## Court Affirms City's Fire Damage Case

City of Tahoka's judgment of \$2,500.00 against Keystone Fleming Transport, Inc., of Lubbock, and the insurance company representing the firm, was affirmed by the Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo this week, according to Calloway Huffaker and Harold Green, attorneys for the City in the case.

On a writ of error, the case could be appealed to the Supreme Court but this is not believed likely.

The case is the outgrowth of the collision of two butane trucks six miles west of Tahoka on April 26, 1953, in which two of the drivers burned to death, Cecil Collier, 28, of Slaton, and William Merrill Jenkins, 18, of Lubbock.

The trucks caught fire in the collision. Tahoka Fire Department went to the scene of the fire, and after arrival there one of the fire trucks was badly damaged when one of the butane trucks exploded.

First trial was held here. On a plea of privilege, the case was moved to District Court of Lubbock county, where City of Tahoka won the judgment of \$2,500 and costs for damages to the fire truck. The case was next appealed to the Court of Civil Appeals.

The most unique part of the decision, Huffaker says, is based on the court's application of the Rescue Doctrine, in which it was ruled the City Fire Department could recover damages against a party responsible for fire resulting from negligence.

## Rev. Geo. Small Receives Honor

Rev. George Maurice Small, reared in Tahoka the son of Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Small, was ordained into the Order of Priesthood of the Episcopal Church in Little Rock, Ark., on Wednesday, June 11, in a 10:30 a. m. service. The Right Reverend Robert Raymond Brown, D. D., Episcopal Bishop of Arkansas, conducted the ordination service in the Christ Episcopal Church of Little Rock.

Mr. and Mrs. Small, who attended the event, said however that the most beautiful service was that of his first celebration of the Holy Eucharist at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Fayetteville at 8:00 a. m. Sunday when he presided as men and boys of the parish made their corporate communion.

For two years, Rev. Small has been minister to Episcopal students at the University of Arkansas and also associate pastor of the St. Paul's Church.

This summer he will do additional work toward his master's degree in Bible at the Swannee, Tennessee, Theological School.

George Maurice is a graduate of Tahoka High School and of the Perkins School of Theology of Southern Methodist University. He was associate pastor of Asbury Methodist Church in Lubbock for two years, and then organized and served as pastor three years of Trinity Methodist Church in Plainview before becoming a minister in the Episcopal Church.

He is married and has two daughters, Sharon, nearly eight, and Mauri, nearly six. Grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. George Small and Mrs. D. B. English, all of Tahoka.

## S. L. Shelton, 76, Is Heart Victim

Sanford Lane Shelton was born July 17, 1881, in Hill county. He was married on November 4, 1904, at Hamilton to Miss Lena Mae Ansley. The couple moved to Haskell county, and thence to Lynn county in 1916 and farmed a number of years, later moving to their home on South First, Tahoka, where they have since lived. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Mrs. A. W. Waldrep of Midland, Mrs. Sterling Alderson of Slaton, and Mrs. Preston Buchanan of Tahoka; four sons, Milton of Santa Fe, N. M., Henson of Hobbs, N. M., Travis of Lubbock, and Marshall of Electra; one brother, Harry of Slaton; 13 grandchildren and eight great grandchildren.

## Belgian Student Will Visit Here

For the fourth year, Tahoka Rotary Club will this summer play host for ten weeks to an advanced student from Europe.

Last Thursday, the club voted approval of Joseph Tasiaux, 24, a native of Belgium and a student of agriculture, to visit in the homes of Tahoka Rotarians and observe Lynn county agriculture.

The project is a contribution to better international understanding. The first European student brought here was Bernard DeBonne of France, the second was Fred Mauhart of Austria, and last summer the visitor was Hans Irniger of Switzerland.

The students are brought to Tahoka in cooperation with the International Research Fund, Inc., of New York City, which furnishes the transportation overseas to New York. The Tahoka club furnishes transportation from New York to Tahoka and the youth's expenses while visiting here.

Joseph Tasiaux was reared and lives on a farm in Belgium. He attended primary school at Boninne and secondary school at Institut St. Louis in Namur. He is active in the youth organization similar to our 4-H clubs. His father was killed by a bull in 1956. He lives with his mother on a farm of 67 hectares, or about 225 acres, on which they have 60 head of cattle.

He writes he is interested in inspecting and working on large and small farms, in observing our farming methods and in our livestock and poultry production.

Joseph is scheduled to arrive here the latter part of July to spend eight to ten weeks.

## Youth Speaker At First Baptist Sunday

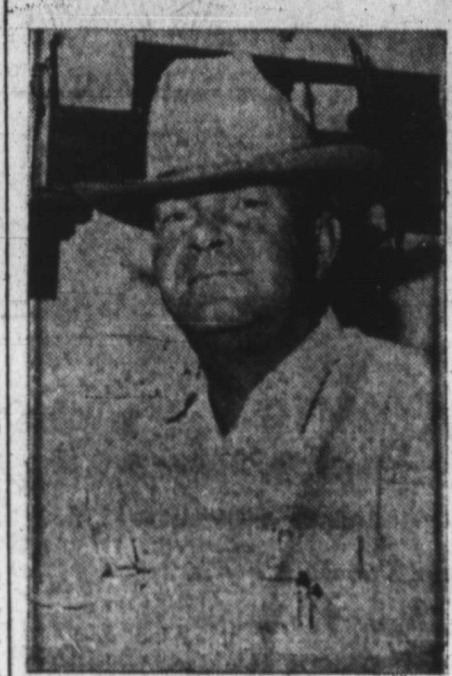

## Large Crowd At Cotton Parley

Friday night's cotton meeting in the assembly room of the Lynter office building was attended by 215 farmers and businessmen. The meeting was sponsored by ginners and farmers of the county.

John Gregg of Lubbock and Earl Sears of Memphis, Tenn., both representing the National Cotton Council, discussed at some length the national cotton situation and the problems confronting the industry.

Wilmer Smith, who also acted as chairman of the meeting, discussed the bills now before the House and Senate in Congress which will affect cotton, and stressed the importance of the passage of some kind of favorable cotton legislation.

The speakers urged everyone interested in cotton to write their congressman and senators insisting that some kind of cotton legislation be passed as quickly as possible. Unless something is done by congress, this area faces a 30 percent cut in acreage in 1959 when the present acreage law expires.

Coffee, cold drinks, and doughnuts were served by a committee of ginners headed by Curtis Stevens of Tahoka.

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## New Secretary For T-Bar Club

Mrs. Peggy Elliott, secretary, of T-Bar Country Club, who is moving to Brownfield, resigned at a meeting of the board of directors of the club Wednesday night, and Mrs. Melba Clem was elected to fill out her unexpired term.

### Lynn County Soil Conservation District News

The broomweed, long suspected of being poisonous to cattle, has been proved deadly under certain conditions by veterinary scientists.

Common in western cattle raising areas, the broomweed is recognized by its narrow leaves coated with a sticky substance which tastes and smells like turpentine. In bloom, the plant produces yellow flowers, singly or in clusters up to three with both dish and ray flowers brightly colored but fading with age.

Experiments reported in the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association indicate that broomweed growing in sandy soil is more likely to cause abortion and retentions of fetal membranes, also to possibly cause the death of the cow, than those growing in loamy soil.

The poisonous qualities of the

plant vary for many reasons. These include an apparent susceptibility of certain animals to the poison, the type of soil in which the plant is growing and the time of year. More cattle die from broomweed poisoning if they eat the plant at the time when it is growing rapidly.

Walter Gasper is having his terrace repaired and rebuilt after damaging rains this past spring. Terraces must be rebuilt or maintained in order to take care of the high intensity rains that we receive in this area. Terraces are normally designed and laid out in a field to take care of the heaviest rain we can normally expect in 10 years period which means about three inches of run off to store behind each terrace. This is the basis for determining the height and

spacing of terraces in a field.

Dave Sherrill, irrigation specialist with the extension service points out that with the present moisture level in our soil, irrigation of cotton should not be started until the first blooms appear.

Walter and Edmund Maeker are planning to install underground concrete pipelines to tie the irrigation wells together as a part of reorganization of the irrigation system. This is a step toward conservation of irrigation water. Maeker has part of his farm leveled and uses terraces to conserve tail water and rainfall.

Caucasian blue stem grass was planted blue N. B. Hancock farm west of New Home Hancock plans to produce seed and graze this area. This grass seed is in high demand for range reseeding and seeding highway right-of-ways, waterways and other unprotected areas throughout the great plains states. This is an introduced grass from the Caucasian plains of Turkey and is drought resistant. The growth resembles King's Ranch bluestem but is more cold resistant.

Jack Reynolds points out that you should watch your cattle closely when you first turn in on a new field of sorghum alnum. Reynolds lost two cows by prussic acid poisoning. Sorghum alnum like all sorghums, sudan or Johnson grass, produces prussic acid in certain stages of growth. The stages of growth usually requiring added attention in the early growth before the sorghum reaches 18 to 20 inches, after rains following a drought period and immediately after a frost. One of the best ways of testing the grass is turn one cow in for a day before turning in the remainder of the herd. Cows should have had a fill before turning in. Prussic acid poisoning does not carry over into the hay or silage.

### Homemaker News...

Well, we're back from 4-H Roundup, and I might add, glad to be home. West Texas is for me! Give me none of that hot, sticky country in which College Station is located.

Bill Griffin and I are quite proud of Lynn County 4-H'ers who participated in Roundup. Two teams represented our county and district in two contests, entomology and share-the-fun.

Do you reach for something cold to drink on these hot summer afternoons? A frosty glass of milk is your best choice, both flavor-wise and nutrition-wise, according to extension foods and nutrition specialists.

A glass of milk is refreshing any time during the day. Try drinking it when you stop to rest in the midst of your housework. Serve to children and adults as between-meal snacks. It serves as a quick energy pick-up, and is loaded with food nutrients.

An 8-ounce glass of whole milk has 170 calories, about one-third of the needed daily calorie requirements, but it is high in food values. You get a third of your daily calcium requirements, more than one-fourth of the riboflavin, and more than one-sixth of the protein requirement. Milk is your best source of calcium, the mineral that keeps bones hard.

Most people like plain milk at mealtime, but for between meals try adding a scoop of ice cream or a little sweetened, crushed fruit. Whether you're enjoying plain milk, or dressed up version, milk tastes better these hot summer days when it's served in a frosty, cold glass.

"Good Milk for Food Meals," an extension bulletin available from my office, gives up-to-date information about the use of dry milk solids, buttermilk, skim milk and condensed milk, as well as the more familiar pasteurized milk.

Here is a little note of interest entitled, "What's Sauce For the Goose." Flag Day shared June 14 with National Expectant Father's Day. And some expectant fathers share morning sickness with their wives. Luckily, doctors have found that the same medicine that helps the wife, often helps the husband get over his "sympathy sickness." It has been reported in the Western Journal of Surgery, Obstetrics and Gynecology, that the drug, Bonadonin, cleared up nausea and vomiting in 61 of 65 mothers-to-be and one husband. The nervous father-to-be was cured after taking Bonadonin tablets for three days. His wife's symptoms were controlled within a week.

Men's sport shirts, women's street dresses and girls' school or sport dresses take a big share of the clothing dollars in most family budgets. Extension clothing specialists say these three items deserve special attention when you shop, because the many new fabrics, finishes, colors and styles make the job of selection pretty confusing.

Price is not necessarily a guide to quality. Specialists say it pays to look for a label that gives infor-

### Speakers Tell Of Rotary Meeting

Otis Spears, president-elect, and A. M. Bray reported on their attendance at the Rotary International Convention in Dallas June 1-5 at the meeting of Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon of last week. Dr. Emil Prohl was also an attendant, at the meeting along with more than 15,000 other Rotarians from 65 nations of the world.

Mr. Spears said attending the meeting of business and professional men from all over the world was an experience he would never forget. When all these people of all creeds and religions and nationalities stood in a moment of silent prayer, he said one could not help but feel the spirit of Rotary. Busy men, many at a sacrifice, had come to promote international understanding, good will, and peace on earth. He said this was the first time he had really gotten the true Rotary spirit, and expressed the belief that the work of Rotary is the most effective force in combating Communism.

He said Dallas and Texas did a wonderful job in entertaining the large convention. He praised the huge air-conditioned coliseum where most convention meetings were held. He also told of some of the general and sectional meetings. One of the things that impressed him most, he said, was the fact that Rotarians think about the same wherever they are from.

Mr. Bray says he spent most of his time in the "House of Fellowship" talking to various Rotarians from around the world, and gained some of the same impressions as did Spears. He marveled at the efficient way in which the convention was handled, and said 100 observers were present to see how this was done.

He told of the 11 style, shows and 11 book reviews presented for ladies, and the entertainment for Rotary sons and daughters, and the special dinners in private homes in Dallas for visiting Rotarians.

He was especially impressed at a meeting of Rotarians from the Asiatic countries that he attended. One speaker from the Southwest Pacific told how Rotary in his country had led a drive which resulted in lowering of the death rate fifty percent. A Japanese told how badly his country wanted back in Rotary at the end of the war, and that the highest honor a school student in Japan could receive was the winning of the Rotary plaque bearing the Rotary "Four-Way Test." A man from the Philippines told how a Rotary project had helped reduce illiteracy 15 percent in his country since the war.

Bray was impressed also by the fact that one club in Australia sent 27 of its members to the Dallas convention.
