New Oil Play Is Likely Here

Felmont Oil Corp. of Midland may have made the most significant oil discovery ever found in Lynn county in its wildcat test west and north of Petty and near the three-well Tahoka Field, 18 miles northwest of Tahoka.

Tuesday, Felmont was running production pipe following the recovery of free oil on a drillstem test opposite the Ellenburger in its No. 1 E. L. Powell well on the

Test tool was open two hours at 10,915 feet and hole bottomed High bidder for the bale was at 11,000 feet. No gas or fluid surfaced, but final recovery included 8,346 feet of gas in drillpipe, 2,219 feet of free oil, 180 and five feet of water.

A second test, which found Ellenburger water table, was run at 10,990-11,050 feet. Tool was open three hours to recover 370 feet of slightly gas-cut mud and 8,500 feet of salt water. Flowing pressures were from 140 to 3,960 pounds, with 20-minute shutin of 4,620 pounds.

School Enrollment Highest In Years

Harvest of Crop Gets Underway

Crop harvest was getting under way in Lynn county this week-the earliest in many years.

Although there are few hands in the country as yet, several farmers have started pulling cotton, most of it dryland, and nearly one to several bales.

Cotton has been popping open rapidly this week, and indications are that there will be plenty of it open in a week or two.

Many farmers with ripe mile are combining, and maize is now coming in at a rapid rate to local elevators. One local grain buyer reported receiving 13 cars Monday, which he said was the biggest day he had ever had.

Much of the grain is hybrid and turning out very well, most farmers cutting so far reporting dryland yields of approximately 1,500 pounds to the acre.

Coach Praises Football Aims

peaker at Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon of last week,

The first portion of his talk dealt with the subject, "Is Football a Dangerous Sport," and in the second part he reviewed the Bulldogs

According to National Safety Council figures, he said, in the age group 15 to 24, 345 are injured in car accidents to 3 in football, drowning is 21 times more likely, and injury with firearms s 20 times more dangerous. Never one to mince words, Bill said he had much rather take a chance on his boy being hurt in football than take the chance of him racing "hot-rod" or car around town

In answer to the question, "Will my grades suffer if I play football," he cited the fact that 90 percent of the Tahoka athletes rank in the top 30 percent scholistically. It is true that a boy who participates in school athletics must learn to budget his time and to give up some of the things in which other students participate in order to make good grades.

He said the students' grades suffer not because of football but be cause of either lact of interest, lack of ability, or lack of time. "If a boy doesn't have enough intelligence to pass his grades, he does not have enough to play football," he declared.

He thinks the advantages offered by sports outweigh the advantages of a boy having a car and

(2) For 1959 and 1960, cotton farmers will be offered a choice between two plans for upland cotton. Choice "A" provides that the level of price support and farm acreage allotments be determined pursuant to Sections 101 and 344

of the 1938 AAA Act as amended. This is the same method used for the past few years except that for 1959 the support price will be not less than 80 percent of parity and for 1960 the support will be not less than 75 percent of parity.

Choice "B" permits farm acreage allotments to be increased up to 40 percent, leaving the exact per centage to the secretary, with the price support set at 15 parity points lower than the Choice "A'

(3) Price support for the 1959 and 1960 crops will be made available through a purchase program to Choice "A" farmers and through loans, purchases and other operations to Choice "B" farmers.

(4) Beginning in 1959, the CCC will establish separate preminms and discounts for standard grades and split grades of upland cotton. (6) The Secretary of Agriculture

will determine not later than January 31 each year the price sup port levels for Choice "A" and Choice "B" and these supports will in the year.
