More and more farmers and ranchers are inquiring about the Great Plains Conservation Program as time progresses. The following article outlines the purposes of this program.

The Great Plains Conservation Program is a long range program. Its purpose is to assist farmers and ranchers in carrying out approved plans of operation for the mitigation of climatic hazards and the protection of their land from erosion and deterioration by natural causes. Achievement of this purpose will bring about greater stability for the agriculture of the area.

To participate in the program, a farmer or rancher shall furnish a plan of operations, satisfactory to the Secretary, which incorporates needed cropping systems and land use changes along with needed soil and water practices in pro-

per combinations. The plan of operation shall include a schedule for carrying out these measures within a period of not less than three years and not to exceed 10 years.

The Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to enter into a contract with such a farmer or rancher to assist him in carrying out his plan of operations. The contract will assure the farmer or rancher of needed cost-sharing assistance in carrying out his individual plan as rapidly as conditions permit.

Last year 10 million dollars was appropriated for this program but due to its wide acceptance this figure has been increased by two million dollars for the coming year.

Terraces are to be constructed for Boyd Barnes, R. L. Hagler and A. B. Farlow. Lines have already been established for Barnes and Farlow.

D. W. Hancock is doing land leveling and installing irrigation pipeline on his farm. This is a part of an overall conservation plan.

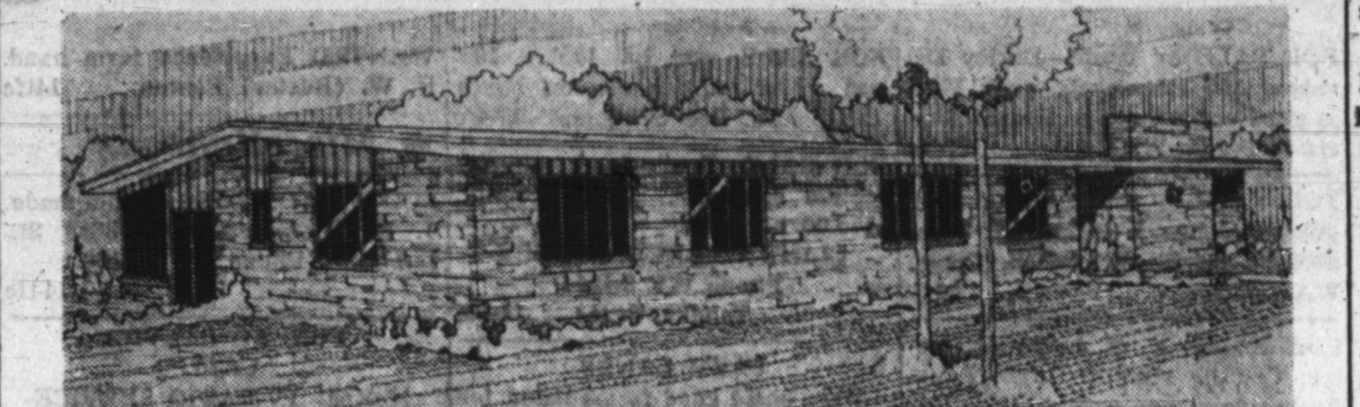
SALEH BANK DIRECTOR

Mrs. S. N. McDaniel, 91, Came Here Before Lynn County Was Organized

Mrs. S. N. (Alice) McDaniel, 91, is not only one of Lynn county's oldest citizens, but there are few people who have lived here longer than she.

She and her late husband, who was the first county clerk of Lynn county, came here in 1902, and she has been here ever since.

The year before, 1901, they had come out in a covered wagon from Jacksboro and looked over the country around Gail, Big Spring, and San Angelo. Accompanying the couple of the camping-prospecting trip were their four children, her mother, and neighboring friends.

The McDaniels decided to make the move west, and came out to Lubbock in the spring of 1902. Lubbock was just a "wide place in the road" at that time and they couldn't find a place to live.

They had started for Big Spring and got as far as Sulphur Draw, down in Dawson county, when they ran into some surveyors who suggested they might settle in Lynn county, where settlers were filling on land.

There was no such thing as Tahoka, but "Old Man" Woods had filed on a section of land out at Lynn and had established a store and postoffice there, predating only by the original postoffice at Grassland. Mr. Woods invited them to move in with him in his dugout, which they did.

Their next move was to find some land to file on. S. N. located a section east of Tahoka Lake, part of which ran down to the lake, and they went to Lubbock and camped "under a mesquite bush" while Mr. McDaniel sweated out the filing process at the courthouse.

Their first home on the section was of two 14-foot rooms and a porch. The land lay in the Tahoka Lake Ranch of Col. C. C. Slaughter, which was managed by the late Jack Alley, foster father of Mrs. Hall Robinson. This section was later traded to the late Ed Redwine, and finally came into possession of the H. W. Mays, and now is a part of the May Ranch.

Lynn county was organized in the Spring of 1903, and Mr. McDaniel had a hand in the organization and the establishment of the Tahoka townsite.

In the first election, he was elected county clerk. He paid \$10.00 each for the three lots on which they built their home in Tahoka in 1904-1905, which was replaced by the present home in about 1915. Incidentally, Mr. McDaniel had to pay \$200.00 some time later for the lot now occupied by McO Drive-In.

Mr. McDaniel passed away on December 21, 1937, and she has continued to live in the same home on lots they acquired nearly 56 years ago.

She was born Mary Alice Nelson in Missouri on June 11, 1867, just following the Civil War. When she was nine, her parents came to Texas, settling first at Gainesville and later moving to Jack county. Here, she met Sam McDaniel, and the couple, married.

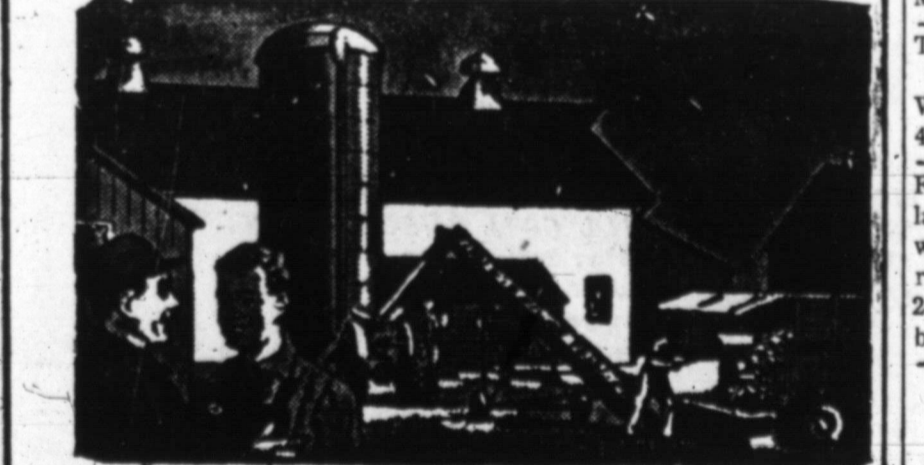

Who Are Helping Send The Rainbow Girls to the Grand Assembly in San Antonio Next June

The organization of Rainbow grew out of an idea of Mark Sexton while addressing a DeMolay Chapter that there should be an Order for girls setting forth some of the truths of Masonry.

Each year on the Sunday nearest April 6th (Founder's Day) the girls attend church in a group in observance of that day. On July 8 (Founder's birthday) this is observed by some special event.
