Last month's issue of Southwestern Crop & Stock Magazine told something of his outstanding success on this farm in these six short years. His first year, maize produced 2,100 pounds per acre on land his predecessor told him was worn out. Each year since he has increased the production until this year his maize produced 4.800 pounds per acre.

But, Mr. Larsen does not put all his eggs in one basket. He is feeding out lambs for the market, using surplus grain, Sugar beet waste, lettuce waste, alfalfa, and any other economical feed to do the job.



More Pipe Used In Plains Farming


College Station-Irrigation farmers in the High Plains area of Texas, from September 1, 1955 to September 1, 1956, added 710 miles of underground concrete pipe to their irrigation facilities. This makes a total of 2,532 miles of pipe now in use says George L. Black, Jr., associate agent in ir rigation for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service with headquarters at Lubbock. Black reports that the first in-

stallation was made in 1948 and that last year's additions amounted to 28 percent of the nine year total. "It is a demonstration which shows that farmers are doing something on their own to conserve and get the most efficient use from water pumped for irrigation

Roses May Be Planted Now

Anyone can grow roses, according to A. F. DeWerth, head, Department of Floriculture. They may be planted in the fall or spring. In Texas, fall planting is generally preferred.

Aim for quality and you may also get quantity. Many gardners try to grow too many varieties or too many plants. Given careful attention, Mr. DeWerth says that 10 well chosen varieties will produce as many flowers and give far more pleasure than 50 poorlytended plants.

Essentials for success with roses are: proper planting, a sunny location and well-drained soil. Start with No. 1 grade plants, and have the ground ready when the plants arrive. Make sure roots are never exposed to sunlight or drying winds.

Water plants thoroughly. Don't apply fertilizer to newly planted bushes until the root system is well established then feed at least twice a season. Never fertilize in late fall. 





Odds & Ends

The family usually sit around the door of the stable to do their work, so it is not an exception but an every-day occurrance for the stable and mangers to be used by the family and their friends. It is cooler in the summer and the light is better in the winter, for the upper apartment has, as a rule, only a couple of small windows with iron bars high up from the ground. On one side is an open fireplace, which sometimes has a chimney; along the side of the wall are the bins or large jars, which contain the wheat, barley, dried figs, grape molasses, and other foods, while in the corner is the cupboard where the bedding is kept during the day. Many of these dwelling places are built on the side of a hill over a cave, and the cave is used as a part of the stable. Such a cave is shown as the birth-pace of Jesus in the Church of the Nativity.


Today, the new born babe in Palestine is wrapped in swaddling clothes, just as was the baby Jesus. A small shirt is the only real garment put on. Then strips of cloth three or four inches wide, and several feet long, are wound around the child. The little arms are carefully placed down . by the side, the little legs are body is wrapped from the toe to the neck. Babies are kept swaddled from four to six months. This is also the custom of some American Indians.

The shepherds still watch their flocks on these rocky hillsides, just as they did on that starry night, centuries ago. It matters not in what direction you go, you see flocks of sheep and goats. I can well understand why Christ mentioned the sheep and the shepherd so much in His teachings. The Twenty-third Psalm is simply the picture of a day in the life of a Judean shepherd. Sheep are mentioned in the Bible more than three hundred times.

The sheep fold is a circulastone wall with thorn bushes on top. The bushes are kept in position by stones laid upon them. 

Clean Fence Rows Conserve Moisture

College Station, — Have you ever stopped to think how much undesirable trees and brush in the farm fence rows cost? A. H. Walker, extension range specialist, says a recent study showed that a single large mesquite tree was using all of the water from one-sixth acre of cropland.

The farmer on whose farm the study was made reported that the tree cost him \$9.10 last year. He averaged a half bale of cotton to the acre on his other crop land but got nothing from the area around the tree. He stopped and did a little figuring and for less than five cents killed the tree.

On another farm, Walker said, no crops were growing for a distance of 90 feet from a brushy fence row. In one mile of fence row the farmer was losing 10 acres of cropland. Countywide surveys have shown that in many counties upwards of 5,000 acres of cropland are not producing crops because of fence row thieves. Walker says if fence rows, trees and brush are not controlled, the farmer would at least save his planting seed, time and labor by not trying to produce crops close to brushy fence rows. This he adds would be a waste of good cropland and not very good manage-

Now is the time of the year to apply chemicals to those moisture and soil nutrient robbers. Walker says research and many farm demonstrations have shown that best control is obtained by spraying the cut-off stump, the trunk base or by applying a solution in frills to the standing trees. The accepted chemical is 2,4,5-T which should be mixed with diesel oil or kerosene and applied with a hand or back-type sprayer. For the hard to kill trees, Walker recommends a pound of the chemical in six gallons of oil. For easier to kill trees a pound to 12 gallons of oil is suggested.

December, January and February are good months for carrying out the control program. Labor is usually available and working conditions more desirable. Too, few broad-leaf crops are growing which might be damaged from drift from the chemical. The chemical is nonpoisonous to man or livestock in the recommended formula.







Holiday Traffic Safety Urged

E. C. McFadden, Vice President of Employers Casualty Company, Dallas, and President of the Texas Safety Association, made the grim forecast, this week, that unless public officials and citizens' groups take action to stop the rising toll of accidents, there will be more than 111,000 traffic deaths and injuries in Texas for 1956.

At the state level, McFadden said the Texas Safety Association, the National Safety Council and the Texas Department of Public Safety are appealing individual drivers and pedestrians to make safety their personal responsibility to themselves and the communi-

"December is the month when traffic accidents reach their peak," McFadden said. "Extreme vigilance is needed by drivers and pedestrians. During the harried holiday season, people have a tendency to be careless. Last year, for example, there were 21 traffic deaths on Texas streets and highways on December 25 . . hardly the way to have a Merry Christmas."
















Four "teen-age" boys are in serious trouble as a result of thefts and acts of vandalism committed in Tahoka last week.

COMMUNITY PROPERTY

When paying your income tax you want to remember that Texas is a community property state. It may come as a shock to your wife but she only gets half of what you and her together made. For tax purposes, in Texas the wife can only have half-not all.

If your wife worked and she files a separate tax return, she must show one-half of the community income of both husband and wife. She also takes credit for paying one-half the withholding tax. You can expect a tax audit if the wife files a separate tax return claiming a refund for the with holding tax she paid and then the husband files a joint return and does not include the wife's income and uses the wife's

Does snow over plowed ground melt faster than snow with grass beneath it? Heat from the sun is reflected by the upper surface of the snow and this reflection is not affected by whether the ground beneath the snow is grass overed or has been plowed. Howver, dirty snow will absorbe more neat from the sun and reflect less han the clean snow and when pathes of bare ground begin to show, the remaining snow will melt more rapidly over plowed ground than over grass.

The snowfall along the coast and in the interior valleys of California, and along the Gulf and Atlantic Coasts as far north as South Carolina is usually less than elsewhere in the United States and averages less than one inch in a season.
