





For example, Senator Ellender's bill now before the Senate discriminates against the staple and grade of Plains cotton.

Smith believes we need to think in terms of a two-price system on cotton-one price for domestic consumption and one price for export to the world market.

Our price supports have priced us out of the world market because we are not meeting the world market price by two cents or cotton men by reason of his acti-





tegrate with them, in which case the Negroes, of course, will attend the same schools as the whites.

However, I believe that the whites would have been building better schools for the Negroes long ago if they had not been so completely impoverished by the Civil War, if I may call it that.

Have you forgotten that when the South was virtually whipped and the Northern armies swept down into Georgia and Alabam, they acted more like Vandals than civilized white men? The University of Alabama, founded in 1831 and now under fire, as it were, was burned to the ground by an invading Northern Army in 1865, the last year of the Civil War. Nat only was that institution burned to the ground but a number of other institutions of the rank of acaremies were burned also-acts of sheer Vandalism. This was followed by a period of "Carpetbag" and "Scalawag" rule-notorious crooks who further fleeced the people and kept them poor. Real recovery was not begun till the dawn of the twentieth century, and for years it continued to be slow even after that.

Personally, I have never been an admirer of such men as William L. Yancey of Alabama, Bob Toombs of Georgia, Jefferson Davis of Mississippi and other Southern firebrands, who were largely responsible for bringing on the Civil War. I have never felt that Secession was justifiable nor the destruction either desirable or wise. If I had been living as a mature man in those days I would have stood with Sam Houston and Andrew Jackson and even with Daniel Webster for the preservation of the Union-but I would not have favored vandalism even in the midst of bloody war .-




