## Auto Inspection Response Good Over This Area

Lynn county inspection stations have processed a total of 4,098 vehicles for compliance with the new Texas Motor Safety laws which went into effect on September 6, according to Jim Riddle of the Department of Public Safety who was here Tuesday.

He said there have been about 5,500 vehicles registered in Lynn county. Of this number, about 400 are not required to undergo an inspection. This leaves a difference of about 800 vehicles.

Mr. Riddle said a hurried survey revealed only one vehicle without the inspection sticker. He thinks that many of these 800 remaining vehicles may have been inspected in some other county.

Anyway, he states that it is now a violation of the law to drive a motor vehicle without an official "OK" sticker, and he suggests that anyone not having had his car inspected get busy at once or before driving it on a public road.

He also states there is considerable misunderstanding regarding the necessity of the inspection of some cars. All cars, trucks, motorcycles, and other motor vehicles must be inspected for operation. All cars up for sale or for transfer or operation must have the inspection sticker—and such inspection should be made before transfer or license is issued.

Dealers must inspect all new cars prior to sale of the same. The law is designed to take unsafe cars off the highways, or to make them safe for driving on the highways, and is driving an effort to cut down on the number and seriousness of traffic accidents.

As a whole, citizens have cooperated in a wonderful manner to comply with the law, and it is hoped that lives of our citizens will be saved by it.

## Traffic Laws Get More Attention

State Highway Patrolmen are "cracking down" on traffic violators in an effort to cut down on the many wrecks occurring over the South Plains, according to Justice of the Peace P. D. Server.

Five complaints charging motorists with speeding were filed with Server over the weekend.

Highway Patrolmen warn the public that speed limits on the highways are 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 at night for passenger cars, and 45 miles per hour for commercial vehicles, pickups, farm trucks, etc.

Warning is also being given farmers that all trailers must carry legal reflectors when driven at night.

It is also presumed that the Highway Patrol will start "cracking down" on drivers of motor vehicles who have not had such vehicles inspected and repaired to comply with the new Texas Motor Safety laws.

## Firemen Raising Iron Lung Fund

Success has already been assured in the Tahoka Fire Department's financial drive for the purchase of a respirator and resuscitator for use in Lynn county in transporting polio patients and aid to victims of drowning, suffocation, carbon-monoxide poisoning, and electrical shock.

Fire Chief Jim Clinton reports \$1,100.00 had been con-

tributed to the fund up until Wednesday morning.

A portable respirator can be bought for about \$1,250.00, and a portable resuscitator can be had for about \$450.00. Thus, a total of about \$1,700.00 is needed to buy both pieces of equipment.

Envelopes are being sent to many homes by school children this week, and their parents are asked to enclose a contribution and return the envelopes, as fully \$600.00 is needed yet.

Members of the Fire Department this week have solicited the business section of Tahoka. Many farmers have made contributions, but there are yet many people who should be interested in helping out on this worthy cause.

The equipment will be kept in the possession of the Fire Department, but will be available for use of any person in any emergency where it will help.

Pat Williams, 7, son of Lieut. and Mrs. Dale Williams, died in Pasadena, a suburb of Houston, late Wednesday afternoon. The child had been ill only since Wednesday morning. Cause of his death was not known here on Thursday morning, but relatives did not believe he had polio.

Lieut. and Mrs. Williams and their other two children were expected to arrive here Thursday night. The body will arrive Friday morning. Funeral services will not be held until Saturday.

James Patrick Williams was born in Tahoka April 5, 1945. He attended school here his first year last session. His father and mother formerly operated the Quality Cleaners, and the friendly and loveable little Pat was quite a favorite of a number of businessmen.

His father sold the business to his "in-laws," Mr. and Mrs. Bill Cathcart when he was recalled to the service two or three years ago. Dale returned late in July from about eight months service in Korea with the Army Air Force. Following his leave spent here, he was assigned to duty to an airfield near Houston, and on August 19 he and his family moved to Pasadena.

The child also is survived by two sisters, Joan, 6, and Donna Kay, age three months; the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Harvick, Sr., and several uncles, aunts, and cousins.

Cooperating with the county PMA committee in this meeting will be representatives of the Soil Conservation Service, Extension Service, Farmers Home Administration, and other Agricultural Agencies, as they will affect the conservation problems in the county will be explained and plans will be made to coordinate the assistance available from each agency.

All PMA community committeemen elected in the August election will attend this meeting.

Chairman S. L. Walters, county PMA committeeman, advises that there are eight communities with a total of twenty four community committeemen in Lynn county.

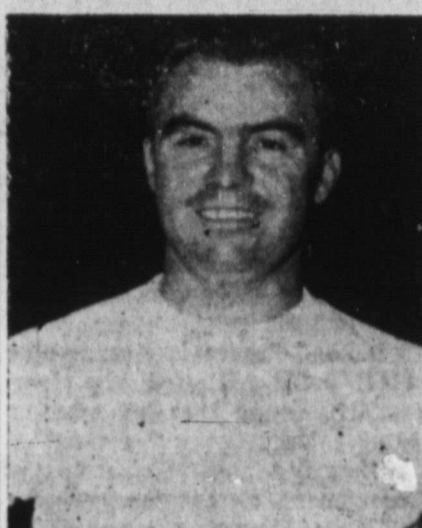

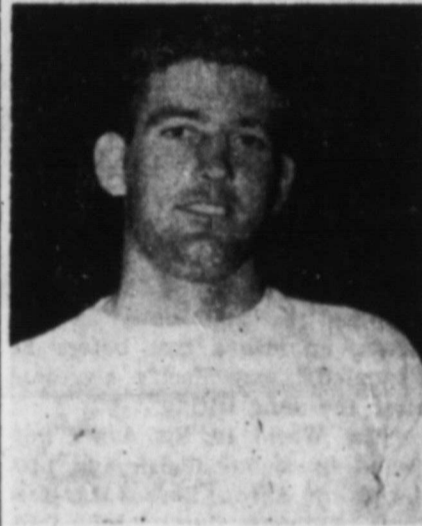

## Bulldogs Open Season Tonight

Tahoka Bulldogs open the 1952 football season tonight with the Sundown Roughnecks on Kelley Field here at 8:00 o'clock in a game that promises to be a good one in spite of the fact that each team has been working out less than two weeks.

A colorful halftime show has been planned for the event by the Tahoka and Sundown band organizations.

Having lost most of the starters (13 lettermen) from the District 6-AA championship team of last year, Coach Bill Haralson and

his new assistant, Bill Sharpley, will field a team of boys most of whom are inexperienced in varsity competition. The boys are eager and willing to go, he says, but may not be expected to develop into a smooth team until they pick up some experience. Only seven returning lettermen are available.

**Sundown Experienced**

On the other hand, Sundown of District 4-A boasts a large squad of experienced boys who are expected to take the championship of their district this year. The team also has one of the best coaching staffs on the South Plains, including Head Coach Hubert Row (Hardin-Simmons), John Blaine (West Texas State), formerly of Dimmitt and declared one of the best coaches in Texas last year, Herman Smith (TCU), and Costin Bufkin (Texas Tech).

Sundown backs to watch include Capt. Don Waygood and Charles Mann and Mick Nichols. Outstanding in the line are Center Tom Stewart, 180, Ends Bill Waygood, 170, and Roy Helms, 150, Guards J. L. Snow, 160, and Winston Spray, 170; and Tackles Bert Glasscock, 190, and Gary Carpenter, 185.

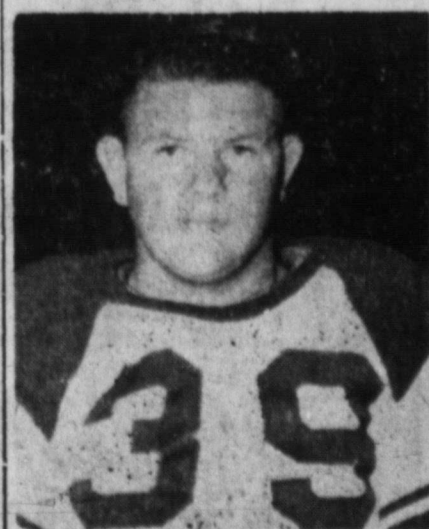

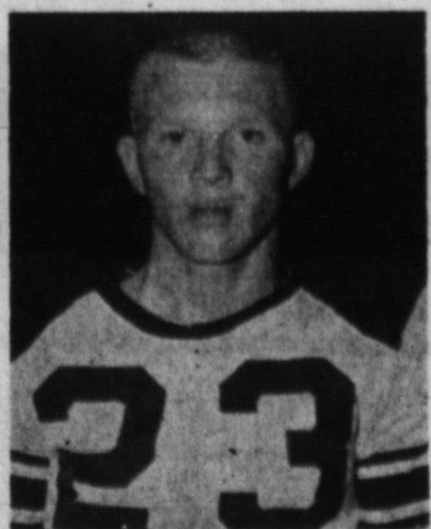

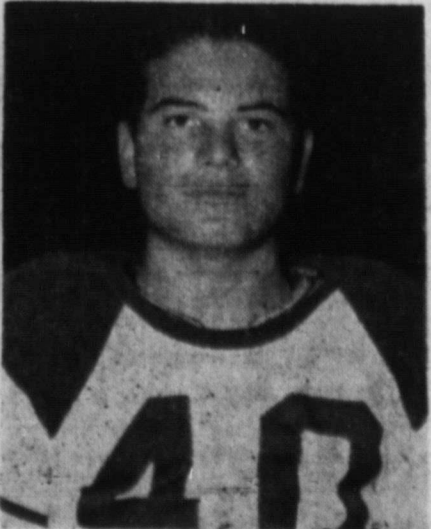

**Gold Coast Dandy Outfit Patterned For Gregory Peck**

It's small wonder that the dashing sartorial masterpiece which Gregory Peck wears in his current role as Jonathan Clark in Universal-International's screen adaptation of Rex Beach's "The World In His Arms" left the girls around the studio a bit breathless.

The lusty Technicolor adventure-film of the Far North in 1850 opens October 19 at the Rose Theatre here, with Ann Blyth as Peck's co-star.

The gent who wore the suit after which Peck's was patterned wore it for the last time while swinging by his neck from a tree. He was Emile "Dandy" Pradeau, a French soldier of fortune who acquired quite a reputation as a bon vivant and boulevardier around San Francisco in the 1850's. He also acquired a reputation as a horse-thief, which was the reason he was the unwilling leading man in an informal swing session on the outskirts of San Francisco in 1853.

"Dandy" Pradeau's elegant blue velvet outfit outlasted him, however. It seems that an amateur water color artist was present at the hanging and pictured the Frenchman's clothes for posterity.

The Universal-International wardrobe department decided that Pradeau's colorful, eye-catching suit would be just the thing for leading man Peck to wear in his role of a San Francisco gent-about-town and seafaring captain in "The World In His Arms."

The suit, therefore, was duplicated for Peck pearl button to pearl button and from frilly lace sleeves to a flowered vest with a border of petunias.

It required two wardrobe men to literally "pour" Peck into the outfit which fit him like an unripe banana.

"I can't understand why that guy had to wait until he was strung up into a tree before he strangled," was Peck's comment after the snug fitting.

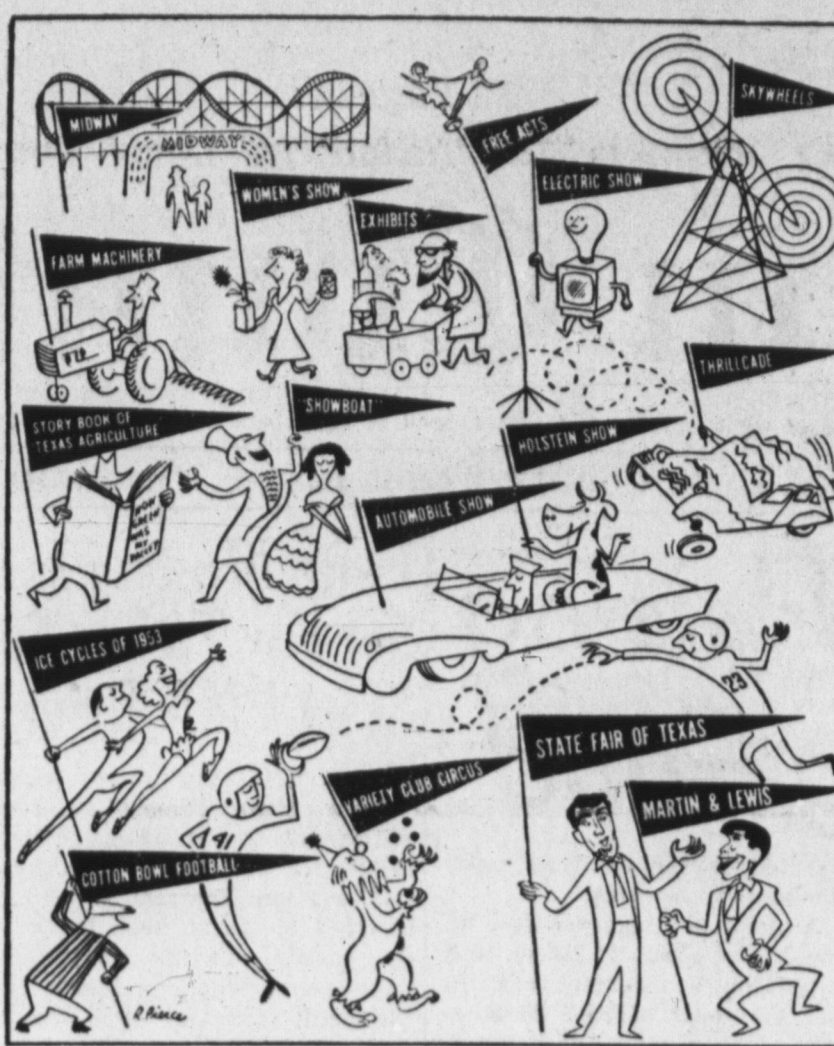

**OPS Man Will Hold Meet Here**

W. C. Reynolds, price specialist from the Lubbock Office of Price Stabilization has informed the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce that he will be in Tahoka on September 12, to conduct a price clinic for local businessmen.

Mr. Reynolds urges all local businessmen who may have price problems under OPS regulations or who desire information to attend the clinic, which will be held at the Chamber's headquarters on Friday from 1:00 p. m. to 4:00 p. m.

"The OPS is still in the business of price regulation," Reynolds declared. "All businessmen who need more information in order to properly comply with the law, or who have some pricing problem for which they need assistance are invited to attend our regularly scheduled price clinics. These clinics are designed to provide convenient, on-the-spot assistance to businessmen who otherwise might be put to considerable time and trouble in order to affect full compliance with OPS regulations."

Mr. Reynolds suggested that operators of service establishments include service stations, cleaning and pressing shops, plumbers, radio and television repairmen, garages, and other businesses selling services. Such businesses are under the OPS services regulation, CPR 34, and are required to have their ceiling prices posted for public view.

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

A deal on Alaskan pulpwood that will not be used to solve the critical newsprint situation is being eyed in Washington closely.

The history of the situation is this. For many years there have been frequent attempts to get a newsprint industry started in Alaska.

However, the dense forests which cover a substantial portion of Alaska's half million square miles are under the control of the Interior Department and the Canadian Forestry Service.

Because of this, it has been impossible to get permission to cut pulpwood in Alaska. As a matter of fact, this is one of the issues involved in the drive for Alaskan statehood.

What further complicates the picture is the fact that the Alaskan forests furnish the same kind of timber that the Canadian newsprint producers utilize.

However, at long last, a pulp plant is being built near Ketchikan, Alaska. The site is an ideal one. Timber cut on the slopes can be slid into salt water channels for towing to the mill.

This mill will produce 100,000 tons of pulp per year. But it will not be used to alleviate the newsprint shortage which has resulted in newspaper publishers all over the country being obliged to pay Canadian producers 150% more for newsprint.

The entire output of the mill will be used for the production of cellophane and rayon. Thus the hold that the Canadian newsprint industry exercises over the free American press will not be diminished.

The entire set up of the deal is causing officials who have been closely following the investigations of the newsprint situation by the Senate Small Business Committee, to scrutinize the details.

The mill will be operated by the Ketchikan Pulp Company, and the stock of this company is jointly owned by American Viscose Corporation and the Puget Sound Pulp & Timber Co.

Among the questions raised by this move are these:  
If Washington bureaucrats have held the vast Alaskan timberlands sacred for so long, why now do they release a big share of this timber for cellophane.

Another question is this:  
The new mill is being financed by a \$30 million public bond issue. If cellophane is worth this type of big financing, why is it not even more feasible to produce newsprint at a price that will be fair to the last major bulwark of independent American enterprise, the nation's weekly newspapers.

The State Department has already taken a stand against solving the problem.

Now there is a determination in many quarters in Washington to smoke out what, if any, high level, secret agreements have been entered into regarding the nation's newsprint supply. The current trend toward increasing mortalities among independent newspapers, plus the building of more big metropolitan newspapers chains, and the growth of giant networks in radio and TV controlled by a handful of men dependent on a revocable license from a Washington bureau, is causing wonder. If this trend continues, there will soon be no more effective independent expressions of thought remaining.

## Marriage Rate Declines Especially in Big Cities

About 1,580,000 couples embarked upon matrimony in the United States in 1949.

This is a decline of one eighth from 1948 and nearly one third less than the all-time peak of 2,291,000 marriages in 1946. The decrease reflects in large part the extent to which the number of unmarried men in the population has been reduced by the phenomenal boom in marriages during the immediate postwar years.

The down trend in marriages from 1948 to 1949 was nationwide, somewhat more pronounced in the major cities than in the smaller communities, and most marked in the northern tier of states from the Atlantic to the Midwest, where the decline was 14 per cent. In the South and the West the decrease was about 11 per cent.

In the popular divorce and marriage centers of Reno and Las Vegas the drop in marriages was 12 and 15 per cent, respectively. New York City recorded a decline of one seventh and Los Angeles a decline of one tenth. Reductions within this range were registered in Chicago, Detroit, and Philadelphia.

"Despite recent declines, the yearly number of marriages is still above the prewar level, and the marriage rate is higher than the average for the four decades from the beginning of the century to Pearl Harbor," the statisticians comment.

## Fluorescent Street Lights

Motorists and pedestrians can look forward to more comfortable night lighting on our highways and byways, reports National Patent Council. A recently developed fluorescent street light, it is claimed, provides a softer, more pleasing light and creates better visibility for motorists, particularly on wet pavement. It is maintained that the lamp has higher efficiency, with a relatively long life. The new street light is described as a cigar-shaped aluminum tube containing two pairs of eight-foot-long fluorescent lamps. Two long highly polished reflectors mounted back to back direct the light from the lamps through clear plastic windows to the street. The result is a less glaring light because it comes from a larger area and because the lamps are almost entirely concealed from the motorist's view.
