-yes and for timber. Importance of Dredging Much money has been made by dredging swamp and other now useless land. The value of dredging has not yet been recognized in most states other than Florida. It is usually most profitable to dredge through a swampland which is unfit for building. A dredger scoop or a "sucker" takes dirt from the edge of the river or creek and throws it up onto the marshland, making beautiful sites. In many cases, this dredging also makes a small harbor or marina out of a useless bed or water. Every state probably has hundreds of such opportunities which are now neglected. Such waterfront would be in addition to the natural waterfronts, of which, as I have previously stated, there will never be more than exists now. The dredging of lakes and rivers would probably not add more

than 10% to the existing waterfronts which are now usable. Land which some day will be needed for watershed purposes could become very valuable. As the population increases, as industries grow, and as people become more accustomed to comforts, the demand for water will increase everywhere. This will apply not only to cities, but also to small towns. In many cases, the municipal water supply depends upon reservoirs with their surrounding watersheds. These watersheds must constantly become more valuable. Even those cities wheih drill wells for their municipal water supplies are finding that wells drilled near existing fresh water bodies are the most prolific. RED MILL IN WASHINGTON

One of the four basic freedoms of our democracy, the freedom of the press, is being used in Washi ton in an open and avowed plot to destroy a form of government which protects that freedom.

The Russian government has brazenly moved into Washington a large corps of highly trained Communist propagandists for the purpose of influencing American officials and the public in favor of

This red mill has for several weeks been misusing our freedom of the press to print and mail a hage volume of "press releases" from behind the closely guarded doors of the Soviet Embassy at 1706 18th St., N. W.

The Russians operate under aff of the protections accorded our free press, but under none of the restraints that might subject them to libel action for their lies. Tons of this Communist propaganda are put into the mail at rates which ire U. S. taxpayers to subsidize a part of the costs.

A call to the Russian Embassy to obtain an explanation brought the response that this is a "free country" and that the issuance of press recases by a foreign government was "perfectly legal," and besides what is wrong with making the Amerian people aware of our views?"

Why, then, we asked, does Moscow spend millions of rubles to jam our Voice of America broadcasts to the Russian people? There was a silence and then the

The Soft Touch



The lead "news Rem" features e "impressions" of a recent visitor Russia, Adhai Stevenson. The oxy identifies him as "the leader of the Democratic party in the U.S.A." and reports that he was

"deeply moved by the friendly attitude of the (Russian) people."

"Peace and friendship were the words he heard constantly," while in Russia, the release says. It adds that he left the Soviet Union "filled with graftends to the says. "filled with gratitude to the people of this great country," and that he had "no doubt that the people of Russia sincerely wished for peace and friendship,"

Use MAT HEAD Terraces are recommended only for land that is suitable for cul tivation, and slope and permea bility are such that runoff oc curs. Most of the soils that have over a one percent fall in Bailey county need terraces.

Terraces are used mainly for dryland farms, but several farm ers who have small wells and are using sprinkler systems are planning to terrace in order to get maximum benefit from rainfall. S. H. Pierce, who lives north

The advantages of terraces are that they reduce the length of the slope by allowing the water farmers between 21 and 35 years Jack Patterson and the rest of only to run the distance between terraces and not building to enough volume to cut gullies between terraces. Terraces reduce soil and water losses by preventing soil from being moved from the field.

The majority of the soil that s moved accumulates in the terrace channel. Water is held in the terrace channel and released slowly and allows a maximum amount to be absorbed by the soil for further plant use.

Terraces also allow land that would otherwise be too steep, to be farmed. Terraces in combination with other practices such as contour farming, stubble mulshing, cover cropping and proper tillage methods will work together successfully for increasing crop yields. These combined practices eliminate nearly all erosion, by maintaining or increasing the organic content which increases fertility and water holding capacity.
