A HOMESICK WAIL FROM THE PHILIPPINES

With never a letter from the homeland, except now and then from the family, the soldier overseas must get terribly lonely and home-sick at times.

The News has a rule not to publish poetry, so-called or real, but the heart-rending wail of a homesick soldier over in the Philippines, written in verse, has come to us this week, and we are publishing it just to remind our people how probably all of these soldiers feel at times. Their friends should write them occasionally just to break the monotony of their lives and to let them know they are not entirely forgotten.

Pvt. Charles Pennington, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Pennington, who is now with the 518th Medical Service Detachment, recently wrote home and enclosed with his letter the bit of verse appearing below. He enlisted in the Army in March, 1948, was sent overseas in September, and was assigned to the 10th General Hospital in Manila, Philippine Islands. He had gotten his basic training at Fort Ord, California, and was later sent to Fort Sam Houston for his Medical training.

He has charge of the Ear, Eye, Nose, and Throat Clinic at the 10th General Hospital, Manila. "He likes his work swell," his sister, Miss Corinne Pennington says, "but he doesn't advise other fellows to join up, as a guy really gets home-sick." Here is an expression of how he was feeling when he wrote the letter home.

Sanders and their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Sanders of Lineville, Iowa.

Among the visitors were Mr. and Mrs. Bob Sanders and their son Joseph Sanders and family of Lineville Iowa. Bob came in Lynn county in 1901, helped organize Lynn county and assisted in building the first court house, a small frame affair located on the north side of the present square. At the time he came here Tahoka had not been established, and there had been only 11 people in the county the year before, 1900, when the Government census was taken. He left here in 1905 for Iowa, where he has since been engaged in stock farming, married soon afterward, and it had been about twenty years since he had last visited here.

Naturally he noted that great changes had come over this county even since his last visit. There are only a few people still living here now with whom he was acquainted back in the early days of the century, but he especially enjoyed brief visits with Bart Reese and Claud Wells.

The Sanders family had a great time visiting and reminiscing over old times.

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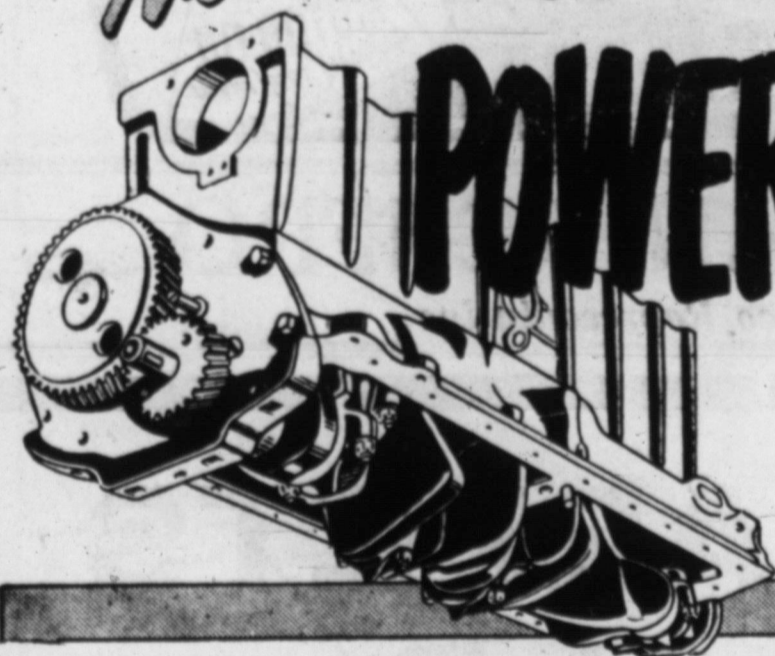

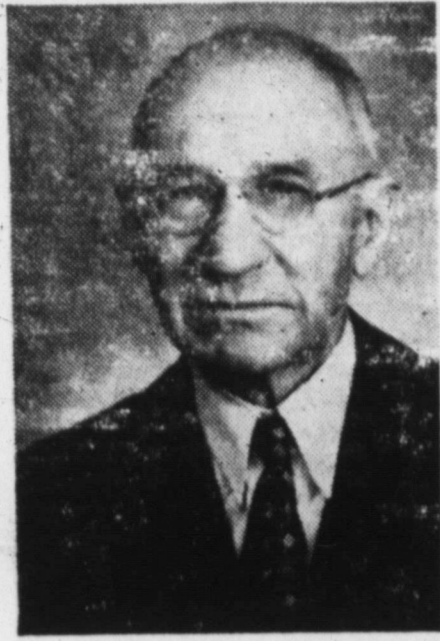

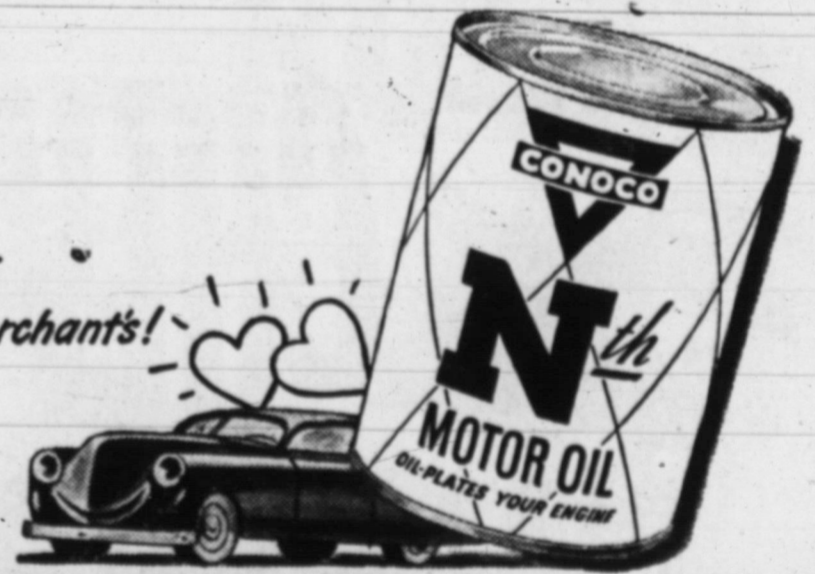

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WAGE INCREASE PROPOSED BENEFIT FOR SMALL MERCHANTS AND FARMERS

Dallas, Tex., March 15.—The proposed increase of the minimum wage to 75-cents an hour under the Wage and Hour Law should be of great benefit to both small merchants and the farmer, although both groups are exempt from the law's requirements, William J. Rogers, Regional Director of the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Division, said in Dallas today. "A man that works a regular 40 hour week at 75-cents an hour will make about \$1500 per year. For the average American family of four, nearly all that money will have to be spent with the small merchant for food and clothes—products which the farmer produces."

Under present price conditions, 75-cents is about equal to 40-cents—the present minimum wage—in 1938 the year the Wage and Hour Law was passed. This will not afford a satisfactory standard of living for the average American family, but it will bring the minimum up to the standard set by Congress eleven years ago.

Food, clothing and rent are the first demands on the income of the worker, Rogers pointed out, and any increase for those now making below the proposed minimum will have to go for these items. This creates a direct increase in the demand for the products of the farm and in these times when foreign markets for the farmers' goods are decreasing, it will benefit farmers to have increased market at home.

While both the farmer and the small merchant are exempt from the minimum wage and overtime requirements of the Act, employees of large establishments—those whose employers have annual sales of over half a million dollars—will receive direct benefits of the Act under the present proposal. Comparatively few merchants are in the group that will be covered by the Act, while all will benefit from business resulting from the increased purchasing power in the hands of workers.



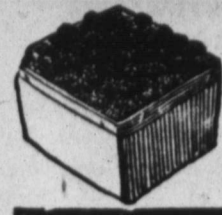

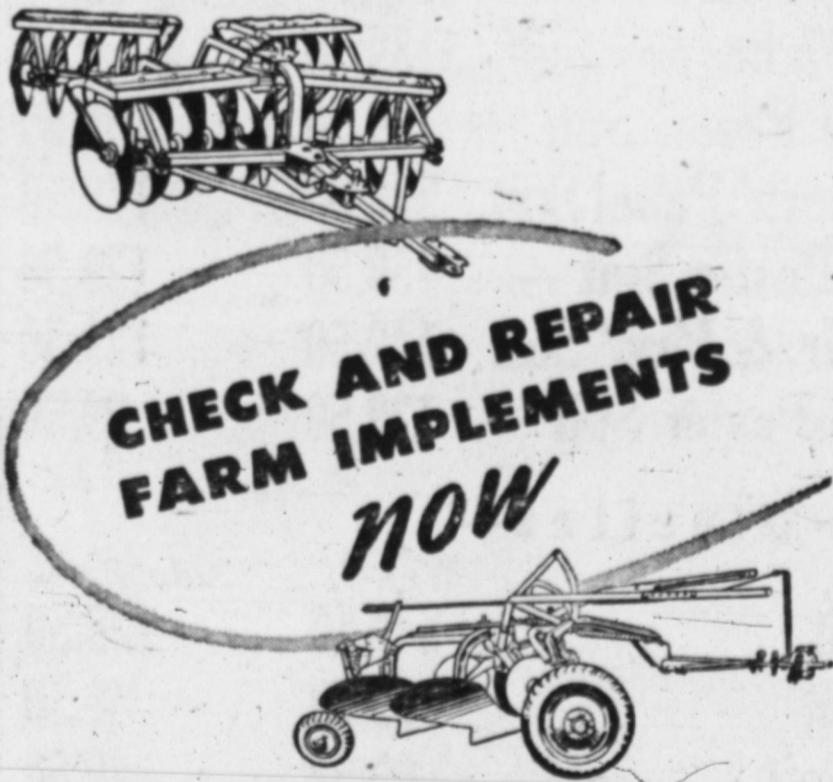

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Fort Worth, March 15.— Farmers cooperating with the 286 operating soil conservation districts in Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and Texas applied major soil conservation practices to 5,235,549 acres in 1948, an increase over the 1947 total of 5,199,170 acres. Last year's work brought the accumulated total of land treated in the four states to 21,854,762 acres.

These figures are given in a report issued today by Louis P. Merrill, regional director of the Soil Conservation Service which furnishes districts with technical help in preparing and applying a coordinated soil conservation program. With headquarters here, Mr. Merrill directs SCS work in the 4-state Western Gulf Region. Districts take in 88 percent of the Region's land area.

The report showed that in 1948, district cooperating farmers applied 3 per cent more conservation per man-year for Soil Conservation Service technical assistance than in 1947. It was the third straight year in which more conservation work was done on the land per SCS technician serving the districts than in the previous year, being 86 per cent more in 1946 than in 1945 and 23 per cent more in 1947 than in 1946.

In reviewing the year's highlights, Mr. Merrill referred to the harvest of almost 28 million pounds of grass and legume seed. Of that total more than four million pounds were in native grass seed, an all-time record, exceeding by more than three million pounds any previous harvest for the whole nation, Mr. Merrill estimated. SCS field technicians and soil conservation district supervisors paved the way for the huge harvest.

Mr. Merrill emphasized the urgent need of the seed in putting grass back on millions of eroded and depleted acres. He pointed out that before the Soil Conservation Service came on the scene, the majority of the region's native grasses had never been harvested for seed, and the other species in last fall's harvest had not been used to produce seed in commercial quantity.

"The nearly 28 million pounds of seed will produce many times that number of plants to help and to hold the soil," Mr. Merrill said. "Last year's seed harvest represents another milestone in conservation progress."

Two other 1948 highlights mentioned were the development of a new grass seed drill and a Bermuda-

grass sprig planter at SCS regional headquarters. Equipped with a fertilizer attachment, the seven-row drill will make it easier and cheaper to plant large areas with the seed of last year's record harvest, he pointed out. The planter will make it possible to sprig Bermudagrass eight or ten times faster than by hand labor.

Texas Moves Ahead

Farmers and ranchers cooperating with the 132 operating soil conservation districts that take in 72 per cent of Texas applied major conservation practices last year to 3,189,978 acres, bringing the accumulated total to 13,141,503 acres.

The cooperating farmers and ranchers improved 1,406,463 acres of rangeland last year.

The residues of crops were used in such a way as to prevent erosion and build up the fertility of the soil on 1,081,281 acres.

Part of a coordinated soil conservation program based on the principle of using the land according to its capabilities and treating it according to its needs, the 1948 work in Texas brought the accumulated totals of these practices to 8,682,649 acres of improved range and 5,758,970 acres of crop residue management at the year end, the report showed.

Other major soil conservation practices applied to Texas farms and ranches last year included:

Contour farming, 658,663 acres; planting cover crops to help control erosion and enrich the soil, 607,276 acres; planting strip crops to help control wind erosion, 17,920 acres; pasture improvement, 218,387 acres; seeding of range, 18,031 acres; seeding of pasture, 128,

Death struck both in the U. S. Senate and in the House of Representatives on the first two days of last week.

On Sunday morning the new Senator from North Carolina, Melville Broughton, who was elected to that body last November and took his seat in January, succumbed to a heart attack. He was to have made his maiden speech in the Senate on Monday or Tuesday. He had been governor of North Carolina and was reputed to be a very able man.

Congressman Sol Bloom, of New York, one of the oldest and ablest men in the Lower house, died unexpectedly Monday night. He would have been 79 on Wednesday of this week, had he lived until that time, and had served in Congress since 1923. He had long been one of the best beloved and most popular members of that body and at the time of his death he was chairman of the powerful Foreign Affairs Committee. Services in this area will be conducted both in the morning and at night. Everybody is cordially invited. Meetings are being held each evening.

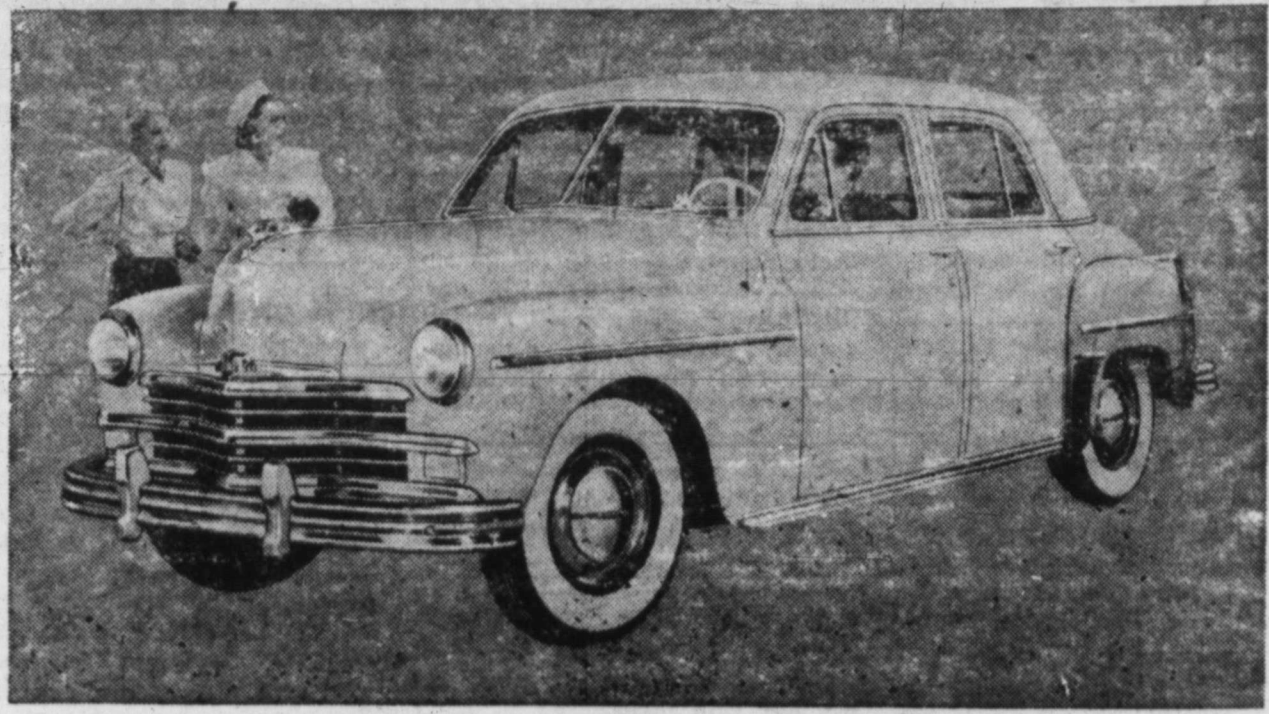
