Showers Delaying Harvest of Crops

Shortage of hands and rainy weather are cutting the potential income from this year's crop materially.

Tahoka's four gins had turned out 1,995 bales up to Thursday noon, an increase of 1,315 from a week ago.

Showers the past few days have interrupted harvesting operations, and the slow rain which started Thursday morning made the situation more gloomy.

Grades and staples of cotton so far had been unusually good, and farmers fear the rain will almost certainly lower the grade. Such could cost the county several hundred thousand dollars or even millions. Before the rain, many farmers had been receiving grades and staples that would bring 35 to 37 cents per pound.

Scattered showers, since last Thursday, have delayed harvest. These have ranged all the way from sprinkle and mist up to an inch and a half east of New Lynn. Much of the east part of the county received from a half inch to an inch.

Tahoka received 41 late Friday afternoon, 13 Monday, .01 Tuesday, and .11 up to noon Thursday. This brought the total rainfall for September in Tahoka to 1.08 inches and the total for the year so far to 15.94.

County Approves Budget For 1959

Lynn County's budget for 1959 was approved Monday by the Commissioners' Court, states County Judge W. M. Mathis.

The total budget is \$438,889.94, but this includes an estimate of \$113,638.94 to be spent in securing highway rights-of-way, which leaves \$325,251.00. Judge Mathis says this is about \$12,000 less than was actually spent in 1957.

Estimated receipts for 1959 are \$352,437.00.

Contract Let On 4-Lane Highway

Contract was let in Austin last week by the Texas Highway Department for the first unit of the four lane paving project on US 87 north and south across Lynn county, from O'Donnell to a point south of Tahoka.

The 12-mile paving contract went to Gilvin-Terrill Co. of Amarillo on a low bid of \$649,364.36.

The contract includes grade and drainage structures, caliche base and asphalt topping on two additional lanes and the rebuilding of all the present two lanes of paving.

The project starts at the Lynn-Dawson county line just west of O'Donnell and extends north to a point south of Tahoka at the north end of the John Slover farm.

County Judge W. M. Mathis says he understands first work will probably be the building of a high dump across the Nance lake six miles south of Tahoka. Dirt work is expected to begin at an early date.

All right-of-way details have been worked out, fences have been moved, and only a few minor obstacles stand in the way of the project.

A. W. Partain of Lamesa, resident engineer for the Texas Highway Department, says preliminary plans have been drawn for the sector through Tahoka and for the sector through Tahoka.

Preliminary plans have been drawn for the sector through Tahoka and also for the sector from FM 400, two miles north of Tahoka, to the Lubbock county line.

Mr. Partain says a new topping has been applied to all of the two west lanes and part of the east lanes of the new four-lane road from O'Donnell to Lamesa. Some repairs will be made to the east lane paving and more hot top applied to it, possibly next summer. Cost of the project was \$157,073.24.

Much of the credit for the beauty of the little park is attributed to Eugene Munsell of the Texas Highway Department maintenance force here.

Four Killed In Wreck

One of the most terrible tragedies ever to occur in Lynn county was the death of four people from the head-on-crash of two cars Sunday at about 12:15 p. m. on the curve of U. S. Highway 87 about a mile south of Tahoka.

Mrs. Dan M. Curry, 29, died Tuesday at Garland, northeast of Dallas, where he was reared. Sheriff Norvell Redwine, who investigated the accident along with Highway Patrolman Ralph Ward of Lamesa, said the two cars appeared to come to a halt virtually on the point of impact and were almost "welded" together.

The impact occurred just as the curve begins at the south end, on the west side of the highway, with the right wheels of the Curry car, traveling south, and the left wheels of the Gregory car, which was traveling north, resting off the pavement. Both cars were wrecked beyond repair.

Mrs. Curry and two children were returning to their home in the T-Bar community from the Church of Christ, where they had attended Sunday School and church services. Dan Sr., who works for Bray Chevrolet, had remained at home with the two younger children, Deborah, 6, and Clyde, 4, who had on Friday undergone tonsillectomies.

Young Gregory was returning to New Deal from Big Spring, to which place he had just taken his bride of about one month to catch a bus for San Antonio to visit her family.

Officers theorized that he may have gone to sleep and run off the road. Some theorized prescription blanks found in his car indicated he may have been a diabetic and "passed out" prior to the accident. The Lubbock Avalanche said he was highly regarded in New Deal. There were no distinct tire marks to indicate he had suddenly applied the brakes.

Mrs. Curry had apparently pulled over on the highway apron to the right in an effort to miss him, but guard posts prevented her from pulling over further.

Justice of the Peace C. A. Clem, who conducted an inquest at the scene of the accident, ruled the deaths accidental.

Mrs. Mildred Childress Curry was born at Snyder Sept. 25, 1929 and moved to Lynn county with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Childress of Draw in 1932. She was married June 29, 1947, in Post to Dan Curry of Tahoka.

Evelyn Louise was born August 7, 1948, and Dan Moody Curry Jr. was born March 2, 1960.

Surviving are the husband; two other children, Deborah and Clyde; the parents of Mrs. Curry; the paternal grandmother of the children, Mrs. Wiley Curry of Tahoka; two brothers of Mrs. Curry, George Franklin Childress of Frankie City and Larry Wayne Childress of Tahoka.

Marion Beverly Gregory was born at Garland in 1936. He attended Abilene Christian College two years and taught last year at Elkhaat. He was married in August to Miss Joyce King after both had attended the summer session at North Texas State College in Denton. On assuming the position as band director at New Deal, he enrolled at Texas Tech for night courses in music education this fall.

Mrs. Curry's death brought the 1958 traffic fatalities on the South Plains to 59, compared with 78 last year at this time and to 1,001 since careful records of fatalities in the area were started eight years and nine months ago.

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Bulldogs Are Still Seeking First Victory at Seagraves

Tahoka Bulldogs meet another tough foe tonight when they go up against the Eagles at Seagraves. Friday of next week, Tahoka enters another tough, the Ralls Jackrabbits.

The Eagles have won two and tied one, taking New Home 34 to 0 and Slaton 16 to 0 before being tied last Friday night by Crosbyton 16-16.

Although Coach A. D. Shaver lost nine top boys last year, he has 12 lettermen back this year and several of them are making top players. Like O'Donnell, Seagraves' fullback Joe Faulkenberry sometimes moves to quarterback to replace regular QB Dennis Grimes. The Eagles combine a strong running attack and a dangerous passing game.

Probable starters in the backfield are: Grimes, 180, senior letterman; Halfbacks James Moore, 165, and Max Cain, 150, both senior lettermen; and at fullback, either Jack Prestridge, 153, senior letterman, or Joe Faulkenberry, 150, a sophomore squadman.

In the line will be Dick Stephenson, 160, letterman and top pass snatcher, and Bobby Bullock, 150, at ends; Charles Welch, 145, senior letterman, Don Taylor, 160 junior letterman, or Charles Yokum, 190 senior, at tackles; Pat Blakely, 175, and Billy Harris, 170, both senior lettermen, at guards; and Jimmy Sterling, 160 junior letterman, at center.

Coach Bill Haralson will probably go with about the same boys he has been using, except for Billy Tomlinson, halfback and linebacker, who will be out another week or two with his knee injury.

Tahoka has a green, inexperienced team this year, and most of the boys with experience in the line are playing positions new to them.

"Grapevine" has it that the Coach is working the boys this week on rushing the passer and breaking up the long ones. The boys have a good attitude and should round out into a better team as the season progresses. Except for a few minor flaws, they have been playing sound ball.

Although Tahoka lost to O'Donnell 28 to 20 last Friday, the boys showed more drive, more hustle, and better line play than in the games with Denver City or Seminole.

Two Are Charged With Burglaries

A quantity of merchandise was taken at Wilson, and merchandise and money were taken at O'Donnell.

Irrigation systems have been planned on the L. W. Goad farm northwest of New Home, H. B. Rinne, Raymon Cudd, and A. A. Rinne farms east of Wilson.

Requests for building or rebuilding terraces have been received on the O. R. Ramsey, Charles Brookshire, M. B. Fuchs, A. N. Norman Jr., T. F. Moore, and L. D. Halford farms. If you are planning on building or rebuilding terraces this coming season let us know your intentions in order that better planning assistance in layout and installation can be given.

Small grains for cover crops are up to a good stand following last week's showers. There is still time to plant rye, winter barley, winter oats, Austrian winter peas for cover crops and soil improvement. Some of the methods of seeding

that are successfully used in this district are with inter-row seeders, broadcast seeders, cotton dusters, grain drills, row crop planters and other equipment.

Ellis Barns of Wells has a stand of rye that was seeded by airplane on his irrigation cotton land and around his farmstead. Welch Flippen has seeded approximately 1,000 acres of rye with a cotton duster that is up to a stand where he has received showers. Raymond Holder has a good stand of rye and barley that was planted in his cotton with an inter row seeder.

"This year's early harvest of grain sorghums offers excellent opportunity to plant soil building crops. These crops not only reduce erosion by wind and water, but will reduce the amount of tillage yet at the same time add organic matter, help break up plow pans and tractor wheel compaction zones by root penetration and enable the soil to store and hold more moisture.

Managing these cover crops is the key to preserving the moisture for the crop that follows. The plowdown of these crops in March when the moisture requirements begin to increase fits into our normal methods of seeded preparation. The cost of seeding varies from \$1.00 per acre for rye to \$2.50 for winterpeas. Turn rows, field borders and areas around the farmstead should be seeded every year because of the protection that is given to the farm.

Bible reading is often random and haphazard with very little inspiration resulting. Dr. S. Parks Cadman, America's first radio preacher, used to say, "I read the Bible like I eat fish. I eat the meat and leave the bones." Some scriptures have greater inspirational value than others. Many a person has become discouraged about reading the Bible because he had no system to guide him. Others have made the mistake of trying to begin at the beginning and read the whole book "straight through" and were unable to grasp its vast sweep of material. It is like attempting to read all the books in a library regardless of their application to one's understanding.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Probably never has there been such a barefaced attempt to use public funds to destroy small business as that made recently in Minnesota.

In that state, one Byron G. Allen, commissioner of agriculture, sent out a letter with a credit card enclosed to over 200,000 teachers, educators and state employees urging them to use the enclosed cards to patronize some 83 cooperative gasoline stations.



In his letter, Commissioner Allen said "Under the basic law creating our Department of Agriculture, Dairy and Food, we are charged with aiding, abetting and promoting the cooperative movement."

As a matter of fact, the state official took the stand that he has a sworn duty to promote cooperative business.

Thus, a public official, paid by taxes, paid in part by independent gasoline station operators, uses his office to promote the ruin of those independent operators.

This could very well be called economic cannibalism.

As is well known, cooperatives enjoy huge tax advantages over their independent competition due to the law that was set up to meet special circumstances.

When federal and state laws were set up for cooperatives, it was the intent to help farmers throw off the yoke of farm commodity speculators who bid up and down prices to suit their profits. By enabling farmers to enter into

the business of selling their own crops, building suitable storage facilities, et al, a more orderly marketing procedure was intended. But it was never intended that this law, with its tax advantages, would permit any group to destroy free enterprise.

On several occasions, the nation's independent businessmen, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have gone on record as favoring measures which would put co-operatives on the same tax basis as independent operators.

There are many in Congress who favor such legislation. After all, it would stop the leak of billions in taxes.

Commissioner Allen's action dramatically points up the need for such legislation, as without such measures, there is no prediction of where bureaucrats with his turn of mind can push American free enterprise.

As to be expected, the local Minnesota businessmen affected by this direct mail campaign of public expense are planning to fight, on a purely local basis.

Yet, there seems to be a basic issue here that probably deserves national attention. A fire in any home in a block is of concern to all who live on that block.

And if Commissioner Allen is successful in using public office in Minnesota to destroy independent enterprise, there is no predicting how far the prairie fire can spread, because if a state official can promote cooperative service stations, what's to prevent these same officials from promoting cooperative grocery stores, dry good stores, hardware stores, or any type of business that exists. It does not seem the viciousness of this move can be underestimated.
