Tahoka voters will decide in an election Saturday on a proposed \$50,000 bond issue for purchase of one-fourth of the right-of-way for the new four-lane US 87 highway through the city, with any surplus from the issue to be used in further street paving.

Only property owners who have paid their poll taxes living inside the city limits of Tahoka are qualified to vote in the bond elec-

The State and Federal governments have proposed to pay for half of the right-of-way costs, Lynn County will pay one-fourth, and the City of Tahoka will pay onefourth-if voters approve.

Plans for the highway through Tahoka, according to A. W. Partain, resident engineer, call for a four-lane divided highway through town, and in addition there will be a two-lane access road on either side. There would be an overpass of modified cloverleaf design at the intersection with US 380 two blocks east of the present traffic light at the inersection of the preshaving an opening Saturday, at ent highways. 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These photographs depict simple illustrations of water heating, principles. Any high school physics student can perform them.

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



SUBJECT: THE PROPOSED \$50,000 STREET IMPROVEMENT **BOND ISSUE**

o The Citizens Of Tahoka

The City Council recommends that the citizens of Tahoka vote For the proprosed \$50,000 Street Improvement bond issue next Saturday, August 9, 1958. The purpose of this bond issue is to buy right-of-way for the relocation of Highway 87 through our City, and also for general street improvements.

The City of Tahoka has entered into a contract with Lynn County whereby the County will pay for one-fourth of the right-of-way and the City will pay for one-fourth, and the State will pay for one-half of the right-of-way purchased within our City for the relocation of this highway. The State and Federal governments will pay all of the cost of paving. We feel that this is a bargain for the City of Tahoka since the main highway through our City adds considerable value to our property.

It is not definitely determined if taxes will be raised at the present time. The City is now using a portion of the bonded indebtedness tax money, which is set aside by law, for the general operation of our City.

The thinking of the City Council is to use the tax money that is going for the general operations of our City to pay off this bonded indebtedness; consequently, the City will have to raise money from another source to replace that money. There are several different ways this money can be raised. It is our opinion that an increase in the garbage collection fee, which is below most cities of our size, will take care of the deficit that will be created in our general operations fund.

If we do not vote FOR this bond issue, the highway will by-pass our City, and we will loose considerable property value and business revenue.




