### Rainy Weather **Continues Through Another Week**

The rainfall here since last Sunday morning has amounted to 2.71 inches up to 3:30 Thursday afternoon. Rainfall last week, most of it the latter part of the week, amounted to 2.87 inches, making a total of 5.58 inches during the two. On the last day of August, .55 of an inch fell. Adding that to the above total, the precipitation for the preceding 16 days had amounted to 6.13 inches.

Preceding this wet spell there had been three or four weeks of hot weather and scant rainfall, and many fields of cotton had begun to show the effects of the drouth, All of that has been wiped out during the past two weeks, and farmers are beginning to fear that if the excessive rainfall continues it may prove to be damaging rather than benefic- Reid Resigns As ial to the cotton. ### **Election Called** On Sewer, Water **Bond Issues**

We are calling attention to the notice being published in this paper giving the low-down on a bond election which is to be held in this city on October 1, the purpose of which is to provide funds for the expansion of our water and sewer systems.

A lot of folks always become frightened when any kind of bond election is mentioned, and that will probably be the case in this instance.

There are no grounds for fright, however, for these bonds will provide on their face that they are not to be paid from tax levies of any kind. Both the principal and the interest are to be paid out of the revenues to be derived from the use of water. When you pay your water bill at the end of each month you will be adding just that much, less operaing expenses, to the fund out of which these bonds are to be paid,

The Mayor and the City aldermen have figured it out that these water revenues will be amply sufficient to pay the cost. Until the Ganadian River project is constructed, as doubtless it will be constructed within the next few years, water will be furnished by the City's wells and such additional wells as it may be necessary to drill. Mayor and the City Council are banking strongly on the Canadian River project. They maintain that it will provide an enormous supply and that at a much cheaper rate than water



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


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

"Sleeping in Bogsta is an unforgetable experience," Rev. Holden said. "The beds are clean and cool, but often they are too short and their mattresses too thin. The beds have no springs and they are often full of fleas." Fleas are everywhere in Bogata, Rev. Holden said.

Colombia's three industries are coffee raising, ranching, and mining, Rev. Holden told the students. He said that there are unlimited opportunities for young American who would go to South America and farm the land, some of which is offered free to homesteaders.

At the end of his lecture Rev. Holden answered questions of the students, and showed them a display of South American hand made goods which he brought back from that country, among the articles, some of which were offered for sale to the students, were stuffed turtles and alligators, handmade belts and hand bags, beautiful inlaid rosewood and mahogany serving trays, sandals, vases and painted wooden bowls.







He is survived by his wife, his parents, two brothers and two sisters. His brothers are Elmer Hunter of Lubbock, and Raymond A. Hunter of the U. S. Navy, doing service somewhere in the Pacific. His sisters are Mrs. Edith E. Jones, who lives in California, and Mrs. Hallie O. Strickland of Odessa. He was a member of a Baptist Church in Lubbock.





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

SALARIES OF LEGISLATORS
One of the proposed amendments

to the state constitution to be approved or rejected by the voters at the November election is that providing for the holding of two regular sessions of the legislature each term of two years, or one each year, and fixing the salary of state Senators and Representatives at \$3,600 per year, payable monthly on the first day of each month.

Under the present constitution, there is only one regular session of the legisuature each two years, but usually there are at least one or two special sessions. Special sessions might be held also under the proposed amendment.

Under the present constitution the salary of a legislator is \$10.00 a day for the first 120 days of a regular session-or \$1,200.00-and \$5.00 per day for the remainder of the session. The regular session this year lasted 60 days after the first 120 day, and the legislators were paid \$5.00 a day for the extra time, or \$300.00 for the two months, making a total of \$1,500 for the six months. They will receive nothing for the remainder of this year and throughout next year unless the governor should call a special session.





Effective October 5, 1949, every man and woman marrying in Texas must obtain a medical examination which includes a standard blood test from a physician before a marriage license can be issued. The marriage ceremony must be solemnized within fifteen days following the medical examination.

Usual Case

1. The applicant for marriage license consults a duly qualified physician licensed to practice medicine and surgery for a medical examination and a blood test. The physician sends the specimen of blood to a laboratory approved by the Texas State Department of Health.

2. The laboratory makes a confidential report of the result of the test to the physician and to the Texas State Board of Health and transmits the certificate form to the physician.

3. The physician completes the certificate form and gives it to the applicant.

4. The applicant gives the completed certificate form to the county clerk who then issues a marriage license. Previous to the issuance of the license the county clerk shall certify upon the reverse side of the aid license that all certificates or the court order required by this act have been received and filed. This statement of the country clerk shall show the dates of the examination of both parties unless same has been suspended by court order.

The above is the substance of House Bill No. 588 of the Fifty First Legislature.
