WATER FUND —
Expenditures last year \$37,271.83
Proposed Expenditures this year \$48,251.36
Increase due to expansion of water system, one full-time man employed at \$175.00 per month, and other salary increases.
City to cash Government Bond of \$5,072.00 for expansion and improvements which are under way now; this is to be added to the \$10,000.00 voted in bonds.

Expenditures from City's General Fund for year 1950 should be approximately the same as last year with the exception of some increase in salaries, but probably no fire hose to buy. A little over \$2,000.00 was spent for fire hose last year.

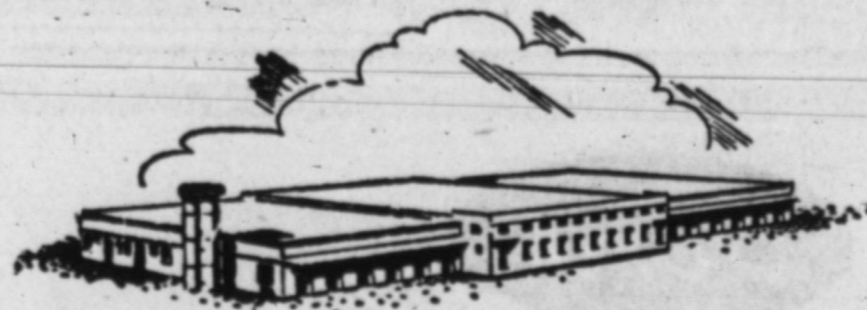

The ranch is provided with rodeo equipment and the boys have their own rodeos. Part of the land is in cultivation and part in pasture. Boys are trained both in farm work and stock-raising, and in some of the other trades and occupations.
Mr. Hodges says that in addition to the general superintendent, Mr. Dory Funk, there is an executive board consisting of five of the older boys. Programs of work and recreation are carried on systematically and effectively. The boys are taught and trained to strictly observe rules and regulations which, in a large measure, are of their own making. The boys as a rule are obedient and notably courteous and polite. They are taught real sportsmanship.
Mr. Hodges says that all the Tahoka Scouts who went on the trip were "carried away" with the ranch,

as were the grown folks also.

program is available at your A. A. office.

Farm Acreage Data Being Gathered
Lynn county farmers are practically 100 percent complete in reporting acreage data for 1949 and from 1945 thru 1949. There are a few farms that we have been unable to complete or obtain any information due to the operator or owner being gone or for other reasons. This information is being gathered to carry out provisions of the present national farm program, and will be vital in setting up any acreage allotments or other new farm policies which may be adopted by Congress before the session adjourns. Wheat allotments, under the present plan are to be set by July affecting the 1949 fall plantings with a reserve set up for new growers.
Your county committee and office personnel appreciates very much the cooperation that the farmers of Lynn county have given toward securing this acreage data information.

Are Farmers Getting Rich?
Although most everyone knows of farmers who "have made money" during the past 8 or 10 years, most farmers have not been "doing as well" as the people in the town or city.
The average net income of farm people in 1948 from all sources was

only \$909 per capita including the value of home-produced food and income from non-farm sources. This compares with the non-farm average of \$1,569.00. Consumers are often misled by the prices they have to pay for groceries and other commodities produced on the farm, or made from raw materials produced on the farm. Too often they are not aware of the prices actually received by the farmer.
Figures show that for the wool in a \$50 dollar suit, the farmer received about \$3.70; for \$10 worth of meat, the farmer received about \$5.10; for the wheat in a 14 1/2c loaf of bread, the farmer received about 3c; and other prices received by the farmer for his products are correspondingly low. Too often the spread between what the farmer gets and what the consumer pays and non-farm incomes are overlooked when farm programs and price-support measures are being discussed.

ELEMENTARY TRAINING COURSE IS OFFERED

Canyon, June 15. (WTNS)—A special one-week course for elementary teachers and principals will be held at West Texas State College July 18 to 22. It may be taken for one hour credit or may be audited.
The course should be of interest to those who have had little training in elementary education or who have had no recent training.
The morning work will be taken up with observation in the demonstration school and conferences with teachers. Group discussions will be headed by demonstration and WT instructors during the afternoons. Topics will be problems of the curriculum, both primary and intermediate.
Evening activities will include square dancing, trip to the Canyon County Club and a play given by the Speech Department.
Fees will be \$7.50 for enrollment, \$5 for dormitory room and meals will be taken at the cafeteria or local cafes.
Observation assignments will be limited, so those who wish to attend are asked to write Dr. Ruth Lowes, Department of Education, and give first and second choices on classroom choices.

Heart Disease Is Threat To Children

Austin, June 9.— The disabling and often fatal disease of children, rheumatic heart disease, is one of the leading causes of death among children and young adults in the age group 10 to 25 years.

Unfortunately, there has been developed for this disease no vaccine such as we have for smallpox, diphtheria and whooping cough, but by recognizing the early symptoms and obtaining a competent physician's diagnosis and treatment, some of the damaging results of rheumatic heart disease can be prevented or moderated.

The State Health Officer Dr. George W. Cox, says that "in general the early symptoms of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows or wrists. The pain is felt usually in one of these joints, and spreads frequently to the others. Often a doctor's examination of a child who becomes irritable and cross without apparent cause, cries easily, and develops nervous habits, will disclose the presence of Rheumatic heart disease."

Predisposing causes to this serious illness include frequent chilling, living in damp, steamy quarters, poor diet, frequent colds, and sometimes scarlet fever or other infections caused by certain streptococci germs. All such conditions should be avoided if at all possible.

Protection for children against rheumatic heart disease, should include a thorough physical examination by a physician at least once a year; a well balanced and nourishing diet; sufficient rest and sleep, and dressing at all times in accordance with the temperature of the room or playground. Consult a physician at once if any symptom suggests that this disease may be present or in the process of developing.

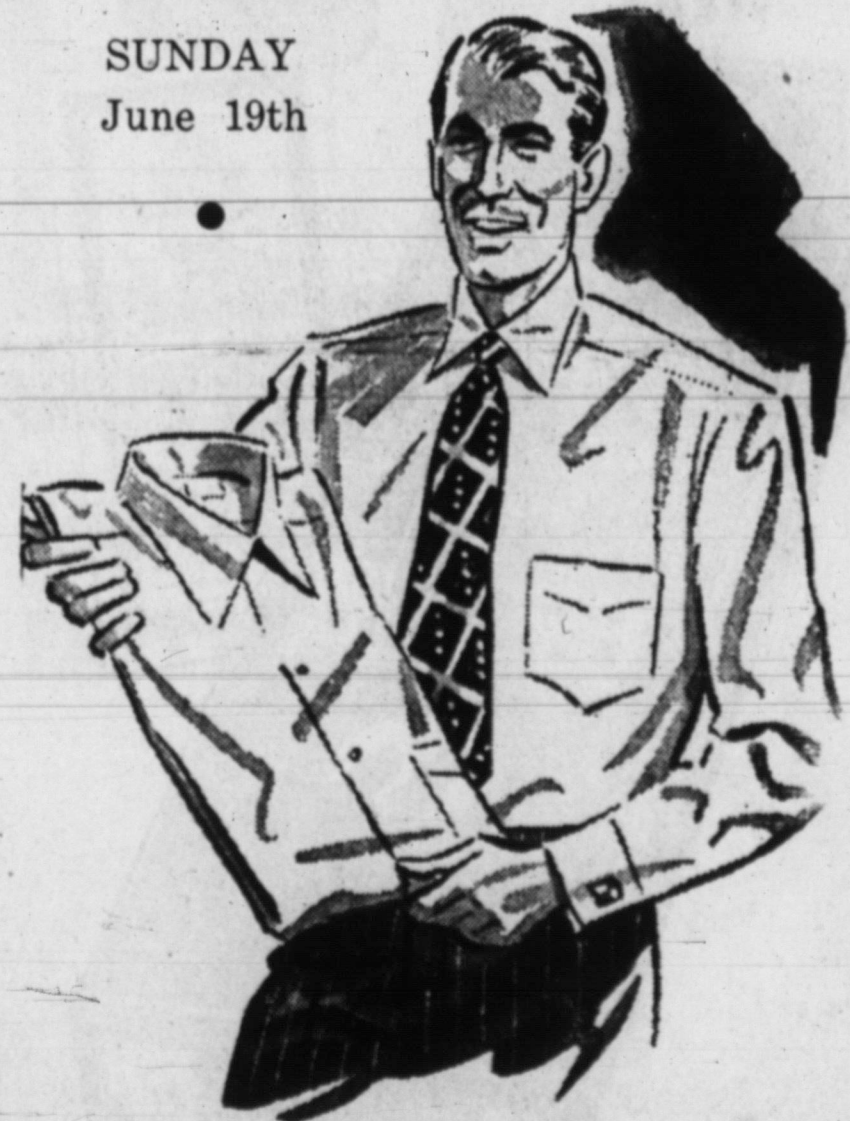

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When state and county officials began to crack down on shameful violations of the liquor laws by prominent people in Lubbock a few weeks ago, some of them retaliated by starting a smear campaign against some of the officers. They complained verbally that some of the officers were grossly mistreating many of the people they arrested. Judge Pardue took cognizance of these complaints and instructed a grand jury to make an investigation. This grand jury made a report one day last week in which it highly complimented the officers of

the law for the gentlemanly way in which they had been handling prisoners. That seems to have stopped the mouths of the complainers. We hope that the county attorney and all the state enforcement officers keep up their fight against the illegal traffic in liquor on the part of clubs and organizations and the blue-stocking gentry just as they do against the Mexican or the Negro bootlegger. The law should know no favorites. And that goes for the peace officers of Lynn county as well as for Lubbock county.

Reckless driving causes many people in Texas to be killed or crippled for life almost every week of the year. Half the drivers, possibly, are guilty. Men and women, boys and girls, preachers, teachers, farmers, business men, doctors, lawyers, and folks who have fairly good sense about everything else, seem to use almost no sense at all when they get hold of a steering wheel. All of us are guilty at times. We get terribly wrought up about an outbreak of polio but we remain perfectly complacent about this perpetually recurring epidemic of driver's insanity. Yet it is taking more lives and crippling more limbs every month than polio takes in a whole year. We need to do something about it.

Odds & Ends

(By E. I. The Elder)
Well, the summer vacation period is going to be here soon. A lot of folks will be hiking off to the Mountains or to some seaside resort, to California, to Oregon and Washington, to Mexico City, to Galveston, Florida, Arkansas, or somewhere, just to enjoy the scenery, the climate, the fishing, the bathing beauties, or what-have-you, but lucky is the newspaper man who can ever find the time or the money to take a real vacation. Honestly, folks, I can't see a chance.

O yes, Maybe I can go up to Mackenzie State Park or over to Buffalo Lake for an afternoon or two some time this summer.

Well, Sir, old Bud Milliken the other day made me want to take off and go down to the Big Bend country—or rather to Presidio on the Rio Grande above the Big Bend.

Bud had been down there two or three times fishing and just scouting around, and although he was not ranting about the scenery he told about running upon a cave down there under a bluff near the river that excited his curiosity and admiration. At some time in the remote past it had been the home of some tribe of cave-dwellers—Indians who made their homes in caves and like secluded places centuries ago, possibly long before the white man ever set foot on America.

There was every evidence that this cave had been occupied as a dwelling place. The rough places on the walls and floors apparently had been smoothed out a bit by the use of crude implements or tools in the hands of men. There were curious carvings and beautiful paintings on the walls. Hieroglyphics that only the Indians who made them could read or interpret.

Archeologists and historians have given us descriptions of many such caves, either natural or man-made, under the cliffs and in other almost inaccessible places in Arizona and other portions of the Southwest, and they have figured out pretty accurately, no doubt, the manners and customs of the inhabitants and the degree of intelligence attained by them at the time of their occupancy of these crude homes. They were doubtless peaceable-minded and un-warlike in their attitude toward other Indians and loved the arts of peace rather than the pursuit of war. Archeologists have been unable to determine, however, to what tribe or branch of prehistoric Indians the cave-dwellers of the trans-Pecos country belonged.

Another group or branch of prehistoric Indians that inhabited portions of Texas, chiefly east Texas, were the mound-builders. Ruins of their mounds have been found in a number of places in that part of the state. And that reminds me of a peculiar hill in the southwest corner of McLennan county near the line of Bell county that used to puzzle me as a boy. It does yet. Out in the heart of the black-land prairie was—and still is—a barren hill on which practically no vegetation grew. It was made up of clay, little red rocks, flint-rocks, and such like. It was a sort of double-hill like a two-humped camel's back. It covered possibly twenty or thirty acres of land. Because of its barrenness and other peculiarities perhaps, it was called the Haunted Hill, and still is. The kids, and possibly some grown folks, believe that "haints" could often be seen or heard on it at night. After growing up, I used to speculate that probably it had been thrown up there at some remote period by Indian mound builders. But I have never heard that theory advanced or maintained by geologists, archeologists, or other kind of scientists. Was it thrown up there by some eruption of the earth's surface at

some remote period of the past? Or, was it the work of water erosion? If it is the result of either of these causes, it seems extremely probable that there would be other such hills in that section of the state. But, we have never seen nor heard of any other hill even similar to it anywhere in the black-land belt. There are plenty of barren knobs and hills out here in the sandy West, notably those near Post, which obviously were caused by water and wind erosion, but never a one in the great black land region. Wish the geologists would explain this one.

I have often dreamed that some time soon I would go up and take a look at the ruins of pueblos constructed along and beyond the Canadian River in the Texas Panhandle by some pre-historic tribe of Indians. Some of these pueblos, it is claimed, originally contained as many as 300 rooms. A miniature model of these pueblos may be seen in the College museum at Canyon.

Last summer we did visit the pueblos out at Taos, New Mexico. Curious and interesting structures they are, three or four stories high, kept up and maintained as remnants and models of an ancient Indian culture that has almost gone the way of the buffalo and the old Wild West. We can not say, however, that during our brief visit we developed very much admiration for the lazy, trinket-selling Indians that we found squatting or lounging around or strolling about over the premises. It was not the Indians but the magnificent mountains round about that charmed us and made this, for us, the "Land of Enchantment."

We do hope to see some time soon the abandoned home of the ancient cave-dwellers at Presidio, together with the perpendicular walls of the St. Helena Canyon further down the river that tower some 1500 to 1800 feet above the river bed. Hope they get that highway down into the Big Bend completed soon just as far as it can be built.

If and when we go, I am going to invite D. C. Davis to go with us. I think he is about the only guy that really enjoys reading The Lynn County News. Others tell us of mistakes we make but D. C. puts

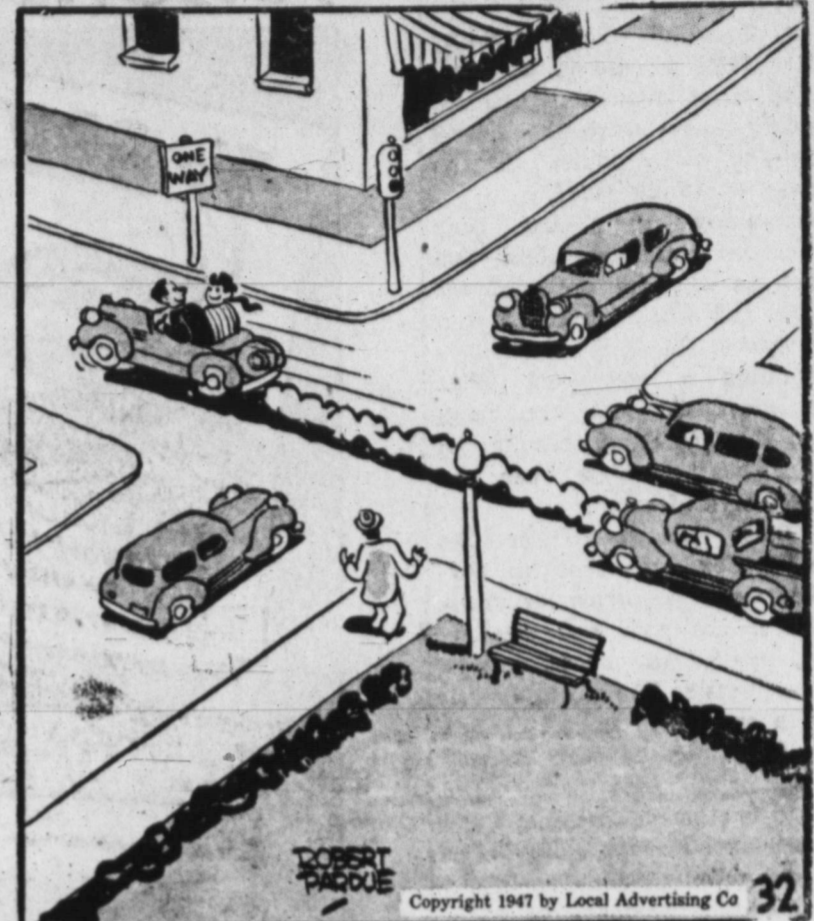
us on the back nearly every week and tells us that we are doing a good job. Thanks, Dave, for these little white fibs; they help a lot.

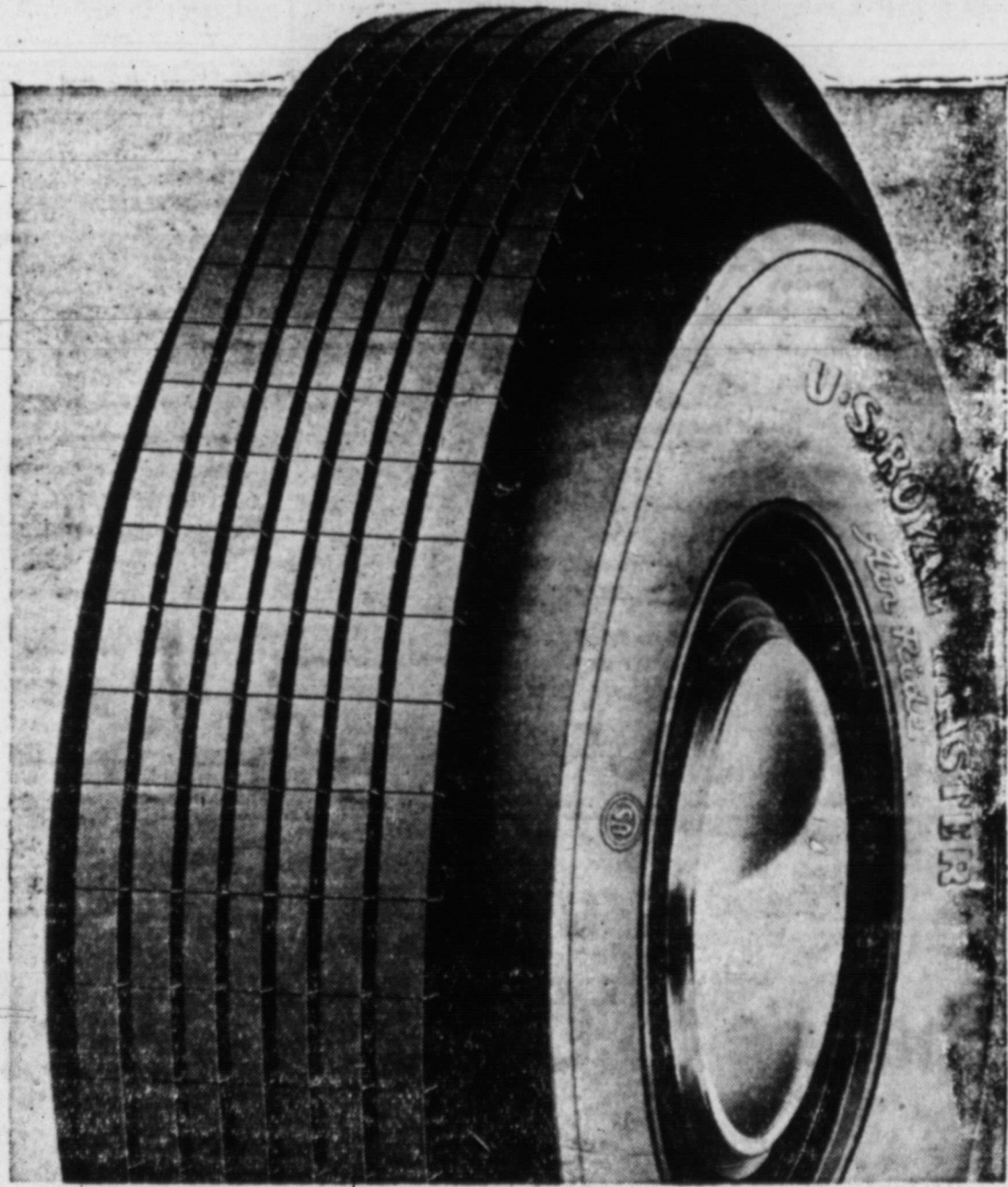
