## Farmers Elected PMA Committees In Lynn County

Results of the community election of farmers at which community PMA farmer-committeemen for 1950 were chosen, were announced today by the county office of the Production and Marketing Administration in Tahoka.

Approximately 600 of the county's farmers who are participating in one or more of the Federal farm programs administered locally by the committees voted in the election which ended Nov. 23.

A committee composed of a chairman, third member and two alternates was named for each of the county's four agricultural communities. At the same time, voters in each community elected a delegate and alternate to the county convention to be held in Tahoka on December 1, at which the county committee for 1950 will be chosen.

Successful candidates for community committeemen are: Community A—Chairman, Buel Draper; vice chairman, A. C. Fillingim; regular member, R. O. Nettles; 1st. alternate, Earl Tunnell; 2nd. alternate, J. H. Smith.

Community B—chairman, L. A. Coleman; vice chairman, J. H. Sander; regular member, S. A. Cummings; 1st. alternate, Chester Swope; 2nd. alternate, J. P. White.

Community C—chairman, L. D. Howell; vice chairman, W. G. Gass; regular member, V. O. Caswell; 1st. alternate, Lonnie Williams; 2nd. alternate, Gus Porterfield.

Community D—chairman, S. L. Walters; vice chairman, Earl Billings; regular member, Calvin Dorman; 1st. alternate, Sam Bartley; 2nd. alternate, Levi Gray.

County convention delegates and alternates are: Community A—delegate, S. L. Williams; alternate delegate, Dwight Corbell. Community B—delegate, R. J. Macker; alternate delegate, T. B. Mason. Community C—delegate, Silas Russ; alternate delegate, Ward Eakin. Community D—delegate, Oran Hickerson; alternate delegate, Noel Hays.

## Basketball Team Opens Season

Tahoka High School boys A and B and girls teams opened their winter basketball season Tuesday night, dropping three non conference games to the always strong Abernathy Antelopes.

All three teams go to Lorenzo tonight for games. This school also has long placed much emphasis on basketball.

Next Tuesday night, the two boys teams play their first games in Tahoka, meeting the Class AA Brownfield Cubs.

The A team was overwhelmed by a 65 to 16 score, and the B team lost 32 to 10.

Abernathy perennially has one of the best teams on the Plains, and this year has hopes of going to the State finals. All boys on the first string are over six feet tall and experienced. Esten Blackmon led the scoring parade with 17 points, followed by Murry Sanderfer with 15. Howell scored six for Tahoka. In the first quarter, the Bull dogs held Abernathy to a 10 to 7 score. Don Brice and Ronny Gurley fouled out early in the second half trying to stop the tall boys.

Cochs Jake Jacobs has a bunch of hustling basketball players, but they lack experience. Four boys on the squad played last year, but none was on the starting line-up. He hopes to have a club that will break into the victory column by the time the conference season opens in January.

His girls team is likewise inexperienced. Tahoka is reviving girls basketball this year after having been without a girls basketball team for many years. Though the girls lost to Abernathy by a top-heavy score, they too may be expected to show much improvement in a few weeks.

## Liquor Figures In Court Cases

The criminal docket in the county court reveals that on Monday of last week a Mexican named Severo Salez entered a plea of guilty to a charge of driving a car while intoxicated and was fined \$75 and costs, a total of \$98.10. He has paid off.

The News failed to report this case last week.

On Monday of this week, Verbal Jordan, a Negro, pleaded guilty to a charge of drunkenness in a private residence not his own. He entered the residence of a white family out near Wells in a drunken condition and members of the family reported the offense to the sheriff's office. He was brought in to court, pleaded guilty, and was fined \$50.00 and costs, a total of \$73.10, which he paid.

A drunken Mexican created quite a commotion, almost a riot, in O'Donnell Sunday when officers arrested him. He drew a long-bladed spring back knife on the officers, but was over powered and the knife taken from him. Judge Garrard fined him \$100 and costs and assessed a jail sentence of 30 days against him on a charge of aggravated assault. He is in jail.

Another Mexican, Andres Rodriguez, pleaded guilty Monday to a charge of driving a car while intoxicated, and he was fined \$50 and costs; total, \$73.10. He paid off.

Likewise a white man, R. C. Adams, entered his plea of guilty to a charge of drunken driving, and likewise paid his fine and costs amounting to \$73.10.

Also still another Mexican, Saturnillo Aguilar, dug up \$73.10 to pay for the pleasure he got out of driving a car while under the influence of liquor.

Lupa Herra, another swarthy-hued gentleman from the border country, paid a fine of \$50 and costs and was sentenced to jail for ten days on a charge of aggravated assault. It seems that he lost his temper, jerked out his knife, and began to slash another gentleman of his race on the hands and maybe the arms. But he was corralled before he inflicted any very dangerous wounds.

## Tahoka has Ginned 20,000 Bales Cotton

Nearly 20,000 bales of cotton had been ginned in Tahoka from this year's crop when the News gathered reports from the various gins at 2:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon. The exact total as furnished the News was 19,277 bales. This would indicate that 3,506 bales had been ginned at that time since the report given on Wednesday morning of last week. Our guess is that about 85,000 bales have been ginned in the county.

The weather for gathering the crop remained ideal up to Thursday morning, when a cold wave had arrived together with cloudy skies and just a hint of mist in the morning hours.

By far the largest part of the crop has been gathered, and if there should be much bad weather during the next ten days, many Mexicans may be expected to step on the gas and wend their way back toward the border. In that case, a lot of the cotton remaining in the fields would be gathered by harvesting machines.

Every community must give its best to its young people and has a right to expect in return that those same young people will become active participants in community life, bringing to it the benefits of their training.

## Twelve Are Fined On Drunk Charges

An even dozen men were brought into the justice court here during the week end and Monday on charges of drunkenness in public places and entered their pleas of guilty. Mexican, Anglo-Americans, and one Indian were included in the number. The usual fine of one dollar and costs was assessed by Judge P. D. Server in each case.

The News is informed that more than a dozen drunks paid like fines in the justice court at O'Donnell.

Also one case not reported elsewhere was filed in the county court here charging one David Gonzale with unlawfully transporting intoxicating liquor. He was placed under bond in the sum of \$1,000 to await further action by the court.

Rufus Trevine has also been charged with assault on another Mexican with intent to murder. He struck the other Mexican in the mouth with a heavy bottle and inflicted serious injuries. That case also awaits action by the grand jury.

## Feed Crop Being Harvested Rapidly

The feed crops of Lynn county are being harvested rapidly now, and in fact grain men say that the big end of the crop is already in the bag.

The News is informed, however, that it would be practically impossible to give reliable estimates of the size of the crop harvested for the reason that vast quantities of it have been hauled out in trucks to other towns outside of Lynn county in almost every direction—wherever storage space could be found.

V. F. Jones, however, expressed the belief to a representative of the News that the feed acreage in the county is more than 100,000 acres and that the yield will average more than 1,500 pounds per acre. So, you can get your pencil and figure it out.

Mr. Jones has himself recently built an additional elevator with a capacity of 45 freight cars or more. That makes six grain elevators of varying capacities in Tahoka.

## Fire Damages Lynn Theatre

Lynn Theatre was operating again Monday night although fire had almost completely gutted the projection booth at 10:30 Sunday night causing a loss of \$3,300.

Lester Flood, manager of local Wallace Theatres said the fire started as result of broken film. In a moment the projection booth and its expensive equipment was afire all over. However, the instant the fire started, the automatic fire shutters used in local projection booths closed, and a large portion of the crowd in the theatre probably knew nothing of the fire.

## Three Mexicans Hang Up Cotton Pulling Records

Here are the records made by three Mexican cotton pullers Tuesday on the V. O. Caswell place one mile from Draw, which are really remarkable. If anybody in Lynn county knows of a better record than these, or even as good, we shall be glad to publish the same in The News.

Dave Ramirez from Rock Spring, Texas, pulled 1852 pounds of cotton between 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m. Wednesday on the V. O. Caswell farm.

Allegando Hernandez from Palentina pulled 1653 pounds within the same hours.

Jose Capeda from Weslaco pulled 1745 pounds between 8:45 a. m. and 5:00 p. m. the same day.

Irvano Ortega of Sterling City was the trucker who handled the cotton and 11 year old Paul Ortega of Sterling City was the weigher. Can anybody in Lynn county show better records than these?

## Two Wilson Men Are Smothered In Elevator Cave-In

Two men were smothered to death sometime before noon Wednesday in a grain pit at Wilson when the walls of an elevator granary caved in and permitted tons of grain which had been piled against the wall to pour into the pit. The victims were Albert Clubb Jr., 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Clubb, Sr. of Lubbock, and Vernon Lee Wilkins, 32, of Wilson. The granary was owned by Clubb's father, and it was estimated that 500 tons of grain had been piled against the granary wall.

The tragedy was discovered when John Hill of Tahoka went to Clubb's office at the Farmers' Co-operative Gin in Wilson across the street a hundred yards or more west of the elevator and grain pit to get directions as to the unloading of his grain. Procuring the information from Mrs. D. C. Newscum, wife of the manager of the gin, and Mrs. Kiser of the office staff, Hill went over to the elevator and soon came back saying that there had been a cave-in.

The news spread rapidly and soon everybody in town had gathered at the scene of the accident to try to rescue the men who were thought to have been buried beneath the grain. Wilkins' body was found about one o'clock and Clubb's body soon afterward.

Justice of the Peace P. D. Server held an inquest and pronounced the death of the men to have resulted from smothering.

Mr. Wilkins had been in Wilson only a few weeks, his relatives living at Dalhart.

Funeral services for young Clubb were to be held at 10:00 a. m. today in the First Methodist Church in Lubbock.

## Farmers Will Vote On Market Quotas

Around 1900 cotton farmers in Lynn county are eligible to vote in the national marketing quota referendum Thursday, December 15, Clarence Church, chairman of the county PMA committee, announced today.

"Farmers who produced cotton in 1948 are eligible to vote. Every farmer who had an interest in the 1948 crop as owner, tenant or share-cropper may cast his ballot," Church said. "However, no producer can vote more than once in the referendum even though he has several farms in cotton production. The Secretary of Agriculture has declared quotas on the 1950 crop. It is up to farmers themselves to approve or reject them."

The referendum will be held in accordance with the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended. Marketing quotas cannot remain in effect, however, unless they are approved by two-thirds of the farmers voting.

Polling places will be located conveniently throughout cotton growing areas of the county, Church said.

"Every farmer in this county growing cotton has direct interest in the cotton marketing quota referendum," Church said. "It affects every producer. Every producer therefore, should make the decision by going to the polls and voting either for or against the quotas. It is only through wholehearted participation of cotton growers at the polls in the referendum we can determine exactly the way they feel about quotas on the 1950 crop."

Miss Rosemary Nelms was able to return to her office and resume full-time duties as city secretary Wednesday after recovering from a major operation performed just 4 weeks previously.

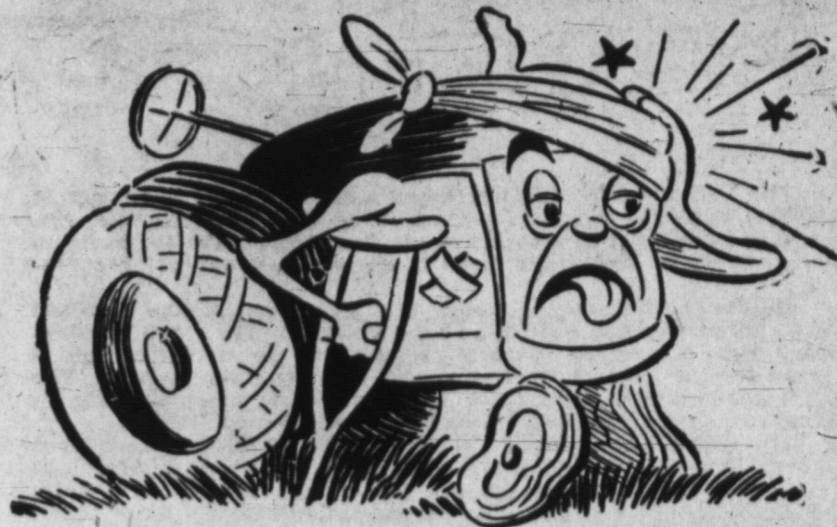

M. A. committee. This conservation measure includes leaving a ten-inch stubble of grain sorghum on the land at least until January 1st on sandy cropland that is subject to wind erosion. In 1948 Lynn county had approximately 12,000 acres qualifying for this practice and it is thought that we will have equally as much this year, Church states.

## School Cafeteria Feeds About 325 Students Daily

An average of 325 Tahoka students are served a hot lunch Monday through Friday at the school cafeteria, under the direction of Mrs. Urban Brown, wife of the Grade School principal.

The carefully planned meals generally include a meat, a salad, two vegetables, and a dessert. Each student receives a half-pint of milk every day. These meals cost students, and teachers as well, only 35 cent per day.

Even at that low charge per meal the cafeteria has managed to show a small profit each year for the last four years. This is accomplished, Mrs. Brown said, through use of government-supplied staple foods such as potatoes, fresh fruits, canned goods, cheese and honey. Actually, the cafeteria is operated on a non-profit basis, and the small amount made, above expenses, goes into improvements or "extras," she said.

Mrs. Brown's staff includes Mrs. Clyde Jones, Mrs. Emma Sparks, Mrs. Louis Murray, and Mrs. A. T. Voyles.

Four years ago, when Mrs. Brown became director of the school cafeteria, the lunches were served in the school gymnasium. They were prepared in a small room back of the stage. Students lined up across the stage, received their meals, and had to go outside the gymnasium to eat them.

The building now occupied by the cafeteria, a war-surplus army building, was erected across the street from the high school in the summer of 1947. It has a seating capacity of 225, and a large kitchen area.

The cafeteria's kitchen equipment is owned, for the most part, by the school system. This equipment includes a steam table, stove, ice box, and a three-compartment dish washer. A rented deep freeze unit is also used.

The building and equipment are often used for luncheons, dinners, and gatherings by various civic and special groups. The Lions' Club uses it for regular Tuesday night meetings and the Rotary Club uses it on special occasions. Many school social functions, such as the recent FFA Mother-daughter Banquet, are held in the cafeteria. No charge is made for use of the building, but there is a nominal charge for service. Mrs. Sparks is in charge of the special luncheons and dinners.

Mrs. Brown taught school for two years at Groom before she became director of the cafeteria. She attended Texas Technological college from 1940 through 1942. The Browns have a four year old daughter named Sharron.

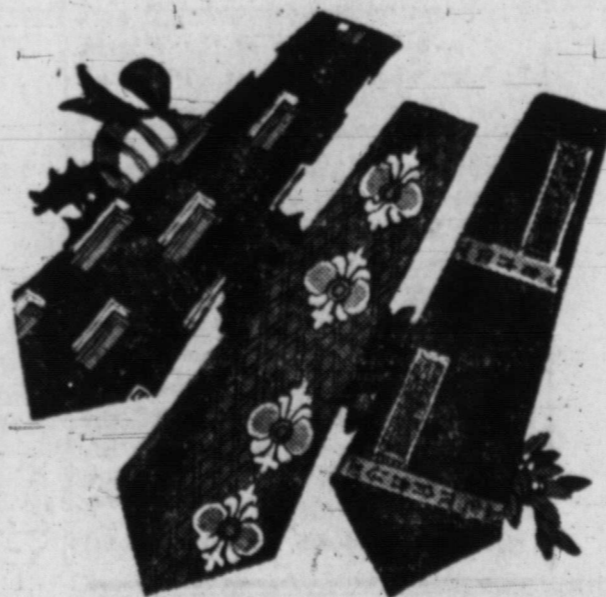

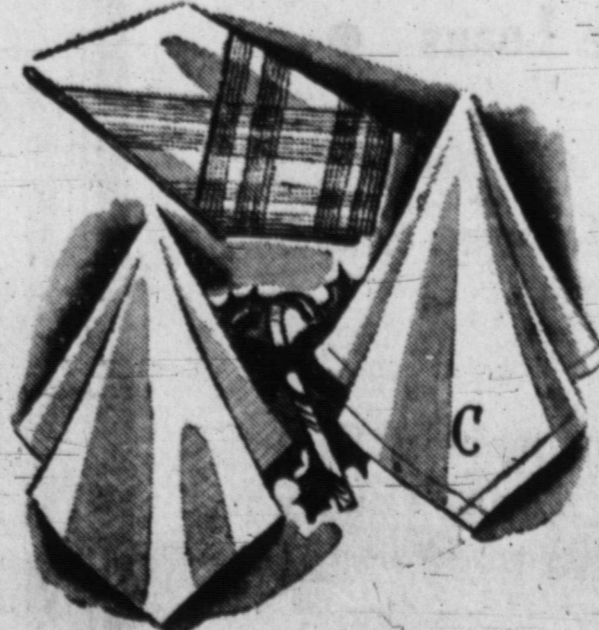

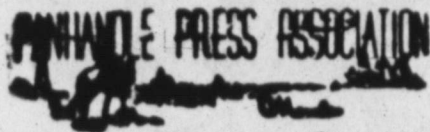

**THE VOICE OF ONE CRYING IN THE WILDERNESS**

Some of us can remember how, when the rotten Czarist regime was overthrown in Russia in the early years of the present century a republic of Russian states was formed on lines somewhat similar to our own, and Alexander Kerensky, patriot and statesman, was elected President.

Before he could get the new government thoroughly established, however, those two international thugs, Trotsky and Lenin, seized the reins of government and deposed Kerensky, who was banished or had to flee from the country to save his life. The thugs have been in charge of Russia ever since, the bandit band that now holds sway being headed by a guy named Stalin, with such confederates as Molotov, Shevinsky, and Malenkov.

Since being driven out of his native land, Patriot Kerensky has been living in Great Britain.

France, and the United States. He has never dared to return to Russia. Hence this little news story published in the daily papers of this country Monday. It sounds like the voice of one crying in the wilderness.

London, Nov. 27. (Reuter's).—Alexander Kerensky, 68, former Russian prime minister, broadcast to Russia Sunday night for the first time since he was deposed 32 years ago. He told Soviet Communists that they were playing with fire.

"Should this fire flare up," he added, "Russia at any rate would burn up, if indeed not the whole civilized world." He accused the Communist International of using Russia's forces for world aggression.

Teachers attending the state convention in Fort Worth last week were repeatedly told that taxpayers are going to expect better education under the new Gilmer-Aliken law set-up, according to newspaper reports. So, say we all. That means that higher scholarship will be required of teachers in many instances, but it should not be forgotten that degrees do not mean everything in considering the qualifications of teachers. There are many teachers who never earned a degree in college who love children and know how to teach them. We are not saying that they should not be required to improve their scholarship but they should not be discarded for the sole reason that they do not possess degrees and replaced with teachers who have scholarship but lack other important qualifications for teaching. This matter of selecting and discarding teachers is so important that it should be done carefully. Superintendents have a great responsibility right there.

Former Senator Lee O'Daniel has a searching eye and a listening ear. He also has an active imagination

and a ready tongue. He got the Austin correspondent of the Houston Post to come up to his home 15 miles out in the west of Fort Worth a few days ago to break the news to said correspondent that he is receiving bundles of mail these days urging him to run for President, probably about 58,716 letters or some such number. He also wished to divulge to the correspondent that he intended to keep his intentions a secret for the present. "When I get ready to announce anything, I'll do it in the usual way—call all the newspaper boys in and tell them all at the same time." In the meantime, don't let this secret get out, fellows.

**Odds & Ends**

We were struck a few days ago by the fact that fashions change in whiskers as well as in coats and cravats, breeches, bangs, and bustles. We ran across a man wearing a peculiar style of the old out-moded goatee. And, he was wearing it not on his chin but against his neck away back under the chin. It was well-groomed, too—whiter and silkier than any tuft of goat's hair or any lock of South Plains cotton. It must have been a hang-over from some other age or some other country, we know not where. Anyway, he was a nice-looking gent and carried an air of distinction, like a duke, maybe, or some Professor or Doctor of something or another. Anyway, he attracted a little more attention than the ordinary genus homo.

About the nearest approach to this gentleman's beard-style that we have ever noted are pictures of Jefferson Davis, although this round, ruddy-faced gentleman does not favor Jefferson Davis much more than any modern 16 year old girl favors Saul of Tarsus. Davis did wear an 'under the chin' tuft of whiskers, however. Most Kentucky "Kunuels" of his day are thought of as wearing goatees. In fact, the goatee seemed to be a rather popular institution in the South during the Civil War period, although General Robert E. Lee himself wore a full set of well-groomed beard, and Stonewall Jackson had a plentitude of long whiskers not so well kept. Many Southern gentlemen of that era are pictured with long beards. Maybe they didn't have time to shave.

Going back to the beginning of our country, Captain John Smith is always pictured as a bearded gentleman, and pictures of the Pilgrim Fathers who landed at Plymouth Rock represent the men as wearing beards. Their first Governor, John Winthrop, also had a nice set of silk-like hirsute adornments. But the typical Puritan has been carved in stone as a clean-shaven, sier-faced individual.

The prevailing style of the common man throughout our Colonial period doubtless included the wearing of beard but many of the preachers, lawyers, and public officials throughout the period are pictured as beardless.

Coming on down to our national

period, we note that all the portraits of Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, John Quincy Adams, and Andrew Jackson, an unbroken string of seven Presidents, and practically all of the leaders in Congress during their administrations, are uniformly pictured as clean-shaven. There seems to be just a faint hint of burn-sides high up on the face of John Quincy Adams in some of his pictures.

But Martin Van Buren is the first President that really shattered precedent and blossomed out in a luxuriant growth of side-whiskers. And, excepting the two Adamses, father and son, both of whom seemed to be poor politicians, Van Buren was the first one who failed to get re-elected. He didn't even get re-nominated by his party, which was the Democratic. A clean-shaven Democrat has long been a thing to be admired.

The only other President in our history who wore burn-sides was Chester A. Arthur, a Republican, and he did not get elected to the office; he was promoted to it by the dastardly act of an assassin, Charles J. Guiteau, a disappointed office-seeker, who shot and mortally wounded President Garfield only 4 months after he had taken office. Garfield lived ten weeks after his assassination and died on September 19, 1881, and the Vice-President thereupon became President. Arthur served out Garfield's term of three years and nearly six months but was not nominated by his party to succeed himself. He was a handsome gentleman, and was apparently proud of those silken burn-sides. No other burnside-adorned Republican has ever succeeded even in being nominated for the Presidency. Chauncey M. Depew tried it in 1888 but the much-bewhiskered Benjamin Harrison beat him to it and got elected. Depew got elected to the Senate in 1899 however, and served two terms.

Now going back to the end of the Van Buren regime, it will be noted that he had a string of clean-shaven successors. The Whigs had nominated a war-hero, William Henry Harrison, raised their battle cry of "Tippecanoe and Tyler too" and capitalized Harrison's "log-cabin, hard cider" background and elected him. He lived exactly

one month after he was inaugurated and Vice-President John Tyler, a Democrat, became President. James K. Polk, a Democrat, was elected as the next President on the issue of admitting Texas into the Union as a state, but the act of admission was passed before Tyler went out of office.

Then came on the Mexican War

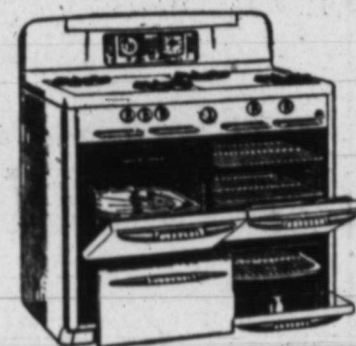
and old "Rough and Ready" Zachary Taylor became the hero of that war, and the Whigs nominated and elected him to succeed Polk. He too died in office and Millard Fillmore became President. Franklin Pierce, a Democrat from New Hampshire, a supporter of the Andrew Jackson policies, served one term as President.

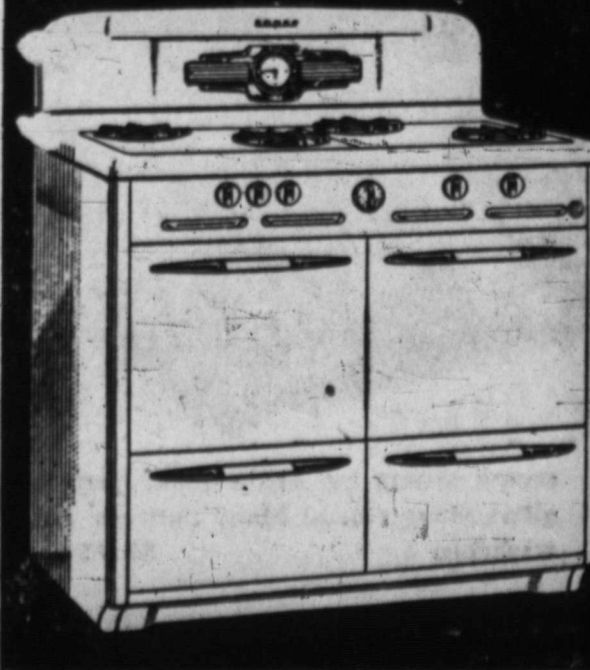

dent and was succeeded by James Buchanan of Pennsylvania for one term.

All of these wore no whiskers.

Then came the hairy-faced Lincoln, though he never wore a beard until he became President. When he was assassinated he was succeeded by Andrew Johnson, a clean-shaven Tennessee Republican. Then followed a line of heavily be-whiskered Republicans, Grant, Hayes, and Garfield. Here we skip Arthur, already mentioned, and come to Grover Cleveland, the first President to wear only a mustache. His first vice-president also broke some kind of record by wearing all kinds of whiskers except a mustache. He kept his upper lip clean shaved. That was the well-known Ohio statesman, Allen G. Thurman. Cleveland failed of re-election, being defeated by Benjamin Harrison, whose face was buried in whiskers.

Cleveland licked Harrison at the next election, however, and his vice-president was Adlai E. Stevenson, who also wore merely a mustache.

William McKinley followed Cleveland and departed from his Republican predecessors by taking his razor to the White House with him. He cut 'em all off clean. When he too was killed by an assassin, Theodore Roosevelt came into the picture. He wore a heavy mustache, probably in an effort to hide his big teeth, but that is one thing he never succeeded in doing.

After serving out McKinley's unexpired term and then one of his own, Roosevelt helped to elect big Bill Taft, who also wore a handsome mustache. He served but one term, for Roosevelt got mad and decided to run against Taft on the "Bull Moose" ticket, split the Republicans, and Woodrow Wilson, a clean-shaven Democrat, beat both of them.

At the next election the Republicans chose Warren G. Harding, a clean-shaven Republican, and he died in office, leaving the Pres-

idency to Calvin Coolidge, another Republican who consistently used the razor. In fact, with the retirement of President Taft, hair ornamentation seems to have gone out of style altogether. If you don't believe it, just look at pictures of Herbert Hoover, Franklin D. Roosevelt, and Harry Truman. We hereby warn all prospective candidates for the Presidency to go to the barber shop before announcing for the office and be sure to keep it up until after the election.

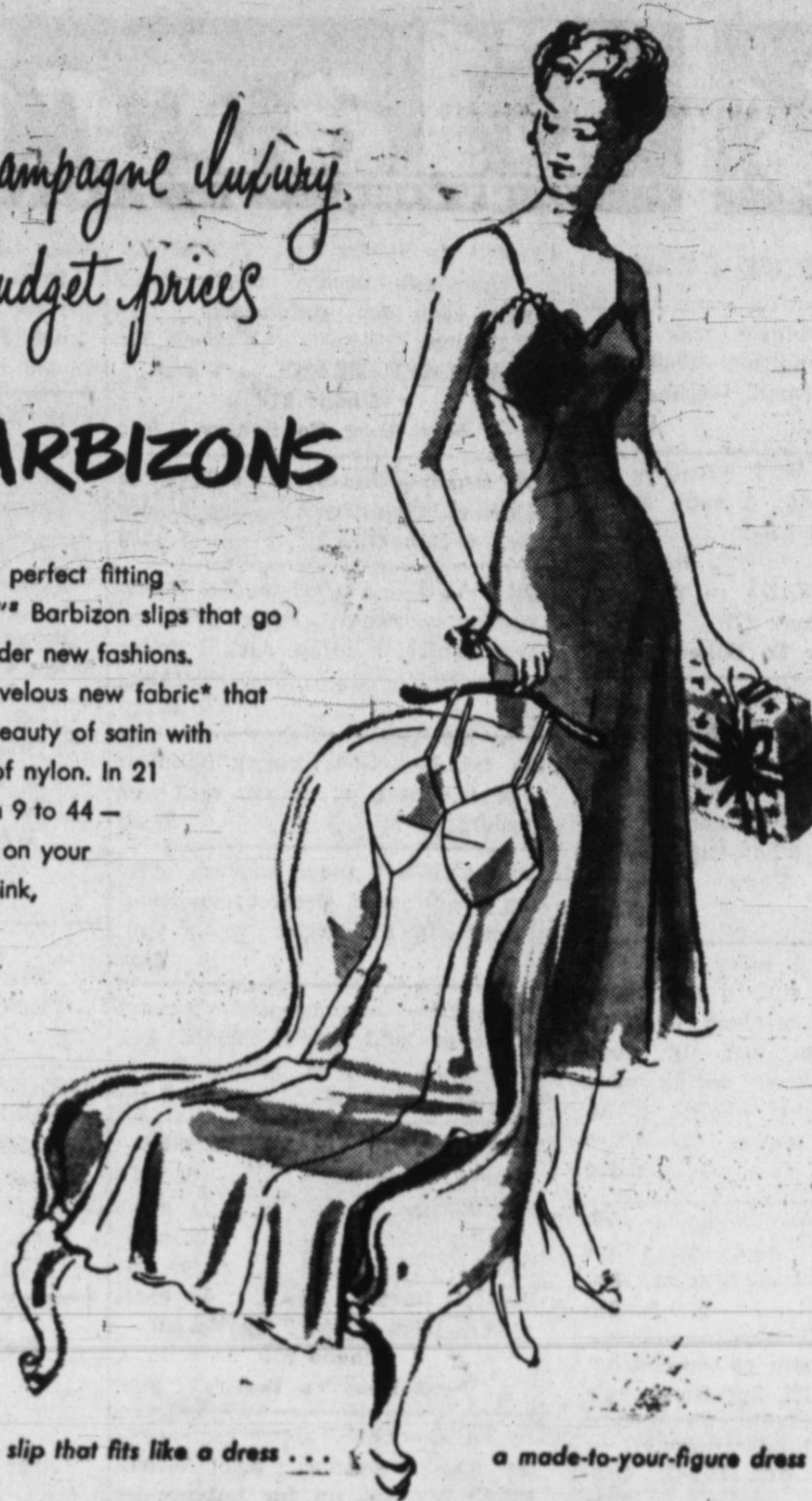
