

The water falls about eight or nine feet to the channel below, and runs on down a deep gorge for possibly a hundred yards or more into the main channel of the South Pease Riv er. The South Pease above that point has a dry bed except when heavy rains fall, but the stream of water coming from the spring may be seen for hundreds of yards down the river, and in fact a mile below the spring the highway from Dickens to Matador crosses the river on a bridge.

recaptured in 1860, the Indians as, they built a number of small dwellings close together on of Northwest Texas were rounded up and placed on reservations in the Indian Territory, but Comanches, Kiowas, and Apaches continued for several years to make occasional raids down into Texas. Finally General R. S. Mac-Kenzie of the United States Army was instructed to clean out these marauding bands and he proceeded to do so. He made a surprise night attack upon a big band of Comanches at the junction of the Tule and Palo Duro Canyons in 1874, stampeded their horses, and killed or captured the entire band. We never hear of any of them being in the vicinity of Medicine Mound or of Roaring Springs after Cynthia Ann's recapture; and I was not able to gather any further information about the place until 1895, except that both the Matador Cattle Company and the Espuela Land & Cattle Company were organized in 1879, and of course cowboys were briught into the county and into the vicinity of Roaring Spring immediately following. In 1895 the Dutchman school was established on Dutchman Creek on the present site of Roaring Springs and a man named Atchison was the teacher. There were some 12 or 13 pupils. Prior to the building of that school house a lit.le school had been conducted in a cellar. The place was nothing more than a small school center and trading point, however, until 1913.

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


