### \$48 Billion Spent In Four Years For Nation's Military

WASHINGTON (Special- -Figures showing what the \$481/2 billion spent for the Military Establishment during the last four years means in terms of Federal taxes to various income groups were released today by the Council of State Chambers of Commerce. These show over the four years that:

A family of three with an income of \$3,000 paid \$645.19. A family of four with an income of \$5,000 paid \$1,130.08. A family of four with an income of \$7,500 paid \$1,798.92. In addition, these family groups paid out Federal taxes for other purposes connected with defense. These totaled a little less than \$4 billion and included such activities as arms aid to friendly nations, stockpiling of raw materials and atomic energy projects. But they meant \$49.85 in Federal taxes to the \$3,000 family group, \$87.26 to the \$5,000 group and \$138.90 to the \$7,500 group. The Council's study revealed

that \$6.75 out of every \$10 spent for the Military Establishment went for pdy of all personnel, and food, clothing and supplies for the soldiers, sailors and marines. Less than \$2 of each \$10 spent for defense was used to buy guns, ships and planes. The study declared that "Undoubtedly much housekeeping waste in the Military Establishn:ent diminished the value of the \$481/2 billion as an investment in preparedness, but efforts begun by Defense Secretary Forrestal and continued by Secretary Johnson to modernize the Establishment and cut out waste have now tended to strengthen that investment."

It added, "In view of the expanded program brought on by the Korean situation, it is all the more necessary that we obtain the maximum return for every dollar that we are investing in our national defense."

### FIRST CAVALRY (INFANTRY) DIVISION

THIS DIVISION, organized at Fort Bliss, Texas, in 1921 as a cavalry unit, was dehorsed in 1942 and since has served as infantry. However, its soldiers still prefer

to be known as "Cavalry Troop-ers." Among its components the oldest regiment is the 5th, or-ganized as the 2nd Cavalry regiment in 1855 commanded then by Lieut. Col. Robert E. Lee, who resigned when the Civil War began. The 7th regiment in this division was commanded by General George A. Custer and fought at the battle of the Little Big Horn at "Custer's Last Stand." The 8th regiment saw service against the Indians under Sitting Bull and in Pershing's punitive expedition against Pancho Villa in Mexico. Youngest regiment is the 12th, formed in 1901, which

served in the Philippines and on Othe Mexican border. In World War II the division

landed in the Admiralty Islands in February, 1944 and in defending Momote airstrip fought one of the wildest battles in the Pacific. Japanese marines in overwhelming numbers attacked with bayonets attached to long poles, trying to spear troopers in their foxholes and drive them into the sea. Against great odds the men of the 1st held the strip until the bulk of the division arrived. Approximately 4,500 Japs were killed in the battle for the Admiralties.

This 7th was one of the spearhead units invading Leyte in October. 1944, and for this action the division won a citation, with subordinate units also cited. It was the first American to enter Manila in the dash upon the Philippines' capital in January, 1945. Inside Manila the units split, one capturing Malacana Palace and the other crashing the walls of Santo Tomas University, liberating more than 3,700 Allied civilian prisoners. The 1st remained on Luzon mopping up Japanese elements until Japan capitulated. On September 10 it was the first American division to enter Tokyo. It remained there as an occupation force. Its Medal of Honor winners are Sgt. Troy A. McGill, of Ada, Oklahoma, and Pfc. William J. Grabiarz, of Buffalo, New York.

The commanding general of the 1st Cavalry is Major General Hobart R. Gay, a native of Rockport, Illinois, who was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Regular Army in October, 1917. He participated in the amphibious landing in Africa in 1942. He was chief of staff of the 3rd Army in European operation in 1944. In Septem-ber, 1949, he assumed command of the 1st Cavalry in Japan.

The division shoulder patch is a large shield of cavalry color, yellow,. with black diagonal bar and thoroughbred horse's head in the upper right corner. The bar signifies the division as first in name and in battle.
