## Bulldogs Win, Lose Conference Games

Since last Thursday, Tahoka Bulldog basketball team has won one and lost one conference game.

Thursday night of last week, the boys defeated Seagraves in the local gymnasium by a score of 35 to 18. Carter and Bennett of Tahoka and Stafford of Seagraves tied for high point honors with 8 each. In the B game, Tahoka won a close contest 20 to 18.

Tuesday night here, the Bulldogs lost to O'Donnell Eagles 45 to 30, in a game that was closer than the score indicates, as the game was very close until the fading moments. Jack of O'Donnell was high with 18 points, followed by Duane Carter, who scored 16. Tahoka B team won a 20 to 18 victory, Lynn Halameick scored 9 points.

The Bulldogs are scheduled to meet Post here next Tuesday night.

Last Friday and Saturday, the Bulldogs made a very creditable showing in the Tulla tournament. They won their opener with Happy Friday morning 46 to 32, they lost to powerful Dimmitt 54 to 30 and were nosed out by Canyon 29 to 28. Dimmitt went on to win the tournament by defeating Tulla 62 to 33. This is the same Dimmitt, featuring one all-state player, that was nosed out in 1948 by one point by the state champions. The game may have been closer had not three Tahoka boys fouled out in the game. James Ray Bennett made the all-tournament team. Coach Jacobs used all ten boys in the game, namely, Small, Carter, Bennett, McNeely, Boyd, Morgan, Polk, Henry, Crowell and Gurley.

## Leo Jackson Named Coach At Greenville

Coach Leo Jackson, former Tahoka coach who went with Supt. W. T. Hanes to Cameron four years ago, has been named head coach of Class AA Greenville.

In 11 years of coaching at Flo-mot, Tahoka, Olney, and Cameron, Leo's teams have won five district championship, four bi-districts, and four teams were undefeated. Last fall, he lost only to New Braunfels. He will go to Greenville March 1.

## Sheriff Is Given Larger Offices

Sheriff Roland Clem and Justice of the Peace P. D. Server have exchanged offices on the lower floor of the courthouse, after having obtained permission of the commissioners court. The sheriff also gets the room on the west of his main office, which has been used heretofore for various purposes.

Mr. Clem is fixing up a private office in the smaller room. The sheriff has had no privacy heretofore and needs such an office. Also a space in the main office is being cut off from the rest of it by a railing for the use of his bookkeeper and deputies as well as him. Self-seats will be provided outside the railing for visitors.

Mr. Server has moved into the office heretofore occupied by the sheriff. It is a slightly smaller room than the one he has just vacated but it is large enough for all practical purposes except, possibly, on rare occasions when he may have a red-hot jury trial.

One problem has been created by this change, according to the gentlemen of leisure who spend a lot of their spare time around the courthouse. They are wondering what South Tahoka will do for a voting place. Probably the commissioners court knows.

## Former Citizen Died Last Week

Rev. Birgil S. Coughran, an early day citizen of Lynn county and a brother of Mrs. J. J. Atkinson of this city, died at his home in Ontario, Calif., at 12:30 a. m. January 19th, according to a telegram received by Mrs. Atkinson Thursday of last week.

Rev. Coughran was the son of the late A. S. Coughran first tax assessor of Lynn county. The Rev. Coughran located in the northwest part of the county in 1901, and when Tahoka was established in 1903, he was one among the first to build a home in the new city. He and his family moved to California in the early 1920s.

Rev. Coughran was a Nazarene preacher and was pastor to a number of churches in Texas and California before retiring several years ago. He is survived by his wife and three children.

## Plan Extension Of City Water System

In the midst of the first wet spell the South Plains has enjoyed in several years, the city council of Tahoka is preparing to greatly improve and extend its water system in the very near future.

At a meeting of the council on Tuesday night of last week, the council ordered 7,000 feet of six-inch piping to be used in the place of the two-inch piping upon which many of the residents of the city must now depend for their water supply. The order was placed after the council had canceled an order for some 8-inch piping which they had made a long time ago but had never received. They found that the price had advanced so much that they could use the City's money to much better advantage by buying the six-inch piping.

Half of this piping, 3,500 feet of it, is to be delivered in February and the remaining 3,500 feet in April according to Dr. K. R. Durham, Mayor, and it will require several months and quite a sum of money to lay the pipe. One line will be extended out into the Roberts addition, Dr. Durham says.

The piping will cost more than \$10,000 but the City will not go in debt for one foot of it, the Doctor says. The City will pay for it with money that was saved during the War period when no material could be bought. He gives members of the city council in those days, Joe Boardwell, Otho Thomas, Bascom McCord, N. C. Rainey and others, credit for the City's present ability to make these improvements and extensions.

## C. of C. Directors Discuss Projects

Tahoka Chamber of Commerce directors in a meeting Monday night disposed of a number of items of business of interest to the town in general.

Plans were made for the annual membership banquet which will be held late in February plans for which will be announced later.

The C. of C. voted to furnish most of the financing for the annual Spring 4-H Club Livestock Show. The board also discussed prospects and means of securing housing for oil company crews which wish to move to Tahoka.

## New Storm Brings January Moisture Near Four Inches

With only a brief relaxation last Sunday, Old Man Winter is still doggedly holding the fort throughout West Texas. A coat of sleet, snow, and ice is still on the ground at this time, Wednesday afternoon. On less than half of the days since this spell was ushered in on Sunday, January 9, has the temperature risen at any time during the day above the freezing point.

The last lap of the spell set in Monday morning when another whiz-bang norther swooped down from Montana or somewhere and drove the mercury down in a jiffy. On Monday night the thermometer registered a low of 15 above zero and started out at 15 Tuesday morning. It never rose above 26 all day Tuesday and went down to 20 again Tuesday night starting out at 20 on Wednesday morning. It remained below the freezing point all day long.

The clouds began to spit fine particles of snow Monday which grew heavier toward nightfall. Sleet and fine snow fell most of the night and the precipitation netted .37 of an inch of water up to Tuesday night.

Precipitation during the first storm of the year beginning on January 9 amounted to 2.74 inches. Precipitation the Saturday and Monday following amounted to .34 of an inch. Precipitation last Saturday and Saturday night amounted to .41 of an inch; and Monday and Tuesday, .37, making a total since the spell began of 3.86.

It is still cloudy and cold. Additional snow fell during Wednesday night amounting to .06 of an inch of water, which ran the total for the month up to 3.94 inches in Tahoka. The temperature Wednesday night and early Thursday morning stood at 24, but the clouds cleared away early Thursday morning and the sunshine and a brisk southwest wind was running up the temperature steadily throughout the day.

## A. A. Walker, 87, Is Buried Here

Funeral services were conducted at 3:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon in the Methodist Church here for Alexander A. Walker, 87, who died at 8:00 o'clock Monday morning in a Big Spring hospital. Services were conducted by Rev. C. A. Holcomb Jr., pastor of the Methodist Church, and the body was laid to rest in the Tahoka cemetery under the direction of the Stanley Funeral Home.

Mr. Walker, who resided just outside the city on the Lubbock highway, had been a resident of Lynn county since 1933, when he and Mrs. Walker removed to this place from Canyon.

Besides the wife, survivors include four sons and two daughters. The sons are Otho Walker of Amarillo; Lloyd of Hobbs, New Mexico; Alfred of Conway, Texas; and Olin of Lubbock. The daughters are Mrs. E. H. Cutter of the family home and Mrs. J. B. Redfern of Amarillo. One sister also survives, Mrs. Maggie Phelps of Oklahoma City.

All of the children and some of the members of their families were here for the funeral.

Mr. Walker was born on October 8, 1861, in Dallas county. He and Miss Camma V. Thomas were married on January 30, 1890 in Ellis county, she being a sister of A. L. Otho and the late Clifford Thomas of Tahoka. He and his family moved from East Texas out to Claude, Armstrong county in 1909. They afterwards lived near Hereford and at Canyon and moved from Canyon to Tahoka.

Mr. Walker was a good man and a good citizen. He had been a member of the Methodist Church for 54 years and lived a consistent Christian life. Recently he had been in ill health and died from the infirmities of old age. He will be greatly missed by his family and friends.

**LOCKNEY CHURCH TO BE REBUILT**

Plans are being made to build an out-and-out new Baptist Church at Lockney on the site of the old one, which collapsed under the weight of snow and sleet and ice which collected on the roof during the recent unprecedented storm. The wreckage is being cleared off the site and as much of the lumber and brick in the former structure as possible is being salvaged, according to the Lockney Beacon.

**Grassroots . . .**

By Bill Griffin, County Agent  
Lynn county has been included in the 1949 Sears Poultry program for 4-H Club Boys. This program offers many opportunities to 4-H boys interested in poultry work. Three 4-H Club boys will be selected as demonstrators and each demonstration must provide a brooder house and broiler that will accommodate 300 baby chicks or 60 poults, ample feeders and waterers, keep accurate records and use approved methods in brooding and growing the chicks or poults.

Each demonstrator will receive between March 1st and 15, his 300 chicks or 60 poults. Each demonstrator must agree to pay \$15.00 which will be turned over to the District Treasurer and be used to expand the Boys 4-H Club poultry program. Boys with chicks will make this payment at time cockerels are sold and boys with poults will make this payment at time first turkeys are sold.

**AAA Conservation Program Passes 12-year Mark**

The record farm production of 1948 is but a part of the return on the investment in conservation farming for the past 12 years, says Clarence Church, chairman of the Lynn County Agricultural Conservation Committee. "The Nation's assistance to farmers to help them carry out soil and water conservation practices is really paying off."

Conservation, of course, would not entirely overcome extremely unfavorable weather nor widespread losses from insects but it does make possible increased yields from better strains, more efficient methods and conditions these other improvements would still be ineffective.

Under the Agricultural Conservation Program, the chairman points out, farmers of this country have in the past 12 years terraced 14,177,000 acres, about 700,000 miles; constructed 680,000 erosion and flood control dams on farms and ranches; planted 622,000 acres of trees, seeded 102,000,000 acres of crops on the contour; applied 185,947,000 tons of lime to 104,733,000 acres of farmland and applied 15,789 tons of phosphate fertilizer to 123,440,000 acres to make possible the growing of legumes for soil improvement and erosion control; established 62,214,000 acres of stripcropping for wind and water erosion control; and grew and plowed under 198,180,000 acres of cover and green manure crops to add organic matter and build resistance to erosion.

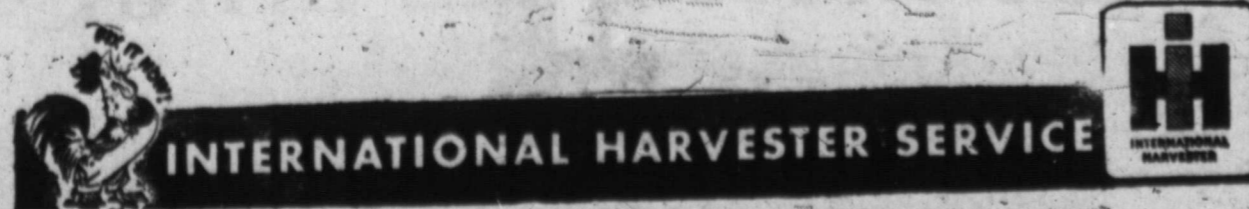

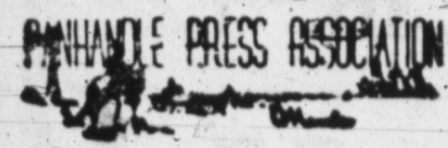

office well-prepared to perform its duties and its reputation for efficiency and integrity grew as the years came and went. A few men now living in Lynn county had known him when he served the people of Lynn county in official capacity and the people of Sweetwater as mayor, and when he was promoted to the state office they never had a doubt but that he would "make good" on every count. Among these were the writer of these lines and J. F. "Uncle Frank" Stuart of this city. The latter had known George Sheppard from his boyhood days, and he never failed to sing George's praise every time the name was mentioned in his presence. He believed in George's worth, and so did the people of Texas, as they proved by keeping him in office. It is fitting, too, that he succeeded by the man whom he took with him to the Comptroller's office when he went to Austin in 1930, Robert Calvert of Sweetwater. Calvert, too, is efficient and thoroughly honest. Governor Jester is to be commended for making this appointment.

Did you know that Texas has a woman state senator? Well, we didn't until we read about her and saw her picture in a newspaper. She is Senator Neville Higgs Colson of Navasota. But Senator Colson is enough of the name and title for you to undertake to remember, dear reader. Her district consists of nine deep east-Texas counties with a combined population in 1940 of 169,173, considerably smaller than the population of our own district but much larger than the population of many other districts. We hope that he redistricting of the state following next year's census will not result in her elimination from the Senate, particularly if she proves to

be outstanding in efficiency and courage, for we believe that a few women of the right type in that body would raise the standard of character and service somewhat. And Mrs.—excuse us—Senator Colson seems to have started out on the right track. She is an enthusiastic advocate of the building of farm-to-market roads in this state. She favors an appropriation of forty million dollars out of the State's surplus of seventy-five million for the building of such roads. The people of the state certainly need them. We need some of them in Lynn county—and they need them still more, strange to say, in some of the old black-land counties of Central Texas. Take Bell county, for instance. They have some of the poorest rural roads in that county running through thickly-settled communities that we have ever seen anywhere—and yet they have scarcely a dozen miles of hard-surfaced farm-to-market roads in the county. We hope that Senator Mrs. Colson, together with the help of others in the legislature, gets the job done. She has already had ten years experience in the House and is onto the legislative ropes. We shall watch her course with interest.

A. M. Jackson, editor of the Slaton Slatonite, is a confirmed stand-patter, as is proved by the following paragraph clipped from his column in the Slatonite last week. "It is my prediction," he says, "that a lot of the items of men's wear that are now accepted will be out of use in the not too far future. 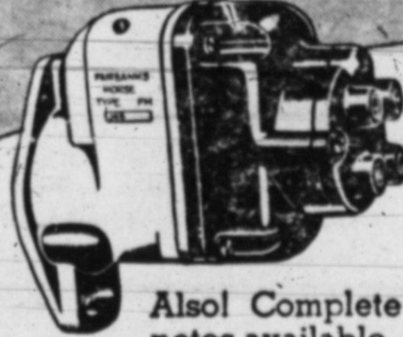
