Brewer, Nelson Are Elected Roberts, Holland In Run-Off;

Lynn county cast a relatively light vote—2,088—in Saturday's Democratic primary election, and as a result there will be one county run-off election in the August second primary.

The run-off is for county clerk between C. W. Roberts, who polled 829 votes, and Mrs. Wade (Dude) Holland, who received 795 votes. Tied in the race was E. A. Howle with 396 votes.

L. K. (Heavy) Nelson was elected commissioner of Precinct 4 over incumbent E. H. West, running for a third term, by a vote of 305 to 166.

Woodrow (Ode) Brewer, commissioner of Precinct 2, in seeking a second term received 348 votes to 94 for his opponent, O. J. Stanley.

Only other candidates in the county having opposition was Horace Brunette, justice of the peace of Precinct 4 (O'Donnell). He received 297 votes to 65 for J. F. White, Sr., former O'Donnell businessman.

A peculiar situation is the fact that Thomas Reid, unopposed candidate for re-election to the office of county treasurer, died on Thursday preceding the election on Saturday. His name, naturally, appeared on the ballot and he received 2,093 votes. His widow received 10 votes. Mrs. Paulah Pridmore received two, Mrs. Ott Patterson one, and Mrs. Joe D. Unfred one.

All other county candidates up for re-election this year were unopposed. W. M. Mathis received 2,065 for county judge, Mrs. Ruth Jolly received 2,067 for county superintendent, W. S. (Skip) Taylor had 2,074 for district clerk, and C. A. Clem was re-elected justice of the peace at Tahoka with 321 votes.

S. M. Clayton Jr. of O'Donnell was re-elected county Democratic chairman receiving a vote of 2,067.

Write-in votes for precinct chairmen resulted in the following elections: John F. Thomas, South Tahoka, 29 votes; Irwin Sander, Wilton, 26; Mrs. Margaret Noble, O'Donnell, 35; E. R. Blakney, New Home, 33; J. Weldon Martin, Draw, 20; A. M. Cade, North Tahoka, 24; Roy LeMond, Grassland, 27; Raymond Gatzki, Gordon, 29; B. W. Francis, Garnolia, 7; Ross Smith, West Tahoka, 18; N. S. Parker, Newmoore, 10; and Roy-Lee Williams, Lakeview, 9.

Truett Smith Is Elected Judge

Truett Smith of Tahoka was elected district judge of the 109th Judicial District without opposition in Saturday's election. On January 1, he will succeed Judge Louis B. Reed of Lamesa, long-time holder of the office who did not seek re-election.

Smith was reared at New Home, and later attended Wayland College and Texas Tech. He has served Lynn county as County Clerk and county attorney, and then served this district as district attorney. Since retirement from the latter office, he has been practicing law in Tahoka.

Summer Revival Set August 17th

Roberts Winner In District Race

Wesley Roberts of Lamesa was re-elected state representative in the Texas Legislature from the 96th district by a vote of 5,501 to 2,910 for Charles McReynolds of Andrews.

Lynn county gave Roberts the largest majority with 1,577 votes to 333 for McReynolds. He led in his home county of Dawson 2,231 to 575, in Gaines 1,356 to 936, and in Andrews 1,336 to 1,039.

Bond Sales Are Above Quota

"Savings Bond sales for the first half of 1958 totaled \$154,525," Truett Smith, chairman of Lynn county's Bond committee reported today. "Our county has now reached 63.3 percent of its 1958 goal of \$244,000. June sales were \$31,994."

Sales in Texas for the first six months of 1958 were \$88,580,546 which was 3.4 percent greater than the same period in 1957.

"Every American who buys Savings Bonds is providing for his own future, adding to the strength of his country, both militarily and economically," stated Mr. Smith, County Chairman.

Yarborough And Daniel Elected

Lynn county voters overwhelmingly favored Price Daniel for re-election as governor and Ralph Yarborough as United States Senator from Texas.

Daniel received a total of 1,409 votes, while his nearest opponent, former Governor and Senator W. Lee O'Daniel received only 489. Henry B. Gonzales received 78 votes and Joe A. Irwin, 50.

In the Senatorial race, Yarborough had 1,242 votes and Wm. Blakley 788.

For Lieutenant Governor, present incumbent Ben Ramsey received 1579 votes to 400 for his opponent, George Nokes.

In the race for Land Commissioner, Lynn county cast 1,501 votes for Bill Alcorn, the present holder of the office, to 316 for L. J. Dimmitt.

For Commissioner of Agriculture, incumbent John C. White received 1,253 votes to 502 for Tom Griffin and 150 for Glenn H. Gohmann.

There were two contests for places on the Supreme Court of Texas. For Place 1, Associate Justice, Robert W. Hamilton of Midland led the ticket with 1,252 votes, J. Edwin Smith received 436, and Wilmer B. Hunt 143. For Associate Justice, Place 4, Joe Greenhill received 1,244 to 604 for Sarah T. Hughes.

Elected without opposition were Will Wilson, Attorney General; Associate Justice, Place 2, Frank P. Culver; Associate Justice, Place 3, Ruel C. Walker; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Kenneth K. Woodley; Railroad Commissioner, Olin Culberson; State Comptroller, Robert S. Calvert; State Treasurer, Jesse James; Congressman, 19th District, George Mahon; and Associate Justice, Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals, E. O. Northcutt.

Dial Telephone Building Complete

Completion of the General Telephone Company of the Southwest's new building to house Tahoka's future modern dial equipment was announced today by Claude Adams, district manager for the company.

The new building, located at 1801 Conway immediately north of the old telephone building, will contain the automatic dial central office equipment. The interior walls and roof slab and beams have been painted, and the floor is covered with asphalt tile. Refrigerated air conditioning and forced warm air heating are provided to insure maximum equipment efficiency during all types of weather.

The architect of the new building was Maudin-Ballard and Associates, and the general contractor was Commercial Construction Co. No definite date is known here as to when the dial equipment will be installed, but contract with the city for dial operation before first of the year.

Ford Will Attend State 4-H Meet

Denver Ford of Tahoka will attend the Texas 4-H Council Workshop in San Marcos August 4-8 as one of the two representatives from this county agricultural Extension District, it was announced by W. H. Jones and Mrs. Aubrey W. Russell, district agents.

Rains last week end ranging all the way from a quarter inch up to better than four inches greatly improved crop prospects over Lynn county. In fact, prospects are as good as ever in the history of the county at this time for both cotton and maize.

The north half of the county received the biggest rain, Wilson reporting four inches or more and New Home around three inches. In most places the fall came slow and easy and wet the fields deep.

Tahoka received a week-end total of 1.71, with 1.3 Saturday and Sunday, 1.40 during Sunday night, and .18 Monday night.

Nearly all the county received an inch or more, except portions of the Midway, Draw, and O'Donnell communities. Even these areas received enough rain to help and crops were not actually suffering.

Many observers declare that the rain could not have come at a more opportune moment, just as cotton was fruiting heavily and much maize was heading out. In fact, many declare that they never saw prospects so good.

The rain not only helped dry-land crops, but enabled irrigation farmers to shut off their wells and thereby save a lot of expense.

Damage so far from insects has been negligible, although farmers will be watching their crops closely from here on out for a hatch of worms.

Norman Vincent Peale, prominent New York minister and Editor of Goodpoints Magazine, says, "The way some people talk, the answer to our problems is a vast scientific build-up to conquer outer space. Of course science is very important—but in my opinion the best answer to our problems lies in our development of 'inner space'—the vast potentialities in the human heart and mind."

Christopher Marley has coined the word "inscape" which has not yet achieved the dignity of getting into the dictionary. He was speaking of the landscape we see when we look inward. Inscape or inner space—what ever we choose to call it—we know, or ought to know, that, for the happiness and welfare of life, the inward view is far more important than the outward.

One great gift of faith is that of a bright and radiant inner light. A person is poorly prepared for the contingencies of life who is wholly dependent on the attractiveness of the outer landscape. The external environment of life. Although the outer landscape may flourish with beauty and significance for a while, this may quickly and unexpectedly change. If outward things is all one has to depend on, if he has no "inscape," no "inner space" which will remain unchanged, he is poor indeed. Thus when the outward view is dark and cheerless, the inward view may be radiant and sunny.

If you would be strong explore the inner space and build an inner strength. As one so long ago adoped, "Be strengthened with might through his Spirit in the inner man."

Lynn County Soil Conservation District News

Carlton Wilke of Gordon is planning on re-terracing his farm as soon as his crops are off. Carlton has a field of early grain sorghum that will be harvested early so that terracing can begin in October. If you are planning to terrace this fall or next winter let us know as soon as possible so that proper planning assistance can be given your farm.

Bill Hancock of New Home says his borders were full Monday morning after receiving three inches of rain or more. This is one way of holding all of the rain where it falls and is needed. If you are planning leveling work next fall or winter, now is the time for us to collect the preliminary information in order to render the best assistance.

The heaviest of rains this week should have stayed on the land where it fell. Suppose you had a 4-inch rain and 1-inch ran off to some player lake. If this was a 160 acre farm then the loss would have been 160 acre inches, or more than enough water to have applied 4-acre inches on 40 acres through usual irrigation application. Figuring it cost four dollars per acre to apply, not counting those midnight trips to the cotton field it would be worth \$160.00 if you had pumped that amount of water. In terms of lint production one acre inch of water is worth 27 pounds of lint cotton therefore 160 acre inches of run off is equivalent to eight 500 lb. bales of cotton. This loss is only
