And, we understand, Jim Barnett of New Home as a young sprout caught for Dixie and Paul Dean.

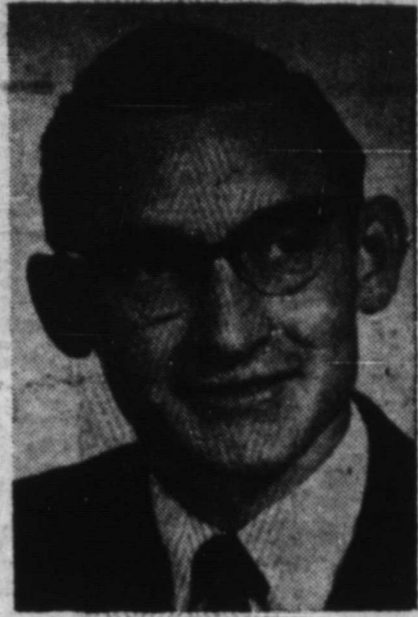
Here are some terms and translations of "Basic TV" we thought we'd pass on to you, in the event that you are having trouble with your TV language.

## Rain And Hail Strike Again

Several Lynn county farms were badly damaged by hail the latter part of last week in two different parts of the county, while others received rain and light hail.

Thursday afternoon five farms north of Lakeview were hit by hail, which damaged about 450 acres of cotton. The area in question, about four miles north of Lakeview, received 1.90 inch of rain in about an hour's time. Although it hailed only about 10 minutes, E. L. Moore lost about one-half section of crops when the storm swiped from one corner to the other across his fields. James Kirksey, the farm operated by R. L. and G. G. Northam, and Clyde Gammill each lost about 9 acres. The hail caught the corner of the W. W. McNabb place, damaging about 25 acres of cotton.

On the same day Wilson received 1.40 inch of rain, New Home about .25, and West Point .40. The rain in the Wilson area seemed to go toward the Wayside district, where about one inch was recorded. It tapered off towards Tahoka. Herb Benson's farm between Dixie and New Home got about .40.

On Friday afternoon at least five more farms east of Tahoka were badly damaged including those of H. O. Hargett, W. P. Scott, Otis Curry, T. I. Tippit, and Lonnie Howell. Clint Sikes and others escaped without too much damage.

In the Redwing area Charles Uzle received one inch of rain, as did Tom Smith. W. H. Williams measured .60.

A local shower in west Tahoka Wednesday amounted to .30.

Mrs. Brookshire, not realizing the danger, turned on the water tap in the bathtub intending to let it run until water came through. The gas gushed out and was ignited by the bathroom water heater.

The skirt which she was wearing caught fire and although it was put out, she received burns on her legs and arms. The window curtains in the bathroom also were burned and the mattress on a bed in an adjacent room caught fire before it was under control.

However, not knowing for sure if the fire was all put out, Mr. Brookshire left the house to take his wife to the hospital. Luckily the fire had all been put out.

**ABSENTEE BALLOTS**  
A record or near-record number of absentee ballots have been cast, a total of 298 up to Thursday noon, according to Mrs. Beulah Fridmore, county clerk. Still out are 42 ballots, some of which may have been voted by the deadline Tuesday.

Interest has warmed up somewhat as the election approaches, but no record vote is forecast in Lynn county.

Only contested county office is that of tax assessor and collector, for which the present incumbent, J. E. "Red" Brown, is opposed by Dale Gandy.

In commissioner's precinct one, Clarence Church, present commissioner, is opposed by T. L. Weaver, Curtis Morgan, and Othell W. Meeks.

In precinct three, the O'Donnell precinct, Mrs. Beatrice McLaurin is opposed by Jimmy Hash. Lynn county has a candidate in the race for State Representative, Mrs. Margaret Garland Noble of O'Donnell, and the other candidate is Wesley Roberts, Lamesa businessman. This 99th district post was vacated by Carroll Cobb, who moved to Lubbock.

Cobb is a candidate for the State Senate, along with Preston Smith, prominent Lubbock businessman and a former legislator, and Kilmer Corbin, the present State Senator.

Interest in the governor's race has picked up the last week, and should help bring out the vote. Ralph Yarborough, former judge, is trying his third time for the office, and is the first name on the ballot in Lynn county. Next is Price Daniel, former attorney general of Texas and present junior U. S. Senator. Then comes W. Lee O'Daniel, former governor and former U. S. Senator. Reubin Senterfitt is a former State Senator, J. J. Holmes is an Austin businessman, and J. Evetts Haley is a Canyon rancher, historian, and champion of states' and individual rights.

## District Boy Scout Swim Meet In Tahoka Tonight

Boy Scouts of the Quannah Parker District will come here tonight to participate in the annual swim meet. About 80 boys are expected to enter from Brownfield, Seminole, Seagraves, Plains, Denver City, Lamesa, O'Donnell, and Tahoka.

The meet, which begins at 7:00 o'clock, will be held at the Municipal Swimming Pool. This is the second time the meet has been held here, the first about three years ago.

The meet will be divided into three divisions, junior division for boys 11 years old; intermediate division, 12 and 13 years old; and explorer division, 14 through 17 years old. First place troops in each of the three divisions will go to the Council Swim Meet to be held on Thursday, August 16, at Mackenzie State Park Pool in Lubbock.

Don Reese of Brownfield, field executive of the Quannah Parker District, will be in charge of the meet. Deane Wright will be the stroke judge, and Charles Verner, Dean Taylor, Leroy Knight, and Albert Curry, all of Tahoka, will be the place judges. There will also be three starters, two recorders, and five Scout life guards.

The swimming events listed in order in all three divisions include the side stroke, back stroke, breast stroke, free style, medley relay, and free style relay. Five points will be scored for first place, three points for second, and one point for third.

In some cases the same troop may win the division. If this happens, there will be only two trophies representing the district at the (Cont'd. on back page)

The consolidation election has been called for August 7 in both the Grassland and Tahoka school districts.

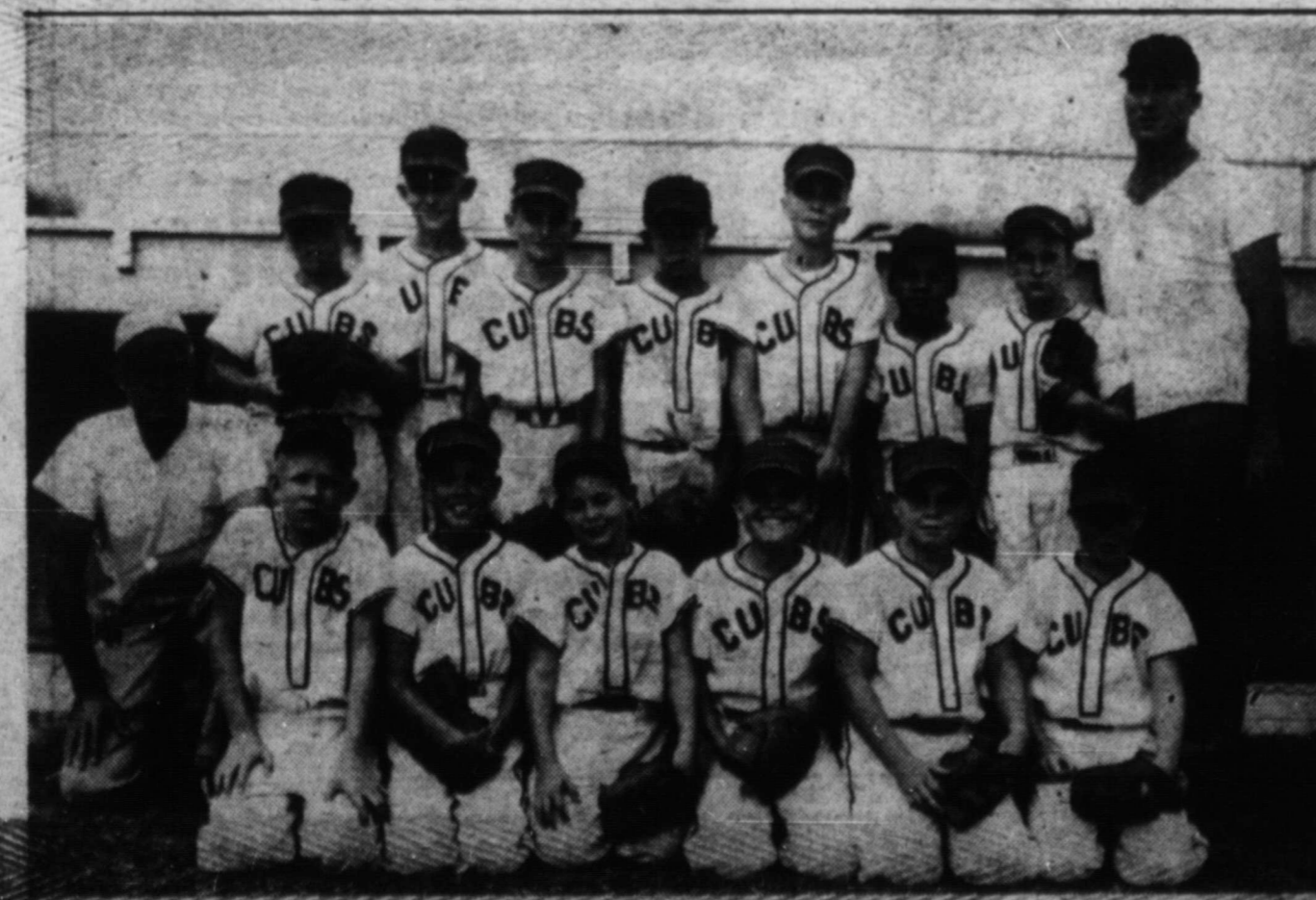

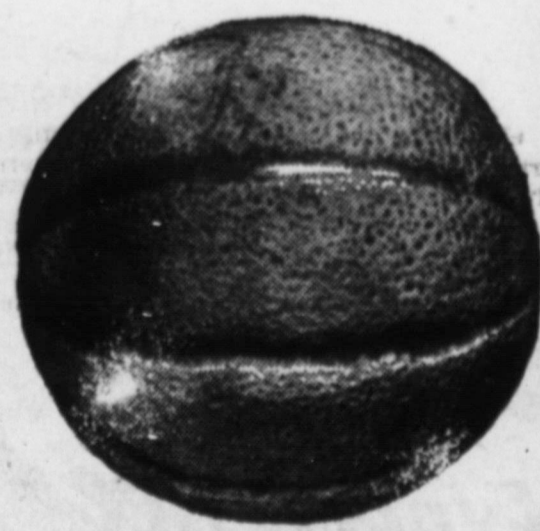

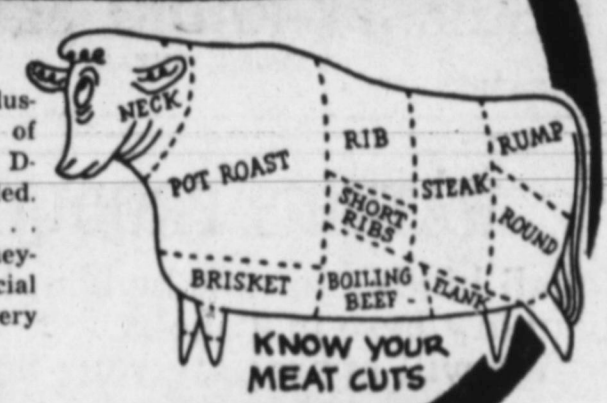

## Rainey Park Raises Livestock On His Farm



Rainey Park farm Mystery Farm No. 104, pictured above, is located 11 miles west and three south of Tahoka.

Noel Hays was the only person to guess the place correctly.

Mr. Parks lives on this farm, which is owned by the Nora Hines Estate. There are 160 acres in the tract. He also farms the quarter section owned by Mrs. Nettie Jackson located immediately north of this farm.

Mr. Park was reared at Gainesville, Cooke county, and came out

to Lynn county in 1916. He first farmed northeast of Tahoka for several years. In 1928, he was married to Miss Ada Byrd. The couple has no children.

They moved to the Hines estate farm in 1935, and have lived at the place ever since.

Rainey says he has 135 acres of cotton, and the rest of the farm land is in feed. The cotton is doing well, but the feed will need rain soon.

He has 40 acres in pasture, and keeps some livestock all the time to supplement his farming. He has 17 mother cows, and feeds out about 20 yearlings a year. He also has about 500 chickens and keeps a milk cow. He finds that his livestock usually pay off very well.

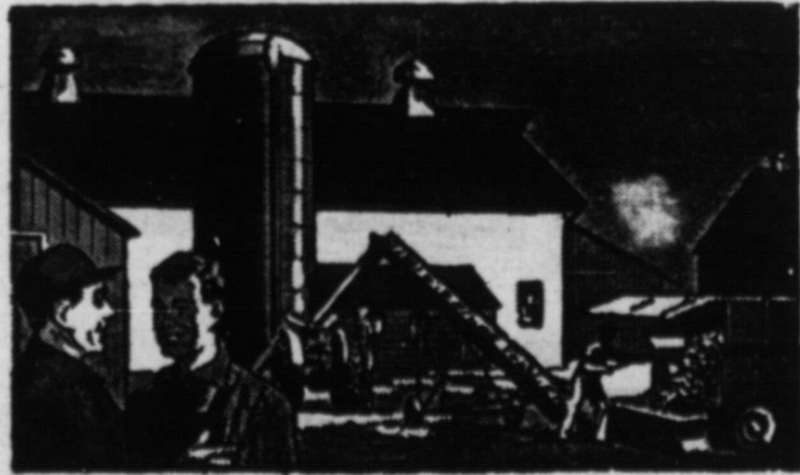

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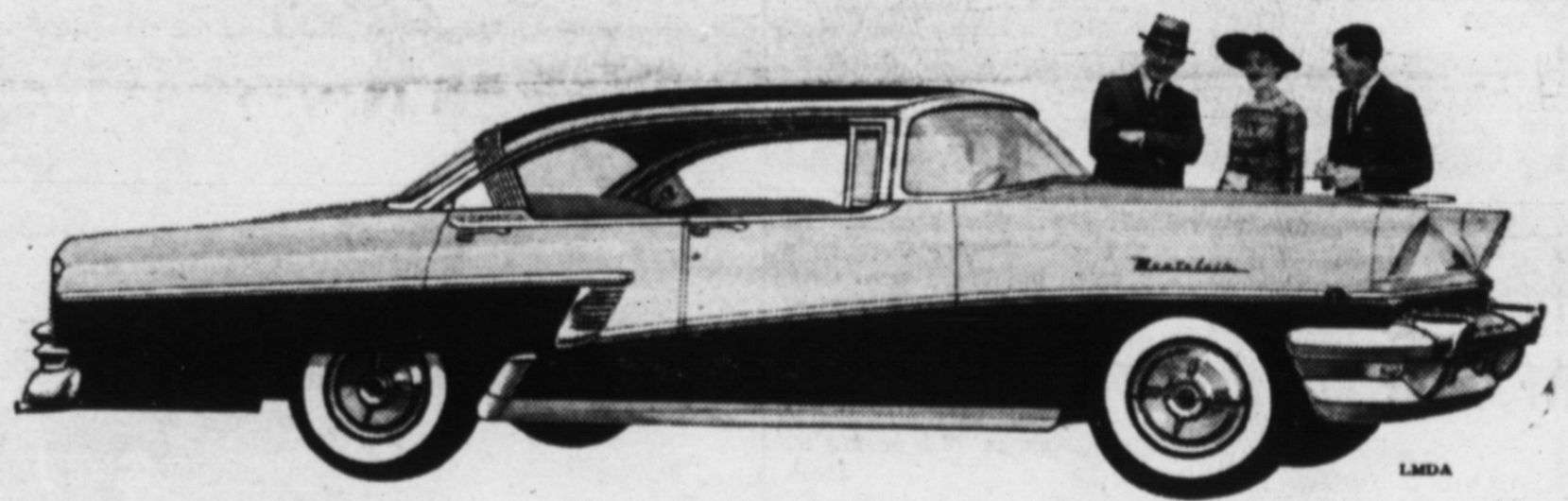

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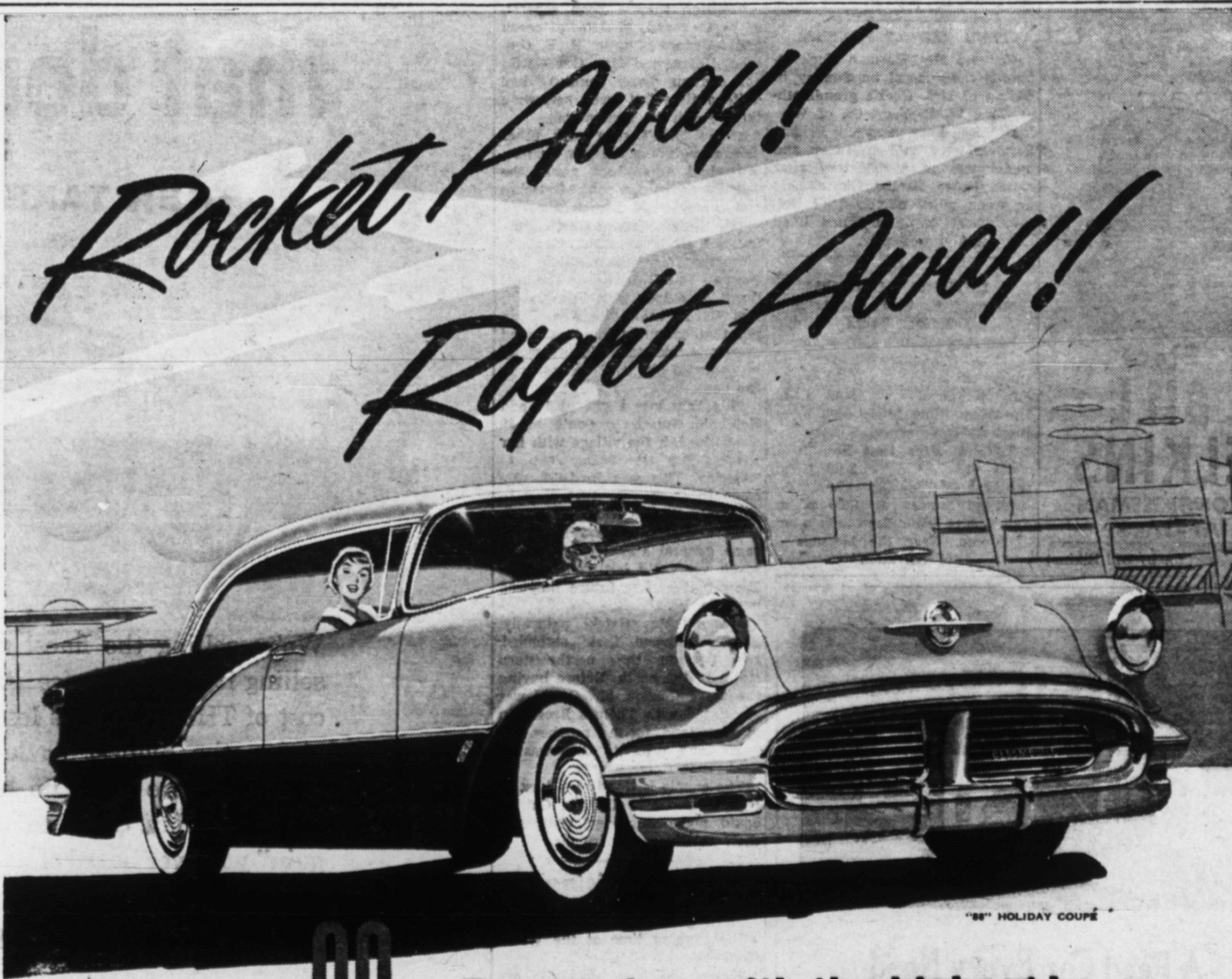

Colored slides of brush control work were shown by S. C. S. technicians at the home of Dr. K. R. Durham on Monday night of last week. These slides showed brush being controlled with a root cutter blade pulled behind a crawler type tractor and seeded at the same time. Blue panic was used most because of the available seed. Where native grass seed was available some acreage was seeded to these grasses. Dr. Durham has some very good colored slides of his own that were made on heavily infested mesquite land that will be good to use as before and after brush control work.

Lynn Birdwell is harvesting his blue panic grass a second time this season with a type of air-blast machine that harvests ripe seed heads while leaving the green ones. The per acre yield will not be known until seed are run through a cleaner.

Sesbania as well as field peas will be a desirable soil improving crop to plant on those acres put in the soil bank. With sufficient moisture, Sesbania will begin to form nitrogen fixing nodules in about thirty days. If moisture conditions are late millet should make enough growth before frost to serve as a dead cover crop. Stalk cutters have been used to cut back careless weeds and other

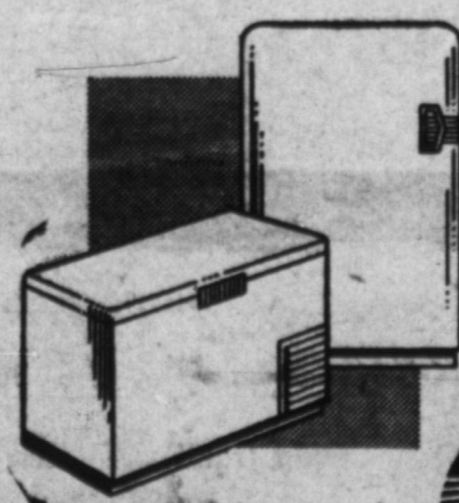

In fact, the Shetland business has gotten to be a big one, especially since the recent growing demand for the little horses.

He recently sold a pair of Shetlands to a Midland rancher for \$1,775.00, and has made a number of other sales at high figures.

Mr. Barton now has 21 Shetlands on hand, all raised by him, and says he has been able to sell all he can raise. He usually has about 30 on hand, and has had as high as 58 mares at one time.

He says Shetlands that formerly brought \$150.00 or \$200.00 are now bringing \$400.00 to \$500.00. Starting price on horse colts is \$125.00, while the price on mare colts start at \$250.00.

Mr. Barton got in the Shetland pony business 25 years ago by accident, and he has been raising

them ever since.

It all happened in about 1930 when his daughter, Doris, now Mrs. Herman Crawford of Draw, was about three and wanted a pony. He bought her one, and he was in the Shetland business to stay. However, he actually did not start raising them to sell until 1950.

Mr. and Mrs. Barton have four grandchildren who also like the ponies, the two children of Mr. and Mrs. Crawford, and the two children of his son, Marshall Barton, and wife, who live on the home place and help with the Shetland business.
