# Prospests Fair For Two New Oil Fields

Tests are reported to be continuing, with prospects good for a producer, on the new oil wells 12 miles northwest of Tahoka and three miles east of Petty. It is about six miles east of Pennsylvanian production in the small Tahoka field west of Petty.

Tuesday, swabbing was reported to have produced new oil from the upper Ordovician formation, identified as the Montoya.

The well is known as the W. E. Bakke of Midland and San Antonio No. 1-158 Mollie, C. Edwards, and is located 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of Section 158, Block 9, B. P. Fakes survey. A short distance to the south, on the same section, the Texas Company drilled a 7,238 foot dry hole in 1945.

On tests, Bakke reported recovered load and acid residue from perforations at 10,446-551 feet following 250 gallons mud acid treatment. An additional two hour swab produced oil at the rate of 11.70 barrels the first hour and 15.46 barrels the second hour. Shakeout was seven to 12 percent mud, and there was no water.

Wednesday's report said a four more oil, and indicated a well producing 231 barrels of oil a day if li were possible to maintain the Dies On Tuesday

The News is informed the operator has been trying to make a flowing well from the discovery. Herman Brown, Houston indeendent oil operator, has announced a new wildcat test and a new eastern Lynn county.

He will drill the third well in the newly discovered Block L-Glorietta pool, about three miles east of Wilson. The new test, just west of the discoveries on the Scott and Savell lands, is the No. 1 Rhods F. Coleman test, 330 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the west lines of Section 6, Block L, 1RR

The strictly wildcat test will be the No. 1 Ora Mining, 330 feet from the south and 2,300 feet from the west lines of Section 1258, J. Local Men Going R. Boles survey. It is northwest of the Gordon community production and south of the Suniland

The grass seeder is an adautation of a seeding method used many times before by a lot of farmers, and is so simple many have overlooked using the method on grass planting

The seeder developed by Ware is a can in which small holes have been punched, mounted inside the planter box, from which the "guts have been removed. Vibration chakes the fine grass seed out into the regulation planter box and thereby gives a fairly even distribution of the seed planted.

A. B. Cox states that possibly three thousand acres, or more, grass have been planted by this method in Lynn county.



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

The marketing quota program will be in operation for next year's crop, the chairman explains, if at least two-thirds of the voters cast in the referendum are in favor of the program. In that case, farm operators will have an opportunity to elect a choice between (A) complying with their "regular" farm allotments-with price support available at not less than 80 percent of parity for the 1959 crop of upland cotton, or (B) complying with an increased farm allotment 40 percent larger than the support at a level 15 percent of parity lower than under the first choice; quota penalties will apply to any cotton produced in excess of the chosen allotment.

If more than one-third of the votes are against quotas, there would be no quota penalties, only the regular allotments would be available, and the price support level to eligible growers would drop to 50 percent of parity.

The referendum will be held between the hours of 8 a. m. and 6 p. m. on Monday, December 15.



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



The Postmasfer said further that right now is the time to plan your Christmas card and gift mailings. The first thing to do is to check your Christmas card list very carefully-make sure that each address particularly on mail to larger cities includes full name, street and number, city, zone and state.

He went on to say that by little advance planning, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the Christmas rush is on. The Postmaster suggests that you stock up now on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape, for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. Rememadd the appropriate First Class mail stamps to the postage for the package itself.

Be sure to use only First Class four cent, or seven cent Air Mail postage on your Christmas cards. All cards sent by First Class mail may include a personal handwritten message, whereas a signature only is authorized on cards that are mailed at the three cent, Third

Class rate. The Postmaster says it's especial y important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to both

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


