He had been in ill health for some time.

Lynn county's 4-H club entomology judging team took first place honors at the district contests held at Texas Tech Saturday, and will represent this district in the state judging contests at A. & M. College on June 10. About twenty counties participated in the Lubbock contests.

The Lynn county team scored 533 points to lead the Lubbock team, nearest competitor, who had a score of 490.

Members of the team and their scores are: John Mason, Tahoka, route 1, 187 points out of a possible 200; Cordell Hagens, Wilson, route 1, 186 points; Leroy Edwards, Tahoka, route 1, 180 points; and Don White, Wilson, route 1, 180 points.

Each team was allowed three members and an alternate. Since two boys tied, both Edwards and White received a share of the honors.

County Agent Bill Griffin, their coach, will accompany the boys to the State contest at College Station.

## W. J. Faires, 81, Is Buried Here

W. J. (Dad) Faires, 81, a longtime resident of Lynn county, died at 2:20 p. m. Wednesday at the home of a son, Mansel Faires, with whom he lived in Lubbock.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church in Tahoka at 5:00 p. m. Thursday with Rev. D. W. Reed, a pioneer Baptist minister of the South Plains and a friend of the family, and Rev. Jim H. Sharp, local Methodist pastor, officiating. Burial followed in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of Stanley-Jones Funeral Home.

William Joshua Faires, or "Dad," as he was affectionately known to scores of Lynn county people, was born in Oklahoma on December 8, 1870.

He was married to Miss Mellie Silman at McKinney on November 24, 1892. Three children were born to the union, but one of them, a boy of four, died before the family moved to Lynn county in 1916. The family settled on a farm west of Central Church, and lived there for many years, moving into Tahoka in about 1939. Mrs. Faires died March 27, 1949, after having been an invalid more than 25 years.

Since her death, Mr. Faires has made his home with Mansel, first at Possum Kingdom lake and more lately at Lubbock.

Mr. Faires served as commissioner of precinct 1 for two or three terms, and always took a deep interest in the affairs of his community and his county. He left many warm personal friends.

Survivors include two sons, Clifton Faires of Norwalk, Calif., and Mansel Faires of Lubbock; three grandchildren, and five great grandchildren.

# 1951-52 Great Year For Tahoka School System

All-around, the 1951-'52 term has been the most successful in the history of the Tahoka Public Schools.

Work in the classrooms is largely an intangible proposition, lacking in show and glamour, but Supt. Otis Spears says the work as a whole has been the best he has ever seen and he thinks most of the teachers will back him up in the statement.

"At any rate," he says, "There has been an excellent spirit of cooperation and desire to go forward from students, teachers, patrons, and school board members."

On the physical and extra-

curricula side, accomplishments of the year are more noticeable to the public.

This year, the new \$235,000 primary building and cafeteria, among the best in this section, was completed. A band building has been made available, two concrete tennis courts built, the older buildings repaired, new walks laid, and the grounds are being landscaped.

This school year, Tahoka Bulldogs won the District 6-A football championship, being undefeated in the district.

Tahoka Bulldogs won the District 6-AA basketball champion-

ship. This was the first time the school ever took both championships in one year. In fact, it is Tahoka's first basketball championship.

Tahoka Girls won the District 4-A tennis singles and doubles championship.

The band took first place in the Brownfield festival in its division.

Tahoka Band, in the Region I Interscholastic League Music Festival at Canyon, took sweepstake honors, the highest possible, in its class in competition with 20 other bands. It also broke a three-year record in number of indi-

vidual first places, took top honors in twirling, and was selected as one of two bands out of 65 entered to represent the region at the State Fair of Texas next fall.

The local high school furnished the president, Wanda Norman, of the Panhandle-Plains High School Press Association.

A calf shown by a grade school boy, Jerry Cain, was grand champion of the annual South Plains Junior Livestock Show, the first time a Lynn county boy or any boy this close to Lubbock has ever won the honor.

Tahoka Agriculture Depart-

ment's FFA-Dairy judging team took first place in its district, and the Senior Quiz team also was first. Tahoka FFA boys showed the champion Duroc and the champion Berkshire hogs at the South Plains Junior Livestock Show.

There were many other honors won by students of the Tahoka schools this year, but a full list can not be assembled easily.

Tahoka schools have reason to be proud of the year's accomplishments.

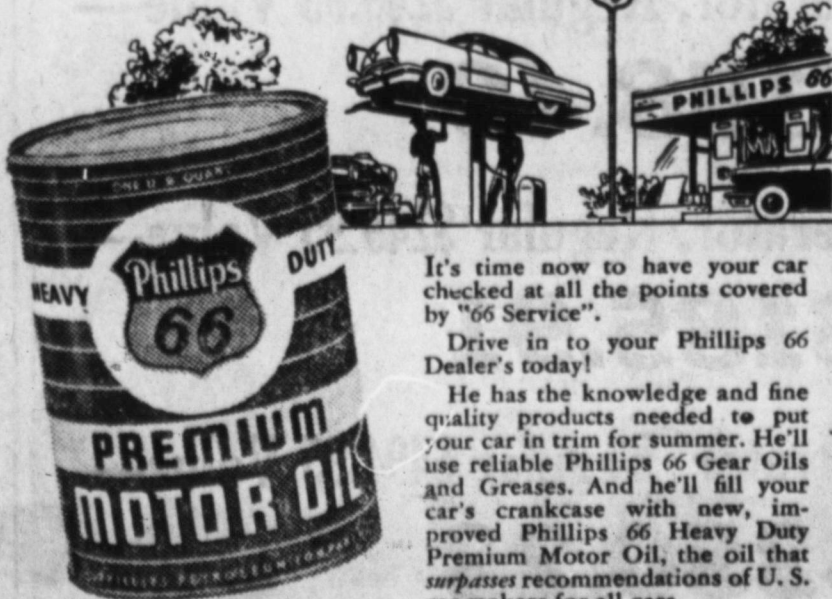

### SWEET POTATO ROLLS

Every homemaker likes to show a spark of originality in her meal planning. Many homemakers are not aware that sweet potatoes offer one means of making hot rolls that will bring new interest to their meals. Try this sweet potato recipe and see for yourself what superb rolls result.

- Sweet Potato Rolls
  - 3 tablespoons sugar
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 2 tablespoons margarine
  - 2 cups mashed cooked warm sweet potatoes
  - 8 cups sifted enriched flour (about)
  - 1 cake yeast
  - 1 1/2 cups lukewarm, scalded milk
- Add sugar, salt, and margarine to mashed sweet potatoes. Blend thoroughly. Add one cup of flour and mix well. Dissolve yeast in milk. Add to sweet potato mixture. Beat until smooth. Cover and let rise in a warm place for one hour. Gradually add remaining flour and work into a stiff dough. Knead well. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Shape into rolls. Place on a margined cookie sheet. Bake in a 375 degree oven for 12-15 minutes. This recipe makes two and one-half dozen rolls. Serve hot with margarine squares.

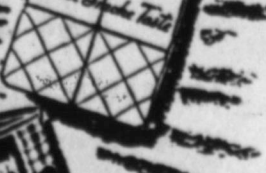

Anyone who will probably want Mexican National hands for hoeing should make a report of their needs as soon as possible, for, as stated before, a users list must be sent in and each employer approved as eligible before he can get them, J. O. Allen of the Lynn County Farm Labor Association, states.

There are probably some hold-

ing back on account of the dry weather and the uncertain crop outlook, but there is no need of that, he says. It is best to go ahead and apply for all you think you will need, get approved and be ready to go. Later on, if conditions are such that you do not need as many as estimated, or perhaps none, that can be taken care of by giving notice to that effect 15 days ahead of delivery date. On the other hand if you do need them, they will be ready for you.

## Native of Iran Tells His Country's Side of Oil Dispute, Other Problems

Hossein Karimi, 21, of Teheran, Iran, a Junior pre-med. student in Texas Tech, was the speaker on the Tahoka Rotary Club program Thursday noon of last week.

The program was arranged and the speaker introduced by John Toler.

Karimi, who is of the Moslem faith, described his native country, its geography, its religion, its politics, its rapid advancement educationally, and its peoples. His talk was very interesting and enlightening, and his frank observations and wit delighted his audience.

Especially in regard to religion and the country's relation with England and the United Nations, he presented the other side of the picture.

Iran's population is composed of 93 percent Moslem, sometimes called Mohammedans. There are a few Christians, and the remainder are Jewish. He debunked publicized reports of strife among the religious factions, and declared that for the most part Moslems, Jews and Christians are getting along fine in that country.

He declared that the three have much the same moral principles, though the creeds are different. In fact, he said he frequently attends Protestant churches in Lubbock, and sees little difference in our moral teachings.

Though Iran has 1,700 miles of border next to Russia, he says his country has no great fear of Russia. If invaded, Iran will fight to the last man, for the Iranians for centuries have lived a hard existence and value their land and their freedom.

Because they are intensely religious, they have no fear of Communists boring from within. Though there are Communists in Iran, they are getting no where at all.

Politically, Iran at the present is more or less democratic. The government is much like that of England, with a prime minister and his cabinet, who can be ousted at any time they fail to get a vote of confidence from the

senate and house. Their king is much like that of England. He has little power, and is more or less a playboy.

Also, the country has made rapid advances in other ways during the past few years. Slavery is no longer tolerated. However, a woman is still a Lady in Iran. She does not vote, but she enjoys high respect and commands the utmost courtesy and consideration from the males. She engages in little activity outside the home and family.

Whereas in the recent past, ignorance has prevailed, now the country has compulsory education. Every child must go to school. Every child must pass every subject he is taking or he falls in them all and must do the year's work over again. And, he declares the young people are taking their education seriously.

Much has been said of the climate in Iran. He insists that the heat and the cold in that country—except in the desert where few people live anyway—is much more even. That is, the weather is not changeable as it is in this part of the United States. He says the climate of Teheran is much like that of Galveston in the summer. Even when a cold spell comes in the winter, the cold is even for days at a time, and neither the cold nor the heat hurts as it does on the South Plains. Some of the oil refiner

ies are in the desert, however, where the temperature gets up to 140 degrees in the summer, and men can work only at night and sleep in air conditioned houses by day.

Oil is the seat of Iran's great

est difficulties at present, and oil is the seat of its troubles with Great Britain. The United Nations and the United States, as well as England, are unpopular at present in Iran because of our stand in backing England against

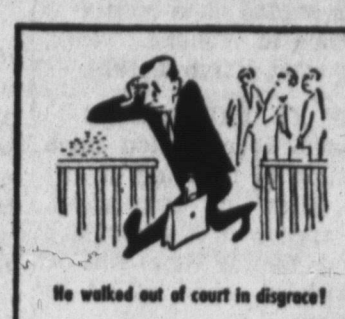
Iran in the oil dispute. He declared that years ago an unscrupulous ruler of Iran granted oil rights to an individual citizen of England for a sum of money. Little notice was paid the (Cont'd. On Back Page)

**Odds AND Ends**

(BY E. I. THE ELDER)

Last week I told you about the great Cathedral of Mexico, built on the site of the former Aztec temple or teocalli, where the Indians had offered thousands of human sacrifices. I promised that this week I would tell you about another great cathedral in that city. So I am going to tell you about the Cathedral of Our Lady of Guadalupe, which was founded, it is claimed, as the result of miraculous appearances of Mary, the Mother of Jesus to a poor, illiterate Aztec Indian named Juan Diego, giving him instructions to go to the Bishop Zumarraga and tell him that he should erect a temple on the very spot where Juan Diego first met the Virgin Mother, Tepeyac Hill.

Five times the Heavenly Apparition appeared to Juan Diego on this hill, according to the story, and five times Juan Diego carried the message to Zumarraga. Each appearance is described in great detail in a little booklet, telling all about the origin and history of the Cathedral, which I bought at an office in the Temple on my first visit there. These five appearances of Mary to the Indian were made at irregular intervals on December 9-12, inclusive, in the year 1531. Bishop Zumarraga was at last convinced and proceeded to build the Temple, and it still stands, though additions and new structures have been built since the original temple was erected on Tepeyac Hill. This hill is the southernmost spur of a mountain range that extends from the northwest down to the very city limits of the present city of Mexico. So, the Cathedral proper stands at the foot of this hill near the northern outskirts of the city and faces south. It is now indeed an imposing structure. While it does not approach the great Cathedral of Mexico in grandeur, it does greatly exceed it in popularity. If you should make a visit to Mexico City you will certainly want to go out to the Cathedral of Our Lady of Guadalupe on Sunday afternoon—any Sunday afternoon.

Mr. Boyd and I and the friends I have mentioned many times in this Column did go over there—or out there—on two different Sunday afternoons and passed by it without stopping on another Sunday afternoon. What we saw and heard was both amazing and pathetic. We had to stop our car far up the street, or far down the street—one can never tell which is what in Mexico City—and walk a distance of

two or three blocks to the entrance of the Cathedral. Between us and the Cathedral, great crowds of people were "milling around." It looked and sounded somewhat like a Carnival crowd on one of the most popular days at the South Plains-Panhandle Fair in Lubbock. It was a different kind of crowd, however, but the hawkers were there in great numbers peddling all kinds of toys, trinkets, curios, toy balloons, and just about everything to please the fancy of little tots and big ones too. There were probably a dozen stands on the church premises and adjacent streets where cold drinks, hot drinks, cookies, cakes, fruits, and other refreshments were being sold. Nuns or other church officials, though none of them wore the full garb of their respective order—in compliance with Mexican laws—were moving about through the crowds collecting pesos and coins for the coffers of the church.

Worshippers, too, were crawling from the streets on their knees to the front entrance of the Cathedral, thence through the doors, and on as far as room would permit toward the chairs provided for the worshippers a little nearer to the large and beautiful painting of the Virgin Mother—an imaginary likeness, of course, that rested high up toward the ceiling of the great sanctuary. Each time we were there we quietly made our way through the dense crowds outside the building, and on through the entry doors, and then stepped quietly out of the line of the stream of worshippers and watched from the sidelines. Other mere visitors were doing the same thing.

On the first Sunday afternoon we were out there, we saw an aged woman, doubtless a grandmother, crawling into the church on her bare knees, and of course she had to be helped along somewhat. Some of our crowd said that her knees were bloody. On our second visit, we saw one couple and a child or two, crawling on blankets, from some place clear across the street some 50 yards away toward the Cathedral entry. As they would crawl off of one blanket onto another, attendants would pick

up the rear blanket and place it in front of them, and thus this family made its way into the great basilica without having contacted the dust and the dirt of the street.

Upon entering the church, the worshippers would fix their eyes upon the Image of Mary and clasp their hands as if in prayer—and doubtless all of them were praying. One could see the lips of some of them moving and tears streaming down the cheeks of others. Nobody could make sport of a scene like that, and I am sure that nobody wanted to do so.

But the sad thing about it, so far as Protestants are concerned, was the evident fact, or at least the apparent fact, that none of those worshippers was praying to God or to the Son of God, or to the Holy Spirit of God. They were praying only to the Image of the "Mother of God"—an Image which was lifeless, powerless, incapable of even hearing their prayers. "O," some may say, "they were praying to the spirit back of the Image." We trust that that might have been—so in many cases, but there was nothing visible to indicate it. There was a picture of Jesus on the Cross on or near one of the walls of the sanctuary, but I saw nobody praying to that picture. Furthermore, in the Ten Commandments, God specifically forbade that people should bow down to and worship any picture or image.

Of course those Aztecs and Mestizos knew no better, for they had never been permitted to read the Bible and had been taught by the Catholic priests to do the very thing that they were doing.

While we were in the Cathedral, we were free to pass from one compartment to another, viewing the pictures, the images, paintings of the Saints, and every-

thing that pertains to the Catholic faith and worship. In fact, one is invited or at least encouraged to do that very thing, in the hope that in the midst of all this Catholic-propaganda some may be constrained to become Catholics themselves. It was on this ramble through the building that I ran upon and purchased the little booklet mentioned in the first paragraph of this column. In this booklet there are numerous pictures, and under one of them I noted these cut lines:

"The main altar of the National Basilica of Guadalupe with the Holy Image of Guadalupe. Place of worship of millions of Catholics from all over the world."

I think that statement is no mere exaggeration. I imagine that hundreds of thousands from Mexico alone worship there during a year's time.

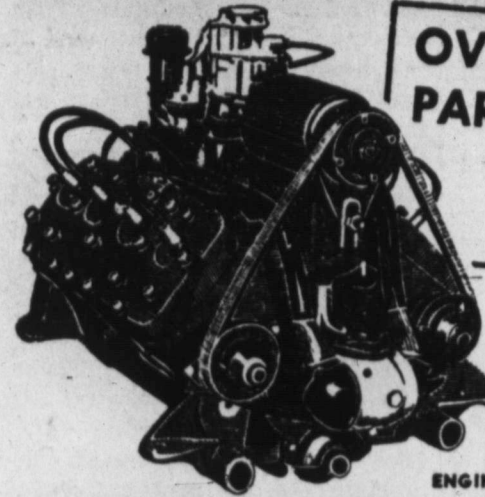
Having completed our visit inside that first Sunday afternoon, we made our exit through a door in the west wall of the Cathedral, and there we heard music and saw a great crowd. Elbowing our way closer in to find out what

was going on, we soon discovered that it was a dance—apparently a war dance, being staged by Aztec Indians. Two or three Indians were playing musical instruments—a guitar and a tambourine possibly—and the music was martial and lively. About three hardy Aztec Indians were dancing to the music, and a great crowd of Indians and whites were looking on and listening

intently. This performance was supposed to be a corollary of the religious services inside, but those Indian dancers were going through all the contortions that I have observed at other times when it was said that they were staging a war dance. It didn't look to me very much like a pious performance; and if those Indians had any spirit of worship

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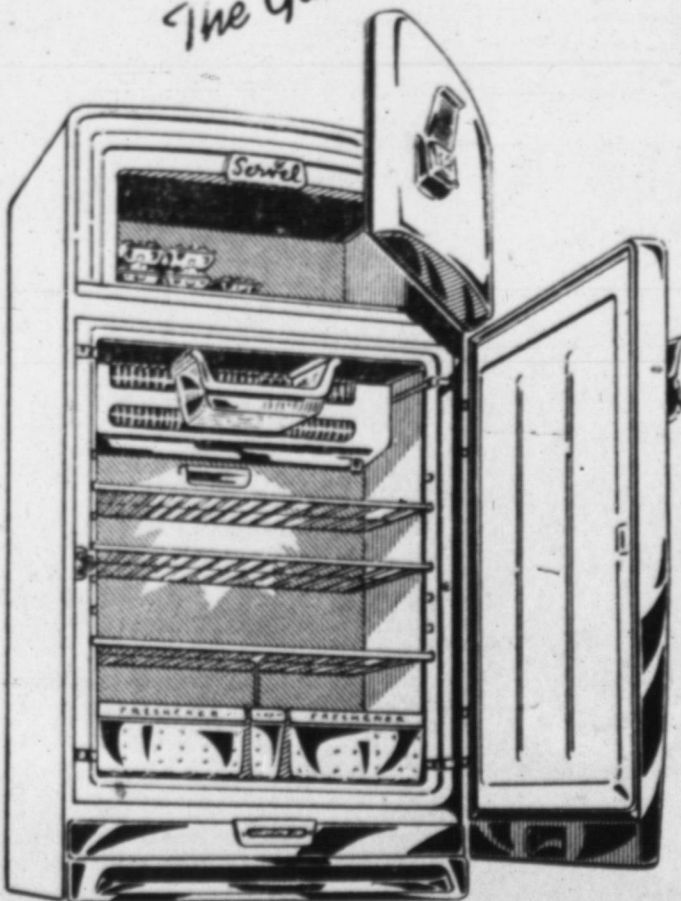

in their souls it did not show up on their faces. The muscles of their faces were drawn taut, and I thought I could see only hatred written all over their countenances and gleaming from their beady eyes. And they certainly were working hard at the job, sweating as it were great drops of blood. If they had had their machetes along with them, I think I should have hunted tall timber elsewhere. I feel that they must have been thinking that afternoon of Cortez rather than Christ.

During the dancing, I did absent myself any way, and with two other members of our little party, I climbed an outside flight of stairs that led up and up and up the almost precipitous southern end of Tepeyac Hill to a resting place, where there were other refreshments for sale and a wonderful view of portions of the city, spread out before us. After the rest, I made another but shorter climb up almost to the very top of the hill where

old Juan Diego claimed to have met the Mother of God and to have received a message from her to the highly educated and polished Bishop Zumarraga.

Incidentally, we have been wondering if the good Bishop himself was not on speaking terms with the Virgin Mother. Some have been brazen enough to suggest that Bishop Zumarraga might have invented that story himself and used it as a means of flattering and winning the Aztecs to the Christian banner and also as evidence of divine approval of his plans to raise funds from the Spaniards as well as from the Indians with which to build the contemplated church.

Juan Diego's story, as he is supposed to have given it to Bishop Zumarraga, takes up more than a dozen pages in that little Catholic Booklet which I have. He relates in great detail each of the five alleged appearances to him. It is a ridiculous story, but we can not publish the whole thing in this column, so I am going to give you a condensed account of it as published in a book entitled, "Mexico, A Land

of Volcanoes,"—meaning a land of political and social eruptions. The author of the book, Joseph H. L. Schlarman, represents himself to be a Catholic and his book is in fact a defense of the Catholic Church.

Now, here is his condensed version of the Juan Diego story. "Scarcely more than a decade after the conquest, something happened in Mexico that had a tremendous influence on the religious and culture of the natives. December 9, 1531. Juan Diego, an Indian living near Tepeyac, was on his way to hear Mass in the Franciscan Church at Tlatelolco. As he came down the steep path over the rock of Tepeyac, the Blessed Virgin appeared to him and told him he should go to Bishop Zumarraga and ask him to build a chapel in her honor on that spot. When Juan Diego asked for credentials of his mission, she told him to go gather an armful of roses (although it was winter and there were no roses in bloom) and deliver them to the Bishop with her message. Juan gathered up the roses, and when he opened his tilma (a cloak fastened by a knot) in the presence of the Bishop, the roses fell to the floor, and on his tilma appeared an image of the Blessed Virgin, the self-same image still venerated in the shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Mexico City.

"Juan Diego testified that the Blessed Virgin appeared to him on five different occasions. The Indians believed Juan Diego's account. The Blessed Mother had appeared to one of their own! The Spaniards might be their rulers, the friars might instruct them in catechism, but the Blessed Mother had appeared and had spoken to one of their own. Up to this time the natives had shown passive resistance to the preaching of the Gospel. The Apparition to Juan Diego gave an astounding impulse to the work

of Christianization, and mass conversions became the order of the day. The child-like devotion to Our Lady of Guadalupe spread to the Indians, to the Mestizos, and to the Spaniards alike and remains to this day the most powerful religious and cultured influence with Mexicans of all classes."

In a further effort to substantiate the alleged story of Juan Diego and Bishop Zumarraga, the above-mentioned author, Joseph H. L. Schlarman, in a reference note published on page 597 of his book, gives this additional testimony and statement of facts:

"The historical fact of the apparition to Juan Diego is substantiated by many documents, both of Indian and Spaniard origin, and by tradition going back to the days of Zumarraga. In compliance with the request delivered by Juan Diego, Bishop Zumarraga built a small chapel; his successor, Archbishop Montu-far, built a larger one, and in 1720 a large church was erected, which has been twice enlarged and restored, in 1895 and again in 1930. In 1737, Our Lady of Guadalupe was proclaimed the patroness of Mexico City and of the nation. In 1910, the Holy See declared Our Lady of Guadalupe the patroness of Latin America, and in 1945, Pope Pius XII called her the patroness of America."

Thus it is thoroughly substantiated that the Roman Catholic Church from the Pope down gives its approval to this Juan Diego-Zumarraga story of the repeated appearances of the Virgin Mary to this crude, unlettered, Aztec Indian more than four centuries ago in order to induce the Bishop to build a church on Tepeyac Hill. It has maintained the integrity of this story and taught it to the Indians through all the years since, and still

wants intelligent Americans and intelligent people everywhere to accept it as the truth and thus to acknowledge the divine origin of the Cathedral. Is it any wonder that intelligent people in Mexico, in time, came to reject the story and to rebel against the authority and integrity of the powerful and almost world-wide ecclesiastical organization itself, known as the Roman Catholic Church with its head or Pope in Rome? And when, on account of this unbelievable story and for many other reasons, they repudiated and rebelled against this church many of them became agnostics or outright atheists, and hundreds of thousands of other citizens of Mexico are today indifferent with respect to all churches and all teachings of the Bible.

But the pitiable Aztec Indians are still crawling upon their knees into this magnificent Cathedral to worship the image of the Blessed Mother, who, they confidently believe, had those interviews 400 years ago with one of their number and through him brought about the building of this great Cathedral. And many mestizos and some Spaniards also still believe the fantastic story and they too worship the image of the Virgin Mary at this shrine. If any country on earth needs Christian missionaries more than does Mexico, we have not yet become acquainted with it.



concession until oil in immense quantities, 6 percent of the world's oil, was found in that country. When Iran government attempted to secure more money from its oil from the English private business concern, the government of England retaliated with taxes that amounted to more than the concession brought Iran. When Iran wanted to terminate its arrangement with the private foreign concern, the British government took up the fight, and has been backed by the UN and the U. S. The people of Iran think they have a right to retain these valuable natural resources, he said, since the original agreement was between an unscrupulous politician and a private company of a foreign country.

Hessein Karimi is from a wealthy family of Iran, but he hopes to become a physician and return to his homeland to minister free of charge to the poor people who need medical attention so badly. Though the country has many doctors, most of them minister only to the people of means.

He thinks the old country of Iran, the oldest inhabited area on the face of the globe, is making rapid strides and faces a brighter future.
