Otis Spears, president-elect, and A. M. Bray reported on their at tendance at the Rotary Interna tional Convention in Dallas June 1-5 at the meeting of Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon of last week. Dr. Emil Prohl was also an attendant, at the meeting along with more than 15,000 other Rotarians from 55 nations of the world.

Mr. Spears said attending the meeting of business and professional men from all over the world was an experience he would never forget. When all these people of all creeds and religions and nation alities stood in a moment of silent prayer, he said one could not help but feel the spirit of Rotary. Busy men, many at a sacrifice, had seme to promote international understanding, good will, and peace on earth. He said this was the first time he had really gotten the true Rotary spirit, and expressed the belief that the work of Rotary is the most effect force in combating Communism.


