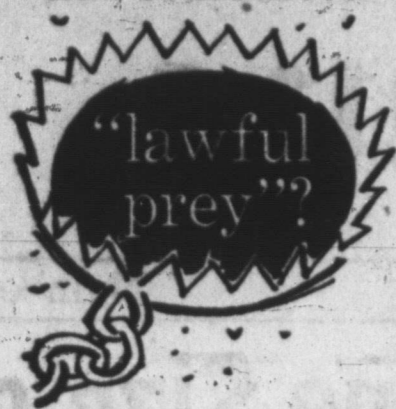

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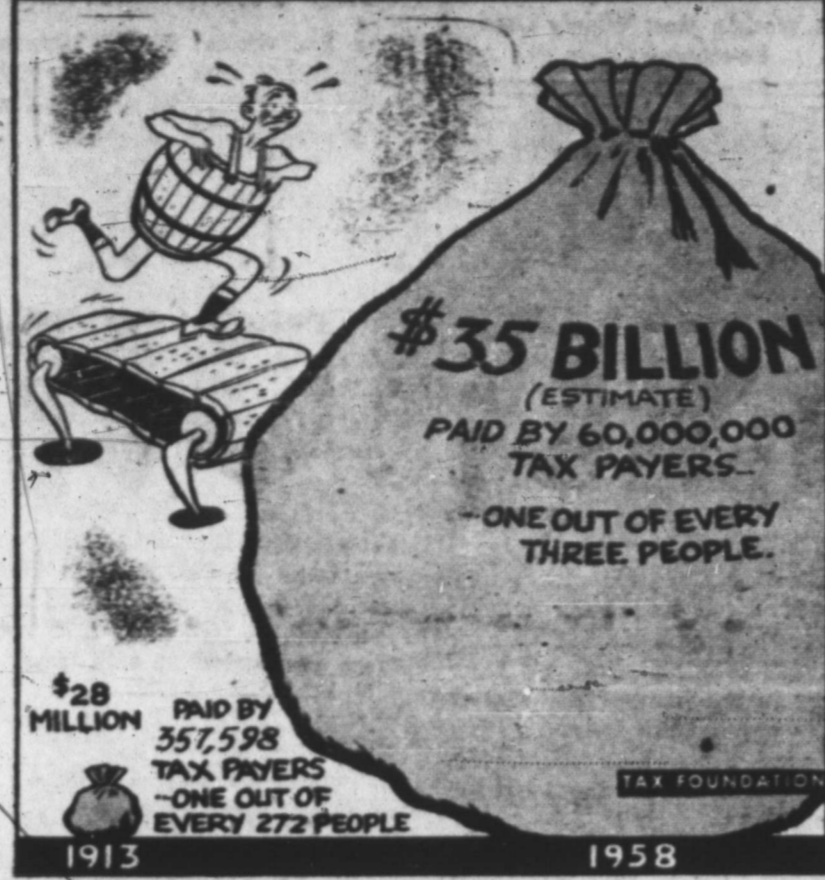

## Bulldogs Put Up Fine Defense In Final Game Loss To Floydada

Tahoka Bulldogs closed out their 1958 football season at Floydada Friday night with a 12 to 0 loss, but turned in one of their best performances of the year.

Floydada had been picked earlier in the season as one of the top AA teams in the state; in fact, some sports writers still had them in the top ten until their 8-0 loss to Spur Bulldogs, champions of District 3-AA who met Crane Friday in bi-district play.

The Bulldogs won only two games in 10 starts, one over Sea, graves 20 to 8, and a conference game over Post 18 to 9. Thus, Tahoka ended the season in fourth place in district just above Post, in the cellar. Spur was undefeated in conference play, Floydada lost one, Slaton won two and lost three, and Post lost four games.

This was the last game for seven Tahoka seniors, Billy Tomlinson and Weldon Calloway, backs who have been out several weeks with injuries and could not play in this one; Jerry Hays, back; David Bray, center and guard; John Hegi, guard and tackle; Jerry Adams, end, and Robert Cloe, back.

Even though playing Floydada an excellent game with a few breaks Tahoka may have given the Whirlwinds an even rougher battle. For example, of the six punts (one blocked, four were against the strong wind, and a fumble rubbed out one Tahoka scoring effort).

The Bulldogs played a fine game defensively, considering the fact that three starting backfield boys

including the above and Junior David Copeland, were out of the line up entirely and another, Kenneth Stice, seeing only limited service due to injuries, Tahoka also put up a fine offensive effort.

Tahoka had a bad break right at the start when the kickoff ball was touched, and run out of the end zone by Robert Cloe to the one yard line. Tahoka carried out to the 16, where Cain's attempted punt was blocked and Floydada recovered on the Tahoka 10. However, on the second play Tahoka covered a Floydada fumble, moved out to the 24 with Billy Cain, Ronnie Walters, Cloe and George Adams carrying, and Cain punted out of danger to the Floydada 38. Rest of the quarter was a see-saw affair.

Floydada scored both its touchdowns in the second quarter. Tahoka over on its 49, the Whirlwinds moved in 12 plays and four first downs to the Tahoka 1 with Williams, Vickers, Teague and Gilliland carrying. Then QB Rodney Teague bucked over for the score. Conversion failed. Score, 6-0.

Floydada made no first downs in the first four quarters, all 12 coming in the second and third. Tahoka had two in the first, two in the second, none in the third, and five in the last.

On defense, outstanding for Tahoka were John Hegi, David Bray, Larry Spruiell, Dean Elliott, Jerry Adams and Roy Thomas. Richard Stice also did well, but played only part of the game after receiving an injury early. Elliott also went out with an injury in the third.

### Expanded 4-H Tractor Program

College Station, Nov. 20—Better care and maintenance for Texas' 300,000 farm tractors and the 2.5 million pieces of allied equipment is the aim of the 4-H club tractor program which gets underway in the State next week.

"We have designed the program this year to reach more people in the areas where farm tractors are most numerous by doubling the number of training schools for adult 4-H club leaders," said W. L. Ulich, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

He said 30 training schools would be held to train 4-H adult leaders in such fields as safety, the importance of kinds and uses of lubricants and the proper maintenance of cooling, ignition and fuel systems of farm tractors. The leaders in turn will instruct 4-H club members in the communities and counties.

"This is a care and not a repair program," Ulich emphasized. It has been proved that much of the money spent for tractor repairs could be saved if operators would follow a well-planned maintenance program.

Primary objectives of the program are to provide increasing opportunities for adult leaders and 4-H club members to learn to operate and care for tractors, skillfully, safely, and economically, and to share their knowledge with other club members and tractor owners and at the same time develop their leadership and citizenship abilities. The program is nationwide and its sponsors provide awards on the county, state and national levels for outstanding achievement.

In Texas the 4-H tractor program is sponsored cooperatively by the Humble Oil and Refining Company; the National Committee

### Cotton Program Vote December 15

College Station, Nov. 20—How farmers vote in the cotton marketing quota referendum to be held throughout the Nation's cotton-growing area on December 15 will determine whether quota penalties will apply, the kind of allotment program in effect, and also the level of price support for 1959 crop cotton. The referendum therefore is of vital concern to every cotton grower, says Searcy M. Ferguson, Chairman of the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The marketing quota program will be in operation for next year's crop, the chairman explains, if at least two-thirds of the voters cast in the referendum are in favor of the program. In that case, farm operators will have an opportunity to elect a choice between (A) complying with their "regular" farm allotments—with price support available at not less than 80 percent of parity for the 1959 crop of upland cotton, or (B) complying with an increased farm allotment 40 percent larger than the "regular" farm allotment—with support at a level 15 percent of parity lower than under the first choice; quota penalties will apply to any cotton produced in excess of the chosen allotment.

If more than one-third of the votes are against quotas, there would be no quota penalties, only the regular allotments would be available, and the price support level to eligible growers would drop to 50 percent of parity. All farmers who were engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 will be eligible to vote in the referendum.

The referendum will be held between the hours of 8 a. m. and 6 p. m. on Monday, December 15.

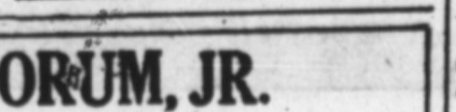

### Christmas Mail Time Is Here

Postmaster W. E. Smith said today, "Christmas may seem quite a way off, but nevertheless, we're starting our annual 'Mail Early For Christmas' campaign immediately, because there's every indication that the 1958 Christmas season will set an all time mailing record."

The Postmaster said further that right now is the time to plan your Christmas card and gift mailings. The first thing to do is to check your Christmas card list very carefully—make sure that each address particularly on mail to larger cities includes full name, street and number, city, zone and state.

He went on to say that by a little advance planning, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the Christmas rush is on. The Postmaster suggests that you stock up now on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape, for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. Remember, also, that you can include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package if you'll add the appropriate First Class mail stamps to the postage for the package itself.

Be sure to use only First Class four cent, or seven cent Air Mail postage on your Christmas cards. All cards sent by First Class mail may include a personal handwritten message, whereas a signature only is authorized on cards that are mailed at the three cent, Third Class rate.

The Postmaster says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to both you and your friends in keeping your mailing lists up-to-date.

Through the fine cooperation of the public during recent years, Postmaster Smith reports that great progress has been made in getting the Christmas mails through on time. He is making many advance preparations to handle the 1958 Christmas mail rush, with extra mail clerks, carriers, and expanded facilities all around. Speaking further about his plans, the Postmaster said, "With over 170,000,000 people in the U. S. A. today, that means more Christmas mail than ever before, and that's why the Post Office needs your help in planning your Christmas mailings well in advance."

Christmas cards and gifts for most distant points should be mailed first, preferably well before December 10th, and those for nearby points should be mailed by December 15th, or at least a week before Christmas.

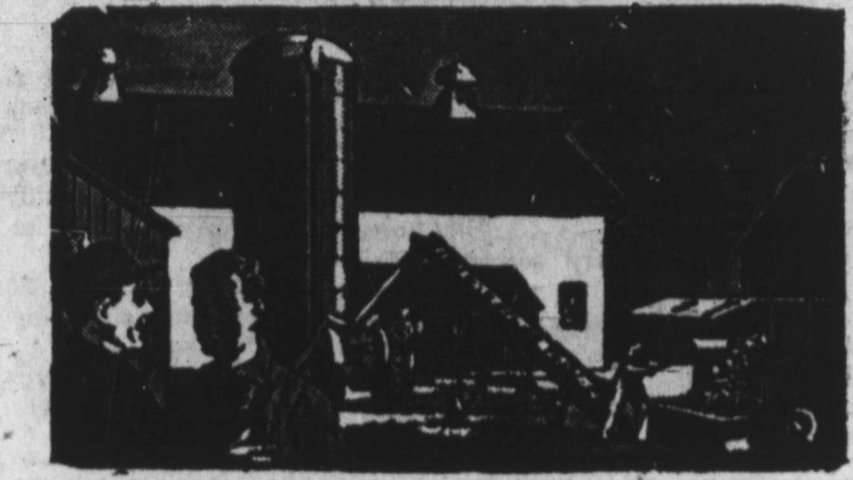
