The platfurm demands "that all corporation and combination of capital in the nature of trusts intended to control manuluatites, material of products shall make comprehensive ozid accurato publio reports of their organization, concitions and operation, under appropriate penalties for failure to do sn"
"We demand for the people of Puerto Fico the right Of freely importing and exportung to whe from any part of the United States; we denounce the sisister infuesic that have causod the President to dop itt from that whfch the termed was a plain duty
"We deplore thesubserviency of the present Adminis tration to the behests of Englaud anci Juglish slatesmen whether it be intentionial or caused b- the ignorance of our efleers in the State Dapartment. Belial-after the dollar. Any man is all right here if he hed got the miriey, just so in Iowa Park. Whan I landad here I bad $\$ 1.30$ I fousd brother here and he had $\$ 9.00$ but owed $\$ 6.00$ for a week's board, so after talking together we de sided to go to the mountains, but the next morniug he took sick and being low in finances I began to look around for something to do. I ronted a tent and bought two soogans, a frying pan, 25) cents worth of flour and 50 cents worth of bacon, and moved in. Brother was still sick. The nex day I hung out this sign: "Cottrel Bro, beadquaters for post-holes, poast-setting and wirestrefchiog," and the next day I sold a man enough pog holes to go around a lot 50 x 165 feet 8 feet apart. We had no holes in stock, only what iwas la our wearing aperel, aud we weat to work and made enough to fill our orders, and today we sawed eyongh of the above named goode to go around a block $300 \times 365$ Teet in the city, which we will deliver Monday aud Tuesday next, if brother is able, he is stillpung. We hope our business will grow. $\qquad$
