on cotton depending upon what part of the county you farm in Parts of the county are in excellent shape for soil moisture whereas other parts are needing a rain, or to begin irrigation. The only way to tell when you should begin is when you can dig a hole two feet deep at this time and determine by the "feel" method that more than 50 percent of the moisture is gone. This will vary with soils but generally if you cannot squeeze the soil into a ball and have retrain its shape when you release it then you have less than 50 percent of the moisture that it is able to store. It is probably more important to know when to irrigate than irrigation

If you don't think your irrigation is working right and you want some help, then call on the Soil Conservation Service technicians that are assisting the Lynn county Soil Conservation District.

Eight Great Plains Conservation Program plans have been de. tion. A wing off first floor will a. m. few months. If you are interested in carrying out a complete conservation program on your farm or ranch contact your soil conservation service office for application. These dark spats often appear in front of TV sets where youngsters have munched and spilled potato chips peanuts or buttered popcorn. These may be trod into the carpet then swept away in a vacuum cleaner, but the oil lingers,

The specialists suggest two simple formulas which will remove most stains caused by food spills. These will not set a stain: a calamity which often results from haphazard attempts at spot removal. The two tested remedies

Formula 1: A teaspoon of neutral soapless detergent mixed with Preaching pint lukewarm water.

Formula 2: A teaspoon of white vinegar mixed with three teaspoons

Apply directly to the stain with an eyedropper and sponge from the outer area inward with white unstarched cloth. Blot the area well. In the case of Formula 2, allow the mixture to remain on the stain about 15 minutes before

Where a dry cleaning fluid is recommended, caution should be exercised against using too much on latex-backed rugs since it has a tendency to deteriorate the rubber. (Carbon tetrachloride is very dangerous.) Specific stain treatments are:

Alcohol, coffee, tea, soft drinks: Treat at once to avoid a delayed action brown stain called caramelization. Sponge several times with lukewarm water and then use Formula 1 as directed. Follow with Formula 2 if any stain remains. Butter and fats: Apply any safe dry-cleaning fluid with an eyedropper and sponge with white, unstarcher cloth's.
