Last year the consolidation was voted down in the Grassland district, but an election was called again this year after petitions from both districts were handed County Judge W. M. Mathis.

Grassland also voted down a consolidation proposal several weeks ago when rural districts in Lynn and Garza counties held Liquor Violations elections for joining the schools into one school to be located near Close City in Garza County.

Grassland school teaches through the seventh grade and the eighth grade and high school students transfer either to Tahoka or Post.

Last year to help equalize the cost the Tahoka board charged Grassland students \$67.00 each for attending the local school. The board estimates they will have to charge about \$93.00 this year. However, the Post school board has announced that it must charge about the same amount.
