Yet rather than let the people spend their own money; letting small business retain a greater share of profits to expand and provide more employment, the slant is all toward building more post offices, more government spending for this and that . . . in fact, for anything, just so long as the people are not permitted to spend their own money for the products of farm, forest and factory that would start the wheels of the economy turning over faster under free enterprise over faster under free enterprise.

posal is a 10% cut. This would release, it is estimated, some 3.7 billion dollars or less than the 3.9 billion dollars sought in new money for foreign give away,

Indeed, it now seems these bu-reaucrats, these so-called civil servants who are modern day Rasputins behind the scenes, have even sold idea high tax rates are more sacred than sol-emn promises.

For it is a matter of record that in 1956 and in 1952, both major parties in their political platforms promised to reduce taxes on small business to permit small business to expand, provide more employment, more stability to

Failure to keep these promises has undoubtedly been a big contributory factor to the present economic slow down. Yet official word on possible tax cuts is that they will only be considered "as

Before that, they want to spend more tax money on more unnecessary government projects.


