County Junior Livestock Show Next Week End

Plans are being completed this week for the annual Lynn County Junior Livestock Show which will be held at the Fair exhibit hall all day Saturday of next week. Top baby beefs, hogs, and sheep will be exhibited by Lynn county 4-H and FFA club boys.

County Agent Bill Griffin expects this year's show to be even bigger and better than last year's record-breaking event.

Baby Beef animals will be featured again this year, but in the hog show only fat barrows will be exhibited due to the large number of animals. However, fat lambs will be back on the exhibit list. Cash prizes are being offered in all classes, and winners will exhibit their animals at the South Plains show which will be held in Lubbock the following week.

L. M. Hargrave and T. L. Leach, both of Texas Tech agriculture department, will be the judges.

George Claud Wells is superintendent of the Baby Beef division; Roy Botkin, Ward Eakin, and Charley Lichey, of the Fat Barrow; and Frank Parris and Hubert Tankersley of the Fat Lamb.

W. J. Burckhart Buried Tuesday

W. J. Burckhart, 89, a prominent farmer of Lynn county for many years, died Monday afternoon, after a long illness and the infirmities of old age. Death came to Mr. Burckhart just a little over a month from the time his wife passed away on January 20.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday at 3 p. m. in the First Baptist Church, Rev. C. T. Aly, the pastor officiating, and burial followed in the Grassland Cemetery beside wife. Graveside rites were conducted by the Masonic Lodge of which he had long been a member.

William Joshua Burckhart was born in Texas County, Missouri, on January 23, 1860, before the Civil War broke out. Early in life he became a Christian and joined the Baptist Church, and he served as church clerk for some years. On June 5, 1888, he was married to Miss Martha Ellen Smith in Mary's county, Missouri. The couple and their family moved to Johnson county, Texas, in 1895. He taught school in that county, and also was

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock in the Draw Methodist Church for William Elzy Williams, 48, who was found dead in his bed at Wellman near Seagraves Friday morning. Death, it was believed, resulted from an attack of heart trouble.

Services were conducted by Rev. J. W. Hawkins, pastor of the Draw Methodist Church, and burial followed under the direction of the Stanley Funeral Home of Tahoka in the Draw cemetery.

Pall bearers were his former neighbors and friends of the Draw community. John Martin, Buck Martin, Wes Luttrell, Bob Luttrell, and Vernon Luttrell.

He is survived by one son, J. W. Williams of Wellman; two daughters, Wanda of Springfield, Arizona, and Wanda of Wellman; and two sisters, Mrs. Frank Cook and Mrs. E. C. Busby of Tahoka.

Mr. Williams was born at Stephenville on September 3, 1900. He lived for many years in the Draw community in this county. Some time ago he moved out to Arizona, and came from Creswell in that state to the Seagraves vicinity shortly before Christmas. He is said to have been complaining of feeling unwell recently but his death came rather unexpectedly.

He was a member of the Methodist Church.

City's New Fire Truck Damaged In Wreck

Tahoka's new fire truck was damaged and the car of Oliver "Rocky" Burford was completely demolished at 7:45 a. m. Saturday when the two vehicles collided on the highway at the western edge of town. Troy Connolly had taken the truck out to work it up when the collision occurred. Neither man was seriously injured, but Burford's '41 Ford was a wreck. The fire truck received \$200 or \$300 in damages. The News is informed.

Reburial Rites For Lt. H. A. Maasen

Last rites were held here Thursday at 1:30 p. m. in the Methodist Church for First Lieutenant Henry A. Maasen, Jr., who died in an airplane crash in the Pacific on September 11, 1944. Services were conducted by Dr. M. Norvell Young, minister of the Broadway Church of Christ, Lubbock, and burial was in Tech Memorial Park, Lubbock.

H. A., or "Ham," as he was affectionately known to friends, was born in Dallas October 18, 1922. He first came to Tahoka with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry A. Maasen, in 1923, but after residing here only about six months, the family returned to Dallas. However, in 1927 the family returned here, and Mr. Maasen was a local business man until moving to Seymour last year.

H. A. attended the Tahoka public school, and was graduated here in 1940. While in high school, he was a popular student, served on

Paving Election Saturday, March 12

The News stated last week that if the paving bonds are authorized at the election to be held on Saturday, March 12, the property owners will have two or three years and possibly longer in which to pay for their part of the paving. We stated in a previous issue that the cost to the property owners would probably be about \$4.00 per foot front.

Dr. K. R. Durham, Mayor, requested that we make it clear that the exact cost to the property owner can not yet be determined and that the length of time which tax-year would have in which to pay for the cost of paving is also undetermined as yet. He says that they might have a longer time than three years in which to pay the cost, possibly as much as five or six years. The city council proposes to get the very best deal possible for the property owners if the bonds are voted.

Respecting the regular city election to be held on Saturday, April 2, it can now be definitely stated that Dr. K. R. Durham will be a candidate for re-election, as he has already filed his name. B. L. Parker will also be a candidate for re-election as city councilman.

W. O. Thomas and V. F. Jones definitely will not be candidates for re-election. Names of candidates must be filed with the city secretary more than ten days preceding the election. All persons desiring their names to appear on the ballot or whose friends desire their names to appear on the ballot are placed on notice now that their names must be filed within the proper time.

Seventy-five Tahoka business men and a few guests attended the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet in the school cafeteria last Friday night, heard a report on the year's activities, elected five new directors, and enjoyed a program of music, fun, and a serious address.

Hubert Tankersley, well-known Lynn county farmer, was announced as the new president, succeeding Neal Stanley.

New directors elected were: Maurice Bray, Terry Thompson, Vernon Brewer, Bill Strange Sr., and Ronald Sherrill. Holdover directors are: H. W. Carter, J. A. Biggerstaff, Frank Hill, and Otis Spears.

Clint Walker, secretary, reviewed briefly the year's accomplishments, some of which are promotion of the livestock shows, softball league, soil conservation tour, district WTCC meeting, county directory, highway signs, Christmas lighting contest and program, civic club forum, free express delivery service, the anti-solicitation service, and numerous other projects, including efforts to secure an oil mill, which will be continued.

The principal talk—and a most excellent one it was, both humorous and inspiring—was delivered by Dr. J. W. (Bill) Marshall, president of Wayland College, Plainview.

Dr. Marshall, in the serious part of his talk, made an appeal for more friendship and better understanding between nations, communities, and individuals. He also told of some of the things Wayland is doing in this field by taking students from foreign countries.

Prior to the talk, Dr. Marshall introduced two faculty members and a student pianist, who entertained the group for about 15 minutes. Shelby Collier, Wayland music department head, sang "The Desert Song, Roused Up in Glory, and Sweet Mystery of Life; and "Sailing" Sam Allen, track coach who set three world hurdle marks in one afternoon while a student at Oklahoma Baptist U., sang "A Little Bit of Heaven and When Irish Eyes Are Smiling. Both were accompanied at the piano by Lynn Whitten of Amarillo.

Supt. Vernon Brewer acted as toastmaster, and an excellent steak dinner was served by the cafeteria force.

The entire program was one of the most enjoyable ever held by the local organization, though the attendance was a little smaller than expected, possibly due to other meetings being held in town.

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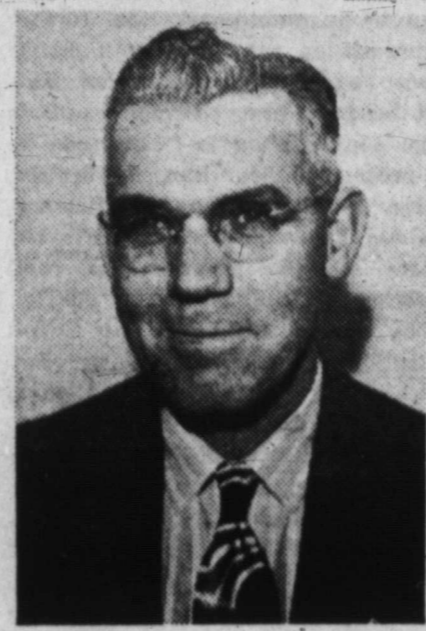

Weldon Havens Body Back Home

Re-burial services were conducted here Wednesday morning for Pvt. Weldon W. Havens, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Havens of Tahoka, who was killed during the war.

Funeral services were held at the Stanley Funeral Home chapel at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday, with Rev. C. L. Jarrett of South Plains, Rev. D. L. Handley of Lockney, and Rev. V. J. Lowrance of Tahoka, Primitive Baptist Church pastors, officiating. Interment was in the Tech Memorial Park, Lubbock.

Weldon was born in Dickens county on November 26, 1924, and he was reared there and near Roaring Springs. Entering the Army during the recent war, he was sent to the Pacific, and met death on Okinawa Island June 16, 1945. He was given a military funeral there, and recently the body was returned to his homeland for reburial.

Besides the parents, he is survived by two sisters, Miss Elda Havens of Amarillo, and Miss Elsie Havens of Tahoka; four brothers, J. A. of Amarillo, and Orville, Richard, and Wayne, all of Tahoka; and the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Morris of Canyon.

The young man is said to have been a fine young American. Many friends extend their sympathy to the family in their sad days.

Wilson Will Vote On School Bonds

A bond election has been called for the Wilson Independent School district to be held on Saturday, March 12, to determine whether or not Bonds in the amount of \$175,000 shall be issued for the purpose of constructing a high school building and remodeling the present building, according to H. H. Hewlett, superintendent.

Also to be determined at such election is whether or not the tax rate shall be increased from \$1.00 to \$1.50 on the \$100.00 property valuations in the district.

The Morgan and New Lynn districts were consolidated two or three years ago with the Wilson district, and it is now one of the four large districts in the county, Tahoka, O'Donnell, and New Home being the other three.

Boys' Ranch, as the name implies is a ranch for boys, started by Cal Farley and the late Dutch Mantell of Amarillo, and now being supported by citizens of the entire Plains. The boys attend school and learn vocations by work on the ranch.

The unique ranch was recently featured in the movies, and has received considerable attention in Readers Digest, Saturday Evening Post and other magazines.

Mr. McGonagill was born at Benjamin in Knox county on March 29, 1902. He came with his parents.

Announce Wilson City Election

On Tuesday, April 5, Wilson will have its first election of officers since the town incorporated less than two years ago. A mayor and five aldermen will be elected.

Pat Campbell, the present mayor, will permit his name to go on the five aldermen will be elected.

The five aldermen have also consented for their names to go on the ballot. They are Pat Swann, J. F. Covey, D. C. Newsom, Clarence Church, and Howard Cook. The name of J. L. Hyde has also been filed as a candidate.

Following a destructive fire about two years ago, which could not be controlled for lack of water, the citizens of the town voted to incorporate. New buildings have since been constructed on the site of the ones destroyed by the fire, and other houses have been built, and the town is more prosperous now than it has been for years.

The people of the town, and vicinity are now hoping for the early construction of another paved highway through the town, leading from Slaton down through Wilson to a connection with the Lubbock-Tahoka highway just north of Tahoka.

Tahoka is to have a new park. Last Thursday night the subject of a new, larger park was discussed at a meeting of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, and as an outcome, the Jaycees went to work the next morning, and they now own two blocks of land in South Tahoka.

The two large block, comprising a total of nine acres, is located two block west of the O'Donnell highway, and three blocks south of the old school building, now the Calvary Rectory.

Further, architects are already at work drawing plans for the park, which will be a memorial to the boys who gave their lives in World War II. Tentatively, the park has been named Lynn County Memorial Park.

Further plans were to have been made this Thursday night at the Jaycee meeting.

The park will be landscaped, if plans materialize, which seems certain, and will include a memorial circle, concrete tennis courts, playground, picnic grounds, croquet softball field, and finally a swimming pool.

Seth Lewis is said to have conceived the park idea, which met instant approval of the Jaycees, and President Wilton Payne named a board of trustees, who, the next morning borrowed \$1500 and immediately purchased the property necessary for the park.

These trustees are: Dr. Skiles Thomas, Dr. W. A. Schaal, Dale Thuren, O. J. Winborn, and W. T. Kidwell.

Rollin McCord donated two lots; a small house and four lots were bought from Ernest Martin for \$850, two lots from Muri Duckett for \$60, two lots from Will Martin for \$30, and two lots from L. F. Bones for \$80.

The two 400-foot square blocks and Blocks 102 and 103 of the Original Town section.

Already, a number of citizens have offered their services in getting the park work under way. Charles Walden will grub the land, and Simeon Kemp has offered to build any concrete forms needed.

A six-inch water main runs to the property.

Various civic organizations of the town will possibly be asked to aid in building this much-needed beauty spot and recreation center.

Then on Saturday night, in the tournament finals, New Home won over Loop 20 to 9, with McClintock scoring 11 points for the victors.

The all-tournament team was selected as follows: Savage of New Home, Henson of Meadow, and Below of Meadow, forwards; Williams of Meadow, Crabtree of New Home, and a Dawson girl, guards.

The editor of this paper has been impudently written an editorial against the Minimum Standards Bill now pending in the legislature. Doctors of Medicine are strongly supporting the bill and many chiropractors and osteopaths are opposing it. Not having had an opportunity to read the bill itself and not knowing how comprehensive or far-reaching in its effects it might be, we are not prepared either to support it or to oppose it out-and-out. If, as charged by some it would be a mere tool in the hands of the Medical doctors to put all chiropractors and osteopaths out of business, we should oppose it, for we believe that there is a field in which these classes of practitioners do much good. Or, if it would unreasonably limit the services of nurses who are not graduates of some nurses school, we would likewise oppose it. But, if it merely sets up reasonable standards of knowledge respecting the human body and the healing arts which chiropractors and osteopaths must acquire before being allowed to practice, we think it is just and desirable. We believe that every legislator should acquaint himself as thoroughly as possible with the merits of the bill and then vote in the interest of the people of Texas. Neither Medical doctors nor chiropractors should be favored unless the people are being protected and safeguarded in their health at the same time.

We can only repeat what David wrote in one of his psalms about the knowledge of the Lord, "Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is high, I can not attain unto it."

The flurry over President Truman's use of extremely undignified language in his outburst against Drew Pearson, radio commentator and newspaper columnist, has about died down, but we merely wish to register our regrets that he used such language. We do not think it is becoming for any Christian gentleman, whether he be President or private citizen to use such language publicly or privately. It certainly is regrettable that the President of the United States should use it publicly. No man should dig down into the gutter to find mud to throw at even a dog.

Former Citizen Dies In Snow

William (Bill) Speight, 37, New Mexico State Policeman, who lived in Tahoka during his youth, was found dead in a snowdrift high up in the Sacramento mountains near Cloudcroft last Friday morning.

Bill is well remembered in Tahoka by many old schoolmates. Mr. Speight was manager of Jones Dry Goods during the 1920's.

A coronor ruled death from natural causes. It is presumed that he was trying to reach the state radio tower atop the mountain at the head of Silver Spring Canyon. His car stalled in the snow, and he had evidently proceeded on foot. He is believed to have become exhausted while struggling in the deep snow. He had suffered a heart attack a few weeks previously.

Born in Wellington Nov. 12, 1911, he joined the New Mexico State Police in 1937. During the war he was a military policeman, and returned to the state service about two years ago.

Chanute AF Base, Feb. 22.—Pfc. Hubbard Young son of Mr. Hubbard Young Sr., Wilson, Texas, graduated from his class in the Airplane Engine Mechanics course at Chanute AF Base this week.

Pfc. Young entered the services August 28, 1947, and was stationed at Roswell AF Base, New Mexico prior to coming to Chanute AF Base for his tech school. He has the Sharpshooters Medal for the Carbine Rifle and the Marksman Medal for the 45 Caliber Pistol.

He attended high school at Wilson High School, Wilson, Texas.

HEALTH FREEDOM SAID TO BE AT STAKE

Health freedom of Texans is at stake in basic science legislation now pending before the Texas Legislature, Dr. W. A. Schaal, of Tahoka said today.

Dr. Schaal said basic science legislation had been approved by committees in both the Texas Senate and House of Representatives and unless the public speak out against the legislation, basic science may become law.

The basic science legislation, he said, was being opposed by Texas chiropractors, osteopaths and naturopaths, and hundreds of people who have been helped by practitioners of these professions.

Dr. Schaal said basic science was being opposed by these three professions because it is (1) discriminatory, (2) placed too much power in the hands of professions (the Texas Medical Association); (3) deprived the people if their right to select the type of health treatment they desired; and (4) super boards set up by Basic science would be a duplication of licensing board and thus a waste of taxpayer's money.

"The claim is being made that basic science will raise the standards of healing arts practitioners," Dr. Schaal said. "It will do no such thing, because the bills, now being considered by the Legislature, specifically exempt all present practitioners."

Dr. Schaal said a more practical measure—a chiropractic licensing law that will raise standards among the chiropractic practitioners was now pending in the Legislature and "would do all the things the proponents of basic science claim their bill would do."

"Licensing has worked very well in other professions, and it is much more satisfactory than a drastic basic science law," he said.

"The basic science legislation is aimed directly at eliminating chiropractors in the State," Dr. Schaal said. The fact that in other states where basic science legislation has been enacted the number of chiropractors allowed to practice had been cut down was proof of this statement, he said. "Several of the so-called basic science states are now in the process of repealing the basic science laws," he said. "Because science not only stifled chiropractors and others, but also cut down on the number of medical doctors thus creating a shortage."

Dr. Schaal said farm families were opposing basic science because they were convinced the already shortage of doctors in rural areas would be made even more critical.

PLANS COMPLETED

Dr. J. A. Hill Is Guest Speaker

J. A. Hill, who retired on the last day of last August as president of the West Texas State College at Canyon after a service of 30 years in that capacity, is now working in the interest of a program to place in the public schools curriculum a course of instruction respecting the evils and harm resulting from the use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage. He represents a board consisting of the heads of the state department of education, the State Health department, the Red Cross, the crippled children organization, and possibly a half dozen other state-wide organizations interested in the health and normal development of the children and the students in the public schools of the state.

He is also representing the United Texas Drys, an organization striving to bring about the curtailment and final prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors.

Coming to Tahoka from Canyon Monday night, he was accompanied by the senior editor of this paper on Tuesday to Lamesa, where he addressed briefly the District 8 Baptist Convention then in session there in the interest of U. T. D. and where he held an hour's conference in the afternoon with about 20 members of the faculty of the Lamesa public schools in the interest of the program for the enlarged study of alcohol and narcotics and their injurious effects, in the public schools. He had an interview with Superintendent Brewer and some of the members of the faculty here on Wednesday morning.

On Tuesday night, he accompanied Rev. C. T. Aly, W. A. Reddell, A. L. Smith, and E. I. Hill to Gomez, Terry county, where there was a meeting of the Brotherhood and members of their families, and made a brief address there also. Rev. C. T. Aly was the main speaker of the evening.

Hill is planning to attend a general meeting of heads of the various organizations which he represents to be held soon for the purpose of perfecting the plans already made and to wage a determined fight for the curtailment of the evils resulting from the use of intoxicating liquors and other health deterrents.

EXTENSION SERVICE OFFERS TAILORING COURSE

Miss Mary Routh, Clothing Specialist for Extension Service, is teaching a tailoring course in Lynn county. Since Miss Routh has a limited amount of time to spend in the county, she is teaching eight women, who in turn will teach others. The work is open to any woman who sews and is interested in learning the tailoring.

Sherrod of the Dixie Club; Mrs. Tom Russell and Mrs. W. C. Macker of the Joe Stokes Club; Mrs. Howard Venable of the Redwine Club; Mrs. Roy Miles of the Joe Bailey Club and Mrs. Buster Phipps and Miss Ina Ledbetter of the Wells Club.

Any one interested in getting the training in tailoring can get in touch with any of the eight leaders or the County Home Demonstration Agent within the next few days.

New Oil Derrick Ready For Test

One oil test was about ready to start drilling in south Lynn county this week, another in west Lynn was abandoned, and a third just over the line in Terry seemed to be a certain producer.

The rig has been erected on the Lindly place about a mile north-east of O'Donnell on a deep test, which expects to go to a depth of possibly 9,000 feet in search of oil.

The McAlester Fuel Co. Edwards No. 1, a project to deepen an old hole, was expected to be abandoned this week. No oil was found in the Ellenburger strata when a drill-stem test was taken at 11,175-226 feet. The test is about ten miles west of Tahoka.

The Seaboard No. Hinson discovery, located northwest of West-point, just over in Terry county, is continuing swabbing operations in an attempt to increase production. Last official reports are that the well swabbed 163 barrels in 24 hours. It is in the Pennsylvanian at 9,442 feet. It is reported to have 6,500 feet of fluid in the hole. Location is on section 9I, block 4-X, PSL survey.

Oceans Becoming Saltier Blame Is Placed on Rivers

Is the ocean getting saltier? Yes, it is, say oceanographers, whose business it is to study such things as how salty is salt water, and why.

The open Atlantic ocean anywhere a few miles off the United States coast beyond range of dilution by the many rivers, averages about 3.6 per cent salt — a shade more than the average for all oceans. So uniform are ocean waters over most of the globe that only in a few places does their salt drop below 3.3 per cent or rise above 3.8 per cent, says the National Geographic society.

Millions of years ago, as scientists reckon, ocean and river water were probably much the same. Even purest river water, however, carries a tiny per cent of salts acquired in draining the earth's crust. Salts also reach the oceans by way of undersea springs.

Once in the ocean, the salts stay behind, while the sun carries on its work of evaporation which lifts pure water back onto the continents. Thus the oceans grow imperceptibly saltier due largely to the sweet rivers which dilute ocean saltness along the continent shores.

Saltiest of all ocean areas is the Red Sea. There are no rivers to produce even inshore dilution and the hot sun speeds evaporation, so the salt content surpasses 4 per cent.

Leather Tanning Chemical Found in Bark of Fir Tree

Discovery that the bark of the Douglas fir is a rich source of chemicals sorely needed for tanning leather was reported at the 114th national meeting of the American Chemical society by James Hubbard, E. F. Kurth, and Harry Kiefer of the Oregon forest products laboratory at Oregon state college.

Pointing out that large tonnages of the bark, now chiefly a waste product, accumulate each year at lumber mills and pulp mills in the Pacific northwest, the chemists said a compound called tannin is present in the bark in amounts ranging from 7.6 to 18.3 per cent.

Since the outbreak of the blight that has decimated the chestnut tree, formerly used in leather making, the United States has been forced to import about two-thirds of its annual requirements of tannin, which is employed to convert hides into leather, the report noted, and "hence it is desirable that domestic sources of tannin be developed."

The tannin is present in Douglas fir bark in amounts that make it feasible for commercial extraction," the paper stated. "Heavy leather made from the bark liquor in a commercial tannery is soft and pliable, and has an even, light color."

1950 Agricultural Conservation Program

Although 1949 is only two months old, with County Agricultural Conservation Associations offices busy finishing up the 1948 Agricultural Conservation Program and with farmers just getting started on the 1949 ACP, work on the 1950 program already is underway.

According to Clarence Church, chairman of the Lynn County Agricultural Conservation Committee, this is the time of the year when recommendations for the next year's program are made. The program for each year is developed from suggestions and recommendations from each of the Nation's 3,030 agricultural counties which in turn reflect the needs and experience of farmers in the counties.

Every farmer is invited to make recommendations, says the chairman. In developing the program, he explains, only the most essential and practical practices can be included and final decisions must be based upon available funds.

The chairman explains the procedure as follows: recommendations from each county are considered along with the recommendations of all the other counties in the state by the Production and Marketing Administration Committee. The recommendations from each State are sent to Washington for consideration in the national program.

Recommendations fall into three general categories, Mr. Church said: 1. Changes in the current program—changes in practices or specifications and the amount of assistance for practices now in the program.

2. Elimination of practices or provisions. When a practice is sufficiently established so that it will be carried on without assistance, there is no longer a need for it, the policy is to take it out of the program.

3. New practices. As science finds new and better methods of conservation or as changing conditions make new practices necessary, the recommendations for new practices are made.

Most of the practices and provisions are continued from year to year, the chairman explains, but this yearly opportunity to go over the program carefully and make suggestions for improvements, keeps the program flexible and in line with conservation progress and new developments.

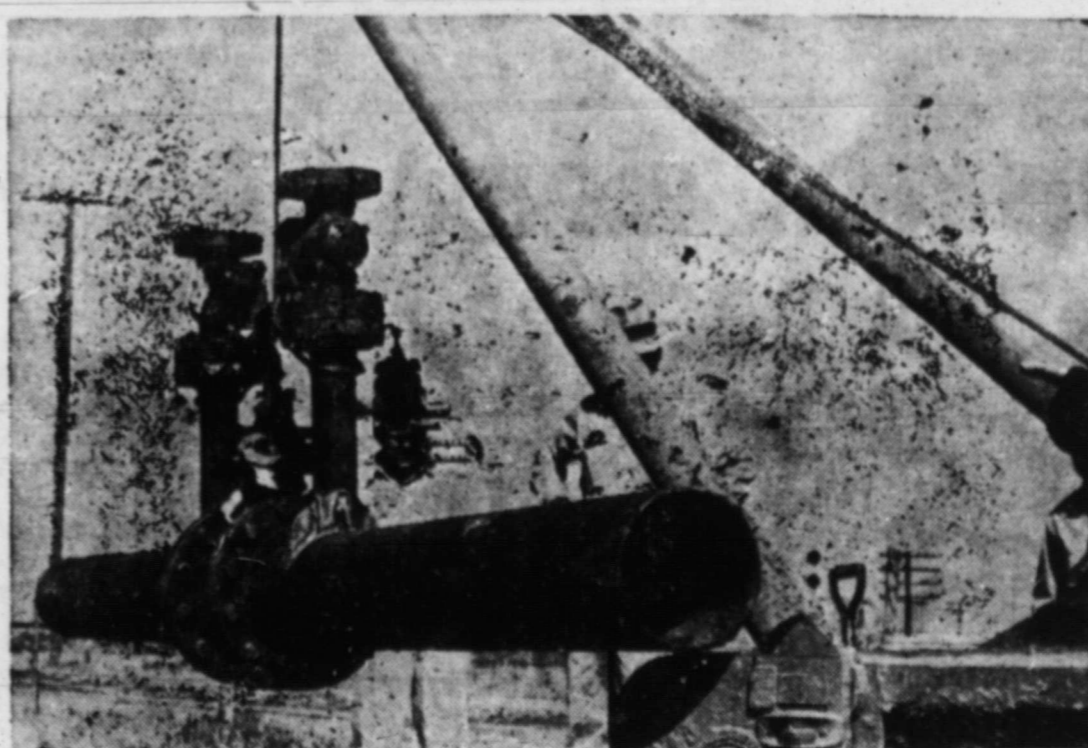

To the Resident Qualified Voters of the City of Tahoka Who Own Taxable Property Within Said City, and Who Have Duly Rendered the Same for Taxation:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Tahoka, Texas, on the 12th day of March 1949, on the various propositions and at the place more particularly set forth in the election ordinance adopted by the City Commission on the 22nd day of February, 1949, which election ordinance is substantially as follows:

An Ordinance by the City Council of the City of Tahoka, Texas, Determining the Necessity for the Extension, Enlargement and Improvement of the Water and Sewer Systems of Tahoka, Texas, and for the Widening, Improvement, Extension and Pavement of the Streets and Highways, of Said City, Including the Purchasing of Necessary Rights of Way Therefor; Determining the Advisability of Submitting to the Property Tax Paying Voters of Said City Who Own Taxable Property Within Said City and Who Have Duly Rendered the Same for Taxation, Propositions Relating to the Issuance of the Negotiable Interest Bearing Coupon Bonds of Said City to Finance Such Improvements, Extensions and Constructions; Providing for an Election Upon the Question of Authorizing an Aggregate Amount of \$50,000.00 of the Bonds of Said City for Such Purposes; Prescribing the Place and Time of Holding Said Election, the Qualifications of the Voters, the Purposes of the Various Bonds, the Amounts Thereof, the Interest Rate Thereon and Submitting the Proposition of the Levy, Assessment and Collection of Ad Valorem Taxes Annually While Said Bonds or Any of Them Are Outstanding to Pay the Interest On and Provide a Sinking Fund For the Redemption of Said Bonds as the Same Mature and Accrue; Prescribing the Maturity of Said Bonds, the Manner of Holding Such Election and Declaring an Emergency.

Whereas, the said City Council of the City of Tahoka, Texas, affirmatively finds that it is advisable and to the best interest of said City that certain extensions, enlargements and improvements be made

to the water system and the sewer system of said city, as well as that certain extensions, improvements and pavement be made to the city streets and highways of said city, all in accordance with the plans and estimates which have heretofore been approved by the City Council and it is further deemed advisable and necessary that the negotiable interest bearing coupon bonds of said city shall be issued for the purpose of financing the cost of such improvements, extensions and repairs, and that it is necessary and expedient that an election be held within and for the City of Tahoka, Texas, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors who have duly rendered their property for taxation, the various propositions to determine whether or not such bonds shall be authorized for said purposes and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be annually levied, assessed and collected against all property in said city for the redemption of said bonds at maturity and for paying the interest thereon as it accrues:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAHOKA, TEXAS:

Section 1. That an election be held within and throughout the boundaries of the City of Tahoka, Texas, on the second Saturday in March, 1949, the same being the 12th day of March, 1949, such date being not less than fifteen days nor more than thirty days from the date of this ordinance, at which time there shall be submitted to the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of Tahoka, Texas, who own property subject to taxation within said city and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the following propositions, to-wit:

PROPOSITION NUMBER ONE
Shall the City Council of the City of Tahoka, Texas, be authorized to issue the negotiable interest bearing coupon bonds of the City of Tahoka, Texas, in the amount of \$35,000.00, bearing interest at a rate of not exceeding three and three-fourths per centum (3 3/4%) per annum from date and maturing at such time or times as may be deemed most expedient by the City Council, serially, not later than twenty years from their date, for the purpose of improving, extending and altering public streets, avenues, alleys, highways and boulevards by paving, widening, raising, grading, filling, repaving or resurfacing the same or otherwise improving such streets and highways,

and for the purpose of acquiring the necessary rights of way incidental thereto; and shall there be annually assessed, levied and collected upon all taxable property within the City of Tahoka, while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, a tax sufficient in amount to pay the annual interest on such bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity?

PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO
Shall the City Council of the City of Tahoka, Texas, be authorized to issue the interest bearing coupon bonds of the City of Tahoka, Texas, in the amount of \$5,000.00, bearing interest at a rate of not to exceed three and three-fourths per centum (3 3/4%) per annum from date and maturing at such time or times as may be deemed most expedient by the City Council, serially, not later than twenty years from their date, for the purpose of constructing, extending, enlarging, improving and adding to the sewage disposal plant, filtering bed and emptying grounds for the sewage systems, and acquiring land and rights of way within and without the limit of the City of Tahoka, Texas, for such sewage disposal purposes, and extending and installing additional sanitary sewage lines; and shall there be annually assessed, levied and collected upon all taxable property within the City of Tahoka, Texas, while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, a tax sufficient in amount to pay the annual interest on such bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity?

PROPOSITION NUMBER THREE
Shall the City Council of the City of Tahoka, Texas, be authorized to issue the negotiable interest bearing coupon bonds of the City of Tahoka, Texas, in the amount of \$10,000.00, bearing interest at the rate of three and three-fourths per centum (3 3/4%) per annum from date and maturing at such time or times as may be deemed most expedient by the City Council, serially, not later than twenty years from their date, for the purpose of constructing, installing, enlarging, improving, extending and adding to the water supply system of the City of Tahoka, Texas; and shall there be annually assessed, levied and collected upon all taxable property within the City of Tahoka, Texas, while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, a tax sufficient in amount to pay the annual interest on such bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity?

Section 2: Said election shall be held under the provisions of and in strict conformity with the constitution and laws of the State of Texas, including Chapter I, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas.

All persons who are legally qualified resident property tax paying voters of the City of Tahoka, Texas, who own property in said city subject to taxation and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

Section 3: The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following, to-wit:

For the Issuance of the Street Improvement and Paving Bonds and the Levying of Taxes in Payment Thereof.

Against the Issuance of the Street Improvement and Paving Bonds and the Levying of Taxes in Payment Thereof.

For the Issuance of the Sewer Extension Bonds and the Levying of Taxes in Payment Thereof.

Against the Issuance of the Sewer Extension Bonds and the Levying of Taxes in Payment Thereof.

Proposition Number Three
For the Issuance of the Water System Extension Bonds and the Levying of Taxes in Payment Thereof.

Against the Issuance of the Water System Extension Bonds and the Levying of Taxes in Payment Thereof.

As to each of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or pencil one of the expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

Section 4: That said election shall be held at the City Hall Building in Tahoka, Texas, and the City of Tahoka, Texas, shall constitute one election precinct and the presiding judge of said election shall be as follows, namely: E. R. Edwards, presiding judge; and such presiding judge shall make selection of the clerks and other necessary officials to effectively hold said election.

Section 5: That notice of said election shall be given by posting

a substantial copy of this ordinance at the City Hall Building and at the places in the City of Tahoka, Texas, and such notice shall also be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within the City of Tahoka, Texas, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election.

The Mayor and City Secretary shall cause such notices to be prepared and posted and published as above specified, and such officials shall further make due returns of the posting and publishing of such notices to this City Council.

Section 6: Immediately after said election has been held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the City Secretary of the City of Tahoka, Texas, for canvassing by the City Council and shall return the ballot boxes to the City Secretary for safekeeping.

The manner of holding such election and canvassing and making returns thereof shall be governed by the general election laws of the State of Texas, when not in conflict with the provisions of the hereinabove mentioned statutes, and the City Council will furnish the necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite for said election.

Section 7: The fact that it is affirmatively found by the City Council of the City of Tahoka, Texas, that there is urgent need to proceed immediately with the matter of the extension and enlargement of the water and sewer system of said city, as well as repairs and improvement of the streets and alleys of said city, in order to make the same more convenient for the use of the public at large and to preserve and to protect the health and welfare of the citizens of Tahoka, Texas, creates an emergency and public necessity, demanding that the rule requiring the reading of the ordinance on more than one day before final passage be suspended; and such rule is hereby suspended and it is ordained that this ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and adoption.

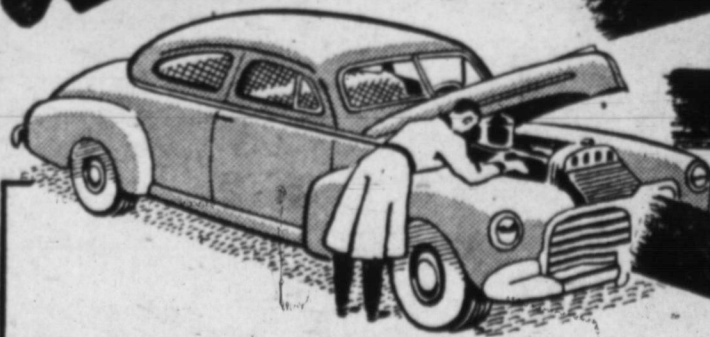

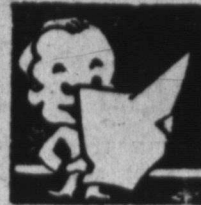

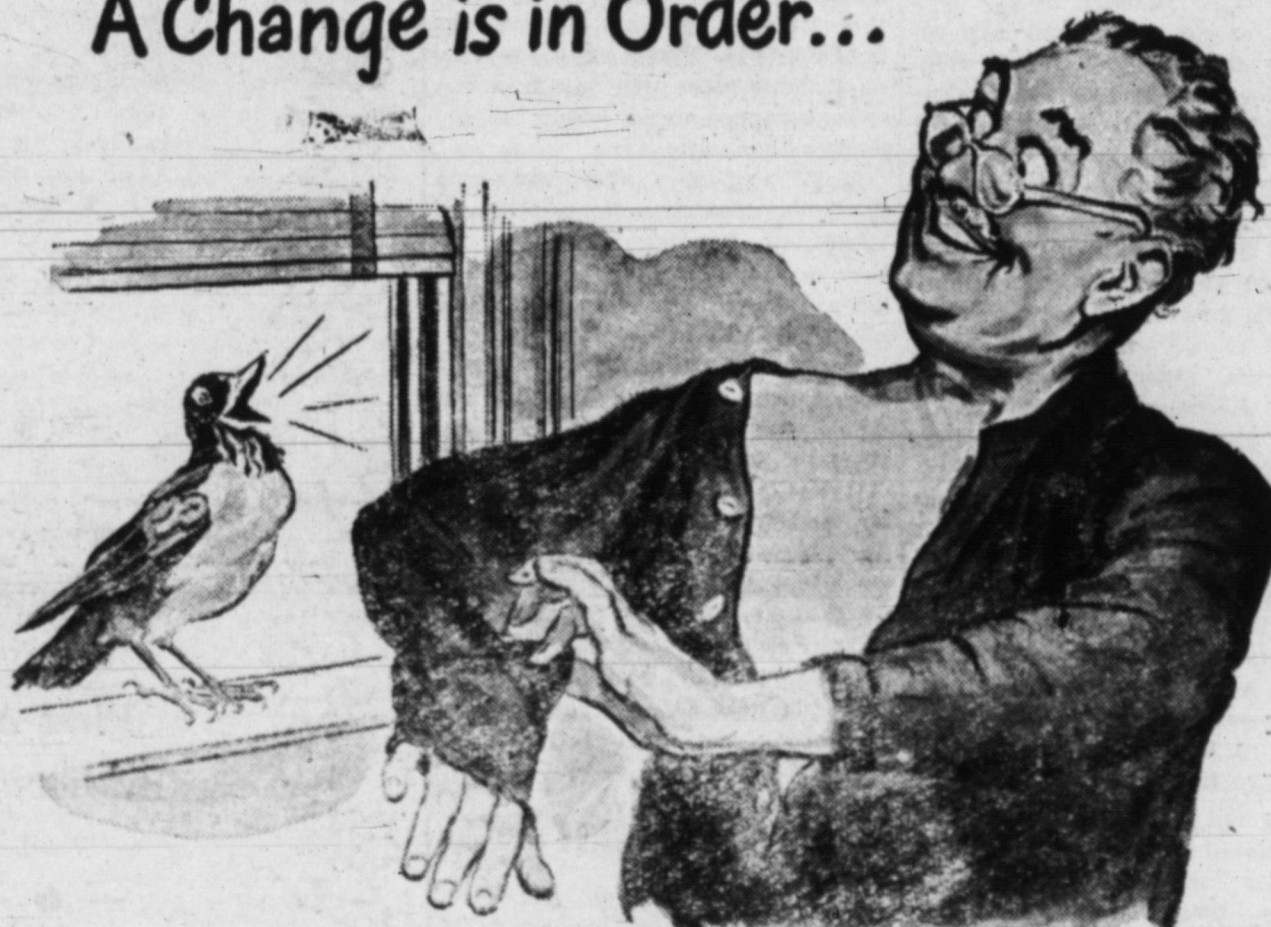

 the Bulldog football and track teams, was on the debating team, and participated in dramatics. He helped establish the high school paper, "The Growl," and was its first editor. After graduating at Tahoka, he attended Texas Tech two years, studying journalism and speech, and was on the staff of The Torreador.

He enlisted in the Navy in May, 1942, as a flying cadet, and received his wings June 19, 1943, at which time he transferred to the Marine Corps. After a year of further training, he left for overseas in July 1944, flying across as co-pilot of his plane. His squadron was stationed on Emirau Island, in the Southwest Pacific.

H. A. died in a plane crash on Sept. 11, 1944 on New Hanover Island. On February 16, 1945, his body was exhumed and returned to Emirau, where he was re-interred with full military honors.

H. A. was one of Tahoka's finest young men, and had a future of much promise, but his life was cut short by the terrible world conflict.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Maassen of Seymour; one sister, Mrs. Hubert D. (Joycelyn) Henry of Littlefield; the paternal grandmother, Mrs. Mary T. Maassen of Dallas; and the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Taylor of near Lamesa, but formerly of Tahoka; and other relatives.
