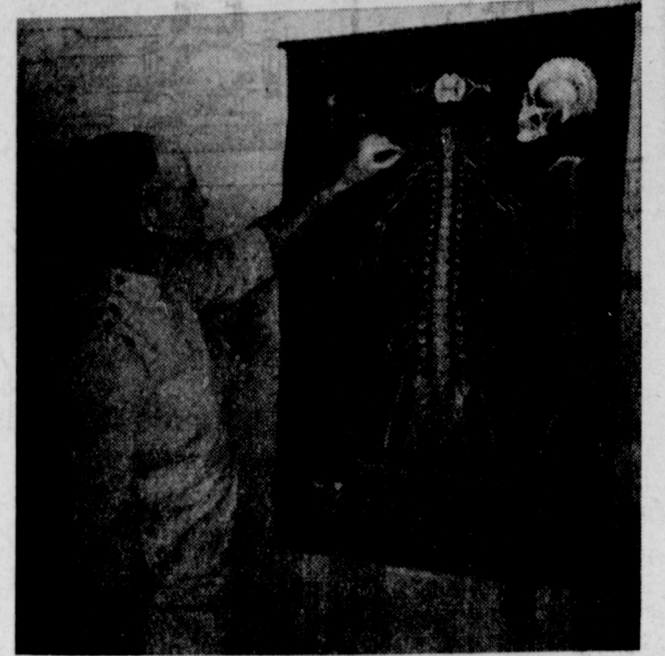

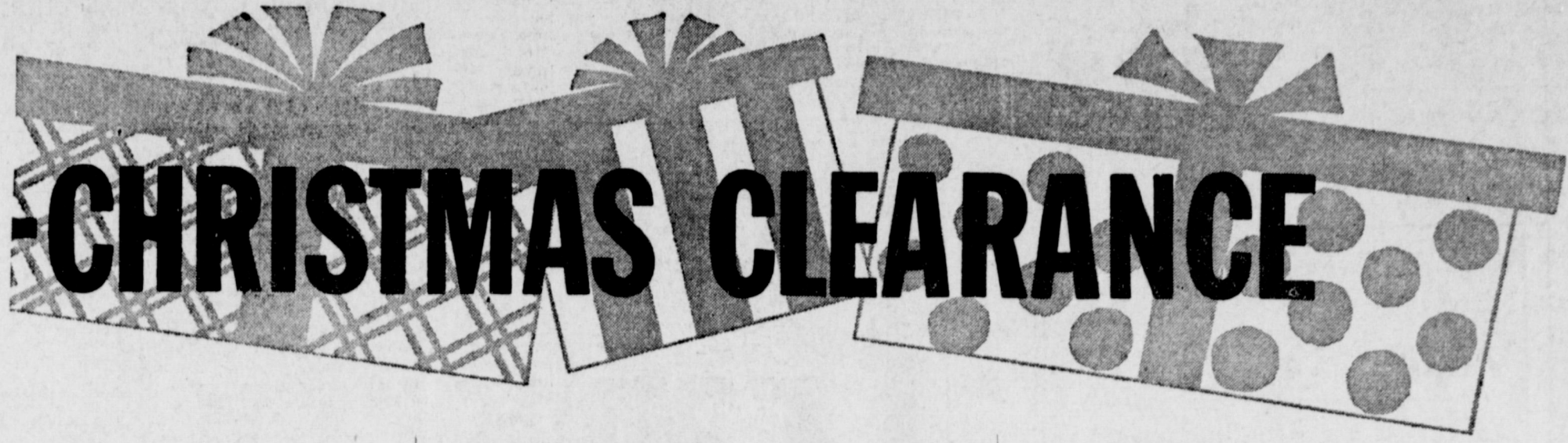

Friendly People Impress Visitor From South Africa

Rayman H. Voogt, of the Union of South Africa, visiting in Muleshoe this week, has been impressed with TV, our mechanical standard of living, but mostly gadgets, big cities, and high he told The Journal, by the spirit of friendliness of the people. He was amazed at the freedom of the people. "A man may speak to a lady on the street, even a married lady, without fear that she'll call the police," he said.

Everywhere he has been, the people extend him a cordial welcome, treat him as one of their own.

Rayman is in Muleshoe almost by accident. A student at Freed-Hardeman College, Henderson, Tenn., where he is studying to be a Church of Christ minister, he's on his way to Abilene to spend the Christmas season with two other young men from South Africa, who are studying in ACC.

But he traveled thus far with John Niessert, fiancé of Miss Eunice Dill, and was invited to spend several days in the Dill home here.

Rayman lives at East London, in Cape Province, Union of South Africa. It's a town on the Indian Ocean, having a population of 96,000. Of this total, some 40,000 are white, of English, Dutch, German or other European stock, leaving some 56,000 blacks in East London.

In the Union of South Africa are 13 million people; 9 million blacks, 33 million whites, and 1 million of other races. Of the whites, dominant races are of Dutch and English descent.

Voogt himself is of German descent. His father is a customs official in East London.

Rayman has been in the U.S. for 2 years and is now in the third year of his college course. After he finishes at Freed-Hardeman he hopes to enter ACC. Then he'll return to his country to preach. Right now he preaches at two churches, in Acton and Cloverport, Tenn.

There are nine Church of Christ congregations in the Union of South Africa, but there are only five preachers.

Racial and inter-racial turbulence in South Africa have caused a tenseness among the people, and the people are reluctant to make new friends, he thinks.

Asked about agriculture in his country, Voogt said that the soil is fertile, but that farming methods are backward; they still use oxen for plowing. All farming machinery must be imported and this makes their cost excessively high. Similarly all automobiles have to be imported making their cost about \$1,000 higher than in the U.S.

Rayman speaks English, but

has a working knowledge of Afrikaans, a language developed from the contact of Dutch and African natives.

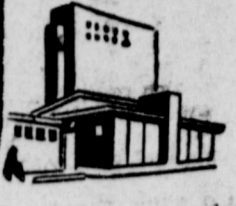

Soil Fertility Bank: These words, or facsimiles of them, are being used in newspapers and magazines, as well as political speeches more prevalently than any agricultural phrase we can remember. When the words were first put together several years ago by J. Walter Hammond, and approved two years ago by Texas Farm Bureau, as the name of a proposed move toward the solution for agricultural problems, no one outside FB cared to mention them. As the program under which agriculturists continually lost favor with their buying public, as well as losing money themselves, became obviously useless, things changed. Just about every senator and congressman who spoke to farmers began mentioning a plan "he had hit on that seemed to have some merits," and it was called "Fertility Bank." "Soil Fertility Plan", or something like that. Well, this is not the first time things of this nature have happened, and we're glad support is

being given a plan of the general nature of the original idea. We hope there will not be so much political pressure to give every party and politicians credit for some pharisean when adopted. Bipartisanship is a difficult goal for men of different parties to achieve.
 We have, in the past, promoted contributions to CROP through this column. We continue to urge you to contribute to this worthy, American cause. We now want to mention CARE, a similar project. Any individual can send one dollar, to CARE, 309 LaSalle Building, Washington 6, D.C., or to New York, or simply in care of the Postmaster, and a package of around twenty pounds, of surplus farm products will be sent to needy people in Europe, Asia or Latin America. If you want to, you can designate where, and rest assured it will go there. If you want a representative of your church to deliver it, say so, and it will be done, and you will be notified by the recipient.

Numerous people to whom I have talked feel that we have a great number of business men locally who are

THREE STEPS TO FARM RECOVERY.

The job of re-vitalizing our sinking farm economy calls for sound, aggressive leadership and not punitive measures from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Texas farmers claim.

Testimony at the recent Senate Agriculture Committee hearings in Fort Worth brought out a universal truth—for Texas, at least! Farmers feel that the present sliding scale parity program of Secretary of Agriculture Benson is a failure, and is more or less directly responsible for the continued decline in farm commodity price.

A speech by Mr. Benson recently almost admitted this charge. The Secretary made an emotional appeal to the U. S. farmer in an address to the National Grange, asking for suggestions as to how to solve present farm problems. In doing so, he demonstrated much concern, yet it indirectly branded his own program as a failure.

However, the answer may already be in his hands. What the farmers of Texas and the nation want is outlined in reports of both the House and Senate Agriculture Committee nation-wide hearings.

Granted that there is no simple solution to the problem. But three points were emphasized again and again by the farmers themselves. They are:

1. A solid price foundation of 90% parity on basis such as wheat, grain sorghums, cotton, peanuts, oats and corn. The two-price plan they feel, will strengthen our farm economy and still allow us to regain some of our lost foreign markets.

The cost of this farm measure, based on previous programs, would be less than 50 cents per person per year. This per capita cost is a matter of record, other claims to the contrary.

2. The productive capacity of this nation should not be stifled by the fear of surplus commodities, say the farmers. Instead, it provides an opportunity for humanitarian use of our abundant goods in areas too poor to purchase on the world market.

3. And by far, the strongest demand—a complete "brainwashing" of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's apparent atti-

tude that the farmer is a dole supported tax drain.

The farm people constantly pointed out that they do not want special considerations—just an opportunity to produce in an

atmosphere that gives them equal chances with the manufacturer and consumer.

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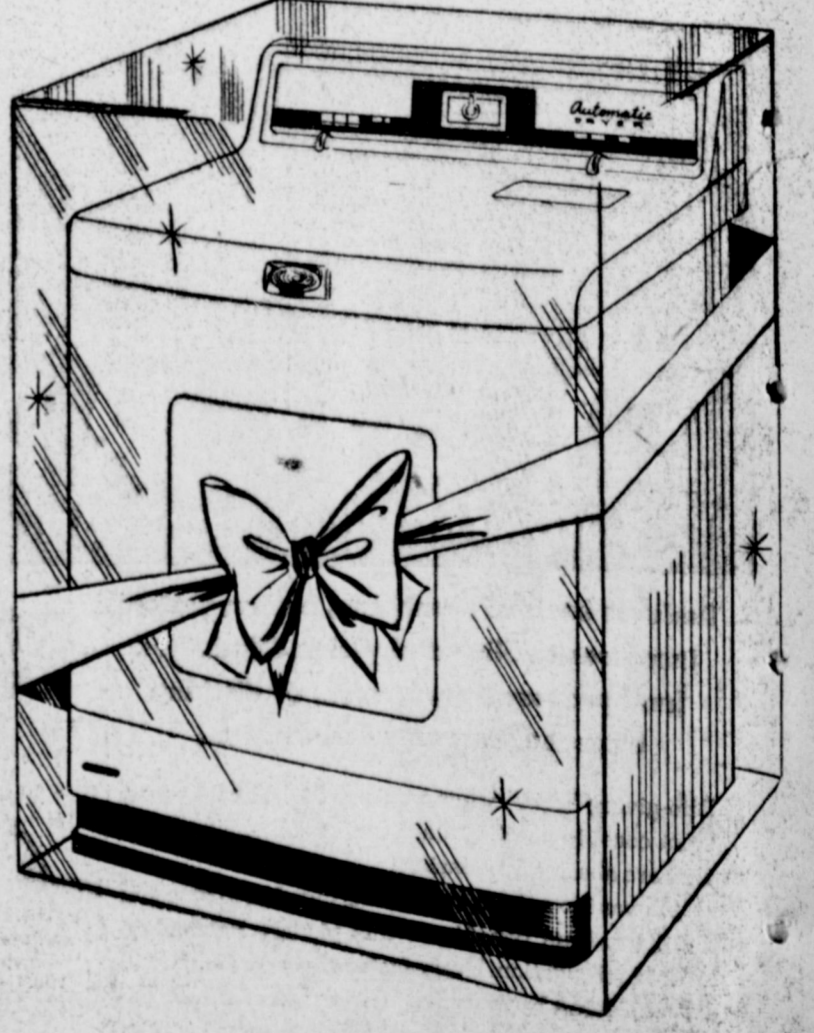

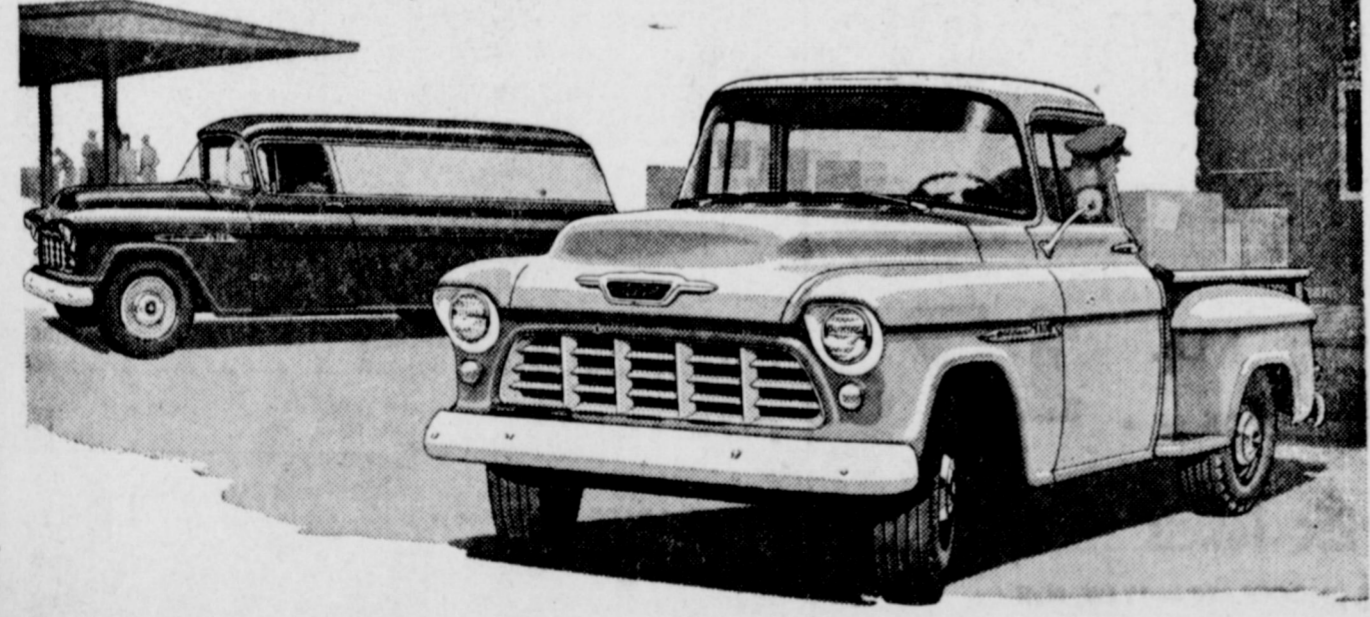

Tests In Cooking Candies

Candy thermometers are the best guides for testing a candy mixture. Before you begin make sure your thermometer is accurate. You can check it quickly by placing it in boiling water. To get a correct reading make sure the thermometer does not touch any part of the pan, and that the bulb is completely covered with the candy mixture. Read the temperature at eye-level, not from above or below.

You can use the cold water test as a cross-check. Drop a small portion of the candy mixture into a bowl of cold water and note the kind of ball formed. Fondants, when done, should form a small soft ball which flattens out when held on the tip of the thumb. A firm ball—the test for caramels—will hold its shape when lifted on the finger. For divinity and popcorn balls the syrup should form a hard ball which can be manipulated
