Methodist Church Nears Completion; Programs Planned

Now that improvements on the Methodist Church have been almost completed, activities for several weeks ahead have been planned and the time for special services set, as is shown by the following report furnished to The News by Rev. C. A. Holcomb, the pastor.

The First Quarterly Conference was held Wednesday night with Rev. J. O. Haymes, the District Superintendent, presiding. Reports indicated a very healthy condition. The work of remodeling the Church was reported almost completed and the Building Committee and all who contributed to the project in any way were highly commended.

Heavy Showers Benefit Lynn County Crops

Heavy rains fell in some portions of Lynn county on Tuesday of this week. The heaviest of the downpour was north and northwest of Tahoka, ranging from a half inch to possibly two inches or more in some localities. It was particularly heavy in the Wayside-New Home area and in parts of the Petty, Dixie, and West Point communities. It was generally light in other parts of the county. Only .36 of an inch was measured up in Tahoka.

A heavy rain fell the latter part of last week, however, over a large area east and southeast of Tahoka. Some damage was done by hail in that area, however.

Crops generally are very promising in all the territory covered by recent rains. Cotton is holding up well everywhere in the county but much of the feed is suffering in areas not covered by recent rains.

Negro Breaks Arm While Wrestling

Elroy Warren, 12-year-old Negro boy, sustained a badly-fractured left arm while wrestling Sunday afternoon. He was brought to the Tahoka Hospital for treatment where it was found that there were in fact three fractures. One bone had two fractures and the other bone one fracture.

An open reduction was done and a bone plate placed over the two fractures. Then the arm was put in a cast.

Explosion Injures Man At Wilson

W. F. McLaughlin of Wilson was released from the Mercy Hospital in Slaton on Tuesday of this week and returned to his home following his treatment as a patient in that institution for about ten days for injuries sustained in a very unusual sort of explosion on Saturday, July 16.

Mr. McLaughlin, who is a farmer, came with a sprayer to the Clary Filling Station in Wilson that morning to compress a sufficient amount of air into it to enable him to do some needed spraying at his home. So, he began to shoot the air into it, and having no way to gauge the pressure, he overloaded it quicker than he expected and the air container exploded in his hands. The force of the explosion knocked him backwards. He was picked up in an unconscious condition and taken to the hospital, where an ugly and serious wound on the head was found which required 15 stitches to close. There was another wound on the left hand which required ten stitches, and his right arm was broken at the wrist. He remained unconscious for several hours.

The same explosion also cut some painful gashes on the face of Zollie Moore, an attendant at the station, and his injuries were treated at the Tahoka Hospital.

New Record Set In Fines Assessed In Local Courts

Possibly a new all-time record in number of fines assessed and collected in Lynn county was set during the past week. Thirty-two citizens paid fines in Justice and County Court totaling \$826.50.

Sheriff "Slick" Clem and his deputies made a raid on some gambling resorts out near New Home last Saturday night and rounded up twenty-three Mexicans and Negroes on charges of rolling the dice or engaging in other forms of gambling and brought them to jail. They have pleaded guilty and most of them have paid their fines.

In these raids evidence was also unearthed to the effect that a Negro woman out in that community was violating the liquor laws. In her possession were found 18 cans of beer three and one-half pints of gin, and one quart of wine. A charge of unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor for the purpose of sale was filed against her in the county court, to which she entered her plea of guilty on Monday, and the court fined her \$100.00 and costs.

Also, a Negro man living in the same area of the county was arrested and charged with possession of intoxicating liquor for the purpose of sale. A cache of 11 pints of liquor and 35 cans of beer was found in the walls of his residence by the officers. His bond was set at \$500.00.

Pete Cruz, a Mexican, was charged in the county court with the offense of aggravated assault committed by him upon one Sam Jose, another Mexican, by cutting him with a pocket knife, inflicting a serious flesh wound. He also pleaded guilty, and the Court assessed his fine at \$25.00 and costs.

Onapre Travino, Mexican, was placed under a \$200.00 peace bond on a charge that he had threatened to kill another person.

Zernal Ozges, Mexican, was fined \$100.00 and costs for carrying a concealed weapon.

A white man who had been seeking diligently to break loose from the liquor habit slipped again and was caught driving a car while under the influence of liquor. He was picked up by officers and charged with drunken driving. His fine was \$50.00 and costs.

An O'Donnell Negro was assessed a \$25.00 fine on a charge of aggravated assault.

Four other white men paid fines for drunkenness.

Tahoka Plays At Post On Sunday

Tahoka and Post baseball teams will play a double-header in the Oil Belt League competition Sunday at 2:30 p. m. at Post. The game had previously been scheduled for play in Tahoka.

Tahoka home games have not been drawing sufficient crowds to pay expenses, and removal of the games to Post this Sunday is an effort to get more gate receipts. Tahoka will receive all gate receipts above expenses, and Tahoka season tickets will be honored at the gate. Post has comfortable, shaded bleachers, and local fans who have not attended games played in Tahoka because they did not want to sit in the sun, can attend this big bill at Post, sit in the shade on a soft cushion, and sip a cold drink while watching the action.

Last Sunday, the Tahokans lost a 6 to 0 decision on the home field, to the Levelland Refiners, and on Tuesday night they lost another to the same team in Levelland 15 to 14.

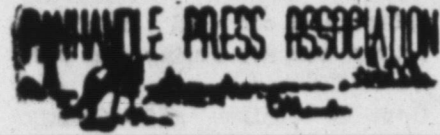

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A FIGHT THEY FAILED TO FILM

Here is the story of a jungle fight gleaned from last Sunday's Avalanche-Journal that would have been worth a million dollars to any motion picture producer who could have been there with his equipment and caught it blow by blow and scream by scream as two ferocious beasts fought it to the death—the death of one of them.

This story came over the wires of the United Press from Spokane, Washington, last Saturday, and it will thrill any boy to the very ends of his toes.

"A maddened black panther and a huge gorilla battled in jungle-like fury for two and a half hours at Spokane's Liberty Lake amusement park last night before attendants of a wild animal show killed the mangled gorilla.

"About 400 spectators saw the 195-pound panther tear off the gorilla's right arm and rip his 312-pound body while the keepers vainly tried to separate them. The animals had come together through an unlocked cage door.

"When it appeared plainly that the animals were fighting to the death and could not be separated, an attendant shot the losing gorilla with a .32 calibre rifle.

"The shrieks and cries of anguish could be heard for more than a mile around the resort lake as the two wild animals clawed, slashed and tore at each other in the five-foot compartment on a truck.

"A 600-pound lion in an adjacent cage added to the blood-chilling cries as he lurched against the bars all during the fight.

"The rare \$2,000 panther still was so enraged after the shot ended the fearful battle that he had to be subdued by chloroform before he could be led from the cage."

Well, that lithe and agile panther was doubtless more beautiful and worth far more in dollars and cents than was that ugly old gorilla, but if we had been there our sympathies would have been with the ape—he was so much more like the rest of us.

A bill is pending before Congress proposing to appropriate federal funds for transportation of Catholic children to parochial schools and possibly for the purchase of textbooks for the use of Catholic children in the parochial schools, we believe. We are not sure as to the exact scope of the bill but it definitely proposes the use of public funds for the benefit of children attending parochial schools. A North Carolina congressman offered an amendment to the bill which would forbid such use of public funds. Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt in her daily newspaper column expressed her approval of the amendment and her disapproval of the use of public funds for the benefit of children attending the parochial schools. Thereupon Cardinal Spellman of New York, the highest ranking Catholic in this country and standing close to the "throne" of the Pope at Rome, emitted a blast denouncing Mrs. Roosevelt as an enemy to the Roman Catholic Church. Last Sunday, a high-ranking Catholic priest of Washington, D. C.,

and rector of St. Matthews Catholic Church, Monsignor John K. Cartright, seconded Cardinal Spellman's denunciation of Mrs. Roosevelt and possibly was more radical and bitter than was the Cardinal himself. The News has no intention to discuss now or at other times the doctrines or policies of the Roman Catholic Church except as they may invade the realm of politics and civil government. Nobody can studiously read the Constitution of the United States and almost any state Constitution in this country without seeing that any use of public funds for the benefit or upbuilding of any church or any religious denomination in this country is contrary to the fundamental law of our land and hence is un-American. The Cardinal and the Priest and the whole Roman Catholic hierarchy, as for that matter, is wrong in this bold and brazen effort to raid the United States treasury in the interest of the Catholic Church. Mrs. Roosevelt should have the moral and active support of every real American in this country in this particular fight.

There may be some grounds for the contention that the Federal Government has the right to prescribe the qualifications of voters for President, Vice-President, and members of Congress in spite of the obvious intention of the founders of this government and the writers of our Constitution to leave those matters to the respective states but we believe that it is very unwise and inexpedient for the Federal Government to be nosing around among state statutes and demanding the repeal or nullification of state laws which may have been adopted in the interest of good government and for the elimination of corruption in politics. The enactment of the poll-tax law in this and other

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Southern States as a prerequisite to voting was not prompted by hatred of the Negro nor by a desire to punish him but was done in order to stop the corrupt practices of both white and colored politicians who were herding Negro voters to the polls and voting them like sheep at every primary election in Texas. All of us who are old enough to have lived and voted in the nineties and the first years of the present century know this full well, and we fear that these practices will be revived in the large cities and in rural areas where the Negro population is heavy if the poll-tax requirement is repealed or annulled. Such a proposal is to be acted upon in the lower house of Congress this week and it will probably pass.

Possibly the Senate will again defeat the measure

Following nearly every week-end comes a flock of reports of fights, stabbings, shootings and other acts of violence throughout this area. Most of the participants are Mexicans or Negroes, and either liquor, gambling, or illicit relations between the sexes figures in most of them. However, a large percent of the crimes committed by whites also center around these three vices. Very few people would vote for the licensing of gambling houses or houses of ill fame, but strange to say, they will vote and fight for the licensing of liquor houses. Just as much sense in licensing one of these evils as the other.



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Odds & Ends

H. G. Richards of Anton, President of the South Plains Press Association, had an editorial in the July number of The South Plains Press, the Association's official organ, which was very timely in that it called to our attention again in this month of July some of the fundamental rights asserted first in the Declaration of Independence adopted in July 1776 years ago and set forth together with other fundamental principles in the Bill of Rights incorporated into our Constitution fourteen years later, June 15, 1790.

Particularly did he lay stress on two of the fundamental rights asserted in this latter instrument, religious freedom and freedom of the press. Three other "freedoms" are set forth in that first Amendment to our Constitution, freedom of speech, freedom of assembly, and freedom of petition to Congress for any redress of grievances that might arise. All five are inseparably linked together.

The people of the United States have enjoyed all these freedoms unimpaired so long that they take them as matters of course which are in no danger of being destroyed or seriously impaired in this great country of ours. Furthermore, we are so used to them that obviously we do not appreciate them for their full worth. Mr. Richards has done a distinct service therefore in calling the attention of his fellow publishers to these great fundamental.

Also, most of us have been hearing so much for so long about the outrages committed by the Communists of Russia that we have tired of these stories and feel that they can never affect us in this country very deeply any way.

But we believe that "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty."

Although President Truman recently expressed the belief that serious opposition to the present Communist regime has arisen in Russia, yet it is evident that the Communists are yet in complete control. In fact, to most of us, no evidence has been submitted to indicate that there has been any material change in the attitude and sentiment of the Russian masses back of the iron curtain. Apparently, they are the same fanatical crusaders for the spread of Communism or the same helpless and hopeless victims of it as they were prior to the last World War.

Again, we are convinced that the Communists are working unceasingly and desperately to make Communist-controlled Russia, the strongest military power in the world. They put on a show of their air power a few days ago, according to newspaper reports, which amazed even the American airmen and military leaders who saw it. Those Russians most assuredly have something up

their sleeves.

Another thing which we should like to say is this. We believe that our people should take a new hitch at reading and studying the stories of Russian cruelty, callousness, stealthiness, trickery, treachery, lying and spying, that are appearing almost daily in our magazines and newspapers. If, for instance, you can get hold of a Reader's Digest for May, 1949, read the first story in that little magazine, a story of Madam Kasenkina held as a prisoner by the Russian Soviet Consul General in New York, to be shipped like an animal back to Russia, who leaped from the window of his mansion to the street three stories below to avoid being thus transported back to her native land. Then turn to the last story in that magazine and read about Russia, the "Land of Milk and Honey" by A. L. White. Those two stories will make the blood of any American boil with rage.

And yet, Russia is still hoping and plotting some day to rule the World. She is still spreading her propaganda in this country. She will never win the people of America to believe in her ideology, but she hopes to get help in this country to conquer the United States by treachery and by violence.

You say it can't happen. Well, just remember Pearl Harbor.

The Japs almost destroyed our military power in the treacherous blow they struck there. Will we forget it? The Russians have not forgotten it, and they are just as treacherous as the Japs ever were.

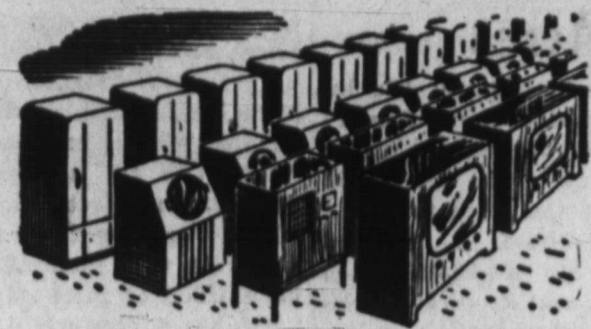

Wheat Acreage For 1950 Cut 14 Million Acres

Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan announced on July 14 that no wheat marketing quotas will be proclaimed for the 1950 wheat crop. At the same time, the Secretary announced a national acreage allotment of 68.9 million acres for the next crop of wheat. This allotment represents a reduction of about 14 million acres below the wheat acreage seeded for 1949 harvest.

In announcing next year's allotment, Secretary Brannan said: "Wheat farmers are now faced with a natural post-war problem. The great expansion in United States wheat production, induced by the war and the unusual postwar foreign rehabilitation needs, has continued at a time when market outlets are showing signs of contraction. The indicated wheat production in 1949, even as adjusted downward in the latest crop report, would be our third largest, exceeded only in 1947 and 1948. It will be our sixth consecutive wheat crop in excess of one billion bushels against an average domestic consumption of approximately 700 million bushels.

"While export requirements for U. S. wheat are expected to continue large we must not mislead ourselves into thinking that we shall have unlimited demands for all the wheat we can produce. The United States is not the only source of exportable supplies of wheat, and as foreign needs fall off international price competition will again make itself felt. The International Wheat Agreement will of course help, but even so, we must expect a downward trend in total exporting. We have recently been exporting over ten times as much wheat as we did before the war. Even with expected exports several times the prewar level, we still need such adjustments."

"Acreage allotments are a fair means of doing this, since they as-

sign to each grower his fair share of responsibility for adjusting production to the prospective market. Because of the large supplies of wheat on hand and in prospect, the alternative to an adjustment in our wheat acreage for 1950 might well be glutted markets, disastrous price breaks, and an undue burden on the whole price-support program. With an acreage allotment program in effect for the 1950 wheat crop, only those growers who cooperate with their allotments will be entitled to price support.

"If wheat growers in general stay within their acreage allotments thus adjusting production to expected demand, it may be possible to avoid marketing quotas in future years. Quotas, with their penalties for excess marketing, provide controls which will not be needed if acreage allotments and other measures succeed in adjusting production."

Mr. B. F. Vance, chairman of the P. M. A. committee announced today that the 1950 wheat acreage allotment of Texas is 5 million 909 thousand 134 acres. This compares with an average acreage of wheat in Texas for the past 4 years of 6 million 759 thousand acres. Vance said that county committees in the wheat producing counties are being advised of the 1950 county wheat allotment. The farmer elected county committees will apportion the county wheat acreage allotment out among wheat growers in their county.

The work will be done in most counties during the coming week and the farmers can expect the announcement of their farm acreage allotment of 1950 shortly thereafter.

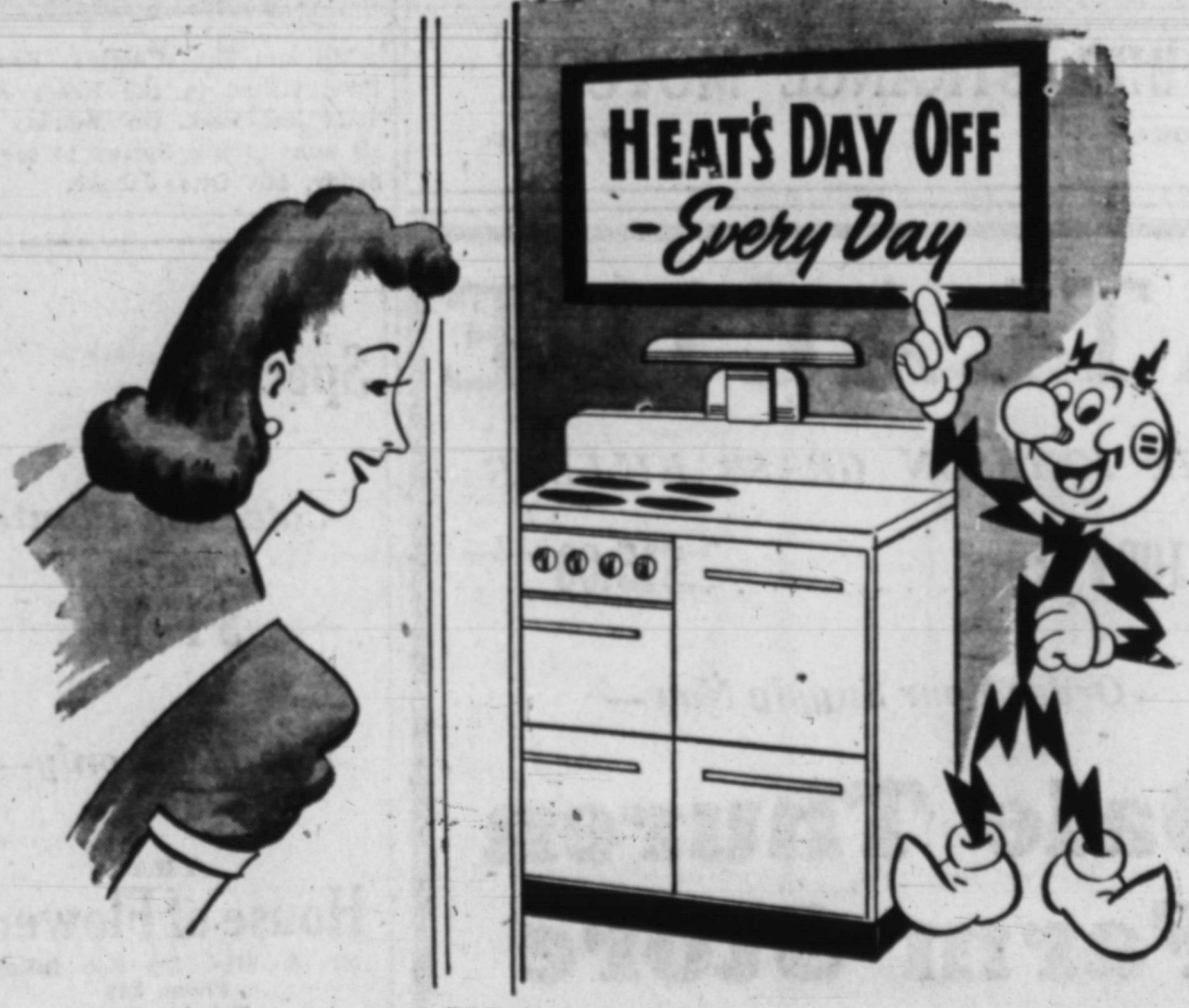

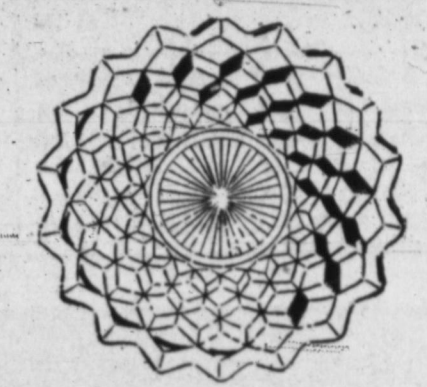

RAID ON RECLAMATION FUNDS REVEALED

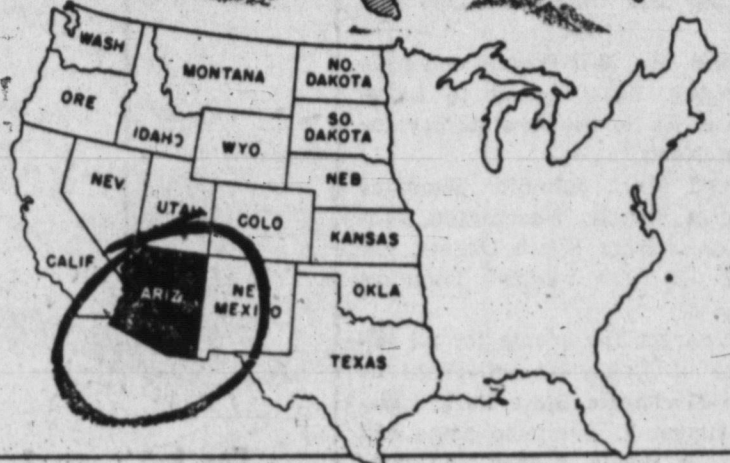
**\$993,307,000
FOR 17 STATES**

Library of Congress tabulation shows that total government appropriations for building reclamation projects in the 17 western reclamation states amounted to \$993,307,000 during the entire 11 year period from 1939 through 1949.



**\$738,000,000
FOR ONE STATE**

Arizona is making Congressional bid for one irrigation project costing a minimum of \$738,000,000 for initial development only. Additional tunnels and dams would raise total project cost to an estimated \$1,500,000,000.



Backers of western reclamation development have expressed grave concern over possible fate of numerous state programs if Arizona's request for a huge irrigation project should be granted. They point out that this proposal gives Arizona the lion's share of all available funds. To meet such a threat, a fight is being waged behind the scenes in Congress over Senate Bill 75 and House Resolution 934. These are the controversial bills calling for the largest reclamation appropriation ever made to a single state. The reclamation states involved in this vital matter are—Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

GRASSROOTS

(By Bill Griffin, County Agent)

Spot checks over the county show a decrease in the flea hopper, especially in the areas where dusting has been done during the past month. The cotton bollworm is on the increase and weather like we have had during the week is excellent for building bollworm infestations. The cotton bollworm is known by several other names, on corn, he is the corn ear worm, on tomatoes, fruit worm, etc.

The bollworm moth prefers rapidly growing succulent cotton for laying their eggs. The eggs are laid

singly on the tender growth and newly formed squares. They are white when first laid, but turn a dark color before hatching. The small worms just eat the egg shell then move to young squares and burrow in usually near the base. The matured worm feeds almost entirely inside the bolls.

For Control apply 10% DDT, 40% sulphur at the rate of 10 pounds per acre when eggs and 4 worms are found per 100 terminal buds, dust at 5-day intervals if necessary.

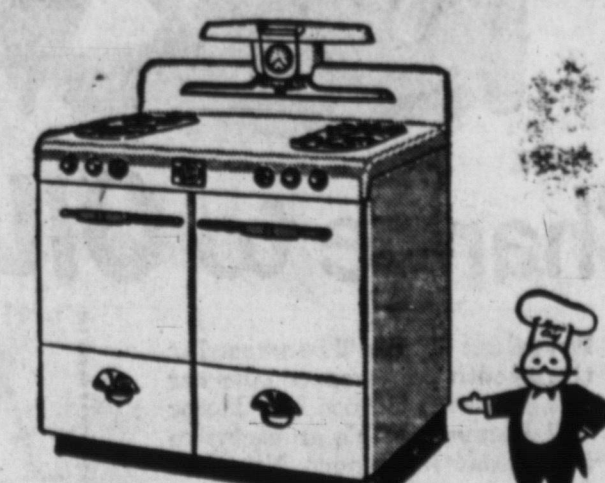

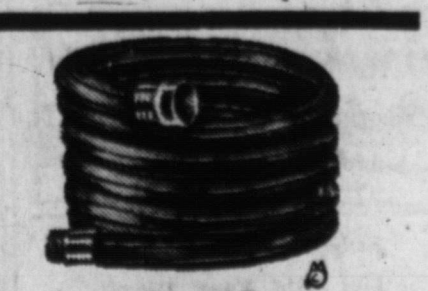

FACTS ABOUT THE —

Texas Veterans Land Program

The question and answers reproduced in this Newspaper, were taken from a pamphlet received from Bascom Giles, who received several thousand letters, therefrom taking the following questions.

Eligibility
Q. Who is allowed to take part in this program?

A. Any Texas veteran of World War II now residing in Texas who served as much as 90 days (unless discharged sooner for a service-connected disability) and who has an honorable discharge, or is still in the service.

Q. Who is considered a Texas veteran?

A. Any man or woman who was a bona fide resident of the state at the time of entering the service between September 16, 1940 and December 31, 1945, and is a bona fide resident at the time of making application for a loan under the provision of the Veterans' Land Bill.

Q. If I were born in Texas but was residing, registered and inducted in another state, but I am now residing in Texas, am I eligible?

A. No.

Q. If I was a legal resident at the time I entered service but since my discharge have been voting in another state, am I eligible?

A. No, you must be a legal resident at the time you make application.

Q. If my wife and I were both in the service can we each buy a tract of land?

A. Yes.

Q. Is there any preference given to veterans who were engaged in combat?

A. Veterans having a service-connected disability sustained in combat will receive a 90-day priority.

Q. Are veterans of World War I eligible?

A. The act provides only for veterans of World War II.

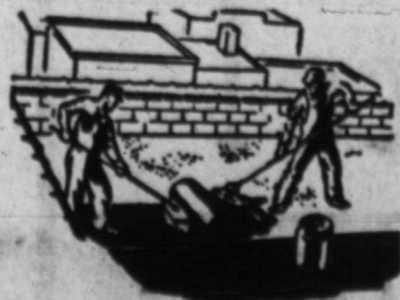
