## John A. Loyd Dies Here

After an illness of about three and a half years, John Anderson Loyd, 79, died at his home here at 3:05 o'clock Thursday afternoon, March 31.

Funeral services were conducted in the First Baptist Church here at 4:00 o'clock Friday afternoon. Rev. C. T. Aly, the pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. C. A. Holcomb Jr., pastor of the Tahoka Methodist Church, and Ernest West, Minister of the Church of Christ. The body was buried in the Tahoka cemetery.

Mr. Loyd suffered a stroke on September 26, 1945, from which he never recovered. He was confined to his bed for about two and a half years before his death.

Survivors include his faithful companion and the following daughters and sons: Mrs. J. O. Allen of the Dixie community in this county; Cecil Loyd of Riveira, Calif.; Lonnie Loyd of S. n Gabriel, and Woodrow Loyd of Spring Garden, in that state; Glen Loyd of Midland, Texas; Beatrice Loyd of Tahoka; Mrs. Carl Hobbs of Lubbock; Mrs. Clyde Ray of Sundown; Mrs. Grady Hobbs of Quemado; and Mrs. Jack Alexander of Morton, Texas; together with 21 grandchildren.

The three sons who live in California had visited here for several days shortly before he died. All of the others were here either at the time he died or at the funeral services.

Numbers of out-of-town relatives and friends were here for the funeral services, among them, Mrs. Dessie Messer and her son L. D. Messer, both of Hedley, Texas; Mrs. Messer being a sister of Mrs. Loyd. Friends present included Bill Francis, Mrs. John Francis, Mrs. John

## G. F. Jones Is Buried Here

G. F. Jones, a resident of Lynn county for fifteen years and almost 90 years of age, died Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock in the home of his grandson, Morell Jones, in Lubbock. The body was prepared for burial and brought to Tahoka by the Stanley Funeral Home of this city, and funeral services were conducted in the Methodist Church here at 3:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon by Rev. C. A. Holcomb Jr., the pastor. Burial followed in the Tahoka cemetery.

Surviving are three sons and a daughter, Merrell Jones of Tahoka, Jess and George Jones of Lubbock, and Mrs. Loretta Neal of Lubbock. Twelve grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren also survive. His wife died on April 13, 1946 and was interred here.

Mr. Jones was born on June 9, 1859, in Senatobia, Tate county, Mississippi, almost two years prior to the outbreak of the Civil War. Senatobia is some 35 miles south of Memphis, Tennessee. He grew up during the Civil War and Reconstruction days—days that tried

## Lt. C. B. King Is Reburied Here

Reburial services for Flight Lieutenant Officer C. B. King, who was killed in action in Wessel, Germany, on May 24, 1945, will be held in the Methodist Church here at 3:00 o'clock this (Friday) afternoon, followed by burial in the Tahoka cemetery. Rev. C. T. Aly will officiate.

The body of Lt. King arrived Thursday. He was in the Airborne service in the European Theatre of operations, being a glider pilot, and was out on his fifth mission. When his plane came to the ground at or near Wessel in Germany he was killed by the enemy.

He is survived by one little daughter, Judy King, his wife having died the next day after Judy was born on June 6, 1943. His cousin, J. W. Lowrey and wife, took the child to raise. Mrs. King was the former Iva June Gary of O'Donnell, and she and Lt. C. B. King were married at O'Donnell in March, 1942.

Surviving also are three brothers, William L. (Bill) King of Littlefield; J. J. (Jack) King of the United States Navy now serving at Shanghai, China, and Karl Kelly King of Perryton, these two being twins; and two sisters, Mrs. Florence King Smith of Albuquerque, New Mexico, and Mrs. Kathleen King Holtwick, a nurse at the Tahoka Hospital, Tahoka.

Another brother, Lt. Lee Edward King, while serving in the Air Transport in India, was killed in a plane crash on March 29, 1944. His body was reburied here a few months ago.

Flight Lt. C. B. King's father, Reuben L. King, died here in March, 1932, and his mother died in August of that year. Both were buried in the Tahoka cemetery.

Lt. King was born at Sanger in Denton county on March 9, 1913. He came to Lynn county with his parents in February, 1917. After he grew up, he was employed for some time by the Galgait Hardware Co. here. He was married and entered the service in the same month, March, 1942.

## Social Security Counsel Given

"Eeny, Meeny, Miny, Moe" is a game children play to determine who is to be "it." The Social Security Administration often experiences difficulty picking the proper account to credit with wages reported on a social security tax return.

When name and number as shown on the social security tax return do not match social security records, it is impossible to determine whether the name is right and the number is wrong, or whether the number is right and the name is wrong.

Your Federal insurance pays monthly benefits to retired workers and their wives at age 65. Monthly insurance benefits are also paid to widows and children of deceased workers who are insured at the time of their death.

The size of benefits depends upon the amount of wages credited to the individual account of the worker involved. Wages reported without an account number or with an incorrect account number, often cannot be credited to the proper account; therefore, the rate of benefits paid would be less than the amount bought and paid for.

## Election Results Are Announced

In the City election last Tuesday, Dr. K. R. Durham was re-elected mayor over Dr. W. A. Schaal by a majority of more than two to one, his vote being 259, Schaal's 115.

In the contests for City Alderman, B. L. Parker, J. A. Biggerstaff, and W. B. "Bill" Strange Jr. were the winners, but each of the other candidates received a creditable vote.

There were six candidates for the three places, and 25 voters wrote in the name of Garland Pennington who was not a candidate, for a place on the council.

"Bill" Strange led the ticket with 234 votes, J. A. Biggerstaff ran second with 213 votes, and B. L. Parker bagged an even 200, barely losing out A. R. Milliken, who received 196. William H. Wood checked up 168 votes and Ed Hamilton 180.

A total of more than 400 votes were cast.

Holdover members of the city council are Clay Bennett and Ivan Cathcart. The New Council is made up as follows: Dr. K. R. Durham, Mayor; Ivan Cathcart, Clay Bennett, B. L. Parker, W. H. Strange, and J. A. Biggerstaff, aldermen.

At a meeting of the council one night last week, the old Council appointed Allie White as chief of police.

## Mrs. Tunnell's Mother Dies

Mrs. Lenore M. Tunnell and family were terribly shocked last Sunday morning at about 8:00 o'clock when she went to awake her mother, Mrs. John C. Schultz, who was staying in her home, and found her dead in bed. Mrs. Schultz, well known to have been alive an hour earlier and it is believed that death came at about 7:30 o'clock.

Mrs. Schultz had become seriously ill about two months earlier, and after undergoing treatment for a month in a hospital in Galveston, where she then lived, Mrs. Tunnell went down to that city and brought her mother back home with her. She had been here in Mrs. Tunnell's home for about a month.

Mrs. Schultz had long suffered from high blood pressure. It was known that her condition was serious but the sudden death was unexpected.

The body was prepared for burial here and on Sunday afternoon and night was taken in an ambulance of the Stanley Funeral Home to Gonzales for burial on Monday. Mrs. Tunnell and her two daughters, Mrs. Charles Stewart and Savannah Tunnell, were taken in a car driven by Ed Singleton of O'Donnell to Gonzales, Mr. Stewart going in the ambulance.

Funeral services were conducted in the Seydler Funeral Chapel in Gonzales at 2:00 o'clock Monday afternoon, followed by burial in the I. O. O. F. Memorial cemetery in that city. The Tahoka funeral party arrived back home Tuesday morning.

Mrs. Schultz was born in Luling on August 22, 1883, and was therefore 65 years old at the time of her death. She was reared principally in Gonzales, however, and about twenty years ago moved to Galveston, where she had lived since.

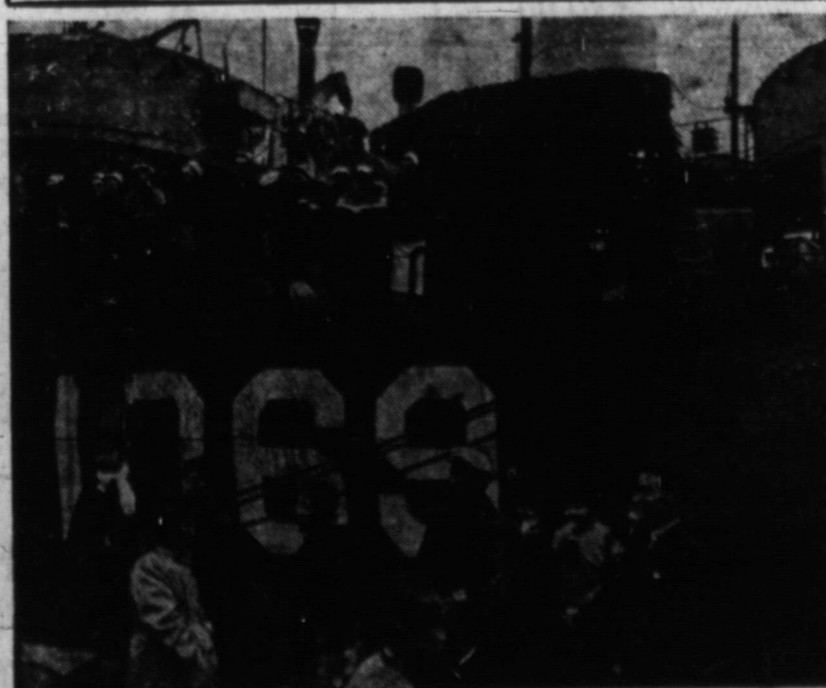
She had visited in Tahoka and had a number of acquaintances and friends here, who also were shocked and grieved to learn of her unexpected decease.

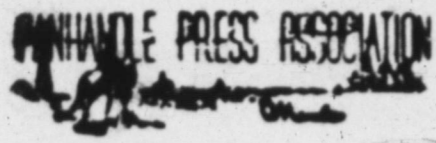

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Although the British people retired Winston Churchill a year or so after the close of World War II, he still shines as a world figure. People in this country and in many other countries still admire him for his wisdom and his powers of leadership. Every time he speaks his words are heard round the world. He spoke at the Boston School of Technology last week and almost every sentence brought cheers from the crowd. One of the striking things he said was that he knew it to be a fact that Russia would have already brought continental Europe under her control and would be bombing England today had it not been for her fear of our atomic bomb. He declared that the thirteen men in the Kremlin aspired to rule the world. Churchill's mere declaration is sufficient to satisfy most of light and power. Think of Lubbock, truth of it is sustained and thoroughly corroborated by Rus-

sia's entire course since the close of the war. By her conduct she has convinced the world that her dictators have the same wicked ambition that Hitler and his co-conspirators had in bringing on the last war. We hope and pray that it may never become necessary for the United States again to use the atomic bomb, but if Russian dictators ever become convinced that they can win a third world war, that very day they will strike and strike hard at Uncle Sam. We must if possible keep the secret of the atomic bomb and develop it to the highest power possible to defend ourselves and the world against the hell-born ambitions of any and every dictator that strikes to rule the world. We must put our trust in God and then do our best.

We think that it is high time that members of mobs in the South be punished, and that effectively. Just about the time we reach the conclusion that mob violence has become a thing of the past, news of a new outbreak comes, the latest one being from a north Georgia county where a mob is alleged to have "flogged" seven Negroes. A sheriff says that the mob took the Negroes away from him and ordered him to leave, which, presumably, he did. A great way for a sheriff to protect his prisoners against mob violence. If the sheriff made no greater effort to protect his prisoners, than appears on the surface, he ought to be kicked out of office for failure to do his duty and otherwise be punished. Georgia and other Southern states should enact laws providing that such conduct on the part of peace officers works a forfeiture of their offices. We have no sympathy for the confirmed criminal, white or black, but when a mob, with or without the connivance of peace officers, undertakes to supplant the courts in administering punishment, they strike a blow not only at the courts but also at the entire South. Mob violence in the South must be suppressed. If it is not suppressed, then we have no further reason or excuse to oppose a federal law against this character of crime.

The dictators of Russia have steadfastly refused to cooperate with the representatives of other nations in seeking to bring about permanent peace in the world and now they are considerably wrought up

because the United States, Great Britain, and the other nations of Western Europe are signing an alliance agreement to help one another in case any of their number is attacked by Russia. If the Russians have no aggressive intentions, why are they disturbed by a mere defensive alliance?

London went wild when they turned the bright lights on a few nights ago for the first time in ten years, according to press reports. We guess so. The black-out was started ten years ago when old Hitler began bombing the lights out of the old town. After the war, London refrained from turning on the bright lights in order to conserve electric us as to its trustworthiness, but the or Dallas, or New York in semi-darkness for ten long years. Of course those English do not want any more war.

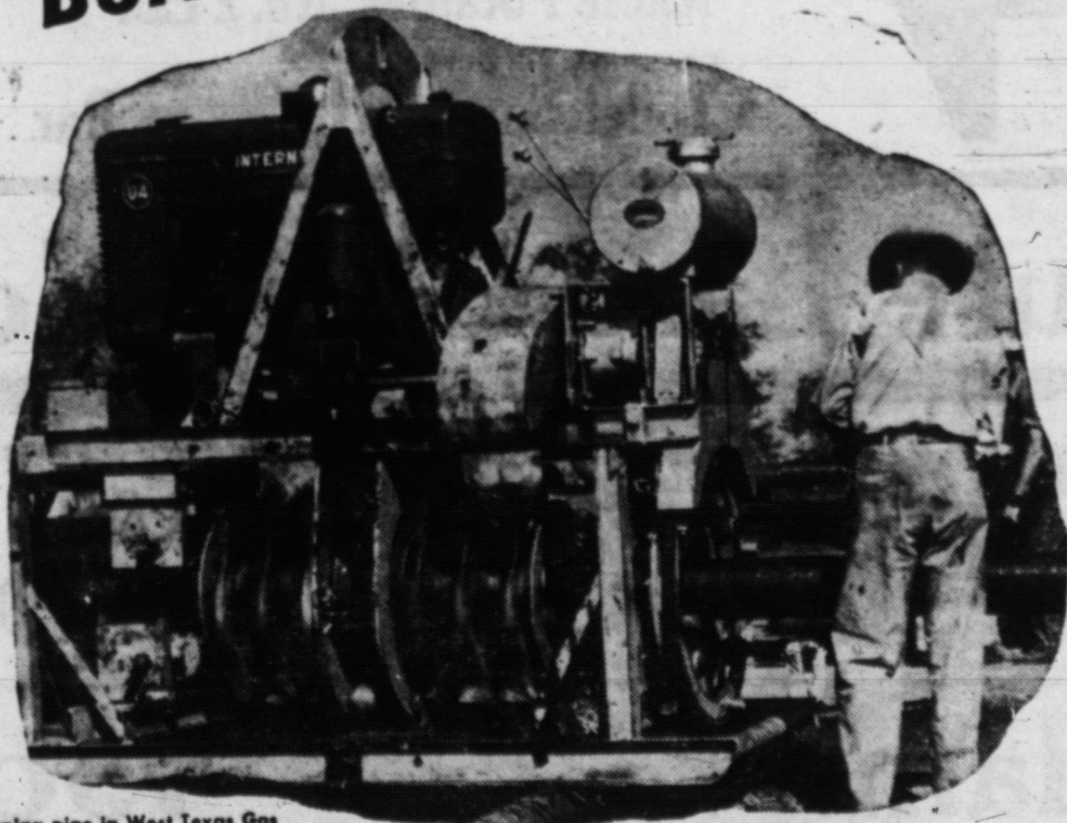

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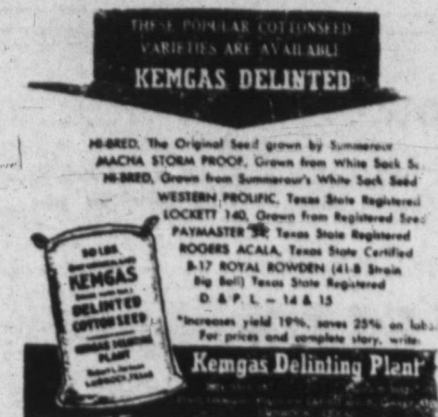

**Oceans Becoming Saltier; Blame is Placed on Rivers**

Is the ocean getting saltier? Yes, it is, say oceanographers, whose business it is to study such things as how salty is salt water, and why.

The open Atlantic ocean anywhere a few miles off the United States coast beyond range of dilution by the many rivers, averages about 3.6 per cent salt—a shade more than the average for all oceans. So uniform are ocean waters over most of the globe that only in a few places does their salt drop below 3.3 per cent or rise above 3.8 per cent, says the National Geographic society.

Millions of years ago, as scientists reckon, ocean and river water were probably much the same. Even purest river water, however, carries a tiny per cent of salts acquired in draining the earth's crust. Salts also reach the oceans by way of undersea springs.

Once in the ocean, the salts stay behind, while the sun carries on its work of evaporation which lifts pure water back onto the continents. Thus the oceans grow imperceptibly saltier due largely to the sweet rivers which dilute ocean saltiness along the continent shores.

Saltiest of all ocean areas is the Red Sea. There are no rivers to produce even inshore dilution and the hot sun speeds evaporation, so the salt content surpasses 4 cent.

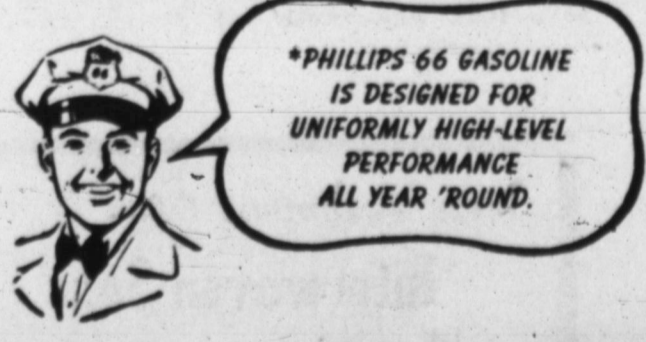

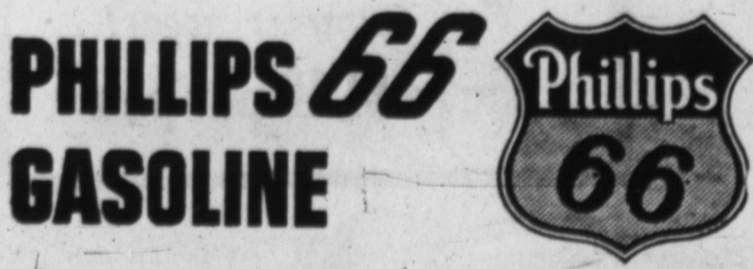

### STUDENT COUNCIL TO SPONSOR PRESENTATION OF PASSION PLAY

Once in a lifetime are you privileged to see such a memorable motion picture as "The Life of Christ", greatest of all Passion Plays, which will be presented in Tahoka at the High School auditorium, Friday, April 8, at 7:00 p. m. Sponsorship of the Student Council of the Tahoka High School.

Listed as one of the ten greatest motion pictures of all time, "The Life of Christ" has a most interesting history inasmuch as it was produced entirely by the world famous Oberammergau Players. The story of its inception goes back several hundred years.

In 1623 the little Bavarian village of Oberammergau was visited by a terrible plague which caused the death of hundreds of the inhabitants. The people of the little village prayed that God would lift this terrible affliction from them, and their prayers were answered. On cessation of the plague, the entire population of the village vowed to perform the Passion Play, or the story of Christ, every tenth year out of gratitude to God for His deliverance... a vow which since has been faithfully observed.

Before Hitler's rise to power in Germany, the famous Oberammergau Players toured the world presenting their now equally famous Passion Play, and before the Nazis forced the end of the presentations they produced this motion picture.

"The Life of Christ" was produced in Egypt and the Holy Land at the tremendous cost of nearly 3 million dollars. The money for the projects having been earned by the world tour... the players taking no salaries for themselves except necessary living expenses while away from home.

The players were selected for

their righteous lives, and the impersonator of Christ considered his role a divine calling, handed down from father to son for generations.

What happened to the cast during and after the war can only be imagined, but the original negative of the picture was brought to this country before it could be destroyed by the Nazis, and was edited, synchronized with and especially written musical score, and supplied with subtitles and commentary in English.

The picture is entirely non-sectarian, and is in no way sponsored by any particular church, sect or religious group, but is endorsed by all denominations as the most complete pictorial history of the life and works of the Savior.

This outstanding attraction is brought to Tahoka under the sponsorship of the Student Council, and through the cooperation of the local churches.

Tickets are now on sale and may be purchased from members of the Student Council. Admission will be 52c for adults, and 25c for students and children.

A good-sized congregation heard one of the finest musical treats that has been offered to Tahoka in recent years on last Saturday night when the A'Capella Choir of Howard Payne College rendered a program of Sacred music in the First Baptist Church here.

The choir consists of about 40 members and is directed by Woodrow Wall of the Music faculty of Howard Payne.

One of the members of the choir is Miss Doris Roberts of Tahoka, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Roberts and now a student in Howard Payne, and another member is Miss Betty Montgomery, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Montgomery who formerly lived at Draw but moved to Eloy, Arizona, about two years ago. Many friends here were happy to greet again these two fine Tahoka girls.

Conductor Wall had his choir perfectly trained, in so far as a mere layman could tell, and all the voices surely were among the finest. The program consisted of classi-

cal sacred music and Negro spirituals. Among the latter were such numbers as Swing Low, Sweet Chariot, King Jesus Is A' Listenin', Little David, Play On Yo' Harp, De Battle ob Jericho, There Is a Balm in Gilead, and Ezekiel Saw De Wheel.

W. W. Caswell is out at Hot Springs, New Mexico, for a few weeks, testing the merits of the hot baths.

E. N. Tomlinson, employee at the courthouse, went to Lubbock Monday for an inspection of his left eye, from which a cataract was removed two weeks theretofore in the West Texas Hospital. The surgeon who performed the operation found that it had been entirely successful and assured Mr. Tomlinson that the sight would soon be perfectly good again.

### RECEIVING BENEFITS TEXAS CHILDREN

Austin, Texas, Apr. 5.— Almost four thousand Texas children from more than 225 counties have received beneficial services and aid to Crippled Children's Division administered by the State Department, during the calendar year 1948. This information is shown by the annual report issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

According to Dr. Cox, the most commonly treated conditions are late effects of acute poliomyelitis, cerebral palsy, osteomyelitis, tuberculosis of joints, cleft palate, hare lip, and clubfeet. Although the services are provided for children from birth to 21 years, the largest group treated were from the age bracket of 5 to 14 years.

The help given these crippled children represents 3,747 clinic visits, 43,433 days of hospital care, 2,897 days of convalescent home care, and 4,986 doctor's visits.

"As long as sufficient State funds are available, any crippled Texas child of normal mentality, under twenty-one years of age, whose parents or guardians are unable to pay for proper care, is entitled to the help of the Crippled Children's Division," Dr. Cox said. "If his doctor believes that it is reasonable to expect that the child can be im-

proved through hospitalization, medical or surgical care, artificial appliances, or through a combination of these services."

Parents of crippled children should make application for this assistance by completing application forms, which should be signed by the physician and approved by the County Judge. The application is then mailed to the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, Texas.


