County Pioneers Holding Annual Reunion Today

Many former Lynn county citizens have been arriving in Tahoka the past few days to visit relatives and old friends—but especially to be present at the annual Lynn Pioneers' Association reunion being held in City Park all day today.

The event is held each year on June 24, and anyone who came here thirty or more years ago and their immediate kin are eligible to attend.

The program will get under way at 11 a. m., dinner will be served pioneers at noon, and a program will follow, with a brief business session following that.

Though there will be special musical numbers, talks by Dr. Sam Dunn of Lubbock and Jake Leedy of Muleshoe, Truett Smith, president, states that "just visiting" and extemporaneous speeches by visitors will feature the program.

Prizes will be awarded to the pioneer telling the most interesting old-time experience, to the oldest lady present, to the oldest man present, and to the person traveling the greatest distance to attend the meeting.

Reburial Today For Lt. Wilson

Reburial services for First Lieutenant Andy T. Wilson will be held in the Methodist Church here today, Friday, at 4:00 o'clock p. m., with Rev. H. A. Nichols, pastor at Stratford but formerly here, officiating. Military burial rites will follow in Tahoka Cemetery.

Lieutenant Wilson is the late husband of Mrs. Betty Sue Roberts Wilson and the father of their only child, Andy T., four years old son. Pilot of a B-24 bomber, based in England, his plane was shot down over Wessel, Germany, on March 24, 1945.

Andy T. Wilson was born at Phoenix, Arizona, April 19, 1919, attended the public schools there, a junior college, received his B. A. degree at Arizona State of Tempe and had almost completed requirements for his M. A. degree when called to service in the Air Force Reserves in November, 1941, just before the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor.

He trained at Randolph Field, the Stamford Field, and LAAP, Lubbock, was an instructor at Goodfellow Field, San Angelo, and then at SPAAF, Lubbock. During his service at Lubbock, he met and was later married to Betty Sue Roberts. He went to England in November, 1944, and from there flew many missions over enemy territory before being shot down. His plane and crew were soon located, but Andy T. was missing 11 months before his body was located several miles from the fatal crash. The body was buried near Liege, Belgium, until it was recently returned to his homeland.

In addition to the wife and son, he is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Wilson of Phoenix, who are here for the funeral, and one sister, Miss Freda Wilson, who could not be present, and many more distant relatives.

Slaton Is Coming Sunday; Tahoka Takes Two Games

Tahoka's entry in the Oil Belt League means that it will entertain Slaton here next Sunday afternoon at 3:00 p. m., following which there will not be another home game until July 10.

Tahoka now has a .500 percent average, having won five and lost five games this season, their first in semi-pro baseball in a long time.

Last Sunday, Tahoka pounced on Brownfield, hapless cellar-dwellers of the league, by scores of 11 to 1 and 8 to 7, in games played here. In the first game, Tahoka waited until the fourth inning to explode with six hits, which, with one error by their opponents, accounted for seven scores. This was an unusually well played game on the part of the local lads, who committed only one error. Holcomb, Tahoka pitcher, allowed only five hits, three of them being bunched in the sixth for the lone Brownfield run, while striking out nine batters. Harvick and Lane were the batting stars, getting three safeties each, while Holcomb collected two hits.

The second game found Pitcher Raymond Pierce in trouble practically every inning, mainly due to errors afield. The lead saw-sawed back and forth nearly every inning, but Tahoka went ahead in the sixth and maintained the one-run lead by holding Brownfield scoreless their (Con'd. On Back Page)

Minimum Water Rates Are Same

The News was in error last week with reference to the water rates in stating that the minimum rate on the first 3,000 gallons was raised from \$2.00 to \$2.50. The minimum rate was not raised but remains at \$2.00 for the first 3,000 gallons.

The other figures and statements in the news story were correct.

For the benefit of our readers we give them again.

Charges for water over and above the first 3,000 gallons up to 13,000 gallons were raised from 25c to 55c per thousand gallons.

Charges for water above 13,000 gallons were raised from 15c to 20c per thousand gallons.

This applies to water rates within the city limits.

Minimum rates for persons living outside the city limits were placed at \$2.50 for the first 3,000 gallons, and at 40c per thousand for all water used above 3,000 gallons.

Better Service On First Class Mail

Hereafter, all first class mail destined for Tahoka which comes west over the T. & P. railroad in the mornings will be routed so as to reach the postoffice here in the mornings. Such is the information given this newspaper by T. E. Shoemaker, Superintendent of the Railway Mail Service in Fort Worth.

Here of late, according to Postmaster Happy Smith, part of the morning mail has been dispatched to Tahoka from Sweetwater to Post and to Tahoka by Star Carrier so as to arrive here at 9 or 9:30 a. m., but part of it has been sent on to Big Spring, arriving here near noon, and part sent by Lubbock, arriving here in the afternoon.

After complaints had been made by local citizens, Mr. Shoemaker has issued an order, effective last Tuesday, that all Tahoka mail from the east be routed by Post so as to arrive here as early as possible.

Junior Baseball Team Loses

Play started Monday in the American Legion Junior Baseball set-up, which leads to a state championship. Only boys who are 17 years and under may participate.

Last year, the local Legion Post started a team here, with Bill Strange Motors donating the player uniforms, and members of the Legion contributing their time to the coaching.

This year, the summer play program was revived, and Coach Jake Jacobs employed to direct the recreation, and is also coaching baseball each afternoon at 4 to 6 for all boys who wish to learn to play the game. From 20 to 30 are participating in baseball, but many of them too young or small to make the team yet.

Last Thursday night, Eldon Carroll of the Legion and Jacobs attended a meeting of district Legion baseball men in Lubbock, and the schedule for this area was worked out. Brownfield, Tahoka, and O'Donnell were placed in a sub-district, and Tahoka will meet each of these teams three times to determine who will advance to the district competition.

Monday, Tahoka was defeated in a game played at O'Donnell by the score 9 to 3, Rogers and Vandiver doing the pitching for the Tahoka Juniors. Tahoka led 2 to 0 in the third, when O'Donnell went on a scoring spree.

Then Wednesday afternoon, the Brownfield team played here and won by a 14 to 5 score. The Tahoka boys allowed nine runs in the third inning, then tightened up the game and allowed only two more runs during the game, while they collected five themselves. Rogers Vandiver, and Mason pitched for the home team. Little Gordon Smith gave the spectators a thrill by slapping out two hits in two times at bat.

O'Donnell plays here next Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock, Tahoka goes to Brownfield Friday of next week, meets O'Donnell there on July 6, and Brownfield here on July 6.

Some damage was done to the cars but luckily nobody was seriously hurt.

Contract Let On New Paving To Wilson, Slaton

A news story out of Austin Tuesday brought the information that on that day the bid of Bryan & Hoffman of Plainview for the construction of the Slaton-Tahoka highway through Wilson and about 2 miles of highway in Garza county had been accepted by the State Highway commission. Their bid was \$133,706.

The Tahoka-Slaton project includes 18.29 miles of grading structures, flexible base, and double asphalt surface treatment from a point two miles north of Tahoka on highway No. 87 northeasterly through Wilson along the Santa Fe Railway right-of-way to the Lubbock county line just south of Slaton, and an extension of Farm-to-Market Road 211 from the east line of Lynn county to a connection with highway No. 84 in Garza county, a distance of about two miles.

The completion of this project will give Tahoka a highway outlet direct to Slaton, and it will be a link in a highway—or at least a farm-to-market road—from Tahoka to Plainview and points further north, relieving somewhat the heavy traffic that now passes north and south over highway No. 87 through Lubbock. Also, it will eventually afford a shorter outlet to the east and northeast by connecting up with highway No. 82 east of Lubbock near Idalou. Primarily, however, it is a farm-to-market project, and will be known as farm-to-market road No. 400, we are informed.

The extension of farm-to-market road 211 from the Lynn county line to an intersection of highway No. 84 will give Wilson a new outlet to the east and southeast and will place it on a virtual highway to the west, since it connects up with a Terry county road at the line of Lynn and Terry counties east of Meadow which gives it direct connection with Levelland, Sundown, and the oil fields of Hockley county, it will also give Wilson a paved road both to Slaton and Tahoka.

We presume that work on the new project will be begun within a few weeks and it will probably be completed before the end of the year.

Wilson Leading Softball League

Wilson continues to lead the Lynn County Softball League with three games won against no defeats, as the seven teams go into the second month of play. However, five games so far have been postponed by rains. Grassland and New Home have each won two and lost one, Bray's and White's have each won two and lost two. Monday of this week, Bray's was victorious over Davis & Humphries 12 to 6, and Tuesday night, Rutherford's defeated White's 11 to 10 in a practice game. Grassland had been scheduled to play White's, but the Grassland boys were too busy plowing.

Thursday of this week, Rutherford's was matched with Wilson, and Friday, today, Bray's meet New Home. Next Monday, Davis & Humphries meets White's, Tuesday, Grassland meets Bray's, Thursday, New Home plays Rutherford's, and Friday Davis & Humphries and Wilson tangle.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12
Proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on September 24, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or cities subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1
Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-executing. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 24th day of September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 34
Proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 66, reading as follows:

"Section 66. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said districts; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

TEXAS TECH TO START NEW BUILDING PROGRAM

Lubbock, June 22— Financed mainly by the lowest interest bonds ever issued by the College, a \$4,000,000 building program will get underway at Texas Technological college as soon as plans can be drawn.

Tech is issuing \$2,800,000 in bonds which have been purchased by a syndicate headed by Stife Nigalaus and associates of Chicago at an interest rate of 1.5965 per cent. Tech officials say if all options on the issue are taken up the interest will run only 1.45 per cent.

Wyatt Hedrick, For: Worth architect, is drawing plans for two wings to the Administration building to add about 16,000 square feet of office and classroom space. Two additions to the Engineering building, enlargement of Home Economics quarters, a new Science building and a new Music hall also will be erected. Cost of the first project, the Administration building, is estimated at \$700,000.

The bonds will be retired from funds obtained from unused Confederate pension money under a constitutional amendment approved by Texas voters in 1947. Some of the funds already have been set aside for Tech by the state.

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MISS BETH SHEPHERD HONORED WITH LUNCHEON

COTTON CLASSING AND MARKETING SERVICES FREE TO SOME FARMERS

Plans for handling the 1949 cotton classing and market news services available to farmers without cost under the Smith-Doxey Act were announced here today by Lell O. Buchanan, in charge of the Lubbock office of the cotton branch, Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

"Farmers should apply for these services just as they did last year," Mr. Buchanan said.

To be eligible for the free cotton classing and market news services, he pointed out that farmers must meet these requirements:

1. Belong to a group of farmers organized to promote the improvement of cotton

2. Plant part of his acreage in the variety of cotton adopted by the group; and

3. File an application as soon as the cotton is planted.

Groups in this area should mail their application to their local county agent or to 1701 Avenue H, Lubbock, Texas.

"To make sure farmers secure all the benefits due them under this program, their group application should reach our office by July 15," Mr. Buchanan said. However, applications will be accepted until August 15.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of county-city health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof;" and

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of county-city health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known as and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be subject to the approval of the voters in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall be subject to the provisions of this Section and to the provisions of any law hereafter enacted by the Legislature in relation to Civil Service Systems. This Section shall not apply to appointive offices only and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 50 of this Article shall not apply, but the creation of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) persons."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon, or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein;" and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses of the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall become a part of the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

Proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 1b, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot, providing for the proclamation and the election thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 1b, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Section 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, A. D. 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases"; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases." Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

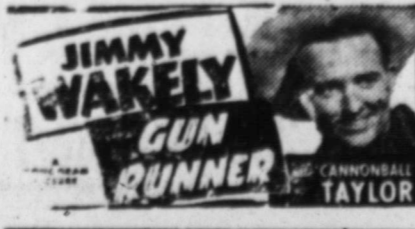

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorizing by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body as to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the above described Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment and the proposed amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature, specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Section 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller.

Section 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Section 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session.

Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered.

Section 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Section 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 6. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

TECH OFFICIAL ATTENDS MEETING IN AUSTIN

Lubbock, June 21.— W. P. Clement, registrar at Texas Technological college, attended a meeting of the State Committee on Classification and Accreditation of high schools in Austin Friday.

The committee is composed of representatives from all major colleges and universities in Texas, and its duty is to set up all the standards by which high schools are classified and accredited.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

GRASSROOTS

(By Bill Griffin, County Agent)

Grasshoppers are still causing some damage over the county. During the week the heaviest infestation were located around the Petty community.

Poison bait is available to all desiring, at the old Red Cross building, east of the Courthouse. The cost is 25c a sack. This charge is a mixing and hauling charge.

Cotton Fleahoppers are making an appearance in Lynn county. Infestation counts were made Oran Hickeron and Clint Sikes farms, Monday, June 20th. Both crops had heavy infestation of the fleahoppers. The fleahoppers blast the square when it is about the size of a pin head.

When your cotton starts putting on, first check for this damage. Twenty (20) fleahoppers to one-hundred (100) stalks of cotton is enough to start dusting. The use of 5% DDT-75% Sulphur is recommended at the rate of ten (10) pounds per acre, at 7 to 10 day intervals as needed.

I have available leaflets with information on dusting if you would like a copy, call by the office.

Men students continue to outnumber women students by 2,071 to 761. Of the total enrollment, 434 are graduates, with a 167 increase over last year.

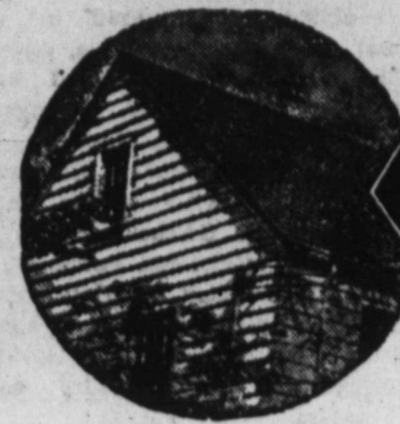
The division of arts and science is leading in enrollment with 915 followed by the engineering division, 384; agriculture, 249, and home economics, 172.

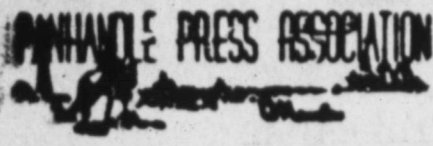

Odds & Ends

Joe Bovell dropped into the News offices a few days ago with a letter which he had just received from a radio announcer on one of the Dallas stations, out of which he was getting a great kick. He handed it to me to read and I really enjoyed it too. Joe had exposed the fellow's ignorance about the South Plains and made him admit it. Had you ever noticed how you and I and nearly everybody else gets awfully tickled when the other fellow's ignorance is exposed?

Well, here is the story that excited our risibilities. Joe was listening at a news broadcast over a Dallas station not many days ago. The fellow was telling about the floods of rain that had fallen out here at Lubbock. He said that Lubbock's average annual rainfall was about eight inches or some such insignificant figure but that during the past few weeks Lubbock had already received some 17 or 18 inches.

The exaggeration was not so funny, although it stretched the truth considerably, but the guy's seriousness and evident sincerity in broadcasting to the world that Lubbock's normal annual rainfall was about eight inches was enough to make a bullfrog shout with laughter.

It tickled Joe and then made him mad. He sat down and wrote the gentleman the facts and wound up by suggesting to him if he could not get nearer to the truth than that that he subscribed for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. That certainly was a heavy load to shoot at a Dallas man.

Joe could have reminded him that Lubbock county last year produced more than 170,000 bales of cotton. Some of that was due to irrigation of course, but the irrigation water came from an underground sheet that lies from less than 100 to around 200 feet below the surface of the plains; and before Lubbock county had any irrigation wells it often produced more than 100,000 bales of cotton in a year. A number of the neighboring counties are in the 100,000-bale class, also.

Now, Joe Bovell and I will admit that this plains country can produce more cotton on less water than any other land we ever saw, but please don't cut us down to an average of eight inches of rainfall a year, Mr. Radio Man.

Be it said to that Radio Man's credit that he wrote Joe a nice letter, admitting his ignorance of Texas, and apologizing for the error. Said he should have investigated before broadcasting such an erroneous statement. He passed the buck to the Associated Press, however. Said he merely repeated a statement which it had made.

Nevertheless, we people who have lived in Texas a long time, can

never understand how even a newcomer could make such a glaring mistake as that.

Still, a lot of us are pretty ignorant of other parts of Texas. What do our kids know about farming down in the black land belt? What do they know about the average rice crop in Matagorda county, for example? What do they know about lumbering in deep east Texas?

Well, a lot of our kids know more about these things than one would suspect, for they have visited kin folks down in that region.

But, coming down to brass tacks, there is not any of us that knows very much. An editor, for instance, may be capable of making a lot of wisecracks, every week, of finding and scratching out the other fellow's mistakes in English, of writing a pretty good editorial now and then, and yet not know beans about the operation of the Linotype machine in his office with which his "wisdom" is put into type.

A lawyer may have a broad and thorough knowledge of many branches of the law and know very little about the practice of medicine, and vice versa.

A college professor may be a great mathematician and yet be a boob when it comes to history or English literature.

There is just too much in this old universe to know for any of us to know very much. And there are no short cuts to knowledge—or should we say, to scholarship.

If I were starting out in life again, I would take no short cuts, even if I had to earn my way as I went along. If I were preparing myself to become a lawyer, I would take everything that our own Texas University has to offer and then get into a big law office somewhere in which I could continue to learn by observation and experience.

If I had an ambition to go to the top as an educator, I would choose courses of study adapted to my taste and would then seek to master everything pertaining to those subjects. The same goes for other professions.

But whether I studied to become a lawyer, a doctor, a teacher, a

writer, or what-not, there is one mistake which many professional men make that I would avoid making.
