then was occupying. The effort fell through, however, when Israel rejected the proposal.

EVEN as the security council acted the fighting was spreading from the Negev to other fronts in the Holy Land—along the Jerusalem-Tel Aviv highway, where Trans-Jordan forces were grouped, and northeast of Tel Aviv in areas held by other Arab forces.

Results of the security council order, at the outset, at least, were disappointing. Each side tried to shift the blame to the other; neither appeared willing to hold the battle.

Palestine truce observers informed the United Nations that the Israeli forces generally appeared to be the attackers in the new fighting that had developed outside the southern front in the Negev.

**CONTROL PLAN:  
For Atoms**

How to establish effective, workable control of atomic energy on an international scale is one of the rocks upon which the U. N. has almost foundered more than once, but the situation began to look a shade or two brighter when the United Nations suddenly steered its resistance to almost impossible Russian demands on the issue.

OVER the objections of the Soviet bloc, the U. N. political committee overwhelmingly endorsed the western plan for atomic control as a necessary basis for eventual elimination of atomic weapons.

The conflict which has kept the atomic control problem deadlocked for so long is simply this:

The U. S. and the West insist that an air-tight system of international control and inspection must be established before the U. S. would feel safe in destroying its atomic weapons.

The resolution which the political committee adopted is generally in line with the American policy. The plenary session of the general assembly was expected to give it a routine final approval.

Peculiarly enough, this was the first time since Bernard Baruch presented the American plan to the atomic energy commission in June, 1946, that all of the United Nations had a chance to vote on it. Previously atomic energy was discussed only in the security council and the atomic energy commission.

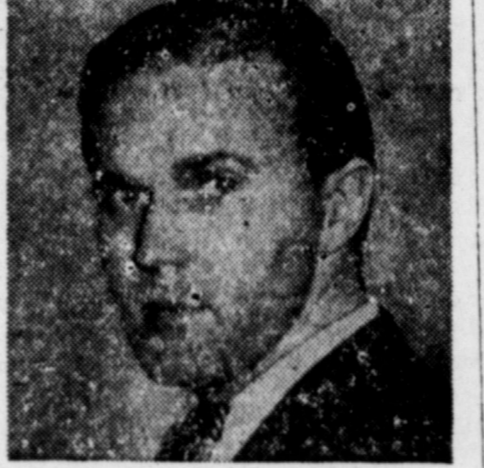
SHORTLY prior to the U. N. action the U. S. had demanded that the world group turn the deadlocked problem over to the five great powers and Canada for direct negotiations.

At that time Warren R. Austin, chief U. S. delegate, had told the 58-nation political committee that the U. N. could go no further in its effort to control the atom until the Soviet union agreed to "participate in the world community on a co-operative basis."

HOW much good the U. N. vote of approval would do as long as the Russians continued to object was a question that remained hanging fire.

It was conceded generally that, regardless of how much satisfaction the western nations might achieve by thus overruling and snubbing Moscow, the paramount problem—that of preserving the peace—probably had not been moved very far along the road to a solution.

**George Polk**



Last May, George Polk, CBS correspondent, was taken out on Salonika bay in a boat where he was blindfolded, bound hand and foot and shot through the head. His murderers: Communists.

Their motive: Simply to produce a murder, the blame for which might be pinned on the rightist Greek government in order to defame it abroad. Gregory Staktopoulos, Communist Salonika newspaperman, confessed he had witnessed the slaying and implicated three other Greek Communists.

**DEFENSE:  
Big Budget**

World tension had slacked off slightly, but according to President Truman's estimate on next year's defense budget the U. S. doesn't intend to relax its vigilance on that account.

THE MILITARY budget for 1949 will be a feat 14.4 billion dollars—that is, if Mr. Truman's current request doesn't get trimmed. It represents an outlay about two billion dollars higher than the figure at which defense spending is running now.

(It doesn't make any difference whether President Truman won or lost the election. He still was required to prepare budget estimates for the congress convening next January.)

The President said that his defense officials had wanted a budget of around 23 billion dollars for the fiscal year starting July 1, but that he had cut them back to the 14.4 billion figure.

WITH RARE candor he admitted that it would take a Croesus to maintain spending as many billions as the officials wanted. His own aim, Mr. Truman said, was to get a military program the country could pay for.

He added that he hoped eventually to reduce military expenditures to above five to seven billion dollars—a remarkably optimistic statement, coming as it did before the election when he was conceded virtually no chance of being able to control any kind of governmental spending after the first of the year.

**ATOM PLANE:  
Seven Years?**

Look up into the sky in about seven years and you might see an atomic-powered airplane scudding across the clouds. Scientists now think there is a good chance that nuclear-propelled aircraft will be in production by that time.

AN OAK RIDGE scientist, David M. Poole, startled the atom-conscious public with the announcement that the theory of an atom-driven airplane has been worked out to completion and is ready to be translated by engineers into actual plans for such a plane.

The nuclear scientists have thought out a way to tap the power of a mobile atomic pile, Poole said. Now it's up to engineers to make the idea work.

Poole disclosed that the scientists have made up their minds how to make the best use of the power whose source is the heat generated in an atomic pile.

What kind of engine will be used to chain the tremendous power concentrated in the uranium fuel? The rocket-thrust motor was tried and abandoned, said Poole. Steam turbine, turbo-jet and ram jet all were crossed off.

THE POWER unit will be a "nuclear rocket." Just what a nuclear rocket might be is top-secret information. All anyone can even guess at at this point is that it probably involves a new principle of application of power.

**DEFENSE SURVEY**

**Experts Eye U. S. Mobilization Plans**

Top military planners are rushing work to complete a spot-check of United States mobilization requirements by November 15.

The check will disclose whether the United States over-all strategic defense plan makes sense and whether it can be applied readily.

Mobilization experts intend to find out if the requirements, listed by the army, navy and air force, can be reconciled with one another, and if this nation has the capacity to fill the military's estimated wartime needs.

All this doesn't mean that war is necessarily around the corner. Comprehensive analyses of the strategic blueprint are routine steps in U. S. mobilization planning. However, the spot-check is in line with the faster military tempo these days.

Bake Your Fruit Cakes Early  
(See Recipes Below)

**Early Christmas Plan**  
IT'S NOT TOO early to think of Christmas now, especially if you want to have fruit cake and plum puddings on hand. These foods are best when mellowed and ripened for several weeks before being eaten. Then, too, it's a good idea to get some of the work out of the way before the holidays are literally on top of us. There's a lot of work to preparing the ingredients for both fruit cake and pudding because they both require chopped fruit and long baking and steaming time.

**WHITE OR LIGHT fruit cakes** find many admirers each year. This fruit cake is not as heavy as the dark kind, and you may find it nice to vary with the latter variety.

**White Fruit Cake**  
1/2 cup butter  
1 1/4 cup sifted flour  
2 teaspoons soda  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
6 egg whites, beaten stiff  
1 1/4 cups powdered sugar  
1/2 cup candied cherries  
1/2 cup candied pineapple  
1/2 cup blanched pistachio nuts or almonds  
1/2 cup sultana raisins

Cream butter thoroughly, then add flour mixed with soda. Sift sugar into beaten whites, combine with the first mixture and add lemon juice, fruit and nuts, cut fine and sprinkled with flour. Stir thoroughly and bake in a loaf pan lined with buttered waxed paper. This baking will take about one hour in a slow (325 degree) oven.

Because the dark fruit cake is so rich, it's a good idea to steam it first to cook thoroughly, then to bake it, for drying out. The cake will be more moist when prepared in this way, and you will be able to slice it thinner.

**Dark Fruit Cake**  
1 pound brown sugar  
1 pound butter  
1 pound flour  
12 eggs, beaten separately  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon grated nutmeg  
1/4 pound each, candied orange peel, lemon peel, citron, all cut fine  
1/2 cup molasses  
1/2 cup fruit juice  
2 teaspoons cinnamon  
1 teaspoon ground cloves  
1/2 pound almonds, blanched  
1/2 pound pecans, unbroken  
2 pounds seeded raisins  
1 pound sultana raisins  
1 pound dates  
1 pound figs  
1 pound candied pineapple  
1 pound candied cherries

Cut pineapple into small pieces. Remove stem end from figs and cut. Stone and cut dates. Mix all these with one cup flour. Mix the remaining flour with soda and spices. Cream the butter until fluffy, add the sugar, then the well beaten yolks and stir well. Add the flour mixture alternately with molasses and fruit juice. Gently fold in the beaten whites, then the dates and raisins and other fruit, and nuts. Line four bread pans with waxed paper and butter. Pour batter into pans, two-thirds full. Set pans in oven, 300

degrees, in a pan filled with one inch of hot water. Bake one-half hour. Cover with waxed paper and bake for two hours. Then remove pans from water and bake one-half hour longer. Remove from pans; remove paper and wrap in fresh paper. Store in tightly covered tin.

IF YOU'RE LOOKING for a simpler fruit cake, particularly for a small family, here's one that is very tasty.

**Simple Fruit Cake**  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup brown sugar  
3 eggs, beaten  
1 cup sifted flour  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/4 teaspoon cloves  
1/4 teaspoon baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 cups seedless raisins  
1/2 cup candied citron  
1/2 cup candied orange peel  
1/2 cup candied pineapple  
1/2 cup candied cherries  
1/2 cup pecans, chopped

Cream shortening and sugar, beat in eggs. Add raisins and all fruits, diced fine, and the nuts. Fold in flour which has been sifted with spices, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Bake in greased waxed-paper lined pan in a slow (275 degree) oven for one and one-half to two hours.

If you bake rather than bake-steam the fruit cake, have a small dish of water in the oven so that the cake will also have more moisture and will be glossy in appearance.

Trimings put on the cakes should be placed on after they have baked for two hours. Almond halves, candied pineapple and cherries are most frequently used.

**Plum Pudding**  
1 cup flour  
1 pound seeded raisins  
1/4 pound citron, lemon and orange peel, cut fine  
1/4 pound seedless raisins  
1/2 pound chopped almonds  
1/2 pound bread crumbs  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves  
1/2 teaspoon ground allspice  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup suet, chopped fine  
1 cup molasses  
3 eggs, beaten  
1 cup pickled peach syrup

Sift flour over fruits and nuts and mix well. Mix remaining dry ingredients, add suet and work in evenly; blend in eggs, molasses and fruit juice. Pour into buttered molds two-thirds full and cover with waxed paper. Place in a steamer or top of double boiler and steam slowly and steadily from four to eight hours, according to the size of the mold. Store as for fruit cake.

One-half hour before ready to serve, start heating the pudding.
