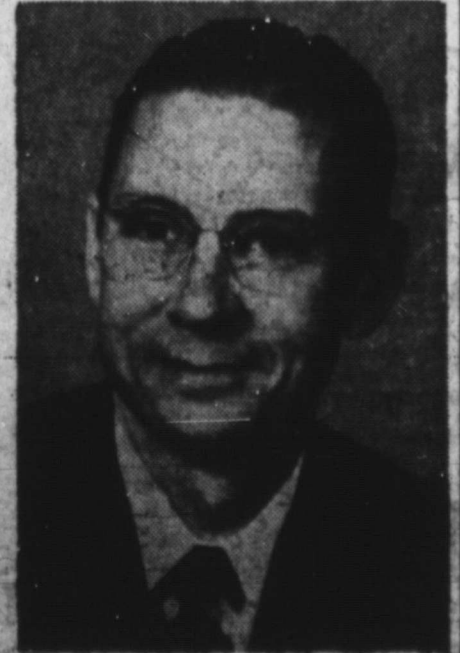
Horace Coffman, song director of the Broadway Church of Christ in Lubbock, will lead the singing.

Wiley Curry Is Death Victim

Wiley Curry, 67, prominent retired farmer who had lived in Lynn county 36 years, died Friday at 3:10 a. m. at his home on North Third Street following an illness of several months.

Funeral services were held Sunday at 2:00 p. m. at the First Methodist Church with the pastor, Rev. J. B. Thompson, officiating, assisted by Rev. Clifford Harris, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Burial followed in Tahoka Cemetery.

Mr. Curry was born at Hubbard, Hill county, on September 2, 1889. He was married to Miss Ora May Isham on November 10, 1912, in Limestone county. After moving to Navarro county, the couple came to Lynn county in 1920 and farmed east of Tahoka until a few years ago when he retired and built a home in town. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

He also had ginning interests for a time, and had a deep interest in local, state and national politics and was ever ready to lend a helping hand in almost every civic project.

Survivors include his wife; six sons, Dewey Lee (Pete) of Fort Worth, Cecil of Plainview, Jim Bob of Hale Center, and Otis, Albert, and Dan, all of Tahoka; one sister, Mrs. Joe (Stella) Thompson of Tahoka; and 21 grandchildren.

W. M. (Bill) Thompson, 78, prominent Lynn county farmer for 30 years, died at 6:20 a. m. Saturday in Tahoka Hospital to culminate an illness of many months.

Funeral services were held Sunday at 4:30 p. m. in the First Methodist Church, of which he was a member, with the pastor, Rev. J. B. Thompson, and Rev. H. A. Nichols of Abilene, a former pastor, officiating. Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of Stanley Funeral Home.

Mr. Thompson was born in Alabama May 11, 1879, and moved with his parents to Hill county, Texas, where he grew to manhood. He was married there to Miss Pearl Curry in 1897. The couple came to Lynn county in 1916, and Mr. Thompson farmed his place six miles east of town until forced to retire a few years ago by poor health. Mrs. Thompson died in 1954, and several months later he was married to Mrs. Peditie Riley.

He was a great lover of horses, and along with his farming he raised some fine quarter horses. He was a member of the Lynn County Sheriff's Posse and rode with the group until a year or two ago. Members of the organization attended his funeral in uniform in a body.

About two years ago he became seriously ill, and a few months ago the amputation of a leg became necessary.

Survivors include his wife; two half-sisters, Mrs. Ethel Norris of Fort Worth and Mrs. Maude Jones of Tahoka; one half-brother, Jess Shelton of Morton; and a number of nephews and nieces.

Amarillo, Pampa Join Authority

Following a vote in Amarillo and Pampa Tuesday, citizens in both cities decided in overwhelming odds to rejoin the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. Plainview, who also withdrew, will vote on the issue Aug. 6.

The only proposition voted upon was whether or not the cities should rejoin the Authority. Amarillo and Pampa withdrew in September of 1955 because they opposed the plan of private financing of the project. This plan has since been abandoned. Both Pampa and Amarillo approved the re-entry about nine to one.

The couple moved to Lynn county in 1921, and he formerly engaged in farming. He is survived by his wife and one brother, B. J. Richey of Pollock, Louisiana.

Victim of Polio Is Back At Home

Miss Linda Hefner, daughter of Police Chief and Mrs. Roy Hefner, was released from a Lubbock hospital Tuesday afternoon where she had been a patient for several days as a victim of polio.

She will undergo therapy for several weeks and doctors believe that she will completely recover the use of her legs.

The polio affected her spine and large joints, but doctors believe that the two Salk vaccine shots she had just received are the only thing that saved her from being a permanent cripple. Without them, doctors declare that she would never have walked again. It is also believed that ballet and acrobatic lessons had also been in her favor.

No visitors will be allowed to see Linda for some time, her mother states, and she will be required to remain in bed for about three weeks.

East and northeast of New Lynn among those reported to have received medium to heavy damage were Newman and T. S. Bartley, Tom Mason, Horace Daniel, Jim Reeves, Carl Stone, and J. F. Thomas.

A very heavy rain fell for a few minutes in Tahoka, accompanied by light hail, which measured officially 1.14 inches in Northwest Tahoka.

Most of the northeast quarter of the county received a good rain, including New Lynn, Garnolia, Gordon, Morgan, Wilson, and back over to Wayside.

Southeast-most of the Midway, old South Ward, Edith, and part of the Redwine areas received good rains, with Draw receiving only a shower, and part of the T-Bar community a good rain.

Much feed is beginning to suffer, and the showers will help greatly in the territories covered.

This rain was preceded by heavy showers Thursday of last week over the county, in which Tahoka received 1.58.

Tahoka's rainfall for the month of July totals 3.46 inches.

Total rainfall for the year in Tahoka through July is 20.93 inches.

Sanford Undergoes Surgery On Brain

Larry Sanford underwent brain surgery in Methodist Hospital Tuesday for injuries received in an accident last week on the Brownfield highway when the car in which he was driving had a blow-out and turned over several times.

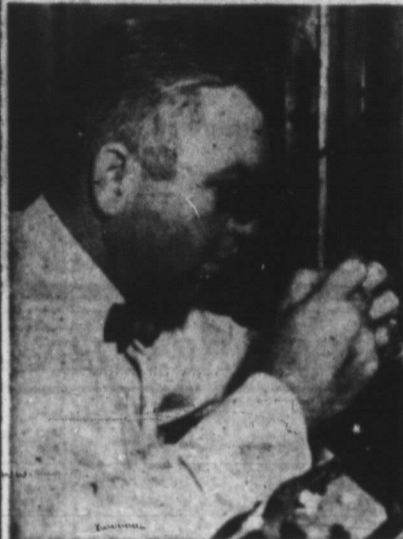
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I always have liked History, however, — and biography, poetic gems red sun-rises and glorious sunsets, even moon-light nights, ligustro flowers, and Tahoka daisies. I like thrilling historic articles, both about the buffalo, the Indians, and the "Old West"—and about the oppression by the British of the American colonists; especially about the fine "generosity" of their noble kings, George II and George III; Patric Henry, George Washington, the "Green Mountain boys" of Vermont, the final licking we gave the insolent English, the strains of "Yankee Doodle," the "Star-Spangled Banner," Andrew Jackson's cotton-bale victory at New Orleans, with a few troops, over a great army of the British who came over to put the finishing touches on our "greenhorns" in the War of 1812. It's all found in this set of books.

There are eleven volumes in this set of books, and they are crammed full of authentic history—not dry stuff, but articles, and stories, and poems throbbing with life and thrilling activities.

The first volume begins with Captain John Smith and tells us about Pocahontas, Powhatan, John Rolfe, etc., separating the trash from the true facts.

It tells also of the raids made by bands of Indians on the white settlers, with terrifying whoops that make the blood run cold; and the final founding of the first English colony in America at Jamestown.

The eleventh Volume brings the reader down to about the year 1885.

Historians contributing the contents of these books include such master authors as George Bancroft, the greatest historian America has ever produced; Francis Parkman, who wrote an exhaustive account of the capture of Quebec by the English, the heroic death of the English commander, General James Wolfe and the no less heroic death of General Montcalm, Commander of the French forces. Wolfe died on September 13, 1759; Montcalm was mortally wounded only a few hours later but died of his wounds early the next morning. You read of this event in your histories many years ago, perhaps; but a few people have read as complete and as thrilling a story as Parkman's, which you will find in this set of books.

Another noted historian quoted copiously in this work is John Lothrop Motley, who wrote a history of the Netherlands, including "The Rise and Fall of the Dutch Republic." James Clarke Ridpath of Indiana wrote a History of the United States; also a biography of James A. Garfield, and also one of William E. Gladstone. He was the virtual founder of DePauw University and was eminent as an

educational leader as well as a Historian.

During the last half of the last century, John B. McMaster wrote a History of the United States in eight volumes, which has become a standard work. This is doubtless the most comprehensive history of the United States that has ever been written. All of these historians are quoted at length in this set of books.

Numerous other authors have written accounts of many other historical events.

Why am I writing all this "mess" for this Column this week? I have two reasons for it. First, I want to inform the readers of this Column that I have a great wealth of material upon which I may draw for historical and literary information with which to fill this column for years to come, if I should live that long, but I shall write most of it in my own language and use quotation marks for that which I copy.

My second reason is to let my readers know how I came in possession of these books, which I regard as much superior to the World Book, for the respective periods which these works cover. Here is the way it happened. In 1900 to 1904, my first wife and I were living in Temple, Texas. A school superintendent, L. L. Todd by name, decided to retire from the Educational Field and enter into business life. He had this set of books. He needed money. So, one day he interviewed my wife, the former Berta Everts, who had been a country school teacher herself, and proposed to sell her this set of books for \$5.00. The books were in good shape. She avidly accepted his offer, paid him the five dollars, and the books became hers. I have had them in my book-shelves ever since, and they are still in good condition. The signature of L. L. Todd is on the fly leaf of each of them together with the date "Nov. 1894," being the date when he acquired the books, I suppose. She, Berta Everts Hill, was the mother, of course, of Frank P. Hill, whom you will find at most any time in the front end of the Lynn County News.

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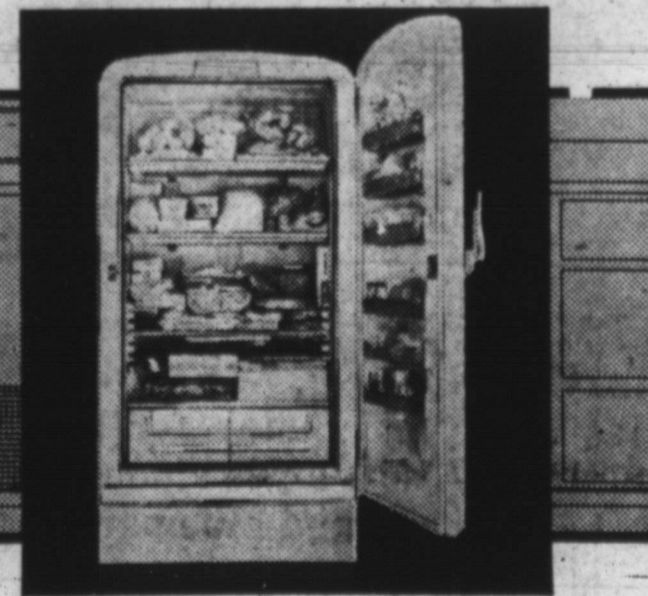

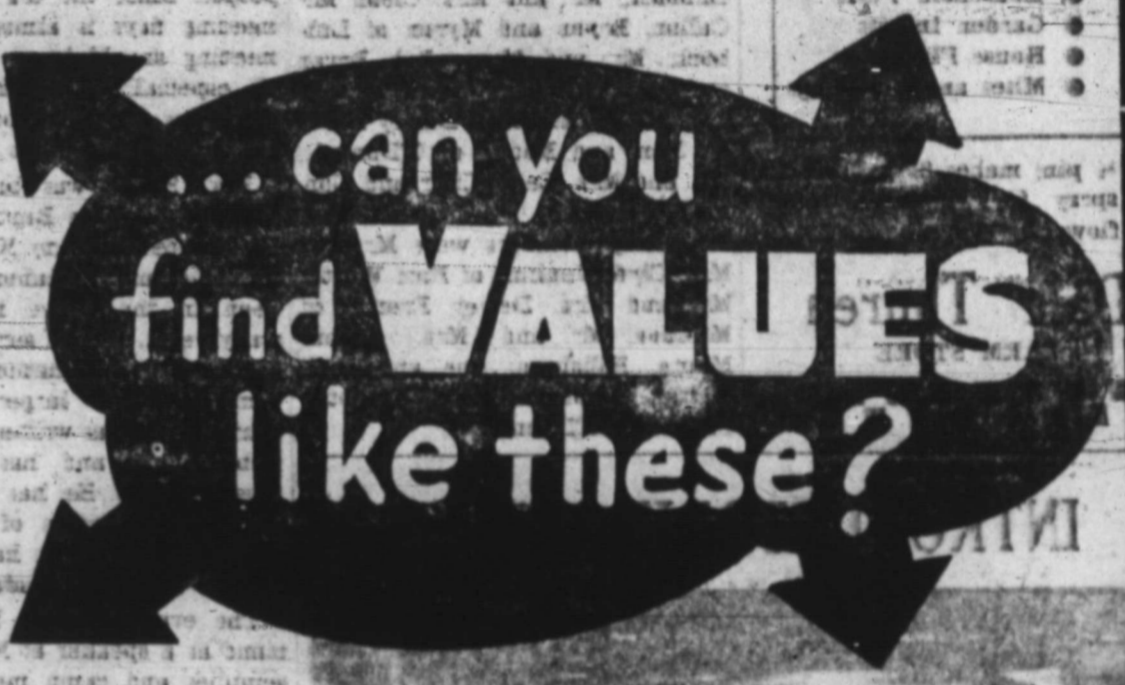

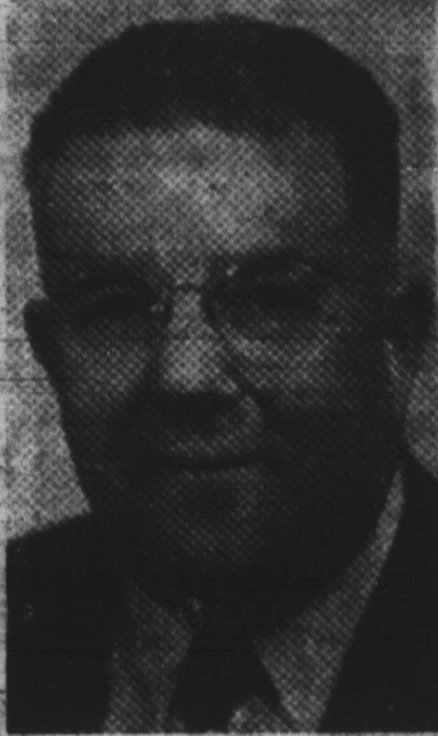
