Irrigation Tests on Will Harris Farm May Revolutionize Crop Watering

The Will Harris farm, two miles north of New Home, is one of 20 farms in the 13-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District.

However, through use of 2,000 feet of concrete pipe on his closed and open ditch system, Mr. Harris is able to water much of his 160 acre farm, and is able to conserve much water that might otherwise be wasted.

Mr. Harris, like each of the 19 other irrigators in the district, has a flow-meter installed on his well pump in order to measure the quantity of water being produced.

Mr. Harris has a record book in which he keeps the exact dates of watering, the exact amount of water applied to each plot, the dates and amounts of rainfall, and time of watering and amount of water applied is determined by results of tests of the gypsum blocks.

Before the Water District installed the gauges, I just guessed at when crops needed water, and just knew the ground was wet without knowing whether or not I had put on more water than necessary.

He tries to apply water according to recommendation of the Lubbock Experiment Station.

Also, Mr. Harris has a well which pumps about 350 gallons per minute on actual continuous test. And Mr. White adds that many farmers will find that they do not actually have the six or eight-inch wells (which they call them) when actually put on continuous

To The Citizens Of Tahoka . . .
FROM THE CITY COUNCIL
SUBJECT: THE PROPOSED \$50,000 STREET IMPROVEMENT BOND ISSUE

The City Council recommends that the citizens of Tahoka vote For the proposed \$50,000 Street Improvement bond issue next Saturday, August 9, 1958. The purpose of this bond issue is to buy right-of-way for the relocation of Highway 87 through our City, and also for general street improvements.

The City of Tahoka has entered into a contract with Lynn County whereby the County will pay for one-fourth of the right-of-way and the City will pay for one-fourth, and the State will pay for one-half of the right-of-way purchased within our City for the relocation of this highway. The State and Federal governments will pay all of the cost of paving. We feel that this is a bargain for the City of Tahoka since the main highway through our City adds considerable value to our property.

It is not definitely determined if taxes will be raised at the present time. The City is now using a portion of the bonded indebtedness tax money, which is set aside by law, for the general operation of our City.

The thinking of the City Council is to use the tax money that is going for the general operations of our City to pay off this bonded indebtedness; consequently, the City will have to raise money from another source to replace that money. There are several different ways this money can be raised. It is our opinion that an increase in the garbage collection fee, which is below most cities of our size, will take care of the deficit that will be created in our general operations fund.

If we do not vote FOR this bond issue, the highway will by-pass our City, and we will lose considerable property value and business revenue.
We recommend that you vote on this bond issue.

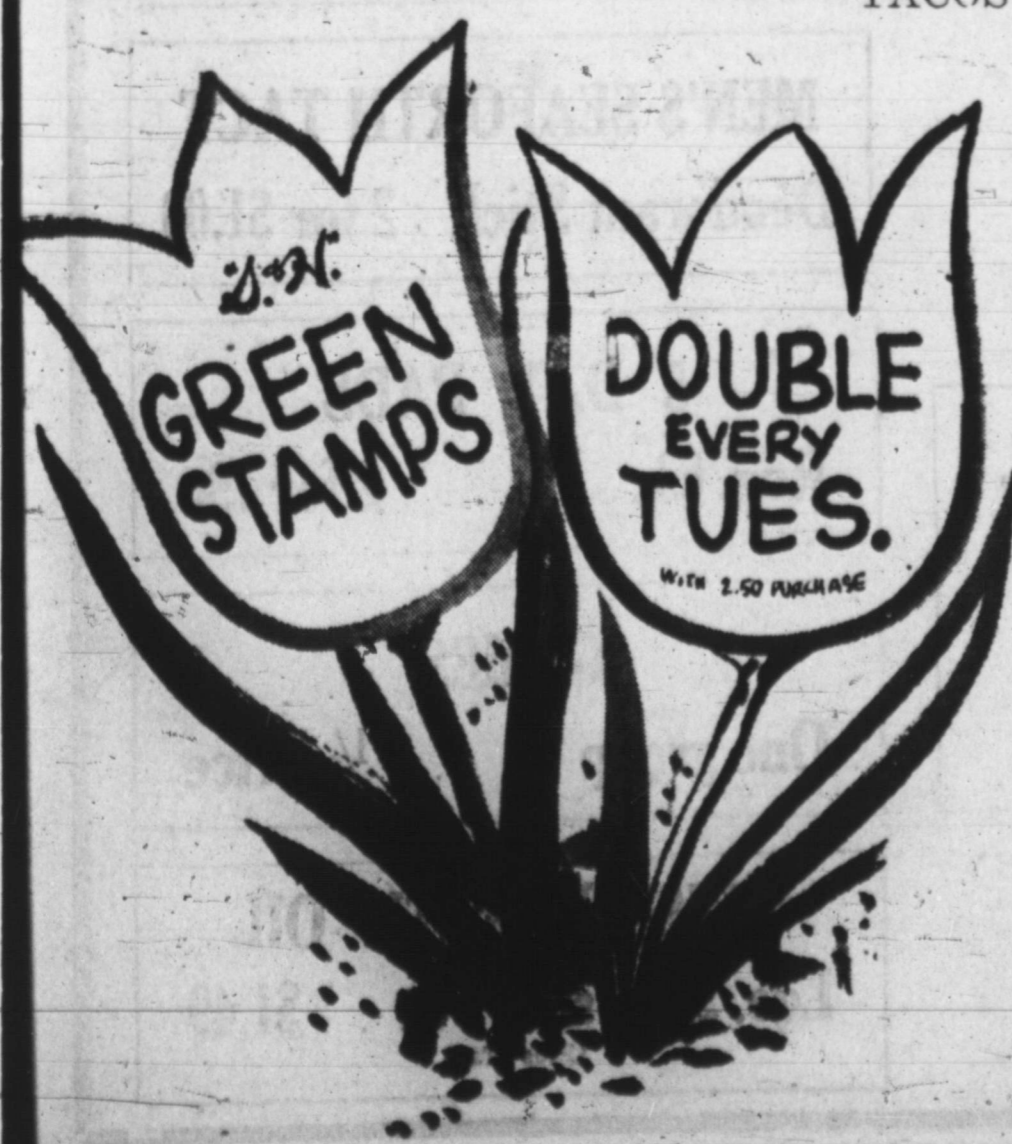

clear party preference on poll tax and exemption receipts, if he expresses no preference that it be recorded on his receipt "declined to state." that no voter registered in one party be permitted to vote in a primary or participate in the conventions of another party, or if he declined to state a preference that he not be permitted to vote in the primary or participate in the conventions of the political party Passed, 37 to 30.
The fourth resolution upheld the continued holding of precinct conventions as opposed to election at the polls of delegates as "the precinct convention is the last remaining place on the home front level where every voter may go to express his views in regard to political problems, discuss issues, draft resolutions, elect and instruct delegates to County Party Conventions."
The convention went on record as recommending to the Commissioners Court that some of the smaller voting precincts be combined.
