Lt. C. B. King Is **Reburied Here**

Reburial services for Flight Lieu_ tenant Officer C. B. King, who was killed in action in Wessel, Germany, on May 24, 1945, will be held in the Methodist Church here at 3:00 o'clock this (Friday) afternoon, followed by burial in the Tahoka cemetery. Rev. C. T. Aly will officiate.

The body of Lt. King arrived Thursday. He was in the Airborne service in the European Theatre of operations, being a glidder pilot, and was out on his fifth mission. When his plane came to the ground at or near Wessel in Germany he


There were six candidates for the three places, and 25 voters wrote in the name of Garland Pennington who was not a candidate, for place on the council.



turn When name and number as shown on the social security tax return do not match social security records, it is impossible to determine whether the name is right and the number is wrong, or whether the number

is right and the name is wrong. Your Federal insurance pays monthly benefits to retired workers and their wives at age 65. Monthly insurance benefits are also paid to widows and children of deceased workers who are insured at the time of their death.

The size of benefits depends upon the amount of wages credited to the individual account of the worker involved. Wages reported without an account number or with an ircorrect account number, often cannot be credited to the proper ac. count; therefore, the rate of benefits paid would be less than the amount bought and paid for.

RECEIVING BENEFITS TEXAS CHILDREN

Austin, Texas, Apr. 5.- Almost four thousand Texas children from more than 225 counties have received beneficial services and aid to Crippled Children's Division ad_ ministered by the State Department, during the calendar year 1948. This isformation is shown by the annual report issued by ¹Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

According to Dr. Cox, the most commonly treated conditions are late effects of acute poliomyelitis, cerebral palsy, osteomyelitis, tuberculosis of joints, cleft palate, hare, lip, and clubfeet. Although the services are provided for children from birth to 21 years, the largest group treated were from the age bracket of 5 to 14 years.

The help given these crippled children represents 3,747 clinic visits, 43,433 days of hospital care, 2.897 days of convalescent home care, and 4,986 doctor's visits.

"As long as sufficient State funds are available, any crippled Texas child of normal mentality, under twenty-one years of age, whose parents or guardians are unable to pay for proper care, is entitled to the help of the Crippled Children's Division," Dr. Cox said, "if his doctor believes that it is reasonable

proved through hospitalization, medical or surgical care, artificial appliances, or through a combination of these services."

Parents of crippled children should make application for this assistance by completing application forms, which should be signed by the physician and approved by the County Judge. The application is then mailed to the Crippled Child ren's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, Texas.
