D. D. Renfroe Victim of Shooting At New Home

The dead body of D. D. Renfroe, 34, was found slumped over in his car which had left the road and had stopped some fifty yards out in a field a mile west and almost a mile north from New Home on Wednesday afternoon of last week. A bullet had entered the right side of the head near the ear and had come out on the left side a little higher up. A pistol was lying on the seat beside him. The car had left the road on which it was coming south and had run out into a field some forty of fifty yards before stopping. The ground was soft and the car had stilled and stopped with the switch still on. It was the opinion of P. D. Server, justice of the peace here, who conducted an inquest, that the pistol had been fired accidentally.

Mr. Renfroe was on his way from the home of his father, P. H. Renfroe, to his own home when the tragedy occurred. He had gone to his father's house that morning, left his car there, and took a tractor down to New Home to have some minor repairs made. This done, he took the tractor back to his father's home and left it and had gotten in his car and started toward his own home.

His father and mother had also gone from home that morning and upon returning soon after noon had noticed a car standing in the field, remarking that it looked like D. D.'s car. Some time later, the father went down to take a look and found the dead body of his son. Sheriff Sam Floyd was notified, and he and others went out to investigate.

A Stanley ambulance was called and the body was brought to the Stanley Funeral Home here to be prepared for burial. Funeral services were held in the New Home Baptist Church on Sunday afternoon at 2:30, with Rev. Renfroe, a relative living in Oklahoma, officiating. Burial with Masonic honors followed in the Lubbock Memorial cemetery.

Survivors include the wife, Mrs. Irene Renfroe, a daughter, Bonnie Janice and a son, Delwin; his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. P. H. Renfroe; three brothers, P. H. Jr., of Denver City, Loyce of Amarillo, and Morris of Corpus Christi; and three sisters, Mrs. Edna Summers of California, Mrs. Jack Hale of Corpus Christi, and Mrs. Dorothy Wheeler of Wichita Falls.

1949 Sub-Soiling Practice Explained

One of the new practices adopted by the Lynn County A. C. A. committee for 1949 will be the practice of sub-soiling to permit better water penetration, according to Mr. Clarence Church, chairman of the committee. This practice is not to be confused with the chiseling practice being carried on to quite a large extent at the present time.

Specifications for this sub-soiling practice include a minimum depth of twelve inches and at a spacing of forty eight inches or less. This practice must be carried out when the ground is dry and the sub-soiler must run in the hardpan layer so that maximum fracture will result. The land must be worked with a chisel, sub-soiler, or similar implement, which will effectively shatter the hardpan or plow sole. Farmers who intend to participate in this practice must secure written prior approval from the county committee before the sub-soiling is begun, Mr. Church states.

G. W. "Dick" Turner will succeed Thad Smith as county commissioner from Precinct No. 4, the New Home precinct.

Sam Floyd, the retiring sheriff, has accepted a position as deputy sheriff of Dawson county, and he and Mrs. Floyd are moving down to Lamesa immediately. Tom Hale, his chief deputy, will move out to his farm west of town. The News is not informed as to Dee Sanders' plans. Sam's second deputy.

The publishers of The News received a few days ago from the office of the State Highway Engineer a copy of an order recently passed by the State Highway Commission relating to the Farm-to-Market Road to be constructed from Tahoka through Wilson to the Lubbock county line south of Slaton. Below is the order:

"In Lynn county, a Farm-to-Market road from highway U. S. 87, 2.0 miles north of Tahoka northeast to the Lubbock county line, a distance of approximately 15.7 miles, is hereby designated subject to the concurrence of the Public Roads Administration and subject to the condition that Lynn county will furnish all required right-of-way free of cost to the State.

"Upon fulfillment of the conditions of this order, the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with the preparation of plans for construction, at an estimated cost of \$106,000.00, and to assume the road for maintenance upon completion of construction."

Another order was also received pertaining to 1.1 miles of road south of Draw, as follows.

"In Lynn county it is ordered that a Farm-to-Market road be and is hereby designated extending from a proposed Farm-to-Market road south of Draw south to the Borden county line, a distance of approximately 1.1 miles, on condition that title to all required right-of-way be furnished free of cost to the State.

"Since the road has been constructed to standards acceptable to the State, the State Highway Engineer is directed to assume maintenance of the road when the condition of designation is fulfilled."

Enclosed with copies of these orders was the following communication with reference to the road program and particularly with reference to the Tahoka-Slaton road, which we pass on to our readers.

"You will find enclosed a copy of a minute by the Texas Highway Commission affecting your county. The information contained in this minute indicates that this road is to be included in the new Land Service or Farm-to-Market road program for the next two years.

"As you know, the new Federal Aid program, under which this road will become a part of the Secondary

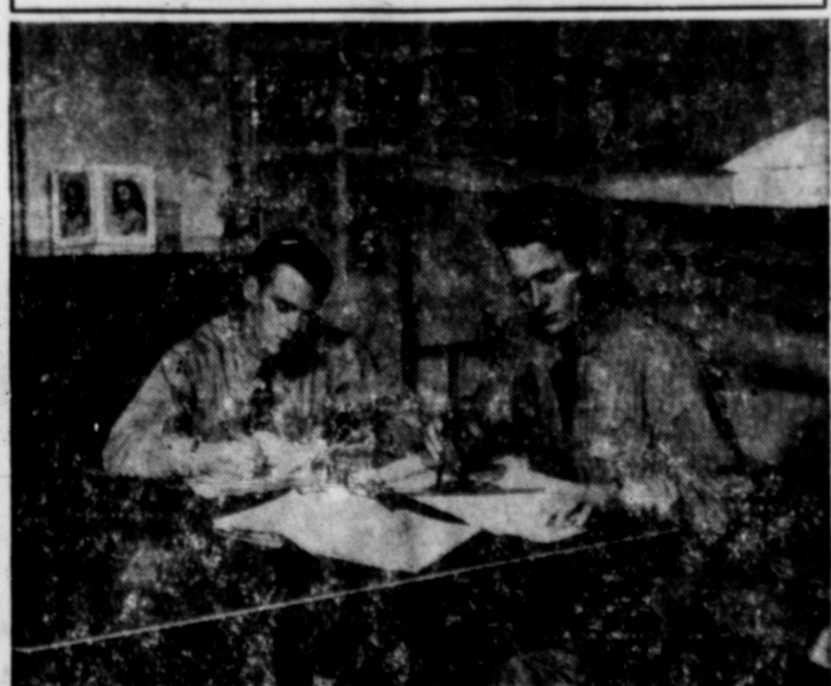
Following the services here the body was taken in a Stanley ambulance to Petersburg, where it was to be buried at 2:00 o'clock this afternoon in the cemetery there.

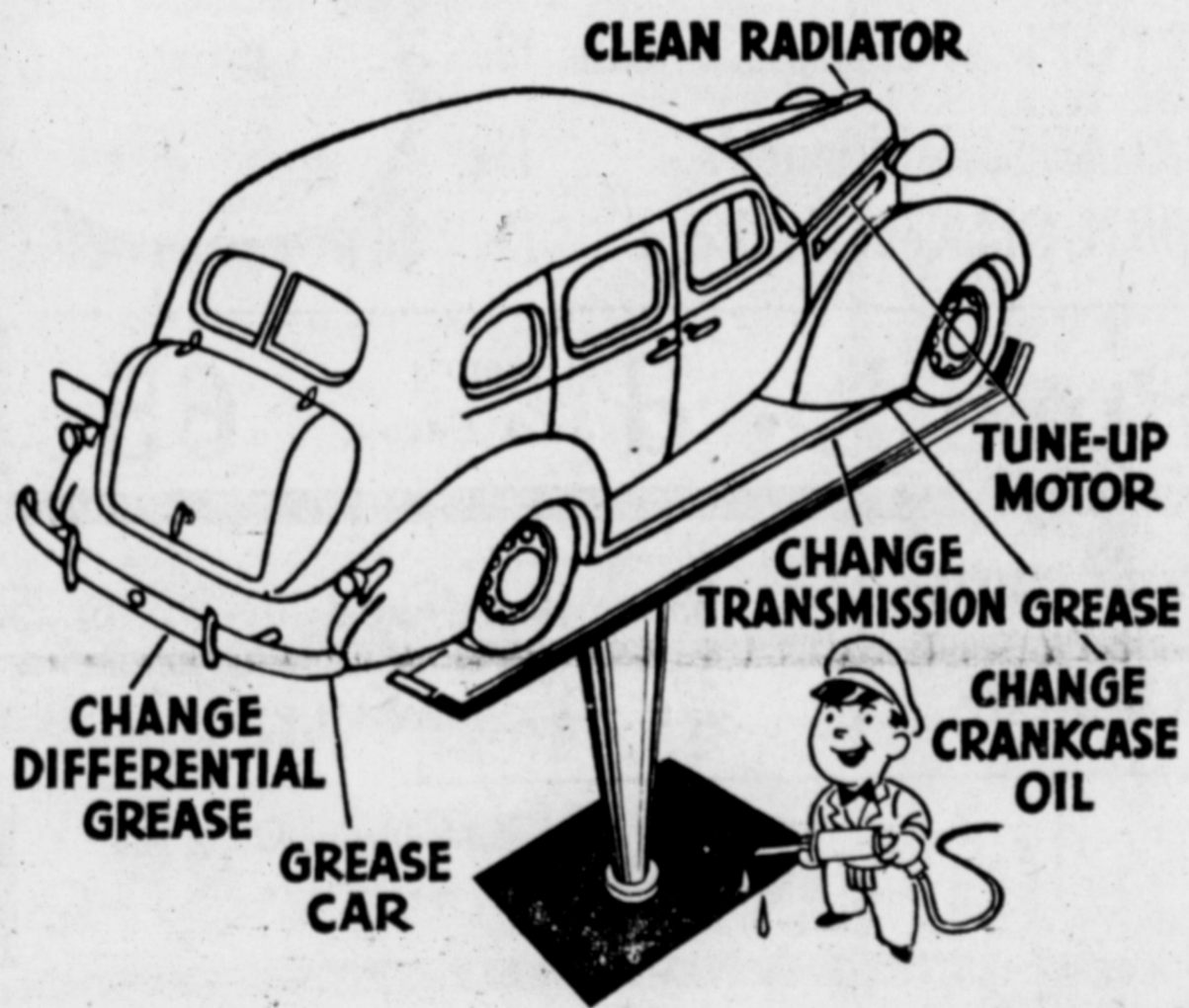

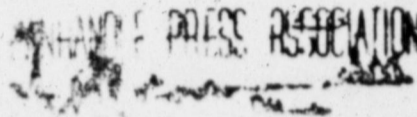

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President Truman keeps on repeating the charge that the probe being made by Congressional Un-American Activities committee is merely a "red herring," by which he means, we suppose, that the investigation is not being made in good faith but only as a political maneuver. There might be a difference of opinion as to who is playing politics in this matter, for we have noticed that some Presidents as well as Congressmen are pretty good at the game of politics. But, politics or no politics, we believe that the revelation of Communist activities in this country has done much good just the same. Everybody has become convinced that Communists have been spying on the internal affairs of our government and have worked their way into strategic positions in some of the departments for the purpose of obtaining information valuable to the Russians and Communists everywhere. Mr. Truman takes the position that investigation of treasonable or other criminal conduct is a matter for the Attorney General and the Courts to handle. That is true in so far as criminal prosecutions are concerned, but Congress and the people are also entitled to be informed if such treacherous activities are being systematically conducted in this coun-

try in order that proper laws may be enacted to forestall all the plottings of the Communist crooks. This government is the people's government, and if it is being threatened by foes within or without the people have a right to know it. The Un-American Activities committee has been bringing the machinations of these foes to light; the Attorney General has not been doing so in any marked degree, so far as we have been able to find out. If Communists are kicked out and kept out of Government positions, Congress will have to do it.

President Truman spoke his mind about the "leaders" in Russia at a banquet a few nights ago. He said that they have a system of morals that are not moral. "Contracts are not sacred with the Soviet government," he charged. "I made certain specific agreements at Potsdam, some of which have been kept. Certain agreements were made at Yalta, none of which have been kept." He praised the Russian people, however, declaring that they are a great people. "I am sure that if the Russian people had a voice in the government of Russia, there would be no trouble." He declared that some of the leaders in the government are anxious to have an understanding with the United States and to end the so-called cold war. His remarks have caused many to surmise that dissension is arising among the Russians themselves. We feel confident that sooner or later there will be rebellion against the present leadership in Russia on the part of the people. No dictatorship can last always. Even the most stolid people eventually become restless and rebellious under any form of arbitrary rule. It will be a great day when the Russian people arise in their might and throw out the dictators and establish a government of the people, by the people, and for the people. We think that President Truman's blast was very timely.

Considering the fact that so many inexperienced people marry, it's no wonder there are so many divorces. The law requires that you have a reason before you can get a divorce. Why not require one to get married?

Tomorrow is next year. Next year will not be very old until the legislature meets. Some big issues will doubtless arise out of the proceedings of that body. The politicians in that body will be doing their stuff. Also, politicians not in that body will be doing their stuff. Some of the politicians in that body will have an eye to the future in everything that they do or say. Some will be looking for chances to feather their nests financially. Most of the members, however, will be attempting to serve the people of this state honestly and conscientiously, we hope and believe. All firmly for the right in the face of opposition and criticism. The people should watch closely the records being made by their representatives so as to know how to vote at the next election. We hope that all our West Texas representatives will make creditable records.

Just to make the South feel good at this Christmas season, we presume, President Truman repeated his promise a few days ago that just as soon as Congress meets he will ask that it enact into law his "Civil Rights" program and make a grab for the tidelands. He has given the country this assurance many times before but we guess he was afraid somebody would forget it. Texans should be especially thankful, since most of the tidelands that anybody cares much about are those along the Texas and Louisiana coast and since the people who most need "civil rights" reside largely in Texas and Louisiana. Besides, Texans voted for the President by a majority of two to one over all opponents in the recent election and he is showing his appreciation.

Price Daniel finishes out his first term as Attorney-General of Texas today. He begins his second term tomorrow. We believe that he is an able and honest man and that he has so far made a good, clean record. His friends will doubtless be encouraging him soon to run for governor in 1950. If he runs, he will probably be a strong contender. We shall watch with interest the work of Price Daniel during the coming year.

Tom Clark is a Texan who is very unpopular in Texas just now. As attorney-general of the United States he is preparing to file suit to take Texas' tideland oil away from her. We guess Tom Clark will never be governor nor U. S. Senator from Texas.

THOUSANDS VISIT PANHANDLE MUSEUM

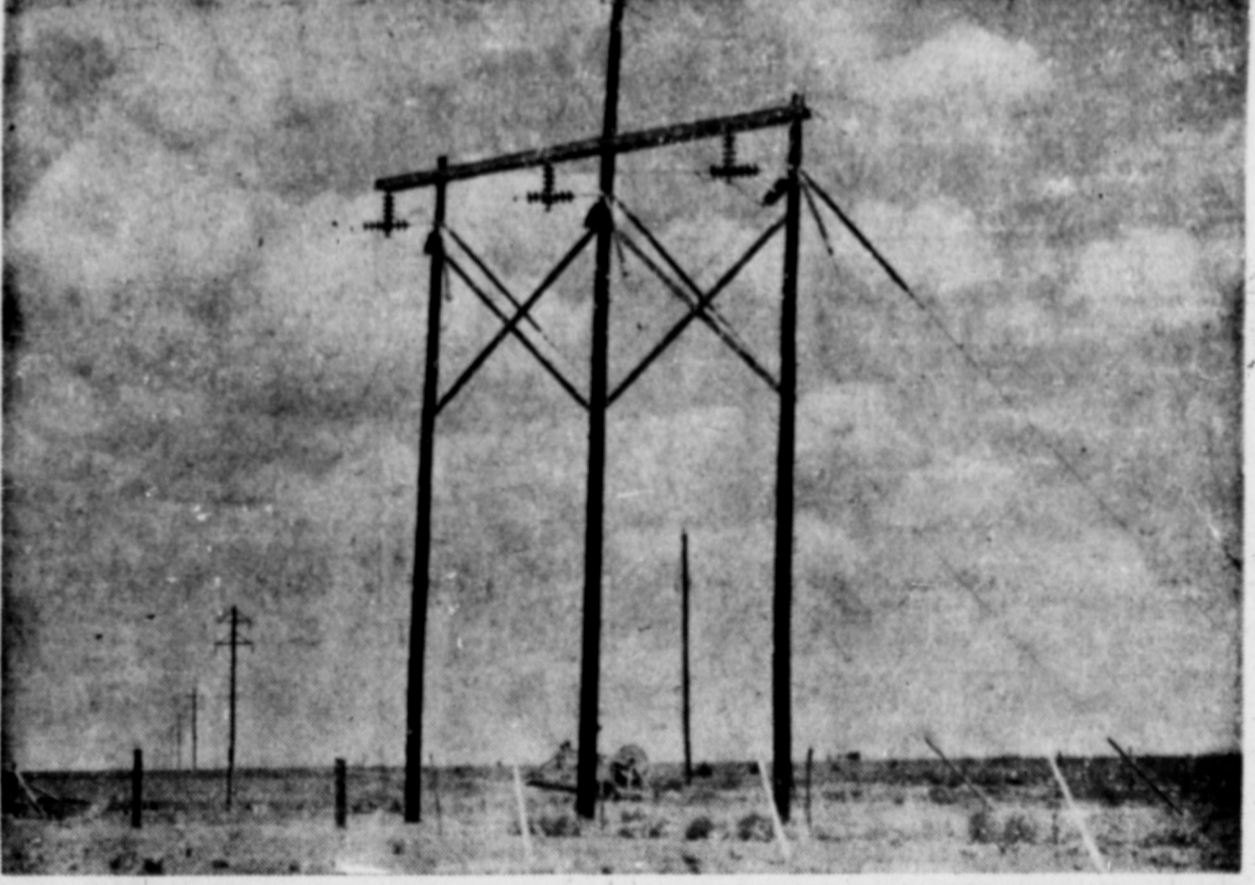

Highways

The new highway system, has been reduced from previous years by the action of the United States Congress. Some of the states fell behind in their highway construction, and hence the Congress in the new bill gave the laggard states opportunity to catch up by making the program for only two years, reducing the amount available by 10 per cent each year and omitting the year 1949. Texas is not—we are proud to say—one of the laggard States. And although the bill provides for the federal funds to be used in a 1950-1951 program, the Texas Highway Department will let contracts and build roads in 1949 as rapidly as possible even though the funds will not actually be available until 1950.

The enclosed minute is the result of a study of road needs by our County Commissioners' Court with the District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department, a submission by the District Engineer to the Texas Highway Commission, and the approval of the Commission of the necessity of the road and its inclusion in the new program of work.

"It is regrettable that more of these vital roads cannot be built at this time; but in the light of the reduction of the federal funds and the curtailment thereby of the new program, you may be assured that the Texas Highway Department will expand every effort to equitably increase the present network of 8,700 miles of farm to market roads."

The communication is signed by D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, and John Davenport, Administrative Aide.
