Play Program Will Get Under Way Next Week

The summer recreation program for the youth of Tahoka and surrounding territory will get under way on Monday with Coach Jake Jacobs of the local schools as director, according to Eldon Carroll, Alton Cain, and Clint Walker, who were recently appointed by Tahoka Forum to supervise the program.

The program is designed to give boys and girls directed play activities during the summer months, and parents are urged to cooperate by encouraging their children to participate in the directed play. There are many benefits to be derived from the program, not the least of which is the opportunity afforded children to learn to get along with their fellows.

Coach Jacobs announces that the program will be carried on five days a week, and it is hoped that a social meeting with moving pictures and other entertainment may be held one night each week.

All boys and girls of school age may participate in the activities in the City Park from 9 to 11 a. m. each week-day, Monday through Friday. There will be games of ping pong, volleyball, basketball, etc. as well as other activities.

Afternoons will be devoted entirely to boys. From 2 to 4 p. m. there will be softball and baseball instruction and play for boys at the new Jaycee Park in South Tahoka. Then, from 4 until 6 p. m., Coach Jacobs will coach the American Legion baseball program which was started last summer.

All boys 17 or under who wish to participate in the Legion Junior baseball are asked to attend a meeting in the A. A. office tonight, Friday, at 8:00 o'clock.

Participation in the Summer Recreation program is absolutely free. The program is being financed by the Legion, the Chamber of Commerce, Jaycees, Rotary, Lions, Red Cross, and possibly other organizations.

New Discovery In Borden County

A test was made Wednesday of the Sterling C. Williams No. 1 Sinclair oil well, located in northwest Borden county, which indicated a production of 40 barrels per hour, according to Charles Nelms and J. E. Nance, who were present when the test was made. The well opens a new oil pool.

The test was made at the 10,000 foot bottom, one made a few days previously having been made at a depth of 9,928. It is believed that the oil is from the Pennsylvania and also possibly the top of the Ellenburger.

Nance owns a 480 acre farm about four miles north of the discovery. C. O. Carkner of Tahoka owns two sections of land a mile and a half east of the well.

Mr. Nance visited The News office Thursday morning and displayed several pictures he had taken the day before of the flowing well.

The well is about 12 or 15 miles south of Draw, is about equal distant from Tahoka and Lamesa but somewhere nearer to O'Donnell.

The Lindley test one mile north-east of O'Donnell is reported drilling at about 10,200 feet. The test is being drilled by Sinclair.

The Barnsdall Billie Williams No. 1 about seven miles southwest of Tahoka is reported drilling near 6,000 feet.

Neighbors Plant J. D. Carter Farm

Twenty four-row tractors, driven by neighboring farmers and farm hands on Wednesday of last week planted most of the farm of J. D. Carter, New Lynn. Only about two hours were required to seed 240 acres to cotton and grain sorghum.

Mr. Carter suffered a severe heart attack about five weeks ago and, though improving gradually, he is still confined to his bed.

Naturally, the Carters greatly appreciated the kindness of their neighbors.

Make Improvement In School Plant

Vernon Brewer, Superintendent of the Tahoka public schools, states to the News that considerable repair work is being done on the Tahoka school property during the summer vacation.

Interior of the High School and Grade School buildings are being renovated, and redecorated. All walls will be repainted and the woodwork varnished, desks sanded and varnished, and floors sanded and a seal-coat applied.

A requisition has been sent the State Board of Control for three new school buses.

Sod on the football field is being plowed up, the field given a slight "turtle-back", and will be reseeded. The Soil Conservation Service has aided the project by surveying the field and giving other help. A leveling machine is being used to re-shape the grounds. Alton Cain, of the School Board's building and grounds committee, is in charge of the work.

The deceased served for 30 years in the Army and the Marine Corps, and retired at the end of the war. He had been in a Navy Hospital for some time receiving treatment. He is survived by his wife, three sons and two daughters.

Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Conwill did not attend the funeral services since they had only recently been at his bedside for several days.

Coach Jim Foust of the High School faculty is in Austin this week attending a special school of instruction in driving motor vehicles. He will likely teach such a course in the schools here next year as recently authorized by the State Board.

More Paving Due In Lynn County

Learning that the State Highway Commission has tentatively approved the construction of about five and one-half miles of farm-to-market roads in commissioners' precinct 4, beginning at the end of the paving on the Dixie-Petty road and extending west 2 1/2 miles to the southeast corner of the Elton George farm and thence north three miles to New Home, more than twenty farmers of the Petty community came before the commissioners' court Wednesday morning asking that the court induce the State Highway Commission to make a change in the log of the road, if possible.

The farmers of the Petty community desire that the paving be extended on west to the Petty Store or as near it as the available funds will build the road. Instead of turning at the Elton George corner and building north into New Home.

They point out that the road from the George corner on west to Petty is in very bad condition most.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL CONTINUES TO GROW

Vacation Bible School at the First Baptist Church started off last Saturday on Preparation Day with a big parade led by the City Fire Truck. A number of cars were decorated with red, white and blue streamers and carrying posters announcing the Vacation Bible School. There were 117 faculty and students registered for the school. Following the parade down through town everyone assembled at the roadside park north of the City where ice-cold lemonade and cookies were served by the women of the church. All previous records of enrollment in Vacation Bible School have been broken and attendance records likewise have been exceeded. The first

three days of the school found 226 enrolled, with an average attendance of 225. To be enrolled an individual must come two days. It is expected that the enrollment of the school will climb much higher before he end comes, June 10th.

Some very attractive handwork is being made in the Junior and Intermediate Departments, and some interesting things will be on display the night of Commencement from the Beginner and Primary Departments.

The faculty, composed of approximately 50 adults, are faithfully giving themselves to every detail of the Vacation Bible School, determined that every child shall be benefited at the maximum during these ten days.

The commencement services Friday night, June 10th, at 8:00 o'clock, will be open to the entire public, at which time the work of these students will be displayed. A large attendance is expected at this service.





GRASSHOPPERS ARE BEGINNING TO WORK ON THE COTTON

Grasshoppers are beginning to move out of pastures and turn-rows into cotton fields. In some cases the infestation is very heavy and some damage has been done in those fields.

U. S. Government poison bait is available to farmers at a mixing station set up at the old Red Cross building east of the courthouse.

Two new insecticides that are more effective than poison bait are available in Tahoka. These new poisons are applied as a dust and can be dusted in pastures and on fence rows without any fear of harming live stock. They are applied at the rate of 15 pounds per acre.

These new insecticides kill by contact or as a stomach poison if eaten by hoppers.

Check every field that lies adjoining to idle land or pasture land.

Sister-in-Law Of Local Lady Is Killed In Accident

Mrs. Edith Galloway of Welch, 42, sister-in-law of Mrs. Jim Burleson of Tahoka, died at about 10:00 o'clock Tuesday night in a Lamesa hospital from injuries sustained at about 6:30 in the afternoon when the car which she was driving was in collision with a truck driven by a Sweetwater man on the Lamesa-Brownfield highway at Welch.

Funeral services for Mrs. Galloway will be held at 2:00 p. m. Friday in the First Methodist Church in Lamesa, with Rev. Sam Thomas, the pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. J. A. Martin, Methodist pastor at Welch.

Mrs. Galloway's 12-year-old daughter, Bessie Jean, who was in the car with her at the time of the collision, was also seriously hurt but seems to be recovering from her injuries in a Lamesa hospital. She sustained the fracture of a thigh, the fracture of an ankle, head injuries, and multiple bruises and lacerations.

The collision is said to have occurred when Mrs. Galloway, who was driving north on the Lamesa-Brownfield highway, attempted to turn west onto the Welch cut-off. The Sweetwater truck, driven by Charles R. Berry of the Pace Packing Company, was coming south on the Lamesa-Brownfield highway. After striking the car of Mrs. Galloway it left the pavement and turned over nearly 300 yards south of the place of the collision, a Texas highway patrolman reported. The truck was not badly damaged but Mrs. Galloway's car was virtually demolished.

Mrs. Galloway and the daughter were taken to the Lamesa hospital soon after the crash.

Mrs. Galloway's husband, Bryan Galloway, who was a brother of Mrs. Jim Burleson, died about two years ago.

Survivors include another daughter, Golda Ruth Galloway; a son, Willard, 20; her mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Laney Grice of Lamesa; two brothers, and numerous other relatives.

Mrs. Galloway, who lived about 3 miles west of Welch, was employed as operator of the Welch school cafeteria. Her daughter, Bessie Jean, was a sixth-grade pupil in the school.





FIVE POLIO PRECAUTIONS FOR PARENTS

Warning that the 1949 polio season is "just around the corner," the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has issued a list of precautionary measures that should be observed by those in charge of children during the epidemic danger period, which usually runs from May through October, reaching its peak during the hot mid-summer months.

The five easy-to-follow rules for children are:

1. Avoid crowds and places where close contact with other persons is likely.
2. Avoid over-fatigue caused by too active play or exercise, or irregular hours.
3. Avoid swimming in polluted water. Use only beaches or public pools declared safe by local health authorities.
4. Avoid sudden chilling. Remove wet shoes and clothing at once and keep extra blankets and heavier clothing handy for sudden weather changes.
5. Observe the golden rule of personal cleanliness. Keep food tightly covered and safe from flies or other insects. Garbage should be tightly covered and, if other disposal facilities are lacking should be buried or burned.

of the time and is nearly impassable much of the time. Rather than to undertake to travel over it, most of the people living at or near Petty prefer to go north to the New Home-Lakeview road, follow it east to the Wayside Service Station, a distance of nine or ten miles thence come eleven miles down the Lubbock-Tahoka highway to the county seat. A paved road from Petty due east to the Cross Roads Service Station would shorten the distance from Petty to Tahoka by six miles. So, they are solidly for a change in the routing of the paving to be done in that precinct.

Judge Tom Garrard and other members of the commissioners' court explained to the petitioners that this is a state paving project and that any new paving that it does must connect up somewhere with its present system of paved highways or farm-to-market roads. The 3½ miles of paving on the Cross Roads-Dixie-Petty road is not in the state system. It was done by Lynn county and is being maintained by the county. A mere extension of that paving west to Petty would not connect up anywhere with the State system. Therefore, the State is proposing to make its extension out from New Home, where there is a State constructed and State-maintained farm-to-market highway.

The State Highway Commission. It is further explained, has agreed to allocate to Lynn county a sufficient portion of the \$15,000,000 recently provided by the legislature to pave about eight miles of road in this county. Three and a half miles are to be paved from Newmoore in the southwest corner of Lynn county west to the Terry county line to connect up with the Lamesa-Brownfield highway, and that leaves about five miles for the New Home project.

The Petty folks are insistent that the Cross Roads-Dixie-Petty public road should be included in the State system, and they argue that the five or five and a half miles

of new construction should be placed on this road now even if the State is thereby compelled to cut down its allowance for future construction by a few miles in this county.

They point out that they have been paying taxes and will continue to pay taxes on the \$800,000 bond issue that was voted several years ago to build a county system of farm-to-market roads and that nevertheless they have been so situated as to get very little direct benefit from this system. This is their reason for their insistence that the county commissioners' court shall now use its best efforts to get a farm-to-market road built into their community that will be of real and immediate service to them.

Is Texas Being Robbed Of Gas?

The question contained in the above headline is suggested by a communication received Sunday by The News from Representative W. R. Chambers of May, Brown county, who represents the 125th district composed of Brown and Coleman counties in the Texas legislature.

The matter discussed briefly by him seems to us to be so important that we pass it on to our readers for their information and perusal. Here it is:

In the newspapers of Thursday, May 19, there appeared a story stating that the Coastal Pipeline Company was going to file an application before the Federal Power Commission to build a 30-inch pipeline 1,000 miles long from Texas to Virginia. The same story mentioned the Piedmont Pipeline Co. that also is applying for a certificate to build a big-inch pipeline to North Carolina.

Texas may be sure that both of them will be built, as the Texas Railroad Commission never opposes these applications. A few weeks earlier I noticed that the Gulf Coast Northern Pipeline Company was going to build the biggest big-inch, a 34-inch line to Chicago. Last month the Federal Power Commission granted permits to the Texas Gas Transmission Company to build a 26-inch pipeline to the North-East, and another to the Trunkline Gas Company to build a line of the same size to Iowa.

The Tennessee Gas Transmission Company is going to double its capacity and increase its take to more than a billion feet a day, and so is the Texas Eastern Gas Transmission Company and the El Paso Natural Gas Company.

The Transcontinental, not yet complete, is planning to increase its capacity by a couple of hundred million feet per day.

The total capacity of these new lines and of the increase in existing systems will be nearly four billion feet a day.

The gas that goes to the new pipelines will come from wells and fields 'dedicated' to them by contract, and they 'dedicate' enough gas to last the pipeline for at least 20 years.

There is great significance to Texas in the dedication of our state's gas reserves. Recently, in the

Supreme Court, in the oral argument of the Federal Power Commission Vs. Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Co., the question came up as to who would get gas, which in this case was Kansas gas, when there wasn't enough for both Kansas and the out-of-state users. The answer was that the gas 'dedicated' to the interstate pipeline, being in interstate commerce, would get preference. This caused Mr. Justice Jackson to observe that the gas producing state might be worse off than the state which gets its gas from a distant state whose reservoirs are dedicated to the interstate pipelines.

Many may ponder the soundness of the law and the wisdom of the authors of the Tenth Amendment. There is little doubt as to who will get the last gas from Texas. It will be the pipelines that were permitted to secure the dedication while we sat idly by.

Texas industries will be burning wood while people in Philadelphia and Detroit are frying eggs or warming their feet with Texas gas. The problem is serious, but it can be solved. The Senate of Tex-

as has before it a resolution, HCR-18, that I introduced, directing the Texas Railroad Commission to appear before the Federal Power Commission and oppose the granting of these permits. If this resolution is passed, we can expect to see these permits denied instead of approved, and we can look forward to Texas future with less fear of dying cities and decaying industries.

If this Resolution is not adopted this session, we may expect to become an industrial wilderness. For when we have to buy our gas from the coal-produced gas of Pennsylvania, we won't be able to compete with industry in the coal-rich states of the North-East.

If enough people will write asking their Senators to support the House Concurrent Resolution No. 18, it will pass at this session, which will conclude its labors in a week or two.



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CIVILIZATION'S NO. 1 ENEMY
The writer of an article in a recently published piece of religious literature calls attention to the fact that practically everybody in Europe drinks regularly either wine or beer or other intoxicating beverages with their meals and on social occasions in their homes with all the members of the family participating. It is a custom, he says, which is universally observed and seems to have become a requirement of social etiquette. Necessarily, this frequent and habitual use of these beverages produces some degree of intoxication, slight on the part of some and heavier on the part of others, and keeps the minds of the people somewhat beclouded much of the time.

Is it any wonder that the nations of Europe have been unable to get along together? Is it any wonder that morals in many of the European countries have sunk to a low level? Is it any wonder that the leaders of the nations can scarcely ever agree on anything, when they come to the peace tables frequently under the influence of intoxicating liquor?

It is little better in this country, you may observe. That is largely true, because we in this country have again gone onto a drinking spree. Both men and women in some circles seem to regard it as smart to drink. But woe to America when it falls to as low an ebb morally and spiritually as the people have fallen in most of the European countries. We are foolish when we fail to recognize that liquor is enemy No. 1 to civilization itself.

As many of our readers as have time to do so should write Representative Preston E. Smith of Lubbock and Senator Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock, who are getting their mail now in Austin, and ask them how they stand on the resolution introduced by Representative W. R. Chambers of Brownwood, respecting the building of pipe-lines from Texas to the North and East for the piping of our natural gas to those sections of the country virtually tax-free, and ask them to give their reasons for the stand they may take. We feel confident that both of them are opposed to this policy. Also, we hope that the people of

Texas will require all candidates for governor, for lieutenant-governor, for railroad commissioner, for attorney-general, for Representative and for Senator, in the legislature next year to declare their respective positions on this matter and on the general matter of the taxation of our natural resources, clearly and unequivocally, when they announce or proceed to run for office. In our opinion this matter greatly outweighs in importance their stand on the question as to who really and rightfully owns the tideland oil along our shores, Texas or the Federal Government. A governor and a legislature should be elected next year who will have the nerve to put a stop to this waste of our natural resources. We need no crooks nor traitors in the legislature next year—no man who would sell out Texas to the "big interests."

A prominent citizen of Tahoka was suggesting to The News a few days ago that a petition be circulated to ask the mayor and city council to furnish a man and an extra truck to keep the old empty beer cans hauled off the alleys and the vacant lots of Tahoka. The old boy seemed to think this Tahoka is getting more than its share of Big Spring beer.

Johnny Martin is the "shine boy" that piles his trade in the John Proctor barber shop just across the street west from the News office.

Johnny makes his living by keeping the footwear of his white friends looking just as spick and shiny as his own smiling face, but he finds his recreation and seemingly his greatest pleasure is managing a colored baseball team. He is the Connie Mack of the Tahoka Black Cats.

He is proud of his Black Cats, too. It breaks his heart for them to lose a game.

Johnny is also proud of Tahoka. It is his home town. He was born here, twenty-three years ago. His father, John Martin, for years was connected with The First National Bank—he was janitor. His mother at the same time worked as a house servant for Mrs. Lockwood, and she was greatly appreciated by Mrs. Lockwood as a faithful and trust-worthy servant. Then, in 1932, she died, when Johnny was only six years old. Johnny sincerely and deeply reveres her memory.

Soon after his mother died, Johnny and his little sister, just a baby then, went to Cameron to live with their grand-mother. He graduated at the colored high school there, he says, in 1940 and came back to Tahoka to live. He has been here ever since. His father had moved out to Arizona in 1937 and now lives in California.

Johnny is really proud of that little baby sister of his, Adelle, named for her mother. She graduated from the Cameron Colored High School last year, he says, and is now attending Paul Quinn College in Waco. While she was a student in the Cameron high school, she was on the debating team for three years in succession, Johnny

says, that won out in the interscholastic League contests held in Prairie View State Normal College.

Johnny is proud of his ancestry too. His father and mother come from Birmingham, Alabama, to Cameron, Texas, or maybe it was Brenham—in 1920. One of his great-grandmothers—his father's mother's mother—is reputed to have been 122 years old when she died. She came up from slavery, as did all his other great-grandparents' doubtless. Of course, if one goes far enough back his ancestors, primitive, uneducated, untaught, and almost unclad, will be found living in darkest Africa. Slave traders ran them down on the plains or in the jungles of Africa, put them on boats, and brought them to America, where they were sold as slaves. This, it seems to us, was cruelly unspeakable, but, in the long-run, it has proved to be a blessing to their descendants, who are now sharing with us our Christian civilization.

Religiously, Johnny is a staunch Baptist; and he attends the services of the Pleasant Grove Baptist here—unless a baseball game gets in the way.

Well, any way, everybody likes Johnny.

Now go with me from the office of The Lynn County News around the corner, then down the sidewalk east about 120 feet, turn another corner and go with me into the Woodworth barber shop. There you will find another "shine boy"—or man, rather, for Early Lee Lawson is in his forties and weighs some 175 pounds or more. And the chances are ten to one that you will find him busy. Although he was hit hard by an attack of sciatic rheumatism some 12 or 15 years ago, which came very near to getting him physically, it could have even dampen his ardent spirit nor slow down his tireless energy one bit.

Early Lee came here from Winnsboro in 1928, worked at other vocations for a year, and then went to shining shoes. He has been making that rag pop ever since. If all the shoes that Early Lee has shined were lined up end to end, we have an idea that the line would stretch almost clear across Lynn county from one side to the other.

Early Lee is a native of Jefferson, Texas. His parents lived there a long time before he arrived. As a kid, he was lucky enough to escape all the alligators and crocodiles and finally navigated west. We don't know how his parents managed to give him such a good start—must have been mighty good people themselves—but any way Early Lee says that she won't budge. Religiously, he is an old-time shouting Methodist, although we think that in recent years he has forgotten how to shout—unless it

is when he gets into an argument with his wife. She is a Baptist, and on. Early Lee says that she won't budge a bit, and he swears he is not going to. He says they have some hot arguments sometimes. Here is hoping they stay cool over on the other side of Jordan. And we think they will. When St. Peter or somebody begins "ringing dem golden bells" for Early Lee and his wife, we fancy we can almost hear them now as they begin intoning that greatest of all Negro spirituals, "Swing low, Sweet Chariot, comin' for to carry me home," and then we

think we can see them climbing men featured above, but they are representatives of our colored population.
