The body was then taken in an ambulance to Avoca, Jones county, for burial at 3:30 that afternoon.

Survivors include four sons and five daughters, 22 grand-children and 22 great-grandchildren. The sons are W. C. Huffaker, a long-time resident of Lynn County who recently moved to Levelland, Hockley county; H. F. Huffaker of Palo Verde, Ellis county; and C. E. and M. R. Huffaker, both of Avoca.

The daughters are: Mrs. Alice Davis and Mrs. C. E. Campbell, both of Wilson; Mrs. R. S. Youngblood of Dallas; Mrs. T. B. Hicks of Robert Lee, and Mrs. Jim Johnson of Lubbock.

Mr. Cain and his family lived at Canyon for many years, and visited here a number of times. Not only does a son and a brother live here, but his widow is the daughter of the late W. C. Cowan, who was one of the pioneer settlers of the town and who died here some twelve or fifteen years ago.

S. W. Cain and his family moved from Canyon to California some five or six years ago.

## Bench Levelling Demonstration Is Held Near Here

One hundred and twenty five farmers attended a bench levelling demonstration on the City farm located a mile South of Tahoka, Saturday afternoon, November 13, 1948.

The program was sponsored by the Lynn County Soil Conservation Supervisors and the City Council of Tahoka. They were assisted by Pat Hines, Superintendent of Water and Sewerage; N. E. Wood and A. E. Ware, Soil Conservation Technicians and Bill Griffin, County Agent.

Mayor K. R. Durham welcomed the group to Tahoka, R. L. Littlepage, Supervisor introduced visitors and guests which included men from six South Plains counties. N. E. Wood and A. E. Ware discussed the layout of the City Farm and the engineering work completed on the farm up to date. Pat Hines, discussed the future plans to be put in effect on the City Farm.

The construction of borders and levelling the land between borders and flood irrigation was demonstrated to the group. Irrigation water was applied to listed land and land drilled to wheat.

Probably the most interesting demonstration was the use of concrete drops in the irrigation ditches and the use of an outlet box to distribute the puddle irrigation system.

### ALASKA MAN VISITS MOTHER HERE: BOOSTS ALASKA

Mrs. Ted Chaney was very pleasantly surprised last Sunday morning when her oldest son, Arnold Cloe, came in from Anchorage, Alaska, and he came in boosting the country and especially the town in which he lives, according to his mother.

Arnold went to Alaska in August, 1946, when the population was 2,500. He now says that at the last count there were 20,000 people living there and 20,000 others at the near-by Army Air Field.

Since going to Alaska, Arnold has built himself a tourist camp with 20 cabins, he says. He admits that sunshine is rather scarce there, however, in the winter time, and electric light bills run high. The sun doesn't get up now until after 9:30 in the morning and goes back to bed at about 1:30 p. m. The figures are reversed in the summer time, however.

Although moose sometimes come up on Main Street in Anchorage, Arnold came home to do some deer hunting with his brother Tom and his two uncles, Jim and John Pegram. Leaving Anchorage Friday afternoon, by air plane, he negotiated the 8,000 miles, or whatever the distance is, in 19 hours, he says.

Alaska is a very beautiful country, he declares, and very modern. Anchorage has three radio stations, three picture shows, and twelve churches.

Arnold's wife and daughters are looking after the business out there while he is visiting. But he plans to take his mother back with him for a visit there. Guess she will tell us more about Alaska when she returns. It must be a nice place to spend the winter.

## 5,900 Bales Cotton Ginned In Tahoka

Up to 8:30 o'clock Thursday morning, 5,903 bales of cotton had been ginned in Tahoka from this year's crop.

The harvesting of the crop is apparently much more than half done; possibly two-thirds of the crop or more has been harvested.

The weather as a rule has been fine for gathering the crop this fall, and if it continues to be favorable practically all of the crop should be out in three more weeks.

The price of cotton seed remains at \$75.00 per ton.

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**CLINIC FOR CEREBRAL PALSID CHILDREN ANNOUNCED**

Lubbock's Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center will hold a clinic for the examination of cerebral palsied children on Monday, November 22. This Center is sponsored by the Lubbock Crippled Children's Society and the Lubbock Rotary Club. The services of the Center are available to any children in the community in need of this care.

Cerebral palsy is also referred to as spastic paralysis and occasionally as birth injury, and research has shown that treatment is most effective when started within the first few months of life although children respond to treatment when begun at a much later age.

Physicians from Fort Worth and Amarillo, specializing in the treatment of cerebral palsy will be present at the Clinic November 22 to examine children and order treatment. Physical therapy care is available daily under the direction of Miss Esther Snell, Director. Miss Snell is a registered physical therapy technician.

The Treatment Center is located at 1317 Tenth Street, Lubbock. Miss Snell will meet with parents and their children during this week to obtain case histories and make appointments for clinic examination. Further information may be obtained by calling the Treatment Center or Collier Lubbock 6541.

**AID TO EUROPE PLAN OPENS THANKSGIVING**

On Thanksgiving Day the Silent Guest Plan for relief to distressed Europe will be inaugurated over the nation for a second consecutive year, Governor Benford H. Jester has announced.

The Governor has proclaimed the month November 25 to December 25 as Silent Guest Plan month in Texas.

Last year's drive netted more than \$1,400 for Texas's share of the aid to Europe's poverty-stricken people—war orphans, widows and old folks. The Governor expressed confidence that donations in 1948 will exceed those collected last year.

As projected through the nation, this plan calls for each American family to invite a "Silent Guest" to eat at his table for one month, sharing in a Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner.

Mindful of the fact that it would cost a family approximately \$30.00 to feed a guest for one month, the Governor has suggested that those families with limited incomes may "share" a Thanksgiving meal, or that and a Christmas dinner.

After calculating the cost for feeding this extra person, the family may mail a check or money order, covering that sum, to the Governor's Office in Austin. The collection will be forwarded then to Committee headquarters for purchase of food packages from the non-profit, government-approved organization; CARE, for delivery to needy families in Europe, Governor Jester said.

CARE, the Cooperative for American Remittances to Europe, Inc., was chosen by the American Silent Guest Committee last year to handle the funds because it represents all of the major religious and nationality groups, and is the only organization of its kind so comprehensive in scope.

### More About Fishing In Old Mexico

To the Editor of The Lynn County News:  
I shall begin the second step of our trip at Christoval, where we had lunch the first day. A Chevrolet pickup was in the lead and a Chevrolet coupe was following it, while Bill Bruckner and I were bringing up the rear in my Ford. Bill is a fast but good safe driver. All morning I noticed that he was not satisfied with the speed we were making. The coupe was taking it easy and Bill remarked several times that something must be done with the driver. While we were eating some one put a can of beer, so it was reported, in the radiator and the last we saw of that car was the tall end of the boat it was trailing,

bouncing high in the air. I told the driver, when we finally caught up, that I did not know what effect beer would have on a man but it certainly would make a Chevrolet seat.

From Del Rio to Eagle Pass is a part of the highly praised valley where all kinds of vegetables are grown, but my opinion is that we will give them something to talk about after we have had a few years experience growing them out here, in West Texas.

I do not intend to cast any reflection on any of our good Mexican friends here, by anything that is said about Old Mexico. October 31st I ate dinner in the basement of the First Mexican Baptist Church of Big Spring and I enjoyed it very much; their food was clean and well prepared as well as delicious. Last Sunday night I ate with the pastor of the Mexican Baptist Church at Snyder and we could not ask for anything nicer.

There are a few good places along the highway to Mexico City, where it is safe to eat. In the larger places there is generally one or two places that cater to tourists and good food is always served there.

Have you ever seen a meat market in Old Mexico? I have seen only one and it is the only one I can describe. However, I have good reason to believe there are many more like that one. The refrigerator was absent from the cooling room and the meat was hanging on hooks attached to the wall. The flies, bugs and even the birds have access to the meat. The roof was the sky. There were no screen doors.

Near Sabinas, we saw where they were washing coal at the mines. All colors of smoke were arising, which gave the appearance of a volcano erupting in all of its fury. It is a remarkable reminder of that place where unbelievers are going to spend eternity.

We are going to close this lap of our trip with one of the outstanding experiences of the entire time that we were gone.

At Sabinas, we left the highway and departed for the jungles. If you doubt that just take the trip. The two Chevrolets stopped at the ice plant here for ice, while Bill and I waited for them on the highway. While we were waiting several children gathered around but they could not talk English, so I had to talk to them in Spanish. They quickly became our friends but our visit with them was soon over, for we had to go. When we got in the car one little girl about five years of age said, "neek-lay" (nickle). We began to pass out all the change we had, which was about \$1.50, and did those kids smile! They were a happy lot. These children range in age from four to six or seven. They were only poor beggers in the street but our hearts were greatly touched and we regretted that we did not have more change for them. I shall never forget the picture. They were pale, thin and

undernourished, unkempt and dirty. Their clothes were dirty and ragged, surely they must have been hungry also. As I passed out the nickles and dimes, I gave one boy his money first, then I had to hold him with one hand while I gave the others their gifts. He was desperate and had a wild look in his eye that you could not forget. These pennies and nickles must have meant a lot to these children, and if we ever go that way again we are going to give them more next time. If you had seen these children you would have been glad to have given them the last bite you had to eat and have gone hungry yourself.

The best part of the trip is still ahead.

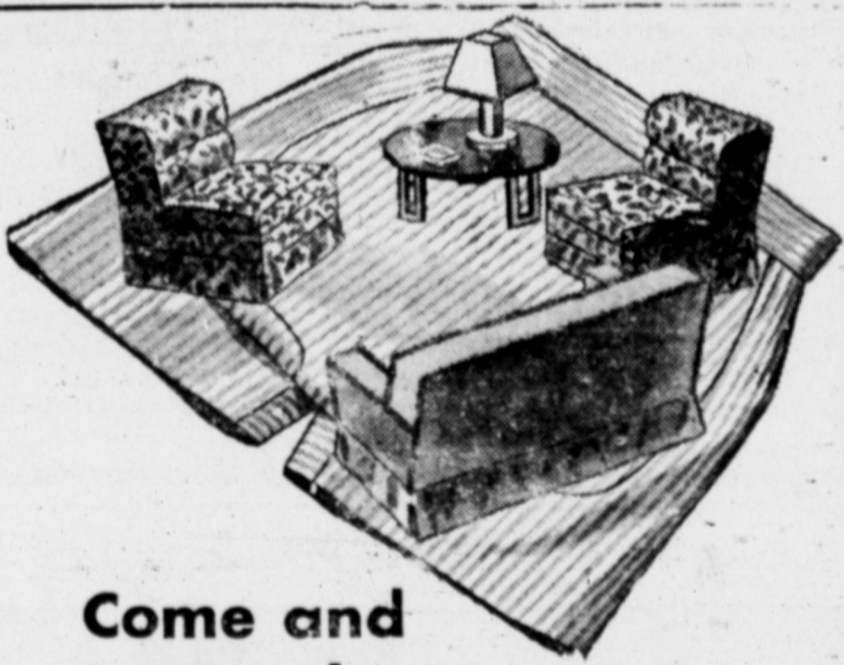

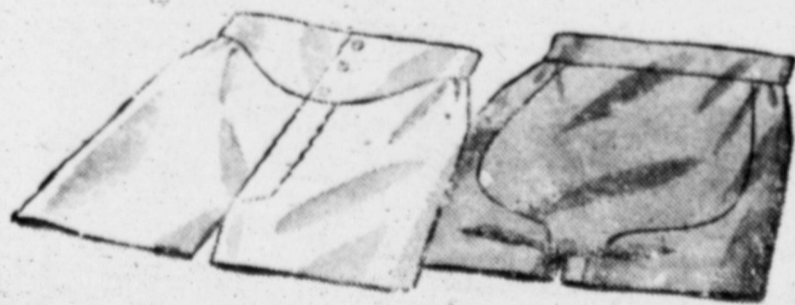

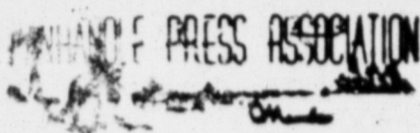

**LET THE LEGISLATURE ACT**

Since Lyndon Johnson was elected to the United States Senate in the recent general election by a vote of almost two to one over his Republican opponent, and since the incoming Senate will have a Democratic majority and there is not the slightest probability that the Republicans could bar Johnson from a seat in that body even if they should undertake to do so, we can see little point in asking the Senate to conduct an investigation of alleged irregularities of the primary election in which Johnson was declared to have won the Democratic nomination. We believe that Coke Stevenson and his supporters should drop their expressed intention of insisting that such an investigation be made.

We do believe, however, that the

Texas legislature at its approach should amend our election laws as to require the Attorney General of Texas to make such investigation when complaint of irregularities is made by an interested party or citizen of Texas. Either the district court sitting in the county involved or in the city of Austin, should have jurisdiction over the subject matter, whether the proceeding be civil or criminal. The law should require that such cases be given precedence on the docket over other cases and should prevent the beneficiary of the alleged fraud from being sworn in until the matter is settled. The punishment for election frauds of any and all kinds should be severe. If serious objection to this suggested remedy should become apparent, then some other efficient method of dealing with election frauds should be adopted. We, the people of Texas, must put a stop to the shameful violation of our election laws by political bosses who practice their arts mainly along the border where white men are scarce and Mexican laborers are numerous.

This is not sour grapes either. We voted for Lyndon Johnson in the Democratic election, but when gross irregularities came to light in that contest which probably changed the result of the election and Lyndon Johnson turned heaven and earth to prevent an investigation, we quit him.

It is no answer to say that Coke Stevenson had been the beneficiary of such frauds in previous elections. There had been similar frauds practiced in some of those counties for many years but never had the entire vote of one or all of those counties been sufficient in number to change the result in any election in which Coke Stevenson had been a candidate or to change the result

in any other state election. Only local candidates had benefited by the frauds. And we happen to say that these should have been stopped long ago.

The in-coming legislature should do something about it.

As a sort of compromise between Democrats of the seven Southern states which require the payment of a poll tax as a qualification for voting and the Democrats of the North who are threatening to pass a whole bunch of "Civil Rights" measures over the protests of the Southern people, The Dallas News suggests that these states heed the demands of the North and repeal the Poll tax qualifications and enact instead thereof laws requiring all voters to register and obtain a certificate of registration, for which certificate they should be required to pay a small fee, as is done in many states of the North. Its suggestion is that this fee could be put into the school fund and thus make up in whole or in part for the loss suffered by that fund from the repeal of the poll tax amendment. While that would amount to about the same thing in the long run as does the poll tax qualification for voting, it would not be burdened down with the load of prejudice that has been heaped upon the back of the harmless little poll tax, and besides Northerners could not consistently oppose it without opposing their own practice in the matter, especially if the charge were cut down to about half of that for a poll tax. We had a poll tax long before we made it a qualification for voting and it could still be retained as a help to the public school fund if the people so desired. Another suggestion made by the Dallas Morning News is that the fund derived from the registration fees could be applied to pay the expenses of holding primary elections. This would enable poor men to run for offices for which they can not afford to run now unless somebody finances their campaigns. That suggestion is worth thinking about. Any way the registration idea in lieu of the poll tax seems to us to be a wise one. If we must get rid of the poll tax then let us voluntarily do so but require registration of voters and payment of a small fee for the certificate.

While Russia is pointing his finger at the United States and charging this country is planning aggressions against her and her satellites, with ambitions to rule the world, he is himself right now using Chinese and Manchurian troops to invade and subdue China, a weak and non-progressive nation that never has attacked Russia nor ever threatened to do so. The Russian leaders know that their charges are utterly false and are making them purely for home consumption behind the iron curtain. That the Russian leaders themselves are nursing the ambition to rule the world is clearly proven by their invasion of poor old China.

People are funny, especially the English people. They have gradually become more democratic until finally they have drifted clear over into a mild form of socialism. A few years ago they turned down Winston Churchill, the most brilliant and possibly the wisest Prime Minister England has had since the days of William E. Gladstone, and elevated to the Premiership a leader of the Labor Party, a fellow named Attlee, reputedly a man of doubtful ability. It was a more complete turnover than would have been the defeat of F. D. R. in this country by old Sourpuss John Lewis or Mediocre William R. Green. Yet the English still insist on making a great ado over Royalty on every possible occasion. A little son was born Saturday night to Princess Elizabeth, daughter of the British King and Queen, whose husband, Prince Philip, is some sort of Duke. That was the signal for the Royal House to open up several bottles of champagne and for the people to stage a great celebration and shout "God save the king" or "Long live the king," or whatever it is that they yell on such occasions. And the common people went to the "Pubs" and swigged beer. Maybe some of them gulped down rum until they were too drunk to gulp. Of course, a lot of folks acted decent about it and possibly didn't drink anything stronger than water or buttermilk. Well, we hope the little chap grows up into a good man and a good king in spite of his handicaps, if they still have kins when he gets grown. A good king, you know, is one who has no power and knows it.

**FOXHOLE PAL WRITES OF PFC. DELMAR WEST'S DEATH**

Last week when the body of Pfc. Delmar West was re-buried here, his mother, Mrs. W. M. West, brought in a letter written by his sergeant in July, 1947, giving the circumstances of her son's death, which occurred on January 30, 1945, and it relates such a graphic story of at least one of the experiences that they underwent that we are publishing a portion of it this week. Delmar's sergeant and pal who wrote the letter was Marvin Unerstall of Washington, Missouri.

Addressing Mrs. West, he says: "I was with your son when he was

killed. I was his sergeant. We started in the morning and went on a barren hill with the town lying in front and to our right. Then hell broke loose about 6:00 or 6:30. We were pinned down by machine guns and then they started shooting artillery. We dug in in the snow, which was around three feet deep, and as we lay there waiting for them to stop, a shell came in and hit between Delmar and me. Your son received the greater impact of the shell and he was killed instantly as was Harry Roesser of New Jersey. Four of us were wounded. Two of them were able to walk to the aid station, but another boy and I were unable to do so and we lay there around four hours in sub-zero temperature and we both very near died of exposure. Delmar never knew what hit him, and I'm sure glad that he did not have to suffer first as many a soldier did only to die later. He was one of my best friends, and I can truthfully say he was the best man in my squad. He died a hero and he was brave. He was always on hand to help when help was needed. I first met him when he joined our division in Camp Pickett, Va. After that we were together a lot. We shared the same foxhole all the time we were on the front lines. We were in combat from December 9, 1944, until January 30, 1945."

The remainder of the letter told something of his own work and home life and his hope, and intention to visit Mrs. West here. It was a fine expression of respect and sympathy for his dead pal's mother.

**GUARD THE CHILDREN AGAINST RHEUMATIC HEART DISEASE**

Austin, Texas, November 18.—Rheumatic heart disease, acribler and killer of children, is one of the leading causes of death and disability among children and young adults in the age group 10 to 25 years.

No vaccine such as those that prevent typhoid, diphtheria, smallpox and whooping cough has as yet been developed for its prevention and control, but we do know some of the danger signals and with a physician's early diagnosis, some of the damaging results of this disease may be prevented.

Quoting Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, "in general, the early symptoms of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows, or wrists. The pain is felt usually in one of these joints and spreads to the others. Often a child gets irritable and cross without any apparent cause; he may cry easily and develop habits indicating nervousness. These symptoms may mean the beginning of an attack of rheumatic fever, and a physician should be consulted immediately."

Predisposing causes to this disease, which include frequent chilling, damp or overcrowded living quarters, poor diet, colds, an attack of scarlet fever or other infections caused by certain streptococcus germs, should be carefully avoided.

Protection against these predisposing causes may mean protection against rheumatic heart disease, and these safeguards should be observed: Have children examined by a physician at least once a year; see that they have a well balanced and nourishing diet; make certain that they get sufficient rest, and see to it that they are dressed according to the temperature of the room or the playground. Consult a physician at once if symptoms indicate that this disease may be present, and if the doctor prescribes complete bed rest, his advice should be followed exactly as given.

## WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS President Truman Astounds Nation By Winning Election Over Dewey; Senate, House Go Democratic, Too

**ELECTION: Ghost Walked**  
The night of November 2-3 was supposed to have been a wake for the defunct Democratic party but the corpse wouldn't lie still. It not only sat up but went around slapping the premature mourners on the back.

IN THE FACE of the supposedly cut-and-dried nature of the campaign between President Truman and Governor Dewey the results of the election were fantastic. Everybody had been wrong—from the second-guessers on every street corner to the "infallible" pollsters of public opinion.

It was Truman all the way—from the first early returns which indicated the trend until the great, pivotal states of Ohio, Illinois and California swung over into the Democrats' camp, crushed Dewey and forced him to concede.

MR. TRUMAN'S two million-plus plurality which gave him 304 electoral votes (to Dewey's 189) was nothing less than a popular directive to serve.

Thus, for the first time since he entered the White House, President Truman was able to feel that he had full, untrammelled control of the administration.

MORE THAN that, the President was enormously elated about the fact that the Democrats had gained control of both houses of congress. How justifiable that elation will turn out to be, however, is a question for time to answer.

"We have a congress now, and I'm sure we'll make some progress in the next four years," he said. "Yes, full cooperation between a U. S. president and his congress, even when they are aligned politically, is, if not quite a rarity, at least unusual."

**Personalities**  
Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York must have been the most tormented man in the nation for a few days after November 2.

AT 46, an age when most men in politics are only beginning their climb to the top, he had sat for a few weeks on an imaginary pinnacle—created by himself, with yeoman help from the pollsters—only to feel it dissolve under him when the votes were counted.

Dewey was through, a man to be pitied. Never again would he find the ambition or the chance to be president of the United States.

BUT FOR President Truman these were days of such happiness and triumph as few men savor in a lifetime. He had pummeled his way through the allotted number of rounds in the campaign almost single-handedly.

He had fought Dewey and the Republicans. He had fought the apathy of his own party. He had fought for and won over to his side a majority of the United States voters.

Harry S. Truman was the man of the year.

**WHAT NOW?**  
**Program**  
Now that it is going to be President Truman again for the next four years, what can the nation expect of him to do along legislative lines?

His program will probably be elucidated in two phases, his annual message to be delivered to the January 3 opening of congress and his inaugural address on January 20.

In the meantime, if his campaign speeches are taken as being reasonably reliable, Mr. Truman has committed himself to a program involving these principal issues:

**PRICES:** "I'm still in favor of action to hold down the cost of living." He wants price control laws, the President indicated.

**LABOR:** "The Taft-Hartley law is the opening gun in the Republican onslaught against the rights of the working man. It should be repealed." He also is expected to speak for the raising of the minimum wage from 40 to 75 cents an hour.

**COMMUNISTS:** "We are on guard against them."  
**CIVIL RIGHTS:** "We cannot be satisfied until all our people have equal opportunity for jobs, homes, education, health and for political expression."

**AGRICULTURE:** "Full markets for farm products... a floor under farm income... increased farm income through cooperatives, market development and research."  
**SOCIAL SECURITY:** "A comprehensive insurance system to protect

### Won't Seek Presidency Again: Dewey

Two hours after he had conceded the election to President Truman, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey had made his decision: He would not consider running for the presidency a third time.

At a post-election press conference the first question fired at Dewey was, "What happened?" "I was as surprised as you were and I'm rather that that is shared

all our people." Probably he will recommend expansion of the law to cover self-employed domestics, farm workers and others not now included.

**ATOMIC ENERGY:** "Civilian control under government management should be retained."

**HOUSING:** "The Taft-Ellender-Wagner bill passed the senate and should have passed the house."

**TAXES:** "The tax reduction (passed over his veto) is inequitable as well as untimely. Some readjustment is required to afford relief to families who are suffering. But total receipts should not be reduced."

**CONGRESS: Demo Gains**  
Although they had needed a net gain of only four senate and 31 house seats for control of the 81st congress, the Democratic party did much better than that.

By the time Dewey conceded the election, the Democratic party was assured of at least 18 senators against five for the Republicans and 188 representatives against 86 for the Republicans.

Forty-nine votes are necessary for senate control. The Democrats now have 54. Democrats have clinched at least 263 house seats. Only 216 are necessary for control.

Republican senators seeking re-election were defeated by Democrats in West Virginia, Kentucky, Oklahoma, Wyoming, Minnesota, Iowa, and Illinois. In other contests where Democrats were seeking re-election, they won.

Colorado's Democratic Senator Johnson was a winner in his reelection campaign. In Oklahoma, where a Republican seat was at issue, former Gov. Robert Kerr, Democrat, won.

Republican Senator Revercomb was defeated in West Virginia by Democratic Governor Neely. Hubert Humphrey, Democrat, mayor of Minneapolis, won his bid for Republican Sen. Joseph I. Ball's job. In Illinois, Democratic Senate Candidate Paul Douglas defeated Republican Sen. C. Wayne Brooks by more than 100,000 votes.

### GUARD: Expansion

Soon after the 81st congress convenes on January 3 it will be requested to boost the authorized strength of the national guard by 100,000 men and put all its units on a ready-for-war basis.

And the way things look now, it appears that congress will agree to that request.

Guard officials said they would ask that the authorized strength be increased from the present 341,000 to 441,000. This, of course, would require special appropriations for armories and equipment.

These officials in Washington said they also will ask that all 27 divisions of the national guard be included in the army's stepped-up defense program.

The army so far has selected only six of the 27 divisions for its "mobilization day" force, the outfit that would be ready to strike back first if this nation were to be attacked.

Army spokesmen, however, claim their present funds and equipment cannot support more than six guard units on a war-ready basis.

**Thanksgiving Topics**  
THANKSGIVING IS ONE OF THE important feast days of the year, and in a sense it's the beginning of the holiday season. Let's make it hearty, gay, full of thanks and cheer.

Since everyone expects a big feast on the table for the special occasion, plan it carefully and start working on it in advance so everything can be picture perfect. Plan an all white or ivory cloth and napkins as a simple background for the table. Have your glasses sparkling, silver shining, and the china washed to spic and span neatness.

IF YOU WANT to have a first course, plan an easy soup like cream of mushroom or asparagus or celery, a clear soup made beforehand. Here's a baked oyster dish that makes a nice appetizer:

**\*Baked Oysters**  
Use four to six oysters for each serving. Open the shells, cover oyster with Thousand Island dressing and sprinkle with a sharp grated American cheese. Bake until heated through and the cheese is melted and browned. Serve in the shells with crisp crackers.

For the turkey, allow from three-quarters to one cup of bread crumbs for each pound of bird. Here's an interesting stuffing which you'll like for variety:

**\*Apple Sausage Stuffing**  
(For 12 pound turkey)  
1 pound pork sausage links  
12 cups bread cubes  
2 tablespoons minced onion  
Salt to taste  
1 teaspoon pepper  
2 tablespoons minced parsley  
6 tart apples, diced  
2 tablespoons sugar

Cut sausage in thin slices. Sauté and add other ingredients. Toss lightly and stuff bird.

**\*To Roast Turkey**  
Allow 30 minutes to each pound for roasting time, using a moderate (350-degree) oven. Baste frequently. If turkey becomes too dark, cover with water-moistened cheesecloth.

**\*Cranberry Salad**  
(Serves 8)  
1 pound cranberries  
2 navel oranges  
2 cups sugar  
1 package lime-flavored gelatin  
½ cup boiling water  
1 cup diced celery  
1 cup chopped nutmeats

Put cranberries and oranges through food chopper. Add sugar and let stand for two hours, stirring frequently. Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. When cool, add the fruit mixture, celery and nuts. Pour into a mold and chill until firm.

**\*Baked Stuffed Sweet Potatoes**  
(Serves 6)  
6 medium-sized sweet potatoes  
½ cup chopped walnuts  
2 tablespoons butter  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 dozen marshmallows  
1 cup shredded pineapple  
Juice of 1 orange

Bake the potatoes until tender, then scoop them out of the shells. Mash the pulp well, adding the butter, salt and orange juice. Stir.

in nuts and pineapple, making sure of getting an equal distribution. Refill shells with this mixture. Cut the marshmallows into small pieces and spread over the tops. Bake in a hot (375-degree) oven until brown.

**\*Broccoli au Gratin**  
(Serves 6)  
Use one pound of broccoli. Select stalks with dark green, tightly closed buds. Cook in boiling, salted water until easily pierced with fork. Drain. Make one cup thin white sauce, using one tablespoon butter, one tablespoon flour and one cup milk. Place broccoli in buttered casserole, pour over the white sauce, top with buttered bread crumbs and grated American cheese. Bake until cheese melts.

**\*Baked Squash with Green Peas**  
Select small squash, split and bake until tender. Fill with cooked green peas, seasoned and buttered, and sprinkle with crumbled bacon.

**\*Pumpkin Pie**  
(Makes 2 9-inch pies)  
3 cups steamed and strained pumpkin or 1 large can of pumpkin  
1 cup light brown sugar  
1 cup white sugar  
2 tablespoons molasses  
¼ teaspoon powdered cloves  
3 teaspoons cinnamon  
3 teaspoons ginger  
1 teaspoon salt  
4 eggs, slightly beaten  
2 cups scalded milk

Mix ingredients in order given and bake in crust-lined pie plates. Set pie on bottom shelf of oven (450-degree) for 10 minutes, then move pie to middle shelf and reduce heat to moderate (350°F.) and bake for 40 minutes or until a silver knife comes out clean.

\*As a variation for pumpkin pie, add one teaspoon of grated orange rind to the filling before baking, if desired.

**\*Finger Rolls**  
(Refrigerator)  
½ cup sugar  
1 tablespoon salt  
2 tablespoons lard  
1 tablespoon butter  
2 cups boiling water  
2 yeast cakes  
¼ cup lukewarm water  
1 teaspoon sugar  
2 eggs, beaten light  
1½ pounds flour

Dissolve first four ingredients into boiling water. Let cool. Dissolve the yeast and sugar into the lukewarm water. Combine first two mixtures, add the eggs. Add one-half of the flour and beat thoroughly, for 10 minutes. Add remaining flour and beat until mixture blisters. Brush top with melted butter, cover and place in refrigerator until mixture doubles. (Four to six hours). Shape into rolls. Let rise for two to three hours before baking in a hot (400-degree) oven for 10 to 15 minutes, or until golden brown.

Guests from out of town were in addition on the southern from Hillsboro, Abbott, Houston, outskirts of Lubbock.

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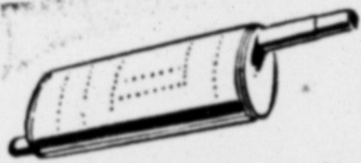
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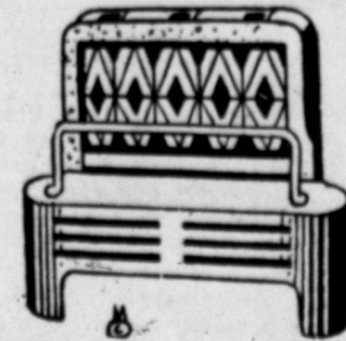
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
