The state's number one money juestion of "Will there be higher taxes?" has quickly resolved itself into a new but firm conclusion amog lawmakers.

There seems to be little doubt that the 56th Legislature is going to raise taxes.

The question now is "where, and how much, shall taxes be raised this session?"

Rep. Frates Seeligson, considered a top House tax authority, has proposed a general sales tax designed to raise \$67 million a year for "aid to education."

Seeligson's general sales tax would apply to most products except feeds, food and fertilizer. In support of his plan, he says his tax "will hurt little men in Texas far

Grounds around the club house The Governor, in his inaugural address, indicated that he could bring the state out of its money doldrums with a msmaller tax program than the one used to solve similar problems encountered by the 1955 Legislature.

> The Governor, at this time, has not made public the details of his program. Neither has he altered his estimates of the budget requirements of another \$65 million a year over and above already anticipated state income during the next two years.

Gov. Daniel is scheduled this week to reveal his emergency action to obtain sufficient general fund money to complete the presat ent biennium ending Aug. 31, with the state's book in balance.

The House of Representatives has considered transfer of money from surplus of a program within the Department of Public Safety and from an unspent, "unneeded welfare fund" in order to provide \$2,300,000 for a biennium legislative expense bill.



For some time, some high officials in public speeches, have been raising this matter apparently as a trial balloon, to test

Whether or not this would be proposed as a substitute for the present income tax, or as an additionaltax, is not yet

made clear.

One thing C. W. Harder seems certain. Any-such propos al will have determined opposi-

For example, on several occasions, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, the nation's small businessmen have voiced opposition to such a measure.

For one thing, this would put business firms still deeper into the situation whereby they are instrumentalities of the United States government when it comes to tax collections.

It is perhaps well nigh impossible for anyone not operating a business to realize how much is shouldered by the average business in acting as an involuntary tax collection agency.

For example, in most states, a retailer not only has to collect income tax from his employees, he must also collect from them social security and unemployment taxes, excise taxes on goods carrying them, local sales taxes, just to mention a few-

perfect accounting of these col-lections, and also keep constantly informed of all the multitude of rules and regulations pertaining to these taxes.

In most cases, this becomes such a major task, that it is necessary to employ experts on these matters.

Thus, a national sales tax would further aggravate the situation, because business would be expected to collect this tax.

In addition, it seems quite specious to believe that imposition of a national sales tax would reduce other taxes. True, as a beginning, there might be some reductions in other items, but once government gets a new source of revenue established, there seems to be no end to the extent of brand new "necessary" expenditures.

Rather, solution to national debt problem is for Congress to work out immediate means of reducing government expenditures. On this score, there seems to be general agreement. Only thing missing is action.

Yet simple arithmetic shows the need for action. For example, if a 2% national sales tax were to be levied tomorrow, which would be quite a high tax, it would bring in fresh revenues less than half of what the nation has been currently throwing away in foreign give aways.

Thus, Congress will have to face up to the fact that it is time to chop down expenditures. As it is now, government is in the position of the man who unable to meet payments on his

Their first home on the section was of two 14-foot rooms and a porch. The land lay in the Tahoka Lake Ranch of Col. C. C. Slaughter, which was managed by the late Jack Alley, foster father of Mrs. Hall Robinson. This section was later traded to the late Ed Redwine, and finally came into possession of the H. W. Mays, and now is a part of the May Ranch.

Lynn county was organized in the Spring of 1903, and Mr. Mc. Daniel had a hand in the organization and the establishment of the Tahoka townsite.

In the first election, he was elected county clerk. He paid \$10.00 each for the three lots on which they built their home in Tahoka in 1904-1905, which was replaced by the present home in about 1915. Incidentally, Mr. Mc-Danied had to pay \$200.00 some time later for the lot now occupied by Mc-O Drive-In.

Mr. McDaniel passed away on December 21, 1937, and she has continued to live in the same house on lots they acquired nearly 56 years ago.

She was born Mary Alice Nelson 'r. Missouri on June 11, 1867, just following the Civil War. When she was nine, her parents came to Texas, settling first at Gainesville and later moving to Jack county. Here, she met Sam Mc Daniel, and the couple married

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

The organization of Rainbow grew out of an idea of Mark Sexton while addressing a DeMolay Chapter that there should be an Order for girls setting forth some of the truths of Masonry.

Each year on the Sunday nearest April 6th (Founder's Day) the girls attend church in a group in observance of that day. On July 8 (Founder's birthday) this is observed by some special event.

This organization is governed by a Supreme As-

sembly and Grand Assembly. The girls are taught to live a life of active service and they respond to all calls.

Tahoka Rainbow Assembly No. 234 was organized in 1953, at which time we had to have 25 members in order to get a charter. Today we have an enrollment of approximately 70 girls.
