

The picture above shows George Chapman at the main distributing frame where the 200 additional lines are connected to underground cable. This is where the lines go out of the central office building and eventually connect with our outside distribution cables.

At left is shown Van White and some of the thousands of wires which have been added to the central office equipment for the addition of 200 more numbers for subscribers' service in Muleshoe. Along with the addition of 200 numbers General also added rotary trunk switching to the toll circuits which means that subscribers have accessibility to a greater number of toll circuits out of Muleshoe than a year ago. This equipment will automatically select a toll circuit which is not in use when the subscriber dials for the operator. We have also added additional circuits out of Muleshoe in addition to the rotary switching feature. Many of the wires were added because of the Extended Area Service to Lazbuddie and Needmore which was not available a year ago.



At left shows where all of the wires off the main distributing frame went. The lines come into the underground cable vault near the central office building. The lines are in small cables each carrying 200 lines. These small cables are then spliced into what is called the main feeder cable which you can see in the foreground of the picture. This big cabl eis what we usually call a 1800 pair cable. This means that the main feeder cable has 3636 separate wires. The main feeder cable leaves the vault into an underground conduit.

Above shows Chapman on what is called a riser pole. This is the place where the main feeder cable comes up from underground and ties in with out outside aerial distribution plant.
