

## Cars Smashed In Wrecks Here Over Week-End

Several car wrecks in Tahoka over the week end resulted in heavy damage to several automobiles, but none of the occupants was injured seriously.

Bill Burkhardt was driving a 1949 Plymouth on the Post highway Saturday night when a 1937 Chevrolet truck, driven east by a Mr. McCoy of Lubbock turned across the highway near the home of W. T. Clinton in front of the Burkhardt car. The collision resulted in a badly damaged front end to Burkhardt's car, but little damage to the truck, according to Sheriff "Slick" Clem, who investigated the accident. None of the occupants was hurt.

Sunday night, two Clarendon youths en route to Lamesa in an old model Ford coupe crashed head-on into a 1949 Chevrolet from Spur on the O'Donnell highway south of Tahoka. The Ford turned over and was "almost demolished," but the Chevrolet received less serious damage. No occupant was injured. Driver of the Ford told investigating officers he lost control of the car as he attempted to light a cigarette.

The same night, J. C. Thomas, local Negro, turned over an old model Chevrolet car in the south part of town near the Chaney Service Station. Thomas received cuts and bruises, but three other Negro occupants of the car were not hurt.

## Clem Candidate For Re-election

Roland W. "Slick" Clem, serving his first term as Sheriff of Lynn county, this week authorizes The News to announce that he is a candidate for re-election to the office he now holds.

Mr. Clem promises the voters that, if re-elected, he will give the citizens of the county the same courteous, friendly service he has endeavored to give them since he went into office about a year ago. At the same time, he offers no let up on his attempt to corral all the willful violators of the laws which protect the citizenship in general.

"I have made mistakes," he told The News, "for I was new to this business of law enforcement, but I have learned a lot and I believe I am now better qualified to fill the office than when I went in. The most I can promise is that I will do my very best."

During his first year in office, the Sheriff's office was responsible for arrests which resulted in the collection of \$23,000.00 in fines. Though there was a great influx of transient workers here this fall, vigilance of officers has helped in keeping crime at a minimum. In fact, this county has possibly had fewer major crimes in the last year than any county of like size and circumstances.

The Sheriff has long been a resident of this county, saw service overseas during the war, and has been active in civic work in the county since returning from the service.

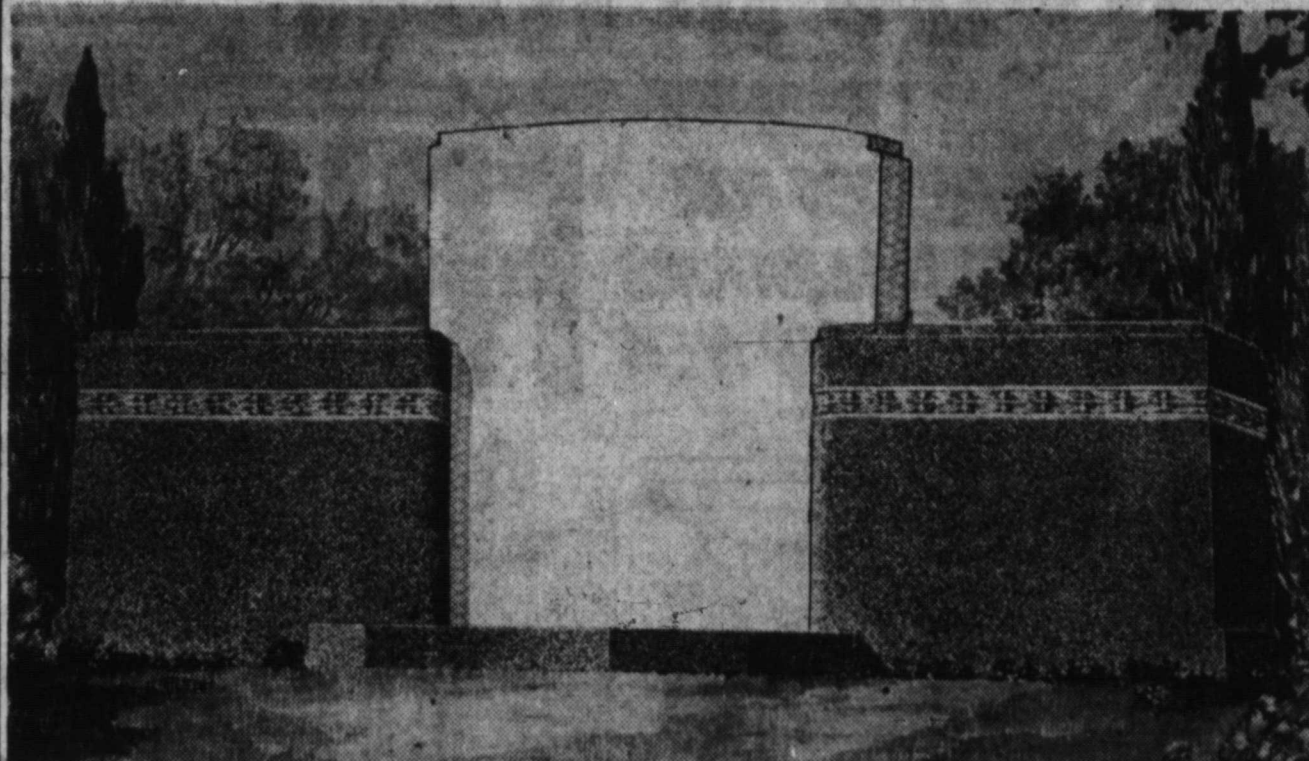
Sheriff Clem asks that the citizens continue to give him the same friendly co-operation and their careful consideration when they go to the polls next July.

## Work Starts On Local Theatre

Tahoka Wallace Theatres will be completely remodeled with work starting this week on the Wallace, according to Wesley Blankenship of Lubbock, who was here Monday in connection with the new work.

While the Wallace is being remodeled, shows scheduled for that theatre will be shown at the Lynn, beginning at 1:30 p. m. each day. As soon as the Wallace is completed, work of remodeling will start on the Rose.

The Wallace, he said, will be completely remodeled in and out. The front of the building will be raised higher, a new marquee built with a vertical neon sign. Inside, the lobby will be enlarged and remodeled, a refreshment bar installed, new carpets laid, and new heating system installed. The interior will be completely redecorated, and neon lighting installed. Russell Lewis, Dallas interior decorator, is doing the work. When completed, the owners hope this will be one of the most beautiful theatre interiors in this area.

Plans for remodeling of the Rose will be announced in a few weeks.

## Bulldogs Meet Post Tuesday

Tahoka lost its second conference basketball game Tuesday night on the local court to the O'Donnell Eagles by a score of 14 to 23.

They will play the Post Antelopes next Tuesday night at Post. However, the team left Thursday afternoon for Tulla, where they will play in that city's annual invitation tournament. This morning at 10:00 o'clock, they play the Lockney Longhorns.

The game here with O'Donnell was much closer than the score indicates. In the low scoring ball game, Tahoka was behind 3 to 4 at the quarter, 7 to 8 at the half, 12 to 9 at end of the third period, and tied the score at 12-all in the fourth, but in the fading three minutes, O'Donnell leaped into the lead to stay.

The B. game also was taken by O'Donnell 37 to 21.

Tahoka now has lost one each to O'Donnell and Seagraves, and won one from Slaton in conference play.

The Bulldogs did not fare so well in the Abernathy tournament last week end. They played their worst game of the season in losing to Farwell 44 to 15, but came back to play a veteran Littlefield five to a 40 to 30 score. The inexperienced girls' team went down before Abernathy and Lorenzo.

The Tahoka V.F.W. is proposing a memorial (pictured above) in honor of World Wars I and II men killed in action. This monument would be 16 feet wide, with the two wings, and 9 feet high. Names of men who died in World War I would be placed on the center section, and the names of those who died in World War II would be placed on the wings.

The monument proposed will be of polished red granite, approximately 18 inches thick, with names sand-blasted on the stone. Plans are to erect the monument in the triangular east of the Lynn County courthouse, formed by Highway 2, Sweet and South First Streets.

The memorial would be financed by donations from Lynn county citizens, and would cost about \$4,000.00. The drive for funds will begin January 23rd. Committees will try to contact every interested person in Lynn county. If not contacted by a representative of V.F.W., citizens should mail donations to C. W. Conway, Quartermaster, Tahoka V.F.W., and checks should be made payable to Tahoka V.F.W. Memorial Fund. Each week names of donors will be published in The News and O'Donnell Index-Press.

If plans are completed by May 30th, the memorial will be unveiled at a special Memorial Day ceremony.

Anson Jones became president of the Republic of Texas on December 9, 1844, and during his term the annexation of Texas to the United States was consummated and the State Constitution written. Texas officially became the 28th state on December 29, 1845, and Jones retired from office February 16, 1846.

Of further interest, Jones was succeeded by J. Pinckney Henderson as the first governor, who was a relative of the late W. O. Henderson of Tahoka.

Mrs. Harris, born in Texas in 1854, remembered vividly many experiences of the Civil War and other events of early day Texas.

## Tahoka Ginning Total Reaches 30,000 Bale Mark

Lynn county has ginned a total of approximately 170,000 bales of 1949 cotton to date, according to an estimate made by The News Thursday.

This far exceeds the previous record cotton crop for Lynn county set in 1937. And, indications are that there are at least 10,000 bales yet to be ginned from last fall's crop.

The previous record crop in 1937 was 154,000 bales. Tahoka had ginned a total of 30,247 bales up to 9:00 o'clock Thursday morning. Based on this figure and previous figures for the county as a whole, this is a reliable indication that the total county ginnings have reached the 170,000 mark.

Though there apparently is little cotton left in the fields, the staple continues to come into the gins. A few farmers are still using hands to pull bolls, and quite a few are still "scrapping" with mechanical boll pullers.

The News has no late figures on O'Donnell's ginnings, but previous figures indicate that O'Donnell has set an all-time cotton ginning record for any one town in West Texas.

**Boyd Tells Of Old Tennessee**

To the Editor of The Lynn County News:  
I will continue my travel story by telling a little more about Tennessee.

We did not have time to go through the Penal Farm but Clyde had gone through it on a previous occasion and he says that it is worth any man's time to pay it a visit. They raise live stock, farm, do their own shop work and many other things with prison labor. I do not know whether all of the inmates are trustees or not but we did not see any of them working under guard.

One of the sights that we will not easily forget was the old Colonial mansions that we have often heard about but had never seen. I was not disappointed because they held our undivided attention as long as we could see them. We saw many of these homes in Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland and Kentucky. If you love history and the glory of the past, you will certainly enjoy a trip through these states.

There are no prairies in this part of our country; it is all woodland with clearings here and

have a better way to exert their energy in something that would not harm them or someone else.

Think about this.—We dare you. Wake up to the fact that the youth of today will play a vital part in the world of tomorrow. If they get the proper social, as well as educational background, they will make good citizens instead of ones we would be ashamed of.

there. The surface of the land is not level because there are so many gulches in it that the most of it is unfit for tilling. However, every available spot from 1/4 acre to two or three acres is in cultivation. The land is evidently very rocky as you can see piles of rock on the spots that are cultivated. A little farther along we saw what one would probably call intensive farming, with every member of the family doing his part. The mother and, eight or ten children were hoeing, barefooted and bareheaded, while the old man was plowing, using a single mule dressed up in a leather collar, a pair of hames and chain traces, rope lines and a rope backband wrapped in a rag to protect the old mule's back. Of course the mule was pulling a Georgia-stock or a double-shovel. The land was all hillsides and the slope was so steep that they could not plow up and down it but had to plow around the hill. We saw hills farmed all the way to the top with rows running around the hill and "believe it or not" where they used cultivators they had a large wheel on the upper side and a small wheel on the lower side to keep them from turning over, or do better work—I do not know which. We stopped at a filling station once while we were there asked what the people did for a living and one man said, "we raise everything in here, this is the Tennessee Valley." I asked how much cotton they raised per acre and he told me that production depended entirely upon the amount of fertilizer used. His crop yielded 1 1/2 bales per acre and he farmed five acres and was still driving a Model A. I saw two or three one-row tractors and one combine about the size of a coffee grinder.

I remember one occasion, we were going around the mountain in a little town where we saw three little kids about six or eight years of age, two boys and a girl, all smoking cigarettes but in addition to that we saw three, two leans and one fat, sisters sitting on the hillside, barefooted and bareheaded squirting amber half across the road as the tourists went by. I wouldn't ask you to believe Leon but Mrs. Leon will verify that statement.

We had breakfast in Somerville, Tennessee where we saw a

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ancient relic of the past. As we were waiting at the filling station a man drove a beautiful bay mare, hitched to a clean, well-kept rubber-tired, top buggy across the street and we were told that he had been doing that

for several years.

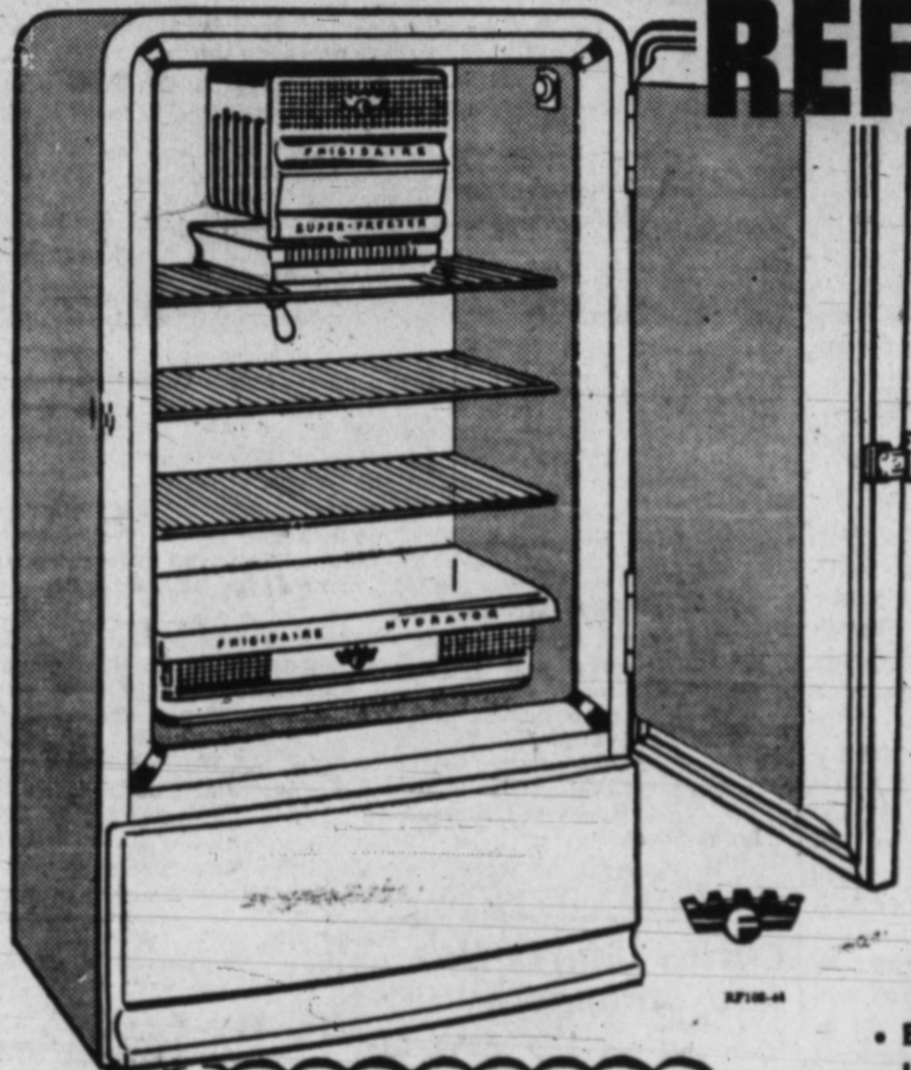

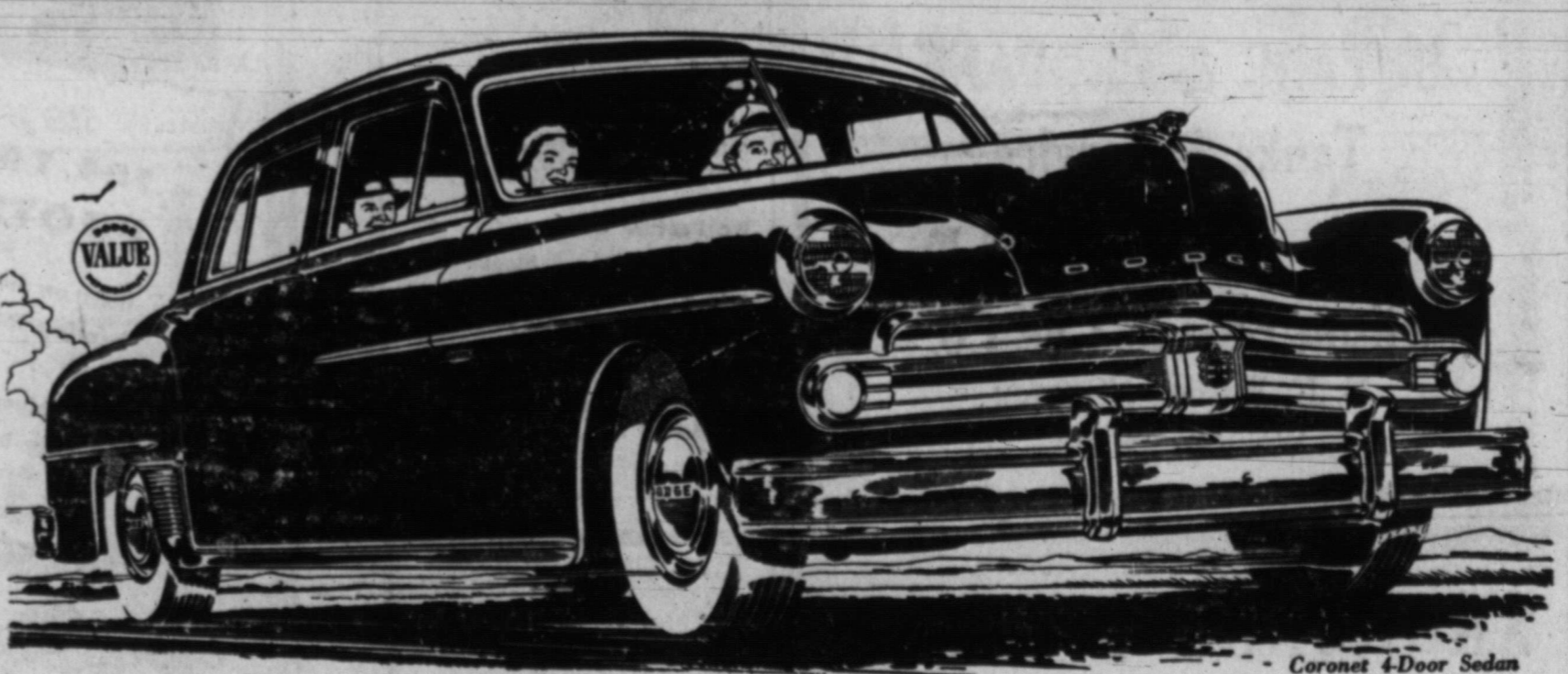

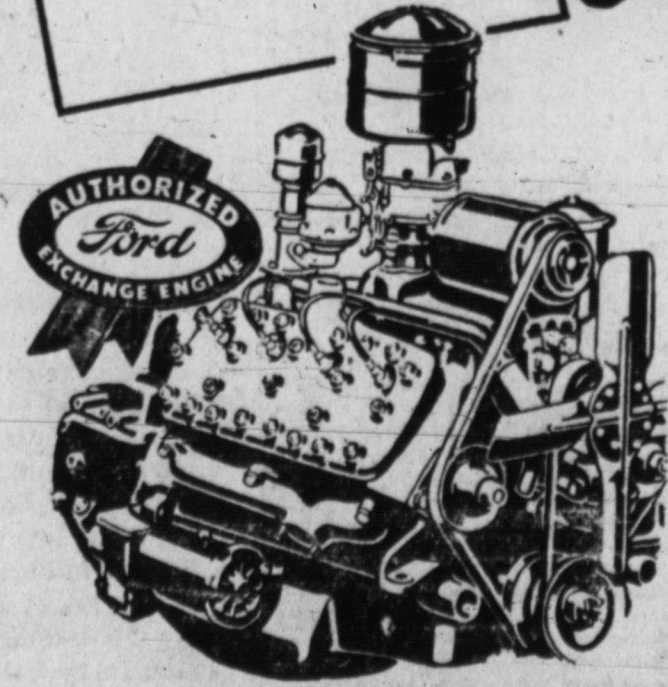

### Agent Continues Annual Report

Following is continuation of a brief summary of County Agent Bill Griffin's annual report, dealing this week with Conservation of Natural Resources, Irrigation, Wind and Water Erosion Control.

The County Agent attended an irrigation school held at Texas Technological College to gain information on pump efficiency and water saving methods to assist farmers with irrigation of crops selling at lower prices.

An irrigation school was held in Tahoka April 4 to study well development, application of irrigation water to crops and methods of applying irrigation water. Subjects discussed during the school were demonstrated on the annual Soil Conservation field

tour held May 4.

**Grasshopper Control**  
During June, grasshoppers were a serious threat to farmers who had cotton adjoining pasture land. Poison bait was made available through the cooperation of the County Commissioners' Court with the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Poison bait was used for control because of the lack of foliage necessary for application of the chemical sprays.

One hundred and eleven farmers spread bait on 7,992 acres of cotton to protect 57,317 acres adjoining pasture land.

### Support Price On Grain Is Urged

Congressman George Mahon reports to the Lynn County News this week that since his return to Washington for the current session of Congress he has conferred personally with Secretary of Agriculture in regard to a support price on the 1950 grain sorghum crop.

Mahon has urged that a grain sorghum support price at a level not below last year be announced in the immediate future. He has explained to officials that producers are making their plans for the year and need to know at the earliest possible moment what they may expect.

Under the law the Secretary of Agriculture can place a support program on grain sorghum into operation. The Secretary makes the decision as to whether or not a support program will be put into effect and the amount of the loan. Mahon and other members from grain sorghum areas lost their fight last year to secure a mandatory grain sorghum support program.

The support program for grain sorghum was not announced in 1949 until Mahon and many other members of Congress from grain sorghum areas had made repeated requests for action by the Department. The support price on the 1949 crop was not announced until last March 14. Mahon has urged that much earlier action be taken this year.

As indicated, the Department has not yet stated whether or not there will be a loan and the amount of such, but President Ralph S. Trig of the Commodity Credit Corporation has provided Mahon with a long statement as to the situation which has been made available to all PMA County offices and County Agents in the 19th Congressional District.

Insofar as is now known, there will be no acreage control program on grain sorghum in 1950 and producers who comply with the cotton acreage program can, if they desire, plant an unlimited amount of land in grain sorghum.

#### CORBIN FAVORS RESOURCE TAX TO FINANCE INSTITUTIONS

A natural resource tax appears to be the solution for financing the Texas Eleemosynary Institutions, according to State Senator Kilmer B. Corbin.

Referring to the special legislative session which is expected to be in January, Corbin said appropriation bills for operation expenses and improvements for the state's eleemosynary institutions is a must but added taxes must be levied to meet the needs. Improvements and expansion at the State Hospitals and Institutions is necessary to remedy the deplorable conditions which have heretofore existed in such institutions.

"The way I see it right now," Corbin said, "is that the state is still trying to operate on approximately the same amount of funds it was operating on 10 and 15 years ago. And they just don't meet the state's needs."

Corbin said that when the legislature convenes for the special session, one of five proposed solutions may be followed:

1. The recalling of the general appropriation bills passed by the group last year, including departmental, eleemosynary and education bills, and cutting them down to save money.
2. The levying of a state income tax.
3. A state sales tax.
4. An omnibus tax (endorsed by Governor Shivers).
5. A natural resources tax.

The recalling and shaving of general appropriation bills would hit right here in the home district, Corbin said. Texas Tech College at Lubbock would probably be cut down on funds. "I'm not against cutting some corners," he said, "but I couldn't be for the cut generally. If I had not wanted the bills as they now

stand, I would not have voted for them."

A state income tax or sales tax would create too big a burden on the general public, Corbin believes. "I have always been against both of them," the senator said.

An omnibus tax might work, according to Corbin, but it would still increase the heavy burden on the public.

"The best solution would be the levying of Taxes of new resources which can absorb them," Corbin said. "The appropriation of money for the eleemosynary institutions is imperative because the late Governor Beauford Jester voted the latter half of the operating expenses bill which the legislature passed," he said. "And we must raise additional funds to cover the expenses so I think a taxing of new resources would be the best solution and the least burden on the state."

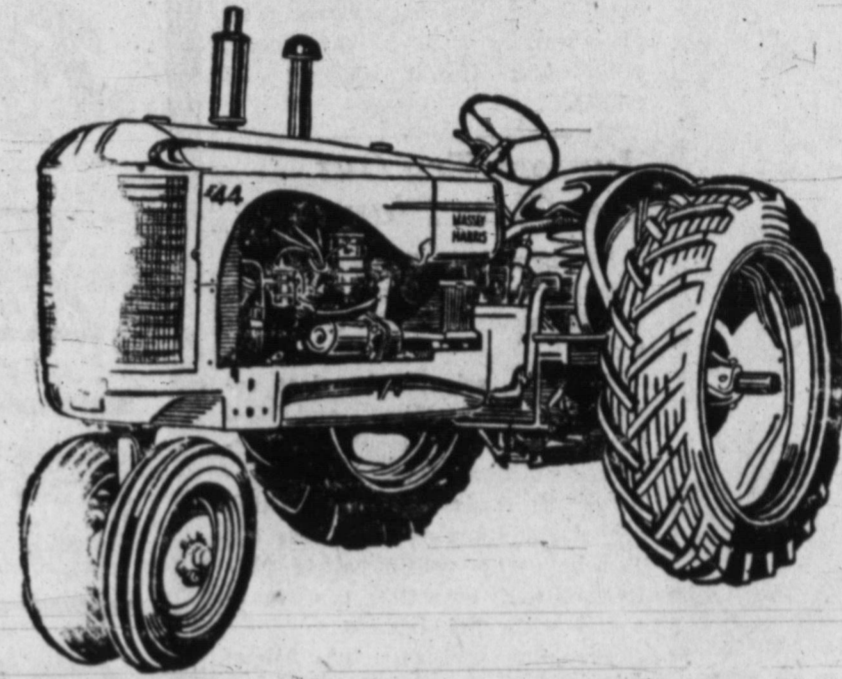

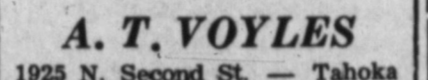

for J. F. Millman from Colorado City and Big Spring to Lynn county ranches and to the then little village of Lubbock. After Tahoka was established he operated a dray service for a while and possibly engaged in several other lines of work. In about 1923, he became janitor of the

Lynn county courthouse, which position he held until 1932, when he moved to Merkel. Tom Higgins was the most efficient caretaker of the court house and laws of any man who ever worked at that job here or anywhere else. He kept the building spotlessly clean and shining and the lawn green and healthy just as if it were his own, and would not allow any person he caught defacing the building or walking

on his grass! For years and years he kept a big yellow tomcat which he once figured up had cost him \$565.00 for hamburger meat. Like his courthouse, the cat was the pride of the town, and no one dared harm it either. The deceased was quite a character around Tahoka. Though seemingly rough at times, he had a heart as big as all outdoors, and the friends are many who mourn his passing.

Surviving him are: Mrs. Marc Risinger, sister; Joe Risinger, nephew; Mrs. Ruth Jenkins, niece; Jorane and Jimmie Risinger and Brookie Nell Jenkins, grandnieces, all of Merkel; and Sgt. Robt. A. Jenkins, with the Army in Berlin, Germany, grandnephew; all of whom were here for the burial rite except Sgt. Jenkins.

Others also attending the burial rites were Mrs. Warren Higgins, Mrs. Irvin Thompson and Jocille Thompson, Oren Higgins, Joe Higgins Jr., Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Higgins and son Dale, Mrs. Jess Higgins, and Mrs. Will Higgins, all cousins of Mr. Higgins and all of Merkel.

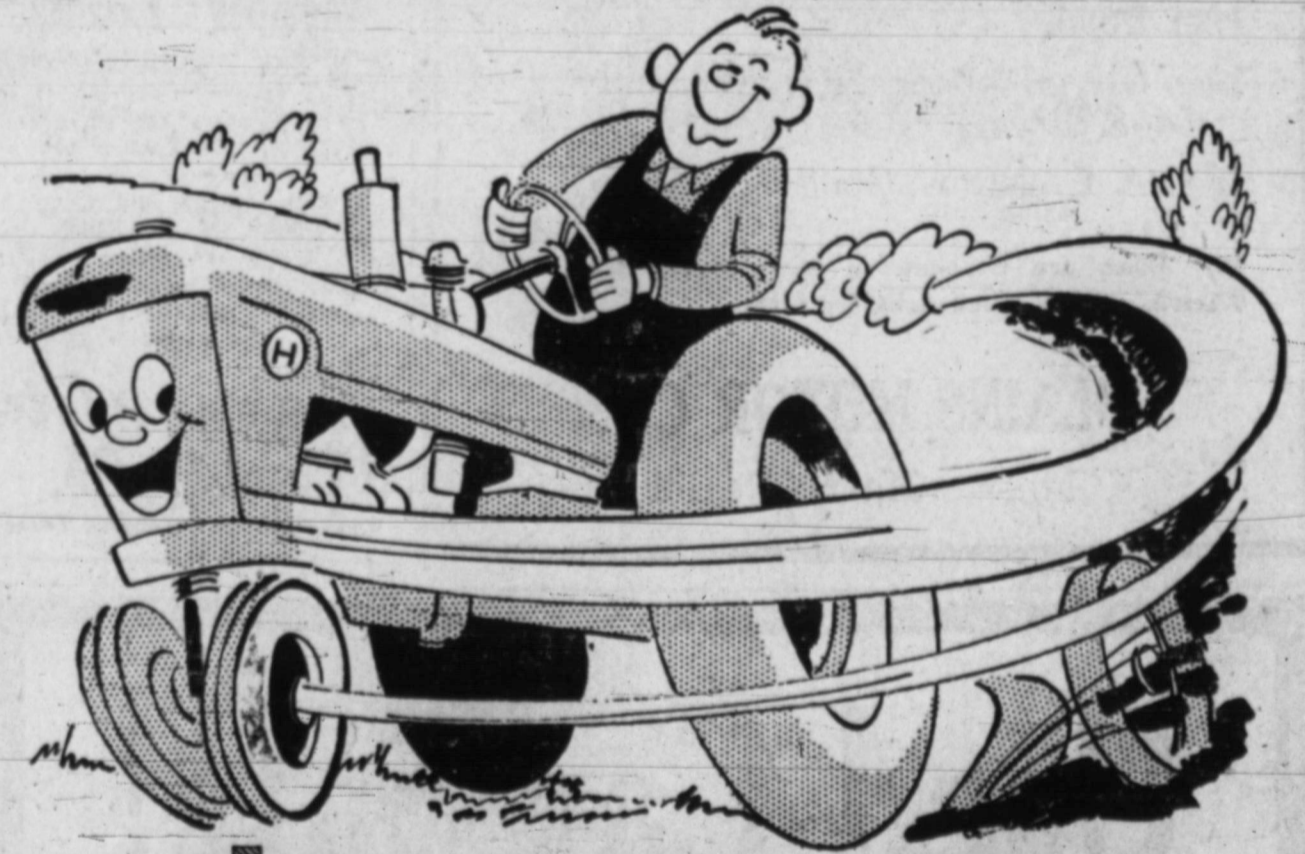
