He awakened Mr. Burkhart, and he said his first thought was to find the fire and try to extinguish it but quickly found that this would be impossible. A moment after he had arisen, he believes a front window broke causing smoke and flames to sweep through the house and into the bedroom.

Everybody, which included a good many tourists like ourselves and most of the people, I think, who lived or did business in the Basin were watching them. To the surprise of the most of us and to the admiration of all of us those two kids ere long reached the top, and the little girl in particular way ed repeated salutes to the folks down in the Basin. Then they descended, and we found that the little hero was a ten-year-old boy, and the little heroine was a girl who was reputed to be only 5. Everybody considered that a remarkable feat.

Well, that was the end of our road. There might have been an un-improved road out of the Basin somewhere other than the paved highway by which we entered, but we were not blazing trails nor hunting unimproved roads in them thar hills, so if we traveled any more we would rave to take the back-track. For awhile we just stayed around there lifting our eyes to the heights admiring those great granite walls. Perpendicular for hundreds of feet in many places, apparently veneered and strengthened by great ponderous slabs of granite, placed upright and made secure by some infinitely powerful hand, rising yes thousands of feet above the floor of the Basin, which is itself 5,400 feet above sea-level.

Old Casa Grande yonder to the east rises to a height of 7,300 feet above sea-level, which is 1, 900 feet above the floor of the Basin at its feet; Lost Mine Moun tain right back there where we entered this impregnable fortress rises to a height of 7,550 feet, or 2,150 feet above the floor of the Basin; while old Mount Emory yonder to the southwest, rises to a height of 7,835 feet, or 2,435 feet above the Basin floor. "Water is about the cheapest thing we buy-it costs the Tahoka consumer less than five cents a ton," City Auditor Russell MsGee tells The

And, while scores of towns in Texas are suffering from a water shortage this summer, Tahoka now has a plentiful supply.

McGee, states that Tahoka's new water system, installed last year, has proven more than adequate this hot, dry summer.

Each hot month of this season has seen the setting of a new record in the total amount of water used with consumption at a million gallons a day.

The City has been getting a lot of complaints from customers, McGee says, on their water bills. Some people, however, do not consider how fast water may be consumed running through an air conditioner, a lawn sprinkler, or even a leaky faucet.

Tahokans should be happy that they have plenty of water and that the rates are no higher than those charged here. Rates in most towns in this area are much higher than Tahoka (Levelland's is 30 percent higher).

Tahoka's rates are: \$2.00 for the first 3,000 gallons; 30 cents per thousand for the next 10,000; and 20 cents per thousand for the all over 13,gallons.





> Following are some names that belong only to God:

1. "God," Gen. 1:1. The fourth word in the Bible is God. This short but important verse teaches four things about God. Viz: (a) His eternal nature; (b) His creative power; (c) His authority;

1(d) Profound respect. Never should man wear this name that belongs only to God.

2. "I Am," Ex. 3:14. This verse teaches: (a) The exclusiveness of 11:00 a. m. God; (b) The inferiority of man; Communion ......11:45 a. m. and (c) The sufficiency of God's Young Peoples Study 6:30 p. m. commands. This is also a term man should never assume.

3. "Jehovah," Ex. 6:3: The meaning, we are told, is "He Will Be." How appropriate. "God" the 10:00 a. m. beginning, "I Am," in the present, 11:00 a. m. and "Jehovah" future. No man 11:50 a. m. could think of such term belonging to himself. 4. "Our Father." Matt. 6:9.


