Paving Program In Tahoka Will Get Under Way

Work was started here this week by the contractor getting ready for the paving program on City of Tahoka streets.

The first project will be the re-topping of the old asphalt streets with a new seal-coat, which will cost about \$7,000.00.

The next project is expected to be the widening of the two highways through town. The State Highway Department will bear the cost of widening this pavement, but the property owners along the routes must bear the expense of the curb and gutter work.

This project is a major one for the town, since it is believed that this widening and installation of curbs and gutters will greatly improve the town's appearance, as well as promoting safety and being a convenience.

Next will come the paving of a number of residential streets—or as many as the property owners sign up to pave.

In this week's issue is the legal publication concerning the proposed streets to be paved, with the amount of cost to each property owner.

Owners should make up their minds at once and sign up immediately if they want paving. The first streets signed up will likely be the first paved.

The very best type of paving will be laid—triple asphalt surface on compacted asphalt base.

New Building At Lynn County Fair

With County Agent Bill Griffin in charge, preparations are being made for the finest and best county fair this fall that has ever been held in Tahoka.

One of the best types of barrack buildings has been purchased and was moved onto the fair grounds Monday. It was placed on a solid foundation and is now undergoing repairs and is being whipped into shape for use as a Woman's building and an agricultural display building. It is 20 feet wide and 50 feet long. It is situated on the corner lot immediately north of the former softball grounds and across the street east of the Mrs. Henry residence. It faces south.

The Fair Association now owns four lots in the southwest corner of that block, total dimensions being 140 feet north and south by 118 feet east and west.

The Association also owns six lots off the west side of the softball grounds block, being a plot of ground 88½ feet wide and extending the length of the block north and south.

Judge Tom Garrard expressed the hope of getting the street closed which lies between this strip of land and the grounds west of the street on which stands the big livestock exhibit building, so that it can be used also as a part of the fair grounds.

The entire property of the Fair Association will be cleared off and cleaned up, all weeds, dead limbs, stumps, and other inflammable matter will be burned and other rubbish removed from the premises.

The new Women's building will be stuccoed outside and treated to a new coat of paint inside.

It is hoped that the women will begin planning at once to fill a large portion of this building with their handicrafts and of all kinds of exhibits of interest to women.

Farmers should likewise begin to think of their interests. The finest crops for years are now in prospect and marvelous exhibits can be made if farmers will take the trouble to select farm products for exhibition purposes.

Of course the livestock exhibit will be fine.

Let's all join in and make the Lynn County Fair this fall the best in the history of the town and county.

Date of the Fair will be October 31-32.

Old County Bond Issue Paid Off

Judge Tom Garrard and the Commissioners' Court received notice from Austin recently that the last balance due on Lynn county road bonds issued in the principal sum of \$80,000 in 1921 had been paid off in full, about two years previous to the last payment date. A small portion of these bonds had been assumed and paid off by the State.

Insurance Forms Made Available

Application forms for the special dividend on National Service Life Insurance authorized by the Veterans Administration will be available at the Lynn County Red Cross chapter office on or after August 29, Phone 1513-J, Eldon Gattis, the chapter's Home Service chairman, announced today.

The dividend is not automatic, Gattis pointed out, and each veteran must fill out one of these application forms. In general, any veteran who kept his National Service Life Insurance in force for three months or more will be eligible to receive a dividend.

The exact amounts which each policy-holder will receive are not known at this time, Gattis said. The Veterans Administration will work that out between now and the first of the year when the first dividend payments will be made.

Two Men Attend National Meeting

Large Bond Issue May Be Necessary To Provide Tahoka's Need For Water

Under authority of the City Council, Mayor K. R. Durham has presented the following statement to The News for publication.

Mayor's Statement

Tahoka's water system is inadequate and no one recognizes the shortcomings of this department more than the City Council. We have done what we could with the funds available, but it is far short of the needs.

The Council has decided to ask the people to authorize the issuance of water revenue bonds for a major overhauling of the water system. The amount of the issue will be determined after the engineers make a survey of the need. It probably will be under \$300,000.

Here are some of the urgent needs:

First, erection of another overhead tower five times as large as the one we have and located more in the center of the water system.

Second, lay new 6 inch mains all over town where every water customer will be on a large main.

Third, lay new 10 inch mains to our Wells north of town. This will

First Bale Cotton Ginned Tuesday

The first bale of cotton grown and harvested in Lynn county this year was ginned on Tuesday of this week by the Farmers' Cooperative Gin of Tahoka.

The cotton was picked on a field planted to Hibred seed on April 8.

It was grown by G. W. Langford living three miles east of Draw and was gathered from 23 acres of land. Draw has possibly had the smallest amount of rainfall this summer of any community in the county and some fields of cotton are maturing early.

This was a very light bale of cotton, weighing only 402 pounds. It took a little more than 1,300 pounds of seed cotton to produce the 402 pounds of lint. The seed weighed 540 pounds. The hulls and trash therefore must have weighed almost 400 pounds.

Mr. Langford has been in Lynn county 23 years, and once before, in 1928, ginned the first bale—that one on October 14.

The bale will be auctioned off to the highest bidder Saturday afternoon at about 2:30, immediately preceding the Appreciation Day event.

Premiums for the first bale include the ginning, bagging, and ties, \$50.00 cash from the Chamber of Commerce, and possibly other individual premiums.

The bale is on exhibit at the First National Bank corner.

The News is informed that O'Donnell received its first bale at about the same time.

Voters Approve School Tax Rate

At the election held throughout the Tahoka Consolidated Independent School district last Saturday, both propositions submitted carried almost unanimously.

The vote for fixing the tax rate at \$1.50 per \$100 valuations was 50 for and 2 against the proposal. The vote on the bond assumption proposition was 51 to 2.

The total amount of bonds outstanding in the entire consolidated district is \$144,900, according to Mrs. Helen Ellis, the secretary-treasurer. The City of Tahoka and a little more than 300 sections of land are comprised in the district.

POSITION MADE CLEAR ON FIRST BALE PREMIUM

The \$50.00 premium offered by the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce each year is for the first bale of cotton that is ginned in Tahoka.

Because of some misunderstanding among some people, the Chamber secretary, Clet Walker, again explains this fact.

Local businessmen, including the local ginners, contribute to the fund. O'Donnell and Wilson raise similar funds, and the Chamber officials feel it is right that the premium go to the first bale that is ginned here, though it may not seem fair sometimes to a gin in a rural area.

Faculty Named For School Term Beginning Sept. 7

Superintendent Vernon Brewer and Principals Otis Spears and Urban Brown, together with Coaches Jim Foust and Ledru "Jake" Jacobs and other faculty members are rapidly whipping every thing into shape for the opening of the Tahoka public schools on Wednesday, September 7, as previously planned.

Students will not report to the school until Thursday, Sept. 8, for registration. They will meet classes on Friday. The faculty only is to meet at the school on Sept. 7. Buses will make their runs on Sept. 8.

With a prospective faculty of 38 members, including the superintendent and the high school and grade school principals, and a possible student body of near 1,200, Tahoka's school system this year promises to be by far the largest in its history.

Not only has there been an increase in the number of faculty members but six subjects have been added to the high school curriculum. These are Business Law, Shorthand, Economics, Texas History, Band and Driver Education.

Building Being Repaired

Considerable repair work is being done on both the high school and the grade school building.

The high school building is being completely weather-stripped through-out, and a new roof is being placed on the grade school building.

The plumbing in both buildings is being worked over and the floors are being re-finished. The wood-work of the high school building is also being repainted.

Desks in the grade school are being re-sanded and varnished. The high school building, a three-



THE PUBLIC HEALTH AMENDMENTS

Two proposed amendments to the state constitution pertaining to the public health are to be passed on by the people of Texas at the election of November 8. These two proposals are by no means identical but they do look in the same direction.

House Joint Resolution No. 15 proposes that "The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-wide health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units;

provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply."

House Joint Resolution No. 36 provides: "The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this state under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing however that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

One of these amendments would authorize counties and cities acting jointly to set up some sort of health program in the city-county health units; and the other would authorize the State to set up hospital districts and levy a tax in such districts, when approved by a vote of the people thereof, for the support of such hospital and health program.

This is striking pretty strongly in the direction of "socialized medicine," it seems to us, which the Doctors have been fighting most strenuously. They will probably fight this proposed amendment. And they will probably succeed in defeating it, overwhelmingly.

But even so, there is a growing sentiment in this state in favor of "socialized medicine." There are so many hundreds of thousands who are unable to pay heavy hospital and doctors' bills that not only they but hundreds of thousands of the relatives and friends of such people have come to the belief that the State should come to their relief in near when serious illness strikes.

These two amendments are just as humanitarian and necessary as were the social security laws when they were enacted for the benefit of the aged and the needy a decade ago, and they will probably receive wide support among the voters of Texas.

The News would like to hear from the Doctors and others on these proposals.

EDITOR GETS REPLY TO CRITICISM OF COURTHOUSE JANITOR (The News has received for publication the following communication, which was provoked by a criticism of the manner in which the courthouse rest rooms are being kept and which was published in the ODDS & ENDS column in the News last week.)

Mr. Editor: While criticizing the Court House Janitor, why not look in on some of your own trash? It is the janitor's place to clean the dirt and filth out which is brought inside the courthouse (which he does, and well). But it IS NOT his place to clean

up the dirty, filthy trash that brings it into the courthouse. I think it is cleaner than it has been in years, according to what the janitor has to work with. He stays on the job seven days a week. That is more than you can say about some of the others, which usually try to run every one else's business instead of their own.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

Proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law, for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for), the following:

"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 45-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 45-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3) cents on One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 61-c, reading as follows:

"Section 61-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county officials in the executive counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said counties; any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive officials, and the limitations of terms of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be determined by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than twenty-five thousand (25,000) people."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for), the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the returns of said election in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21

Proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; and prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Section 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A.D. 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases"; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation of said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed conformably herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, date and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for the same.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Governor shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person or service grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with the Constitution and the Constitutional Laws of the State, and returns shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation required by law.





HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 28
Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 28 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the county body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 11f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 28, which shall read as follows: "Section 28. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall determine, provided that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 11f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 28 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 45-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 45-b, reading as follows: "Section 45-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof, and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Boyd Describes Arkansas Visit

(By Grady Boyd, Wilson) (Cont'd. from last week)

I was in about the same position as a driver following a feminine cigarette addict driving her car. When she puts her hand out of the window, you know that she is going to stop, back up, turn to the right or left, or perhaps she is knocking the ashes off of her cigarette. Believe it or not, the next day or soon thereafter I failed to recognize this U shaped street and got into the same trouble again. The first time my heart pounded like a ten year old tractor; the second time I was so scared that I do not remember much about it, but I assure you of one thing—it never happened the third time.

The city water is purified and is perfectly clean, but the Ozarka Water company has a spring here, and bottles water to be shipped to all parts of the United States because of its purity, taste and medicinal properties. You can have this water delivered to your door at a very reasonable charge which is about the best insurance you get to prevent typhoid that is so prevalent in Arkansas during the summer months. This town is a health resort, and before it was built to any size the water was all pure, but since then the waste and refuse from the homes finds its way to many of these springs. We noticed several people in the slum district carrying their bottle to some of the springs along the little creek that runs through town, and we could not help but wonder if they realized the danger of this act.

One of the most interesting things of this town, mentioned by Mr. Ripley, is a church that you enter by going in at the top instead of the ground floor. The hillside on which it is built is so steep that they had to dig out a space in it large enough for the house and you step right off the street into the cupola and go down a stairway to the floor. Seeing is believing; I saw it.

There is a seven story hotel built in the same manner as the church mentioned above. They had to do a lot of excavating in order to make room for the building and it is so close to the mountain that you can walk out of any back door right on to the ground—the seventh is no different from the others.

Near the same hotel there is a cave that was used by a meat market for a refrigerator. I was allowed to visit this cave and was surprised to find it was cool enough inside to keep their meat without any refrigeration of any kind.

Just across the creek that runs through town there is a viewpoint that gives about the same effect as the pictures you have seen from Switzerland. This spot appears to be a reproduction of the beauty spots of that country.

The thing that attracted my attention most of all was the way they constructed their buildings in this part of town. I especially noticed the old home of Carrie A. Nation, the famous prohibitionist who became a menace to many saloon keepers. I wish we had a million like her at the present time. Her home was built partly below the ground and partly above, timbers 20 or 25 feet in length being used for the foundation on the back side while the front rested on the ground. Nevertheless, just across the street you had to climb a ladder to get upon the front porch, while the rear side of the house rested on the ground. These houses may be seen there today just as I have described them, ladders to the porches and all.

The most outstanding experience that I had while I was there was the honesty that I found among this local group of people. There was a large cave in the side of the mountain that was used as a community refrigerator, and the people were so honorable that no one ever took that which belonged to another, and besides this the children loved and respected the old people so much that they considered it a great privilege to carry in water, fuel, things from the cave, or do

whatever these old folks could not do for themselves.

About three miles from town, there is a balanced rock and a natural bridge which you should see if you ever go there. I was told that 1200 people saw these sights on the preceding Sunday. The owner of this place, consisting of 160 acres, had it fenced hogproof and each year would go to Joplin, Missouri, and buy a lot of old poor sows, let them get fat on acorns and then carry them back and sell them for a big clear profit. Arkansas isn't such a bad place, after all. Adios until next time.


